McConnell Sparks Niagara To NIT Berth

The Purple Eagles of Niagara University, in the midst of a vigorous late season drive that resulted in a berth in the National Invitation Tournament, are "banking on" the developmet of a new star who has carried the Niagara team out of the depths of a three-game losing streak and onto the crest of a promising winning surge. Niagara was the sixth team selected for the N.I.T. after drubbing NYU, 72-54 at Madison Square Garden, Thursday night.

Jim McConnell, a speedy, junior guard is the brightest star on the highly regarded Niagara University basketball quintet at this stage of the winter campaign, reports Bob Lowe, sport publicity director at Niagara. It is a confident, Lowe, sport publicity director at Niagara, It is a confident, poised and experienced McConnell who has shaken off the low man on a totem pole" shroud which covered up his local March of Dimes drive. slow, but sure development during the past two seasons.

As a sophomore McConnell won his spurs the hard way.

When the 1952-53 campaign opened he was a replacement for Captain Johnny McMahon. He slowly developed to the point where he alternated with McMahon at the starting assign-ment, drawing more and more action as the successful sea-

But, at the start of the present campaign, the former Belleville High standout again was the fifth wheel on the team. It was not a question of his ability, but rather of his limited experience compared with the other four starters who were stepping off on their third consecutive season as teammates on varsity. McConnell, however, was content to plug away, polishing up on his playing skills in defense, passing and play-making while chipping in with five, six or seven points a night.

When the Niagara fortunes took a turn for the worse and the Eagles took it on the chin from both Duquesne and Canisius in late January, McConnell suddenly broke loose in a successful effort to establish himself as one of the boys.

Niagara dropped its third straight game against Holy Cross in overtime, but McConnell broke loose for 18 points in addition to a strong all-around performance. Playing as a running mate along side of Niagara's All-American candidate, captain Larry Costello, McConnell had learned the tricks of the trade wrote Lowe. Costello was "the target" of each and every opponent on the schedule, especially since he had accounted for 510 points during 1952-58.

The 13 points by McConnell equalled the previous high game score the Belleville cager had achieved on varsity. He followed through with 13 more points against a host Syracuse team as the latter fell before the NU courtsters, 90-70, marking the first time in a number of seasons that Niagara had managed to whip Syracuse in both ends of a home-and-home series.

Next Niagara opposed St. Bonaventure in a crucial Little Three Conference filt with first place in the standings at stake. McConnell turned ne his peak performance as a varsity player with 16 points, including 14 in a sizzling first half demonstration which carried Niagara through to a clean cut victory. McConnell connected on seven of seven shots from the field, as he "showed up" teammate Charlie Hoxie who is the No. I field goal percentage shooter in the nation with a 55.5 average.

The Purple Eagles made it three straight victories with a 74.50 verdict over Siena. McConnell continued his scoring spurt as he led his team with 17 points including the first three points of the game. With 10 recorded against NYU, he now has 153 points in 20 starts for a 7.6 average.

With McConnell giving the Eagles added scering punch, making the rivals' assignment in each game the rugged task of stopping five stellar scorers, Niagara's chances in the NIT seem brighter than ever. The talented jumor possesses an accurate set shot in-addition to blazing speed for driving layurs with the added striking power of a neat jump-shot. He excells on defense and pass interceptions.


