The remarkable but reckless valor of the extreme right wing of the Republican Party continues to be one of the marvels of the American political scene. The drive of some Republicans to defeat Clifford Case, the Republican Party's primary nominee for sena tor in New Jersey, is only the clearest cur rent example.

They are a minority within the right wing of the Republican Party. If the political statisticians are right, less than half the voters still claim allegiance to the Republi-can Party. So this group really constitutes a minority of one wing of a minority.

Yet, when questioned as to reasons for their position, they often reply, "Defeating left-wingers will prove that the party must return to a sound conservative position. That is the only way we can bring out the stay-at-home Republican vote and reclaim the nation." This view does more credit to their courage than to their knowledge or logic

Some of these people are actuated by the

Very often such "die-hards" will join on special issues with other groups in both parties—and temporily have an influence on events. But how they ever expect to capture the Republican Party, to say nothing of the nation, is hard to understand. For the great is overwhelmingly against them. The great successes of the Republican Party in recent years have come where it has put up progressive candidates. progressive candidates. The record of the Eisenhower adminis-tration should hold a lesson for the "diehards"—and for those influenced by them. Time after time the administration has tried to satisfy extreme right-wing views -been led into mistakes or compelled by public ion to reverse itself.

Very early was the plan to repudiate Yalta. It had to be abandoned in the face of facts and Senate votes. Then there was the effort to "go along" with Senator McCarthy. It gravely damaged the foreign service, produced increasing dissension and the row with the Army, to say nothing of current embar-rassments. The same reckless group promoted the "massive retaliation" fiasco and the bluff in Indochina.

In the field of domestic legislation right wingers in Congress tried to sabotage many parts of the Eisenhower program but lacked the votes. On housing, on revision of the Taft-Hartley Act, and on other measures they were beaten although having the help of some Democrats. On farm price supports and social security (both socialistic in the right-wingers' lexicon) they found no comfort in either party.

There is always something admirable about the man who sticks to his convictions in the face of great odds. But is it conviction or something else which prompts a right-wing Republican to vote for Democratic left-wingers in order to punish Republican moderates? Some right-wing Democrats can keep their convictions and yet vote Republican. But what future is there for extreme right-wing Republicans? Will they continue like Don Quixote to tilt at wind-mills, or will they recognize that moderate Republicanism is their best political hope?

Of the two Communist forces, that in France is, the most vigorous, politically; that in Italy has the widest mass support, hence is the most dangerous.


