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# SPOTLIGHT ON SPORTS

1954 In Review

1954 was an eventful year for Belleville as far as sportsmen were concerned. It was a 12-month period that saw many unexpected happenings occur. So let's turn back the pages and see if you recall some of the highlights of 1954.

In basketball, Coach Jitty Wische molded a successful court team without the aid of a single leterman. One of the games that will go down as a thriller was played after the start of the new year when Bloomfield provided the opposition. Belleville won, 58-57, with Andy LeVelle's free throw conversion in the final two seconds of play deciding the eventual outcome. Pat Grosso scored 27 points in that game. Never did either team enjoy more than a three-point lead as the two quintets saw the score deadlocked 19 times and change hands another 19 times.

Another well earned victory was against arch rival Nutley High. The Bellboys seeded third in the eighth annual Essex County Tournament, was upset by unseeded Orange, 54-52 in an overtime thriller. Wische's team completed the regular season with seven successive victories for an overall mark of 11 wins against only four defeats.

After the close of the season more than 140 of Belleville's avid basketball supporters attended the Varsity Club's eighth annual Basketball Banquet with seniors Pat Grosso, Gary Burman, Bob Taylor and Rocco Cafone receiving in dividual trophies. Basketball official Jerry Malloy was the principal speaker.

Installed to serve a second term as president of the Varsity Club was Ralph Casale. Other officers are Harold Fohert, vice president; Markland O'Connell, treasurer; and Norm Leach, secretary.

At Hasbrouck Height, signed a baseball contract to pilot the at Hasbrouck Heights, signed a baseball contract to pilot the freshman at Fairleigh Dickinson College, in Rutherford.

Jim McConnell, former Blue and Gold court performer, was one of the bulwarks in the successful campaign enjoyed by Niagara University that carried the Purple Eagles into the National Invitation Tournament and a chance for home fans to get a look at him in action. McConnell and his teammates received wrist watches for winning the consolation round.

The Recreation Department's ten-team Intermediate Basketball League finished up the season with the Continentals and Trueters declared co-champions. School No. 7 won the Elementary School League title edging School No. 1. In the Girl's Basketball League the Juniorettes came out on top.

John Chiselco, of Somerville, repeated last year's win in the senior 25-mile event of the "Tour of Belleville" before 2,000. He was timed in 1 hour 3 minutes and 20 seconds as compared to the U. S. record of 1 hour 2 minutes and 14 seconds.

In the spring, four former members of Bill Bennett's crews at Belleville High School were rowing with the Rollins College varsity at Winter Park, Fla. In the varsity shell were Norm Gross, Bud Bilemski, Don Weber and Frank Thompson.

The B. H. S. crew suffered a mediocre season as the oarsmen traveled over 1,800 miles as they rowed against Dartmouth, Columbia, Kent, Lower Merion, Poughkeepsie High Schools and St. Andrews School. The crews, rowing in the National Schooboy Championships at Worcester, Mass., finished fourth in a qualifying heat involving five boats.

In baseball Coach Ed Berlinski inaugurated a new youth movement with sophomores and freshmen seeing increased action during the spring campaign. Letterman back were pitcher John Bartell, second baseman Al Johnston and shortstop Joe Long. Bartell bulwarked the pitching department for the Blue and Gold as Belleville completed the season with a six and three record good for fourth place in the Big Ten Conference. Highlight of the season was an upset victory over highly favored Montclair.

Joe Mignon, Belleville's outstanding sprinter, tied the 100-yard dash meet mark of 10 seconds flat when he beat out Norman Johnson, of Barringer, in the Essex County Group IV track and field jamboree at Montclair.

Belleville placed third in the 20th annual state golf championships, held at Jumping Brook Country Club. The Blue and Gold had a team score of 354 only two strokes behind Montclair and seven behind Ridgewood. Rod MacPherson captured second place low gross with an 81 and Gordon Wiegmann was third with an 82.

The Vesper Boat Club, of Philadelphia, led by Jack Kelly, captured the lion's share of the annual Memorial Day Regatta, of the New York Rowing Association, under the sponsorship of the Nereid Boat Club. The host Nereids won three of eight events entered.

School No. 7 won the Recreation Department's Elementary School baseball championship with a perfect record of seven wins and just edged School No. 8's six and one mark. For the third successive year Frank Casner invaded Nutley and walked off with the Junior Boys Tennis Tournament. He defeated Dave Brownell in the finals for the Olsen Memorial Trophy.

During the summer months a Belleville Recreation team for high school boys was organized with Bill Murphy managing the team. Home games were played at Municipal Stadium.

Twelve-year-old Mike Marano, bulwark of the Giant pitching staff, entered the Belleville Little League Hall of Fame as he pitched a no-hit, no-run game against the Dodgers in a 14-0 decision. The National All-Stars, after advancing to the final round, lost to Millburn, 4-3, for the Essex County sectional crown. In P.A.L. action Dave Schroeder of the Cubs, tossed a 2-0 no-hitter against the Giants. The Braves won the Babe Ruth toga.

DeRosa and Son's Wildcats copped the championship trophy in the Town-Wide Senior Softball League defeating the Babes. Federal Leather repeated as title holder in the industrial circuit.

In football Belleville had a rough season with Berlinski forced to start a new youth movement. The results were slow at the start but gradually picked up as the campaign progressed. After losing its first three games to East Orange, Bloomfield and Nutley without scoring a point, the Bellboys went on to tie West Side and trimmed Irvington and Hillside. The Blue and Gold finished the season with a record of three triumphs while losing five and tying one.

At the Varsity Club's Football Banquet earlier this month, ten seniors received individual statuettes while Mike Dal Bon was selected as winner of the Nelson J. Landon Memorial Trophy emblematic of the most improved player on the squad. Announced as co-captains for next fall were fullback Bob Paganelli and end Bob Castelli.

For those who did not know Dick before he went into service and suffered his mishap, he was a fine athlete himself. He loved all sports and was particularly good at baseball, playing the outfield. It was natural that in seeking an outlet for this love of sports, baseball would be his first choice.

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He will be sorely missed, by all of us in Little League and by the many boys who enjoyed the benefits of the game under his watchful eye.

Essex Republicanism  
At The Crossroads

Clean Government has an excellent opportunity for a long-needed shot in the arm with a powerful serum of new blood. The resignation of Anthony P. Miele as county chairman, announced in a letter to The Nutley Sun this week, makes it possible to provide the Republican county machine with new leadership. That leadership can come from the Old Guard, in which case the lesson of last November may become permanently chronic, or the new leadership can come from the fighting youth wing of the party which alone, in our opinion, can save the Republican party from a one-way downhill decline in Essex County.

Clean Government, at its inception, 30 years ago served a vital purpose. It gave Essex County honest government, but in its career of unbroken electoral successes it developed a fatty degeneration which is, alas, akin to political demise. As was proven last November, Clean Government is no longer invulnerable. It lost four seats on the Board of Freeholders and two county offices to the Democrats for the first time in three decades. It could lose more next year and it could lose, too, its Essex County monopoly in the State Legislature. Whether it does or not, depends entirely upon the decisions that will be taken in the next few days about Mr. Miele's succession.

It is our contention that Clean Government, if it is to survive, must follow the trend of Eisenhower Republicanism, a so-called "progressive liberalism" which is progressive only in the true sense of the word and liberal only to a point this side of New Dealism.

Any conquest of Clean Government's county leadership by the reactionary old Guard could spell its doom. Any trend away

from Eisenhower Republicanism could be fatal. Many names as Miele's successor have been advanced, John Cash, Percy Miller and Damon Douglas among them. In our opinion there is one county official whose name has not been mentioned but who, we are convinced, would bring to county leadership vital youth, fighting qualities and a strong determination. The man we have in mind is Neil Duffy, present Sheriff.

Set a youth to capture a youth vote, say we.

The judges remarked that many of the homes not entered the contest would have made the winners look to their laurels.

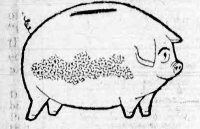

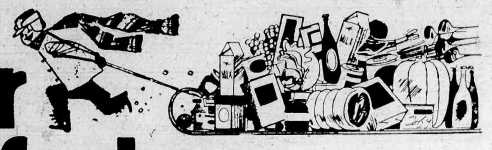

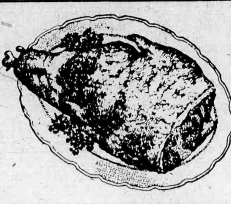
