

Court's Reversal in Greco Charges Bad Faith in Dismissal

Unanimous Decision By Superior Court Judges Charges Commissioners King And Smith Used Act For Circumventing Civil Service Tenure Rights

Copies of last week's Superior Court decision handed down in the Greco case have been received here this week, and upon review it appears that the higher court is, in effect, repudiating Belleville Town Commissioners Kenneth D. Smith and Joseph King for their part in the affair.

The Court, by ordering deposed building inspector Thomas P. Greco reinstated to his former position, nullifies the action of Smith and King and reverses the decision of the Civil Service Commission which upheld their dismissal of Greco.

Greco, who had served as building inspector from November 1, 1948, to his dismissal on March 1, 1955, has been ordered reinstated to his former position with full back pay. His dismissal for "reasons of economy" was found to be "arbitrary and capricious" and a violation of Civil Service. Greco's building inspector job had been transferred to Commissioner King's Department of Public Affairs at their meeting of February 21, 1955. The next working day, Greco was notified of his severance pay effective March 1. A subsequent appeal to the Civil Service Commission upheld his dismissal.

However, the present Superior Court reversal, which came as a surprise to many local observers, stated: "The abolition of a position in the municipal service, or the discharge of a person occupying that position, must not be merely colorable or a device for circumventing the employment law, but must be a bona fide business necessity, with the retention of the position in substance."

The decision further stated: "We are of the firm opinion that Greco's discharge served to eliminate a person whose Director King considered an undesirable and perhaps politically embarrassing official. Director King's motive in this discharge, readily joined in his scheme."

The decision holds that the position of building inspector was not abolished, its functions were turned over to town engineer Matthew Sheehan and his staff which included Greco as an aide, and three clerks. Acting building inspector has no legal standing because it is never a permanent position. The duties of the two positions are different and incompatible, according to Civil Service.

Full Time Duties Greco has testified that his duties were a full time nature. Sheehan said they consumed about 3 to 3 1/2 hours daily of his time. The Court found Greco's testimony more credible, since the position was self-sustaining. The verdict was a full time building inspector.

Red Cross Drive Chairman Harry J. Sullivan Extends Drive To Meet Goal

Chairman Harry J. Sullivan of the Red Cross Fund Raising Drive in Belleville reports that \$13,500 has been collected to date in the local chapter's fund raising appeal. The figure represents slightly more than 90 per cent of the \$26,000 goal which had been established locally by the county organization.

The drive, which was originally to have lasted during the month of March, has been indefinitely extended by Sullivan in an effort to meet the local goal. Collections were hampered during the early part of the drive by several heavy snows and a lack of volunteer workers.

Sullivan reported that returns were still coming in slowly, and that considerable money was still in the hands of collectors and would be due in the near future. Full returns from the industrial and commercial divisions are expected to give the drive a boost, Sullivan said.

The officers and Board of Directors have asked that the drive be kept going until all prospects have been contacted and all outstanding pledges have been collected.

Fund-raising leaders stressed the importance of the drive.

Did you ever hear of Aunt Flo? Chances are that if you've lived in town more than ten years you might remember a column written for people who had problems. The column, which appeared regularly in what was then the Belleville News.

Few people knew who the real author was, but anyone who has ever had dealings with the Town Clerk has met her in person.

Aside from her writing ambitions, Mrs. Florence R. Morey has a full-time job keeping records straight at Town Hall.

The most important part of her job is attending all meetings of the Board of Commissioners. Here she keeps detailed notes on the business at hand and later these notes are made into a permanent record. The records now in the town's safe date back to 1927, when she first came to Town Hall as secretary to former Town Clerk J. J. Day. Six years later when Mr. Day resigned, Mrs. Morey was appointed acting Town Clerk, and she remained in that position ever since, thus becoming the first lady Town Clerk in Belleville and one of the first in the state.

Mrs. Morey's other duties include registration for voting, and keeping records of all marriages. She reports of all departments of the city government, building bids and deeds.

Kidnapper Of Belleville Policeman Is Captured

Detectives Frank Haight And Jack Mariano Climax Year Long Investigation With Capture Of Theodore H. Rose In Carletur Last Week

The excellent work of two Belleville detectives resulted in the capture last week of one of the most wanted criminals by the local department. After a year's investigation, Detectives Frank Haight and Jack Mariano are able to say they got their man.

The year-long investigation and tracking down process came to a climax last Wednesday afternoon when a small army of police closed in on Theodore Hiram Rose, 30-year-old gunman wanted for the kidnapping of a Belleville policeman last May 30. Rose was wanted for kidnapping Patrolman David Waddell, 36, after police surprised him in Belleville High School during an attempted robbery.

According to police, Rose was in the school when a janitor heard noises and summoned police. Waddell, the first officer to enter the building, was grabbed from behind by Rose who shoved a pistol into the policeman's back. His warned other policemen to stand back or he'd shoot.

Commissioner Passes Measure To Relieve All-Night Parking

Board Hears Golden Ask That Commissioners Smith And King Resign Because Of Greco Firing

Meeting in one of their quietest sessions in many months, Belleville Town Commissioners Tuesday night passed on first reading an ordinance intended to alleviate the all-night parking problem for local residents, and heard citizen's comments on the Greco case.

The parking ordinance was introduced by Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan, director of the Department of Public Safety, and would allow all-night parking on alternate sides of the street on alternate nights.

The ordinance, amending the present traffic and parking regulations, reads: "In addition to other prohibited parking in town, no parking shall be permitted between the hours of 2 and 6 a.m. on the side of any street containing even street numbers on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday; and on the side containing odd numbers on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday."

Permits Parking In effect, the new ordinance permits residents to park their cars overnight on alternate sides of the street, except on the days when the ordinance is in effect. Regulations will go into effect after they receive final approval at the next Commission meeting.

Regarding the new regulations, Sullivan said that because of the increased number of cars in town, it was becoming increasingly difficult to enforce the existing ban on all-night parking in certain congested areas of town. The department is trying to be fair, he said, and this method seems to be the most satisfactory.

The new regulations would make it easier for the Department of Public Works to keep the streets clean, since the sweeper would have more time to sweep the whole side of a street every night, Sullivan said. It would also aid in cleaning for street cars, since all cars would have to be moved at least once every 24 hours.

The plan had originally been suggested by the Traffic Safety Committee, headed by Nuncio R. Sullivan, along with Police Chief Charles Spatz and Deputy Chief Harry McGinnis. They had discussed various possibilities and settled on the present ordinance.

CANCER CRUSADE COLLECTS \$7,000

Local National Guard Unit Mans Anti-Aircraft Post

Regular Army Leaves Branch Brook Installation Wednesday As Local AAA Battalion Takes Command; Lieutenant Says Openings For 60 Men

The local unit of the New Jersey National Guard will officially take over the Army's present anti-aircraft installation in Belleville's extension of Branch Brook Park on Wednesday, May 16. The unit, Battery B, 109th Anti-Aircraft Artillery Battalion, is headed by Lt. A. G. Biviano of Jersey City.

The present complement of regular Army men, comprising the 98th Anti-Aircraft Battalion, will leave the local installation for assignment to Washington. Regular Army men have manned the Branch Brook Park post for the past four or five years. National guardsmen have been in the installation since May 2, becoming indoctrinated with the routine of the post. They are now being phased out and will be officially assumed command. The change of command ceremonies will take place at the installation this Wednesday evening.

18 PERMANENT MEN The National Guard unit will have 18 full time men manning the anti-aircraft installation, with the remainder of the duties performed by the National Guard's part-time members. The regular weekly tour of duty. The local change is part of a national program whereby National Guard units are taking over these installations, releasing regular Army men to other parts of the country.

In taking over command, Lt. Biviano stated that the local unit has openings for approximately 30 more men to fill its complement. These openings are for clerks, cooks, motor vehicle mechanics, radio men, mechanics, and gunners.

The Lieutenant added, "This is an opportunity for the young men of Belleville to serve their community and themselves. In case of any emergency, Lt. Biviano said, local men could be summoned to the post within a matter of minutes. He pointed out that it was a "great opportunity" for young men interested in the reserves, since in most communities National Guard members must travel at least 25 miles to their post. Here, for the first time, he stressed, "local men can serve in their home community."

For anti-aircraft duty, all men are eligible between the ages of 17 and 45 who have not served in the regular Army yet. Men up to 18½, who enlist in the program, are exempt from the draft. The unit is open to all.

under attack was not motivated by a lone life yearning for economy and greater municipal efficiency. The office itself remains in existence. . . . Can point to no other economy affected through abolition of jobs or consolidation. . . . Greco's discharge was an isolated exercise in so-called municipal economy."

OVERSTATED

Pointing to an evident oversteering of the town's economic policy, the Court said if they could handle the additional load of the building inspectors' work, they had not originally been working to their full capacity. It suggested that a more economical arrangement . . . have been to retain Greco at \$4,000 and to disburse with the then assistant engineer Clifford Faust at \$2,500, or the engineering aide.

"What was done here under the guise of economy was illusory and in essence an evasion of civil service law," the decision said. The petitioner has carried the burden of proving bad faith, and has exposed the ineffectiveness of disposing of the petitioner without abolishing the post or giving him a hearing on charges, it added.

The decision cited the case history of the affair, starting with Greco winning certification for the job on August 3, 1948. He did not receive the appointment until November 1, with Campbell McCall, a friend of King's, filling the post in the interim. Although a resignation letter had been appropriated for the position, Greco could get no information on his appointment from the Civil Service Commission.

RESSENTFUL ATTITUDE

Greco claims that from the time of his appointment, King displayed a resentful attitude toward him. No secretarial assistance had been provided, and this work was done at home by Greco's wife.

King was quoted as saying, "I get along with anyone and also with Greco, but he couldn't get along with me." At the hearing King acknowledged that Greco's work was satisfactory, but complained of his "resentful attitude toward people."

The Town Commission election of November, 1954. The special question of changing the town's form of government had been defeated and Greco approached King in Town Hall to congratulate him. The testimony shows that King replied, "I want to thank you for everything you did not do for me in the campaign."

To which Greco said, "I would like to thank you for everything you never did for me." King did not deny that he answered with, "I will take care of you."

SMITH QUOTED

The first notice Greco had of his transfer to South department was at the Commission meeting where the change was effected. Questioning Smith on the reason, he was told, "The department was transferred" and "Don't think you're going to get away with the crap you've done."

Although denying any personal prejudice against Greco, on one occasion King actually tried him on formal charges supposedly based on citizens' complaints. The trial resulted in an admonition to Greco to improve his conduct.

One of the most important pieces of testimony that aided the Court in forming their opinion was presented by John J. Goff, president of the Essex Council of the New Jersey State Civil Service Association. Goff presented a conversation he had with King at a convention in Atlantic City, attributing to King the statement, "Greco was too strict in his enforcement and it isn't good politically. He will have to change his ways if he is going to stay on."

The Court's decision concludes: "On a consideration of all the circumstances, we have concluded that the petitioner has sustained the burden of showing that bad faith, and not mere considerations of economy and municipal efficiency motivated his discharge. The mere fact that the removal of an individual from the municipal payroll results in an economy is not the exclusive test, since such removal will always be manifested by a saving. The question is, not narrowly whether a plan conceived and adopted for the purpose of saving money actually, in practice, attained that purpose, but whether the design in adopting the plan was to accomplish economy, or, in the

They will receive one full day's pay for the two-hour training period and regular pay for the summer training program. The starting rate for a private is \$75 a month.

Men in the National Guard are eligible for Army Service Schools to receive specialized training. A retirement and pension program also exists.

Jewish people throughout the world will celebrate the Festival of Shavuoth, on Wednesday and Thursday. Reform Jews observe only one day.

The meaning of Shavuoth lives on in its names and customs. The word Shavuoth, or weeks, stands for the seven weeks of the grain harvest which began on Pessach and concluded with a great pilgrimage to Jerusalem.

The Shavuoth customs observed today symbolize both the religious and the agricultural significance of the holiday. Homes, synagogues and centers are decorated with flowers and green foliage to recall the flora of Israel. The Book of Ruth is read as a description of the great harvest in ancient times. Cheese cakes, honey cakes, and other dairy foods are eaten to recall the Land of Israel, which is described as "a land flowing with milk and honey." In modern Israel the ancient ceremony of First Fruits has been revived, for today again Jews are harvesting the fruits of the soil in the ancient land.

In the synagogue, the Ten Commandments and other appropriate selections from the Bible are read, and special prayers recited. An abridgement of the "Tikkun", an abridgement of the Bible and the Mishnah, in order to review the most important teachings of Judaism.

Jewish women will take special pride in the fact that the Book of Ruth, glorifying one of their own, is read on Shavuoth in the synagogue. They will therefore not fail to read this book beforehand in order to be able to follow intelligently its recitation at services.

Shavuoth is a happy holiday in which the abstract and the concrete elements of Judaism and Jewishness are harmoniously blended.

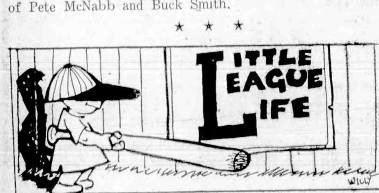

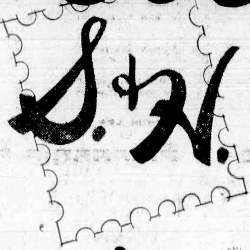

Half Million Extension For St. Mary's Ready By September Of 1957

A new wing to contain four additional classrooms and a combined gymnasium-auditorium with a seating capacity of 1,100 will be built, to be ready for the reopening of school in September, 1957, as an extension of St. Mary's Parochial School in Lafayette Place, Nutley.

Msgr. James Owens announced at Sunday's church services that a campaign will start during May to raise at least \$350,000 to cover the cost of construction, estimated at between \$450,000 and \$500,000. The Jersey City architectural firm of William Neumann & Sons has been designated to prepare plans. The Neumann firm designed and built the 1954 wing. Henry A. Neumann, of 160 Rutgers Place, Nutley, a member of the firm, belongs to the parish.

The present school facilities will be operating at maximum capacity in September, Msgr. Owens told the parish in his pulpit announcement, adding that "it is imperative that plans be made quickly for additional classrooms."

The new wing, of three stories and a basement, will increase the potential capacity of St. Mary's School to 1,480 but it is planned to complete but two of the four new classrooms at the beginning. The other two will be held in reserve for possible future expansion of the school to meet later needs.

St. Mary's School, which now has an enrollment of 1,150 in 23 classrooms, will open two additional classrooms next September to provide three classrooms for each of the eight grades plus a kindergarten room. The two rooms to be opened were built last year during the reconstruction of the former chapel but were held in reserve to avoid breaking up the 8th Grade classes.

With the opening of the two rooms, Msgr. Owens believes St. Mary's, with a capacity of 1,250, will be able to accommodate the anticipated enrollment of next September. For the future, however, more classrooms will be needed and Msgr. Owens decided to incorporate them in a wing with the needed gymnasium-auditorium.

The latter will have separate locker accommodations for boys and girls and a college-size basketball court. It will have a balcony with a seating capacity of 400, and, when used as an auditorium, 700 can be seated on the ground floor. The new wing will also contain kitchens and service rooms so that, with its completion, many of the present social activities of the parish can be transferred from the basement of the church to the school. That will permit the conversion of the church basement

into a supplementary chapel.

The congregation has grown to such an extent that, at present, two supplementary masses are read every Sunday in the basement. It is expected that because of attendance which exceed the church's capacity it may be necessary to schedule a third basement mass on Sundays.

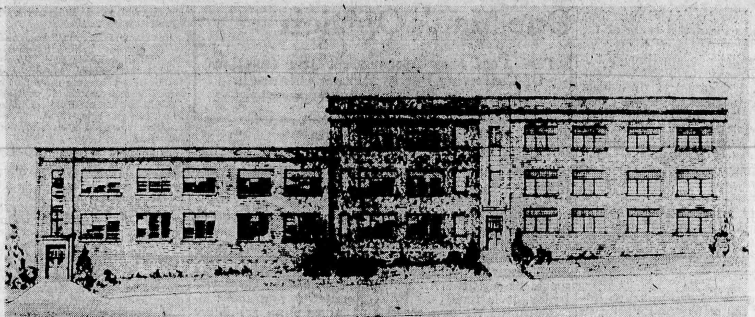
The growth of St. Mary's Parochial School has kept pace with the continuous expansion of the congregation since its founding in 1872. It now includes a section of Belleville as well as a large area of Nutley. Young in September, 1921, in the frame "Lycium" building, the school was started with 83 pupils in a single classroom. The "Lycium" had been lifted on jacks to allow the school to be inserted as a ground floor.

As the school's enrollment expanded rapidly, a combined school and chapel was built in 1926 and the old brownstone church, now the Knights of Columbus home, was abandoned. Continued growth of the congregation led to the construction of the new church in 1952.

A three-floor wing was added to the school, facing Lafayette Place, in 1954 and, last year, the former chapel was converted into six classrooms of which four were immediately put into use. Two others will be opened next September to take care of the anticipated enrollment rise.

The new wing will adjoin the 1954 building, occupying part of the present paved parking area. It will be appended to the existing

wing and will make use of its entrance and stairway. It will extend along Lafayette Place with a frontage of 150 feet and will occupy more than half of the parking area in depth.

The "Lycium" building will continue to be used during the construction of the newest addition but when the four new classrooms are completed the frame "Lycium" will be torn down and its site used for parking.

In his announcement from the

pulpit, Sunday, Msgr. Owens said that diocesan approval of the school plans has been given. He explained that although, hitherto, St. Mary's has raised by direct collection most of the million dollars that has been invested in the church, school, convent and rectory, it has been decided to raise the new fund by St. Mary's first organized campaign.

Smith, King Guilty Of Bad Faith With Greco

Last week's Superior Court decision in the Greco case has fallen like a bombshell among Belleville politicians and residents alike. First reactions to the surprise reversal ranged from "jubilation" on one side to extreme shock on the other, with neither party exactly certain of what its next step would be.

Comment on the Superior Court opinion likewise varied from one extreme to the other. Heard at Tuesday's Commission meeting was the suggestion by a citizen that Commissioners Smith and King resign for their part in the "schism" with Greco; that they broke a sacred trust with those who had elected them. While on the other extreme, comment has been heard that the Court's reversal of a previous Civil Service Commission ruling was uncalled for; that the higher Court had no legitimate grounds to doubt the credibility of testimony given on the part of town witnesses, and to doubt that bad faith was behind the ouster.

However, it would appear that some-

where between these two highly partisan points of view, lies the actual truth of the matter.

From facts publicly known through testimony given before the Civil Service Commission hearing, it becomes fairly evident that personal ill feeling existed between Greco and his former boss, Commissioner King, and quite probably also existed between Greco and Commissioner Smith. Subsequently, under the guise of governmental economy, the two Commissioners contrived to fire Greco for reasons of either personal prejudice or political expediency.

In an official press statement on the Court's decision, Smith still contends that Greco was the prime motive for the release of the building inspector, and the later combination of his duties with those of the town engineer.

Contradicting this motive is the fact that the records can point to no other consolidations, releases, or streamlining of any sort to reduce the number of municipal employees in any of the five departments. Conversely, the number of town employees has been steadily climbing. Greco's isolated release in this instance stands out against a pattern of contradictory behavior.

The Court also noted that no other New Jersey municipality the size of Belleville operates without a full time building inspector, an office that was self-sustaining here due to its several sources of income.

The Court asked the rather pointed question: "If the regular town engineering department was able to assume the added duties of the building inspector, does it not seem that the department had been over-stuffed in the first place, or at least not working to full capacity?" The decision pointed out that if sincere economy had been desired, it would have been more economical to dismiss an engineering assistant, and keep Greco, instead of the course of action taken.

After devoting several pages to describing the tense relations that existed between the two, the Court decision closes with the comment that the petitioner Greco had sustained the burden of proving bad faith on the part of the two Commissioners in his ouster.

From these arguments and others presented in more detail in the unanimous opinion handed down by the Court, it appears that Commissioners King and Smith let their political enthusiasm get the best of their discretion; however, not without the knowledge and consent of the remaining Commissioners, since it was by a unanimous vote that Greco's job was transferred from King to Smith's department, paving the way for the now void dismissal.

One Man's Opinion

Paris Conference Appears Split Over Question Of Converting Purely Military Alliance Into Instrument Of Western Cooperation

Stripped of all oratorical verbiage, the essential question of the Paris conference of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, this week, is clear: Can NATO beat its sword into a plowshare?

The NATO alliance of 15 nations and 400 million people that was hastily thrown together seven years to check Communist expansion in Europe is no longer abreast of the times. It is high time that the non-military aspects of NATO—meaning its political and economic potentialities—should be exploited. As Mr. Dulles explained in Paris, yesterday, it is time that NATO become "a permanent instrument of Western cooperation rather than a military deterrent."

From the efforts which the Russians are making to destroy NATO and the Baghdad Pact it is obvious that they are effective barriers to Communist aggression. In this One Man's Opinion, it would be a grave error to weaken NATO, our military guard in Europe, in the process of modernizing it. That seems to be the British Government's idea, too. At Paris, the British said plainly: "Leave well enough alone. If you want to unify Europe economically do it under some other banner. NATO is a military alliance; leave it alone."

However, the Canadians, French, Italian and Dutch appear lined up in favor of implementing Article 2 of NATO, the clause which requires political integration. Canada's interest is inspired by the presence in Paris of Lester Pearson, External Affairs Minister of Canada, who promoted Article 2 and has never stopped clamoring for its enactment. Pearson sees NATO binding us with the 14 other nations in a genuine political and economic community.

Seek Closer Contacts

At the Paris Conference, Pearson pointed out that it is something like locking the stable door after the horse has been stolen to enact Article 2 now. He feels that the recent troubles in Cyprus, Algeria and the Middle East could have been avoided if there had been genuine political integration such as the treaty provides. Pearson told the other foreign ministers:

"The NATO Council must become a more effective agency of consultation and cooperation. It must be given more authority and its meetings with ministerial attendance must be more frequent."

"Consultations should be developed through the Council into such an accepted custom that no members would think of taking action which affected others in any substantial way—either politically or economically—without prior discussion with the other members in NATO."

The formal statement issued this week at the conclusion of the Paris talks left no doubt that the economic and political issues will have to play subsidiary roles. Nothing is going to be allowed to weaken the roadblock to Communism which stopped Stalin in his tracks Westward and Southward.

and has stopped Bulgarian and Khrushchev ever since.

The permanent council proposed to the member nations by President Eisenhower through Secretary Dulles would assume the function of widening the alliance into the economic and political fields, but it would have no voice in military matters. That will remain the province of soldiers, not diplomats.

As outlined by the Secretary of State, there should be a practically permanent panel of NATO leaders. Its main concern should be the coordination of the economic and political attitudes of the member nations, with particular emphasis on their effect on the rest of the world.

Another and no less important concern of this panel would be the resolving of differences between the member nations. Right now a major difference has arisen between the three Benelux nations and France over Paris' total lack of interest in a Dutch and Belgian proposal of a common market as a key element in strengthening the Atlantic community.

Foreign Ministers Overworked. However, it has met with such an unpreparedness of thought on the part of most of the nations present that it hardly seemed to register, let alone win converts, though it was brought up by Mr. Dulles four or five times from different angles.

This was itself an illustration of a NATO condition which the American project seeks to overcome.

The foreign ministers have many tasks and so can only give a few days, twice a year, to NATO. Each

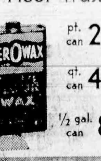
