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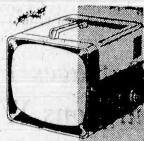

Phenomenal Foul Shooting

I don't know what Belleville basketball coach Herman "Jitzy" Wische has been doing with his charges when it comes to shooting fouls but in the season inaugurated against Passaic the Blue and Gold sharpshooters did themselves proud. All the Belleville boys was to convert 22 of 27 free throws to trim the Indians by a 44-32 score.

That's some pretty fair shooting for any team and compares very favorably with most colleges. The real uncanny feature about the brilliant shooting, however, is the fact that the Tuesday night game against Passaic was only the first regular season contests for the Blue and Gold.

It isn't unusual for a team to get off to a slow or even a mediocre start in the scoring average department because it is only natural that a player will start to hit his stride once he gets a couple of games under his belt. That didn't seem to bother Wische's boys though as they poured the free throws through the nets at the Belleville High gymnasium.

Belleville actually won the game at the foul line as each team tallied 11 baskets. The wide difference in the free throw department was the big factor as the Indians converted 10 of 15 attempts.

The Blue and Gold displayed a balanced scoring attack with no one player outdistancing the rest of the field. Only one player broke into double figures and five other members of the squad had five points or more. Leading the way was Cullen who finished the evening with 10 points. Six of the points were recorded via the free throw lanes.

The Bellboys got off to a good start in the game and possessed a 17-9 lead at the end of the first period. Belleville's junior varsity also got off on the right foot and took the measure of the Passaic JV's, 50-44.

CYO To Honor Top Hoop Player

In its continuing effort to promote good sportsmanship on high school basketball courts the Essex County CYO has announced that it will again honor the outstanding high school player in Essex County by presenting him with the CYO Player Award.

The 1957 New Jersey Golden Gloves will again be sponsored by the Newark Athletic Club in cooperation with the New York Daily News. The bouts will be held in the NAC gym, starting Friday evening, January 4 for six or seven consecutive Fridays and local talent has been invited to compete.

The contests will be held in two divisions, the open class and novice class in the following weights: 112, 118, 126, 135, 147, 160, 175 pounds and heavy-weight.

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Bellboy Courtmen Open Season With Win Over Passaic

Local Cagers Defeat Invaders
By 44-32 Score; Cullen's Ten
Is High For Blue And Gold

After Belleville's first game, in which the Blue and Gold cagers defeated Passaic, 44-32, there can be no conclusive appraisal of the Bellboys. Passaic was supposed to be a rugged opponent but the Indians showed little as Belleville had little difficulty in keeping the game in hand.

Statistically, the difference was at the foul line where Belleville made 22 free throws to ten for Passaic. There wasn't that much of a difference in the free throws missed, but the Blue and Gold had the ball quite a few times more than the visitors. Both teams scored eleven times from the field, indicating the importance of those fouls.

The scoring was evenly distributed among the Bellboys but the brunt of the rebounding was borne by Dom Klein and Ray Kimble. Klein was the best man off the boards throughout the night. He had six rebounds, which the Indians missed. Klein took seven rebounds. Kimble took also effective in limiting Passaic to one shot at a time.

Never In Doubt
The game was never in doubt for Belleville. They took a lead right at the beginning and slowly built in into a commanding margin, until the game was safely out of Passaic's reach. Once they had their margin, they abandoned the fast break which had given them quite a few good shots earlier in the game. In the fourth period they slowed things up considerably, and towards the end, they went into a partial freeze.

The big margin in the first quarter was provided by Frank D'Angelo. D'Angelo put in three one-handed jumpers to widen the difference to eight points. In the second period Klein and Tom Candara combined to lengthen the lead to 12 points.

Then Jack Cullen took over. The "C" Junior wound up as high scorer for Belleville, but he racked up all his points, with the exception of one bucket, in the second half.

Belleville did not look impressive in winning the game. They did a nice job off the boards, controlling them throughout, but Passaic is the smallest team they will face this year. They won't be able to control them against the bigger teams.

There will be a great deal of improvement in the play of the Bellboys when they take the court against Garfield, Tuesday. There will have to be for Garfield won't allow as many mistakes to be made against them without taking a victory in exchange. Height will also be a factor. If Belleville can take their share of rebounds against this Garfield team then Belleville fans can look forward to a successful season.

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Indoor Racing Season

The Recreation Department's indoor bicycle racing program will get underway tomorrow, at the Municipal Stadium at 1:30 p. m. This winter activity is open to all boys and girls in Belleville from the age of eight thru fifteen.

Indoor bike racing is accomplished with the use of special rollers on which the bikes are placed and which are geared into spinning arrows on a large dial. These arrows show the distance being covered and the large dial can accommodate two bicycles on rollers at a time. In effect this amounts to a bicycle treadmill with a speedometer. The rollers and dial used for these races are loaned to the Club by Belleville's most eminent cyclist Ed Litig who also designed the ingenious device.

The racing is conducted by age groups with boys and girls classes in the following groups: 8-10 years, 11-12 years, 13-15 years. Trophies and medals will be awarded to the riders in the first two places of each class, these places to be determined by total points earned through the racing season. Only those who register tomorrow will be permitted to race in the series of point races.

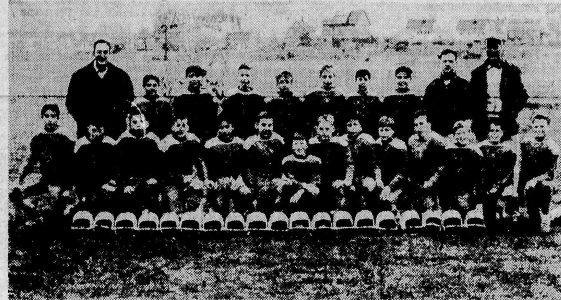

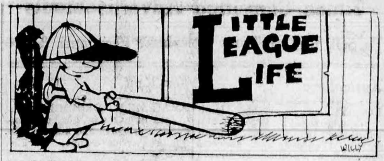

for cancer) it was the scene of the first successful operation in the United States for resection of the colon. It was the first to open and maintain an isolation ward for contagious diseases, a service the hospital performed until the city of Newark took over that function.

At a result of these and other accomplishments, the hospital has long enjoyed national prominence.

On April 30, 1956 a citation was presented to the hospital by the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

"For outstanding and meritorious service to persons of all groups regardless of race, creed or national origin; for its administrative policy of staff and personnel selection, which for more than 80 years has exemplified the ideals of Brotherhood in Action."

There was another change of name on June 19, 1952. At that time the Board of Trustees unanimously passed a resolution authorizing the council to change the name of the institution to the Clara Maass Memorial Hospital.

Miss Maass, one of the first graduates of the nursing school, gave her life in 1901 in experiments which resulted in the conquest of yellow fever.

Ground Bought in 1946. The first step toward moving the hospital to a new site was taken in 1948 when staff doctors donated the site on which the new building stands.

To obtain funds for construction, the Board of Trustees conducted a community and industrial campaign which resulted in a total subscription of \$1,000,000.

cause they will be processed and delivered quickly, and they'll be forwarded or returned to the sender as necessary. Only Christmas cards sent First-Class mail may carry written messages, a custom everyone enjoys.

Moreover, Christmas card envelopes smaller than 2 1/2 inches by 4 inches or larger than 4 inches by 12 inches require hand cancellation, and thus, must carry First-Class postage.

The Postmaster urges everyone to secure free labels at the Post Office marked "All For Local Delivery" and "All For Local Town Delivery." Then, sort your Christmas cards accordingly, tie them in bundles with string, and with each address facing the same way, and attach the correct label to each bundle.

Christmas packages for local delivery should be mailed by December 15 and all Christmas cards for nearby destinations by at least a week before Christmas.

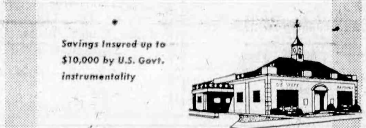

Shanley Tells The Times He May Be Candidate For N. J. Governorship

President's Secretary Informs The Times-News From White House That He May Enter Spring Primary To Seek GOP Nomination

In a despatch from The White House, in answer to a query from The Times-News, Bernard M. Shanley, Secretary to President Eisenhower, yesterday authorized The Times to announce that he may become a candidate for the Republican gubernatorial nomination. His announcement will depend upon the outcome of the world crisis, because when he becomes a professional political candidate he must resign from his White House functions.

Shanley's statement follows closely upon the formal announcement of candidacy of Senate President Wayne D. Dwyer, Jr., an old political rival of Governor Robert B. Meyner in Phillipsburg and Warren County.

All through the four years of the President's first term Shanley, on leave from the Newark law firm of Shanley and Fisher, in which he is the senior partner, was at his side on the executive staff within the White House.

Shanley was appointed Special Counsel to President Eisenhower when the General took office at his first inauguration on Jan. 30, 1953. He served in that capacity until February 19, 1955, when he was appointed Secretary to the President, the post which he continues to hold.

During the 1952 campaign, Shanley was a member of the advisory committee for the Eisenhower presidential campaign. He was counsel to the New Jersey Republican State Committee for four years from 1948 to 1953. In his introduction to national politics, however, Shanley had sought to swing New Jersey for Governor Harold Stassen in the 1948 Republican National Convention, when Governor Dewey took the G. O. P. nomination. In that fight Shanley was a Stassen's New Jersey State campaign manager and worked closely with Stassen's other sponsors, former Governor Walter Edge, George Merck and William Orchard.

Born August 4, 1903, in Newark, Shanley is a graduate of St. Benedict's Preparatory School and attended Columbia College and Fordham University Law School, graduating in 1928.

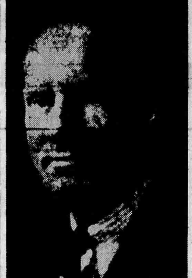
Shanley enlisted in the Army as a private in 1942 and rose to the rank of Captain after service in the mechanized cavalry and in the Army's Civil Affairs Division.

He won three battle stars and a War Department citation during service in the European Theatre and was demobilized in June, 1946.

Shanley was married in 1936 to Miss Maureen V. Smith, of New York City. They have five children, Maureen, Seton, Kevin, Bridget, and Brendan. Their home is in Bernardsville. Shanley was named Knight of the Order of Malta by Pope Pius XII.

An ardent sportsman since his days at St. Benedict's when he was a letterman in all sports, Shanley is a frequent golf partner of the President. At Bernardsville, he
