Correcting An Illegality
The N.J. Highway Authority found itself cornered and on illegal grounds when a delegation of its Commissioners met with delegates of Belleville, Bloomfield and East Orange in a regional conference, last week-end, to study the towns' demand that the Essex Plaza tollgate at Belleville Avenue be moved to a new location north of Watchung Avenue.

The illegality of the Authority's position stems from the very 1952 law, creating the Authority and authorizing the construction of the Parkway, which, until now, the Authority has been very quick to quote to its advantage. The law, read to the conference by former Assemblyman Nicholas Joya who was the Essex County leader when the bill was voted five years ago, says specifically that the section of the Parkway between Central Avenue, Irvington, and Belleville Avenue, Bloomfield, would be toll-free.

The law provided that cars be able to enter and leave the Parkway at the two extremes of the free section. There are entrance and exit ramps at Irvington, but no exit ramp at Belleville Avenue. The Authority, very toll-conscious, built only one ramp, an entrance ramp, at Belleville Avenue and had it lead directly to a wicket in the tollgate. Thus it is impossible for any north-bound motorist to leave the Parkway at the end of the free section. To get off the parkway he must continue to the next ramp and, just by an unhappy coincidence, the 25-cent tollgate stands between him and the exit ramp. Thus the toll-free section is not toll-free, it is a trap, a real-life trap.

Stunned by the realization that it is standing on illegal grounds, the Authority,

through its chairman, Mrs. Katherine E. White, an able lady in a red hat, and two commissioners, Sylvester Smith, a money-minded man, and Dr. John Townsend, of Ocean City, whose interest centers in ferries of the maritime type, showed for the first time a willingness to come out from behind its tollgate and talk justice and traffic congestion.

At that point in the discussion, Commissioner John Lucy and Supt. of Public Works Dudley Shepard, Nutley's representatives, introduced a compromise proposal. They suggested that instead of removing the tollgate to a new location north of Watchung Avenue, which the Authority insisted would give its bondholders a mass heart attack, the tollgate be kept in place but the extreme right wicket be cut off from the rest and be made a free lane, isolated by chains, fences or stanchions, to allow trapped motorists to detour the toll wickets and leave the Parkway by the nearest exit ramp, 500 yards farther north, at Hoover Avenue.

There is no legal reason why the Authority cannot concede the towns' demand. There's every legal reason why it should, because the law specifies that there must be ramps at both ends of the toll-free section. Practically, it can be done, too, "without even spending a thin dime" Shepard said, because between the tollgate and Hoover Avenue the plaza is already widened off and cars can be funneled, toll-free, to Hoover Avenue without interfering with through traffic.

It would be only a half a solution, but it would be better than none. If the free lane could be continued to Watchung Avenue, Belleville would be doubly satisfied and Bloomfield would be spared the traffic congestion which should not exist because of the Authority's stubborn flaunting of the law which it flouts, so often, to its own advantage. 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AVERAGE POLICY SIZE INCREASES

The average size of individual life insurance policies issued by the Aetna Life Insurance Company has doubled over the past decade, Peter J. Palms, Jr., the company's representative of Belleville, reported today.

Policies issued during 1956 averaged more than \$9,100 compared to \$4,600 ten years ago, Palms said.

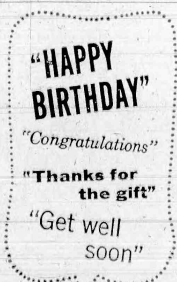

In introducing the Nutley proposal for a free lane to allow traffic to by-pass the tollgate, Commissioner Lucy suggested it be isolated by stanchions or a chain.

Cars destined to leave the Parkway at Hoover Avenue ramp, and, if possible, at the Watchung Avenue exit, would enter the isolated lane to escape tolls but could not leave the lane except to leave the Parkway. Southbound cars would be given free passage from the Watchung Avenue ramp through the outer wicket.

Shepard pointed out that the Parkway has five lanes as far as Route Avenue, 500 yards north of the tollgate, and that no construction would be involved. "It can be done without the Authority having to spend a dime," Shepard pointed out.

Mrs. White had argued that it would cost \$500,000 to demolish the existing tollgate and re-erect it at the Passaic County line, where a new gate house would also have to be built. This estimate was disputed by other engineers present who accused the chairman of "pulling that half million dollar guess out of a hat."

Commenting on the Nutley pro-

posal, Jack Hurley, engineer in charge of Parkway operations, said: "I can guarantee you that the creation of the free lane as far as the two exit ramps will seem the congestion in the Bloomfield Avenue but there would be a serious loss of revenue."

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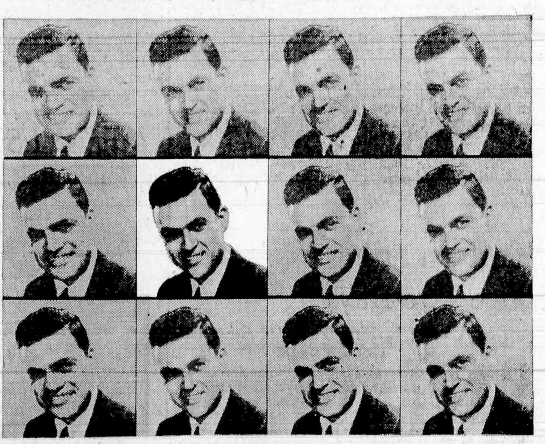

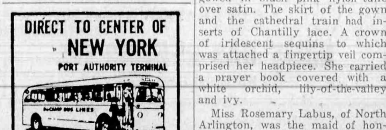
Globe Plant Mgr. Attends Small Business Conference

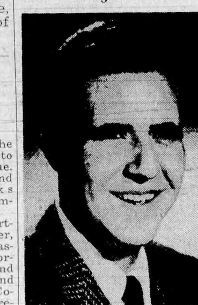
TORRID TUDORS GET RECOGNITION

Ideal Vacation For Boys WHITE BIRCH ATHLETIC DAY CAMP

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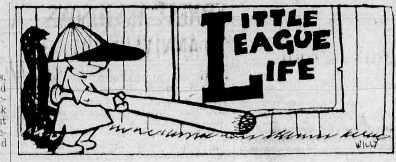
