Correcting An Illegality

Practically, it can be done, too, "with-out even spending a thin dime" Shepard said, because between the tollgate and Hoover Avenue the plaza is already widened off and cars can be funneled, tolls-free, to Hoover Avenue without interfering with through fraffic.


