## High School Has Data On Scholarships Available

Senior students at Belleville High School are eligible to compete for more than 100 four-year college scholarships offered by General Motors under its national scholarship plan, according to R. D. Kline, principal.

## Proposed New Memorial To Veterans



The new Memorial would have a modern simplicity and deep meaning. Its 15-foot-tall arch of spun aluminum, signifying "War to Peace," forms a frame for the curved plank granite stone on which is etched the words "To Those Who Served." This phrase is designed to apply to all of our war veterans.

The curved stone is mounted on a large three-step platform and the whole memorial will be illuminated by soft floodlights. The flagpole is of aluminum, matching the arch. Carefully selected and placed shrubbery completes the beautiful setting.

Belleville Veterans Committee announced this week that plans have been submitted to Commissioner Elmer S. Hyde for a new Veterans Memorial. Committee Chairman James Lee said that the design by William Allison Boyd has the wholehearted approval of the Veterans Committee.

Commissioner Hyde expressed enthusiastic approval of the plan and explained that the present wooden structure has been a constant maintenance problem and expense. The Commissioner said that he feels a permanent memorial is in order and that he strongly favors the plan submitted by the Veterans Committee.

# "Belleville Forward" Offered As Rallying Call For All Who Want To Push Town Ahead

Mayor I. J. Padula Calls Session To Discuss Vacant Stores; Calls Situation "Alarming Indictment"

A letter which requires no prefatory explanation was sent this week by Mayor Isadore J. Padula to all property owners and business people along Washington Avenue. The Mayor's letter follows:

The number of stores now vacant on Washington Avenue presents an alarming indictment as to the level of our business development in Belleville. Something must be done to remove that "dying" look along our main business thoroughfare.

Empty stores bring in no revenue for tax-paying owners, depreciate property values in a business area and "overage" the sales potential of adjacent stores, since the psychological effect of empty stores on resident buyers is bad; people mistakingly believe that a store which is empty is a store which is dying.

Where a appealing merchandise should be.

Several merchants have moved large stocks out of Belleville to neighboring towns, seeking better parking facilities and more prosperous appearing surroundings.

However, this falling off of business venturing in Belleville along Washington Avenue is due to a lack of adequate parking facilities. There are a number of other factors involved in the purpose of discussing ways with by landlords, merchants and business promoters.

## Jaywalkers Face Penalty Of \$50, Police Point Out

Despite publicity on the campaign and police efforts to educate the public, many pedestrians are continuing to ignore crosswalks and posters are required to stop jaywalking.

Police Chief George R. Spatz said that while Belleville's fatality rate in pedestrian accidents has been negative for three years, 20 to 30 persons already have been killed. Chief Spatz said that while there is an apparent lessening of jaywalking in Belleville, the police department will need a great many more signs to stop jaywalking.

All pedestrians are considered as "traffic" and are required to observe the following laws: Observe traffic signals; cross at crosswalks; cross at right angles to curb; give motor vehicles the right-of-way if it is necessary to cross; there are no crosswalks on the left side of road.

The police department will continue to hand out literature on jaywalking as well as give warnings to violators. Future violators will be issued a summons to appear in court, where a penalty of \$50 can be imposed.

## BELLEVILLE STRIKE, ON SINCE AUG. 13, ENDS THIS WEEK

Eastwood-Nealey And Union Accord Reached, Machinists' Leader Says; Pay Raise Won

A new contract for 194 members of the International Association of Machinists, District 47, is expected to be signed with Eastwood-Nealey Corp., 28 Joralemon St., Belleville, within a week, the Union said Thursday.

The strike, which had returned to work last week and early this week after the company agreed to a package settlement offered by the Union's Board.

In addition, 108 members of the American Wire Weavers' Protective Assn., which had been supporting the machinists, also returned to work.

William G. Keele, business representative for the machinists, said that the strike will end by July 31, 1960. Until that time, he said, the company has agreed not to recognize the Eastwood-Nealey Union, which had touched off the strike by filing a petition before the National Labor Relations Board for a union election.

Under terms of the settlement, workers will receive a ten-cent across-the-board raise, eight cents of which is retroactive to May 1.

The New Jersey Junior Women's Clubs are being honored this week by a Jersey Junior Week proclamation by Governor Robert Meyner for the excellent work these women have done and are doing for their many communities.

As part of the Junior Club week program, the Belleville Junior Woman's Club is concentrating on its endeavor to establish a Child Guidance Clinic in this area for emotionally disturbed children. This is only one phase of the local group's work. Since its incorporation in 1933, its history is comprised of community achievement and welfare work on a state wide basis.

The object of the Belleville girls is to "cultivate and maintain an organized center of thought, action and good fellowship among women, and to stimulate an interest in those things that will render the members helpful to one another and useful to society; and to cooperate for the betterment of social conditions." It is a non-profit organization which every year raised a considerable amount of money for needy and worthwhile endeavors, both in Belleville and in the State.

The Belleville Junior Woman's Club was organized in 1933 by Mrs. Charles Smith and joined the Federation of Women's Clubs the same year. This history of Belleville Club goes back to 1916 when a group of civic-minded women formed the Belleville Improvement Association. The next few years saw concerted contributions to the effort, donations to the Silver Lake Welfare Association, the obtaining of a social worker for state board children, and the sponsoring of the WPA nursery school of pre-school children.

In 1928 the club acquired a clubhouse at 51 Rossmore Place after 15 years of effort. ensuing years brought the Minnie Burke Memorial Fund and the forming of a college fund for Belleville girls. In 1933, the Junior Woman's Club joined the organization and later still, a sub-junior club for high school girls was founded. These two groups raised money for all state projects, took part in state drama festivals, one year received a first award for their effort.

The Belleville Juniors have helped in realizing a \$32,000 goal to establish a state fund for Up-Per Extremity Amputees and in one year raised \$32,200 alone for this project. There has been help in many other fields from the Juniors over the years. They have given hundreds of Volunteer Hours at hospitals and fund raising drives such as the Community Chest, Cancer, Tuberculosis, Cerebral Palsy, etc. Every year, they

have presented a Thanksgiving basket to some needy family in Belleville, and have given parties for the veterans in the East Orange Veterans Hospital, the Old People's Home at Ivy Haven.

They have donated home-made cookies each month to the American Red Cross for soldiers at Camp Killeen. For several years they were bought for needy children and a Christmas party was given for them at the clubhouse.

One year the Juniors adopted the Tubercular children at the Essex County Isolation Hospital and made scrapbooks to amuse them. Later the unfortunate children at the North Jersey Training School in Totowa were brought to the attention of the Juniors who sent sheets, blankets, bibs, and smocks, all made by the girls at various social meetings. Stuffed animals were also made for the blind children and eye-glasses collected for the New Jersey State Commission for the Blind.

Each and every year the Junior girls give willingly and freely of their time and efforts to make Belleville a better place to live and this year they have launched on the biggest project in their career, the establishment of a Child Guidance Clinic, for not only Belleville, but Bloomfield, Nutley, and Glen Ridge as well.

The great need for such a clinic was seen by many people of this community in all fields and professions but the Junior Woman's Club of Belleville was the first to make an all out effort to bring about such a clinic. Their efforts have not been in vain for through their initial step in securing this Clinic, they have succeeded in interesting the community, the town leaders, the medical field, and members of the school system, and fraternal organizations. Letters were written, telephone calls made, and many people contacted to get the project underway.

The first meeting of interested citizens for the establishment of such a Clinic was held at the Women's Club, 51 Rossmore Place, under the sponsorship of the Belleville Juniors. Out of this meeting, a nucleus group of people from the four communities was organized into a steering committee. This

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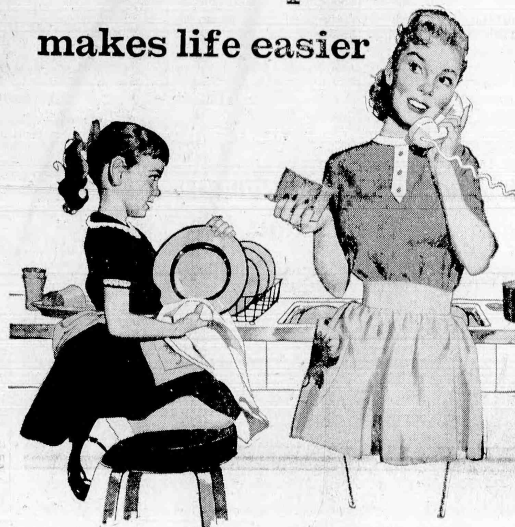
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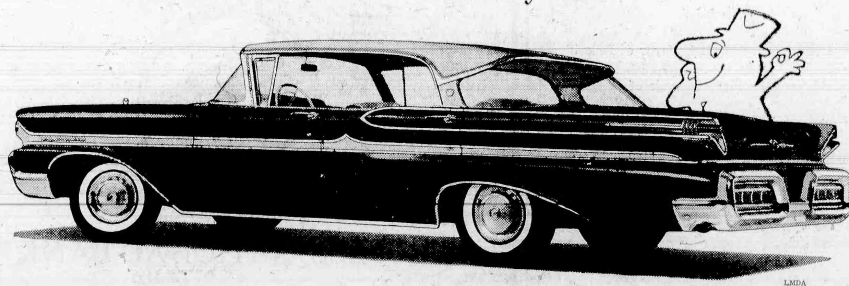

Need For Organization

In appearing before the Board of Commissioners last week to seek the town's aid toward the annual Christmas light project of his fellow-merchants and to attract attention to the harassment to which members of the governing board had subjected him, Saul Smoller did a valuable job in more ways than one.

He proved an eloquent and emphatic representative of the business people for whom he spoke. While no action was taken at the meeting at which he appeared toward appropriating the \$250 requested, it is quite certain that the contribution will be forthcoming before the decorations have been in place very long.

More important than this, however, Mr. Smoller focused attention on a deplorable condition: the number of empty stores along Washington Avenue. The Times-News has referred to this unsatisfactory situation from time to time but it gains emphasis when mentioned in public by one so close to the picture — a retail merchant who has been active for several years in efforts to improve business conditions in town.

Mr. Smoller's comment may or may not have had anything to do with Mayor Isaac J. Padula's letter — printed on the front page of this issue — calling a meeting to discuss the subject. It may be pure coincidence. Nonetheless, it is highly significant that the matter has assumed such vital proportions as to prompt the Mayor of the community to step in with a tangible act towards bringing about some corrective action. The meeting set by the Mayor should be attended by as close to 100% of the owners of property and the operators

of businesses along Washington Avenue as can get to Town Hall.

Possibly of equal importance to the foregoing, Mr. Smoller's ambassadorship to the Board of Commissioners highlighted the need for co-operative action by the merchants along the avenue. In unity there is strength. This can be noth-else, but it is true. One man cannot do the job alone. If merchants want improvements of any kind, they will get them through united action only.

The commercial segment of the town is important to the municipality from the standpoint of tax rates and as an attraction to prospective residents. People like to know they can buy what they want close to their homes. Commissioner Kenneth R. Smith pointed up the position of the merchant group in the town set-up when he said at last week's meeting: "Poor business and empty stores hurt not only the merchants but also the town as a whole and the taxpayers."

The business element of the area in this locality is deserving of more consideration than it is getting. Results can be expected only when those desiring this consideration work together.

There are members of the governing board who are influenced by the lack of unity among the business people and by the fact that some of them are not voters in Belleville.

There is but one way to offset this attitude of disinterest, in our opinion. This is to help make the dormant Chamber of Commerce strong enough to make its voice heard by forming a Merchants Panel within the Chamber or by reactivating the equally latent association of merchants.

By so doing — and only by so doing, we believe — can the business people of Belleville make the impression they should upon the authorities of the town in whose hands lie, to a large extent, the success or failure of our business community.
