Thanksgiving Day A Proclamation

By the President of the United States
of America

At the autumnal season of the year our hearts move us to follow the wise and reverent custom, inaugurated by our Pilgrim Fathers more than three centuries ago, of setting aside one special day for expressions of gratitude to a merciful Providence for the blessings bestowed upon us.

It behoves us to dwell upon the deep religious convictions of those who formed our nation out of a wilderness, and to recall that our leaders throughout the succeeding generations have relied upon Almighty God for vision and strength of purpose.

As a nation we have prospered; we are enjoying the fruit of our land and the product of our toil; we are making progress in our efforts to translate our national ideas into living realities; and we are at peace with the world, working toward that day when the benefits of freedom and justice shall be secured for all mankind.

For such blessings let us be devoutly thankful, and at the same time let us be sensitive and responsive to the obligations which such great mercies entail.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER, President of the United States of America, having in mind the joint resolution of Congress approved December 26, 1941, which designates the fourth Thursday in November of each year as Thanksgiving Day, do hereby call upon our people to observe Thursday, November 28, 1957 as a day of national thanksgiving. On that day let all of us, in accordance with our hallowed custom, foregather in our respective places of worship or in our homes and offer up prayers of thanks for our manifold blessings. Let the happiness which stems from family reunions on Thanksgiving Day be tempered with compassion and inspired by an active concern for those less fortunate in our own country and in other lands; and let us ask God's continuing help and guidance in our conduct, both as individuals and as a nation.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DOND at the City of Washington this eighth day of November in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and eighty-second.

tended as director of public safety of Belleville.

The Nutley Sun, which pioneered the regional protest against the violation of the legal requirement to provide toll-free use of the Parkway in Essex County, was shut out of the conference at the club.

About 40 representatives of the five towns and County Engineers Curtis Colwell attended the day-long on-the-spot visits and the conference. State Highway Commissioner Dwight J. Fairbank, represented by a personal representative, William Engelman, Mrs. Wright, and Mr. G. Fox, who presided the conference, and Mrs. White.

The group gathered at the State Police office alongside Parkway, above Watchung Avenue, and travelled by special bus to view the centers of serious congestion.

The bus made the circuit of the exit and entrance ramps at Hoover Avenue but the conferees did not leave their warm bus for a closer inspection.

The Authority report, drafted by the New York engineering firm of Parsons, Brinckerhoff, Hall and MacDonald, emphasized that the Hoover Avenue interchange served by Interchange 15A at Hoover Avenue and Interchange 151 at Watchung Avenue.

Basing its statistics on account of motorists, chiefly during the morning and evening rush hours, the report concludes: "The indications are, therefore, that much of the traffic congestion on Bloomfield Avenue attributable to Parkway users is due entirely to the daily effort of 20,000 motorists to avoid paying a toll at the Essex Toll Plaza."

The report estimates that the Hoover Avenue ramp now serves, in addition to the 1,400 vehicles which pay the 25 cent toll at the nearby tollgate.

The New York engineering firm estimates in its report the difficulties of providing northbound and southbound ramps at Belleville Avenue south of the tollgate, where the free starts and ends. It estimated the cost of a southbound ramp directly from the County Canal Road at \$660,000 and from Belleville Avenue at \$870,000, chiefly because of the high cost of property acquisition.

The engineers said that for northbound traffic it would be built at Belleville Avenue, the ramp north of Belleville Avenue but south of the tollgate.

The two new sets of ramps there would cost \$2,400,000.

As an alternative proposal they suggest that the Essex Plaza shopping period at hand, the town could help by suspending the parking meter along the business street, thus encouraging buyers to drive to the local stores in their cars.

Carl F. Nitto, secretary of and counsel to the Passaic Parking Authority, was present at the invitation of Mayor Padula and he addressed the assembly. He stated that there was no reason why Belleville could not meet its business problems head-on and find ways of offsetting the effect of the large shopping centers and nearby large towns — just as so many other communities have done.

"This will take working together," said Mr. Nitto, "and it may mean new steps in zoning, conditioning, enlightened sales."

No one appeared to know what the intention of the Park Commission were, and it was decided to try to get an expression from the Commission by notifying it of what the Board of Commissioners proposed to do with the property.

ville Foundation's \$300,000 to make its own surveys and submit the findings to the town — not to expect the municipality to do this type of work.

Parking facilities for the benefit of the merchants should be provided by the merchants themselves, and not by the town as a whole, Mr. Golden declared.

Any answer made by any member of the Commission to Mr. Golden's outburst was the comment by Mayor Padula that, as Mr. Golden knew, he, Mayor, had proposed a Planning Board for Belleville two years ago, long before the present editor of this paper entered the local field and last week's meeting of The Belleville Foundation.

It was argued, also, against the town's taking on the grounds that more motorists would use the toll-free Essex County section of the highway and cause grave traffic congestion for following patrons.

In its conclusion, the report recommended that no ramps be built at Belleville Avenue, but failed to take a definite position regarding the two Hoover Avenue ramps other than to state that "even though it would cost only \$308,000 they would not provide satisfactory solutions to the mutual problems of the Authority and Bloomfield."

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High School P.T.A. Votes Against Sending Delegate To Citizens Conference

The Belleville High School P.T.A., in carrying out Parent-Teacher Association policy, voted to take no part in the Belleville Conference at its regular meeting, Monday evening, Nov. 18.

Mrs. Edward Rochau, president, who was asked to send a delegate to the conference, read the P.T.A. policy before putting the motion to a vote on the floor. The P.T.A. policy is as follows: "This association shall be non-commercial, non-sectarian, and non-partisan. No commercial enterprise and no candidate shall be endorsed by it." Section Four of the P.T.A. regulations state: "This association may cooperate with other organizations and agencies active in child welfare, such as conference groups or coordinating councils, provided they make no commitments that bind their member

agencies." Mrs. Rochau went on to read policies and guiding principles: "As an organization the P.T.A. does not endorse any candidate for office. Any group activity in support of a specific candidate on the part of a local unit, council, district or state branch is a violation of the non-partisan policy of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers."

Following a lengthy discussion from members, the motion was put to a vote with the members turning down the request of the Conference to have a High School Delegate serve in its organization.

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Belleville Adds E. O. Scalp To Its Belt; Nutley Game Dec. 7 To End The Season

Belleville High School's football team, undefeated since its loss to Bloomfield in the first game of the season, was highly favored to defeat Orange in the annual Thanksgiving Day clash yesterday. The Belboys took a 6-1-1 record into the contest, with East Orange (27-13) as the latest addition to their list of victims. Orange was on the rebound of a 25-0 loss suffered at the hands of Kearny.

Fullback Gene Barra, Belleville's leading scorer, was shooting for the lead in the Essex County scoring race against Orange, and will continue his pursuit for this lead Saturday, Dec. 7, when Belleville encounters Nutley at Park Oval in its last game of the year.

Barra scored three touchdowns and two extra points last Saturday, 20 points in all. The day's work raised his season's total to 94 points, which rates him third in the county, behind Bob Haines of Montclair, who has 109 points, and Dan Garavani of Caldwell, who has tallied 102 points.

EDITOR'S NOTE: This issue of The Times-News went to press before Thanksgiving Day but could not be delivered that day because of a printing error. The paper had to be held for delivery today, Friday. Consequently, we are not able to carry a report of the game with Orange. And this explains why our reference to the Thanksgiving Day contest had to be so vague.

Playing against East Orange last Saturday, the Belboys made few mistakes and capitalized on those made by the Panthers.

When Bob Lee, East Orange halfback, was jarred loose from the ball in the first period, for example, the Blue and Gold recovered the fumble and in four plays had converted it into a touchdown.

Mike Morano, playing in the safety slot for Belleville, pounced on the loose ball, giving Belleville possession on East Orange's 12-yard line. In two plays Barra moved it to the two. Then Frank D'Angelo took it to the one before Barra carried it over. The extra point was run by Barra.

Belleville scored twice more before the Panthers were able to enter the scoring column. Late in the first period, the Belboys started a drive that was climaxed in the second quarter.

The series of plays, seven of them to be exact, covered 69 yards. The key play in the drive was a 54-yard gallop by Frank D'Angelo after taking a pitchout from Quarterback Ed Long.

Another mistake by East Orange set up the Belboys' third score. When the Panthers' attack stalled on their own 40, the boys were forced to punt. A bad pass from center prevented Felix Del Mauro from getting the kick away. The ball went over his head and bounced to the 20, where

Belleville took over. Three plays later, the Long-to-D'Angelo pitchout produced another score.

At that point the game was on ice, and when the Panthers began to mold an offense, it was too little and too late. Lee and Quarterback Cliff Baskerville, each taller for East Orange, thereby avoiding the embarrassment of a shutout.

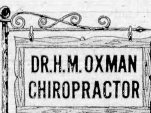
With East Orange disposed of in the expected manner, Belleville mentor Ed Berlinski faces a more serious problem. That is keeping the Belboys "up" for the contest with Nutley. Nutley, despite its poor record, will provide some of the stiffest competition that Belleville has run up against. A letdown after the Thanksgiving Day game would result in serious consequences.
