# BOYD ANNOUNCES NAMING OF UNIT ON CURRICULUM

## School Board President Tells Of Formation Of Body To Review Class Work

William A. Boyd, president of Belleville Board of Education, this week announced the formation of a committee under the jurisdiction of the Board to study and review the entire school curriculum, explore all areas of facilities, staff and equipment, and to submit recommendations according to its findings.

The committee, headed by Superintendent of Schools Evan H. Thomas, will include the administrative staff, each school principal, department directors, teachers, specialists and outstanding laymen of professional ability in all fields of curriculum, industrial, business and commerce, and will also include a member from the I.T.A. and the school board, Mr. Boyd stated.

Mr. Boyd's statement continued as follows:

"The present-day lack of specialists, mathematicians and specially trained engineers has created a variety of impressions in the minds of the public. This provides an opportunity to re-examine and re-evaluate the system of education, and to produce a picture of clarity and understanding."

"If the oft-used expression that our free public school system is the last bastion of democratic way of life is accepted as true, then it is our patriotic duty to perfect the system of education, and to produce a picture of clarity and understanding."

"This study should be comprehensive and all-inclusive, for while we are endeavoring to attain the scientific accomplishments to be our most vital need, we must re-evaluate the educational system we require educated men and women in greater numbers for all our endeavors."

The request filed with the Board of Adjustment would have permitted an increase in the legal number of children to ten.

# Junior Rifle Club Teacher Is Champ Cop Pistol Shot

The increased interest in competitive shooting within the ranks of every rifle club in the county is being due to the work of a man who never shot a pistol until he became a policeman—Nicholas DeHagara. DeHagara has spent much time developing interest and enthusiasm for shooting in the police department pistol team, which has been placing third in the Essex County Police Revolver League against such competition as Newark Police Department and Essex County Sheriff's Office.

DeHagara, a former musician turned policeman, a veteran of the regular army in the navy, had never held a pistol in his hand until he was sworn in as a policeman in February, 1951. He is a perfectionist at heart, DeHagara decided then and there to become a first in shooting. As he said in this reporter, "Shooting is the most important attribute to police ability in keeping law and order. Therefore, I decided that I would try to become good at shooting."

Since his appointment to the police department, DeHagara has been opening his eyes to the fact that he can spend his spare time practicing on the Belleville Police Department pistol range.

Today he is considered one of the most outstanding shooting experts in the county, having won several trophies in competition to show his skill.

He is the first Belleville man to shoot a perfect 300 score in the highly contested Essex County Police Revolver League. He placed second in that league for the season's average. He placed third among 4,000 participants in the international pistol matches held at Hempstead, L. I., this year. And he has been Belleville police officer several times.

A product of the Belleville school system, DeHagara was a musician all through high school. He was a member of the County Police in 1939, he was assigned to serve with several Navy bands, including the one at Pearl Harbor, with which he was playing at the time of the infamous attack on the Japs in 1941.

DeHagara, his wife, who had joined him in Hawaii in October 1941, were in town at the time of the attack and were injured. They remained there for four years, with DeHagara shipping out for duty with the Pacific fleet. Mrs. DeHagara, formerly Miss Cecilia Pallica of Little Falls, N. J., remained in Hawaii, working with the War Department and the Bank of Hawaii.

Patrolman DeHagara was recently appointed instructor of the Junior Rifle Club. He has several plans in mind for these boys, DeHagara said. He will teach them how to handle a weapon and how to be careful in handling a gun. He has hope that by teaching these youngsters how to shoot properly, a little may rub off on them, so that they go into service, they will have a bowing acquaintance with shooting."

The police officer is in charge of the police pistol range and also teaches shooting to members of the police department. He has his own ammunition and that of the members of the police team. He also will make ammunition for any officer who requests it.

He is assigned to duty as a traffic patrolman at the corner of Jerusalem Street and Union Avenue.

DeHagara and his wife (they were married in 1940) live at 79 New Street. At the present time they are breeding toy terriers and have six of them.

He is a member of St. Paul's R. C. Church, treasurer of Belleville Police Benevolent Association, Local No. 24, and a member of Post No. 275, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

# MCGLYNN HAYS CO. CALLED BANKRUPT BY FEDERAL JUDGE

Federal Judge Royce J. Wortendyke Jr. handed down a decision in Federal Court, Newark, Monday declaring the McGlynn Hays Industries, Inc., of 21 Banger Street, Belleville, bankrupt. Efforts to reorganize the business, in court since July 1955, failed. The firm manufactures aircraft components and radar mechanisms.

An offer by Philadelphia Gear Works, Inc. of Philadelphia to reorganize the company was withdrawn when the U. S. Treasury Department refused to allow the company to carry on its books as tax losses more than \$500,000 of McGlynn Hays debts. The Philadelphia Company had hoped an \$800,000 amount would be approved.

The Belleville company owed about \$14,000 in taxes, reduction taxes and about \$900,000 to the Office of Defense Lending of the Treasury Dept.

At the time the reorganization petition was filed, McGlynn Hays' assets were \$665,945 and liabilities as \$1,718,188.

Judge Wortendyke referred the case to bankruptcy referee William H. Tallyn, who will conduct a bankruptcy sale of the company's assets.

**A Change In Tactics Indicated**

In the Letters-to-the-Editor column in this issue of The Times-News is printed a communication from Lee H. Garson.

Mr. Garson takes Mayor Isadore J. Padula to task for remarks made by the Mayor at the dinner on Dec. 3 of Belleville Manufacturers' Association. In doing so, we feel that Mr. Garson has been unduly harsh toward the Mayor and unfair in some of his comments.

The Mayor's talk may or may not have been intended as Mr. Padula's answer to the letter sent him by the Citizens Tax Council. The Mayor may or may not have answered a letter to answer the Council's letter with a plan of his own. We are not familiar with, nor can we be expected to be acquainted with, Mayor Padula's method of handling his correspondence.

But he was justified in taking the contents of the Council's letter as part of his text for his speech before the industrialists last week. Nor is it uncommon practice for a public official to make answer to such a letter in this public manner. The letter was a good one, as was the letter by Mr. Garson, a prominent member of the Council, printed in the Letters-to-the-Editor department in last week's issue of The Times-News — although we disagree with some of the thinking presented and some of the conclusions drawn.

The Mayor was right in suggesting that no civic group, "no matter how sincerely inspired," can usurp the place of specialists. Mr. Garson agrees with this in his letter in this issue of The Times-News. There appears to be a difference of opinion as to whom the Mayor was referring when he used the description "specialists."

Mr. Garson seems to believe that the Mayor meant outside professional "specialists." It may be that the Mayor had in mind the heads of departments of municipal government, such as himself, who are logically in a position to know more about the workings of government than are non-officials.

Once again, we are not in a position to know, nor can we be expected to know, what the Mayor had in mind. Regardless of his intention, it is our opinion that if he was referring to himself and the other members of the Commission in making the statement about usurping someone's place, he was on solid ground.

By this we mean that the elected officials of our town, (as in all others) are chosen to

represent us and to act for us. It is not fitting for any group to suggest that it can act for these elected officials.

If, as the Citizens Tax Council advocates, a Planning Board should be appointed, the appointment of personnel must be made by the Board of Commissioners, not by any civic group or combination of civic groups — no matter how sincerely inspired.

This does not mean, of course, that the Commissioners should retire to an ivory tower and make their choices. It does not mean, either, that the Commissioners should turn deaf ears toward outside suggestions. On the contrary, we agree that such groups as the Citizens Tax Council have much of value to offer in the choice of members of a Planning Board — or any other board, for that matter. The thinking of the Council and other associations of local men and women should be accorded serious attention by the appointing officials — but in the final analysis the actual appointing is the prerogative and responsibility of our elected officers. Should the Council or any other group find fault with the persons chosen, there are many ways of making this disagreement known.

We think, further, that Mr. Garson was too severe with the Mayor in characterizing the latter's remarks as "funny" and "ridiculous." It may be true that much time has been lost in not having set up a Planning Board years ago, in not having taken action toward improving the main business section and in not doing what was necessary to prevent Belleville from falling behind neighboring communities.

Does this mean — do Mr. Garson and the Citizens Tax Council believe it means — that nothing should be done at all? That, because Belleville is late, it should throw in the sponge altogether? We do not think Mr. Garson or the Council has anything like this in mind.

We were impressed by Mayor Padula's words at last week's gathering. We thought he sounded sincere and that he was striving to point a way out of what, more than once, has been called a "mess."

Why not acknowledge that we missed the boat in past years? Why not insist that all is not lost because of what has happened in days gone by (or, more accurately, because of what has not happened) and take the view that there is another boat to catch? Why not raise our thoughts from a personal to a community level and let's all face squarely the situation as it exists today and work together for improvements tomorrow?

Basically, that is what we believe the Mayor and the Citizens Tax Council — and some other local organizations — are really trying to say. Instead of saying it, let us do it.
