Charles G. Sherwood, of 30 Alexander Avenue, was elected president of the New Jersey Taxpayers' Association at its annual meeting Monday. He succeeds Francis J. Pinque, of East Orange, president for the last three years.

Sherwood was elected at the organization meeting of the 60-man board of directors in the Hotel Robert Treat, Newark.

Vice president in charge of manufacturing for the International Electric Corp., Paramus, a division of International Telephone & Telegraph Corp., served previously on the Taxpayers' Association's board of directors, executive committee on education and municipalities.

In an effort to improve progress in curriculum and teaching, the Board of Education sponsors a year-around workshop program for teachers and employs a director of curriculum.

Alert to continuous improvement of curriculum, the board of education has taken many constructive measures during the three years that I have been associated with it. The remedial reading program has been expanded. A program of corrective speech instruction in the elementary schools was introduced by me and adopted by the board.

program of mathematics instruction for the more able students has been introduced in the high school, and students in this program will receive advanced standing in college. Old textbooks have been replaced to the extent that all textbooks are now in good condition. Each department in the high school is beginning a program of before and after school work for the more able students and those who seek special help.

Two high school mathematics teachers have been financed by the board in taking a course in the teaching of modern mathematics. Educational television sets have been purchased, and each school now has a set of its own.

As president of the board of education, one of my first acts was the appointment of a lay committee to work with the professional staff in the study of the curriculum of the Belleville schools. This committee began its work under the chairmanship of Jesse H. Staudman, and when he left town I appointed Mrs. Edward A. Rochas to replace him.

The committee is continuing its work on the following subjects: home economics, industrial arts, social studies, business education, foreign languages, physical education and health, music and art, reading, curriculum organization, and seeds.

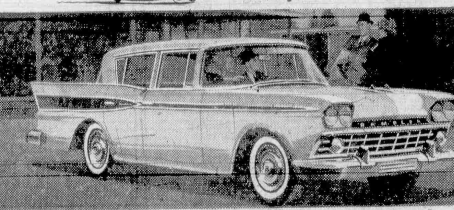

Junior Boys Basketball Team Wins Four Straight In Bid For Division Title

St. Peter's is making a strong bid for honors in the Essex County CYO Junior Boys Basketball League this year. Competing in Division III, St. Peter's has won its first four games and seems headed for a divisional crown. Only team currently in a position to push the Petreans is St. Anthony's, Newark, winner of two of three decisions. All of the other clubs in the division have lost at least twice.

Bellboy Quintet Loses To Bengals, Upsets Seton Hall

Coach John Westlake's Bellboy Five Come Back From Humiliating Bloomfield Loss To Upset A Highly Rated Seton Hall Quintet

Coach John Westlake's Bellboy quintet split in two games this week as they suffered a 79-47 thrashing by the terrific Bloomfield squad and then came right back and upset a highly touted Seton Hall team 51-45.

Fred Riccio led the Belleville scorers in the Bloomfield fray with 13 points. Riccio continued his fine scoring in the Seton Hall game as he dropped in 22 points to bring his seven-game total to 140 points. Riccio was ably assisted by Jim Hunt in the Seton Hall game when Hunt dumped in 18 points, his best output this season.

The Seton Hall game saw the Pony Pirates take a 10-9 lead at the end of the first quarter. Kevin Torpey led the Seton Hall team while Riccio and Hunt led the Bellboy squad. 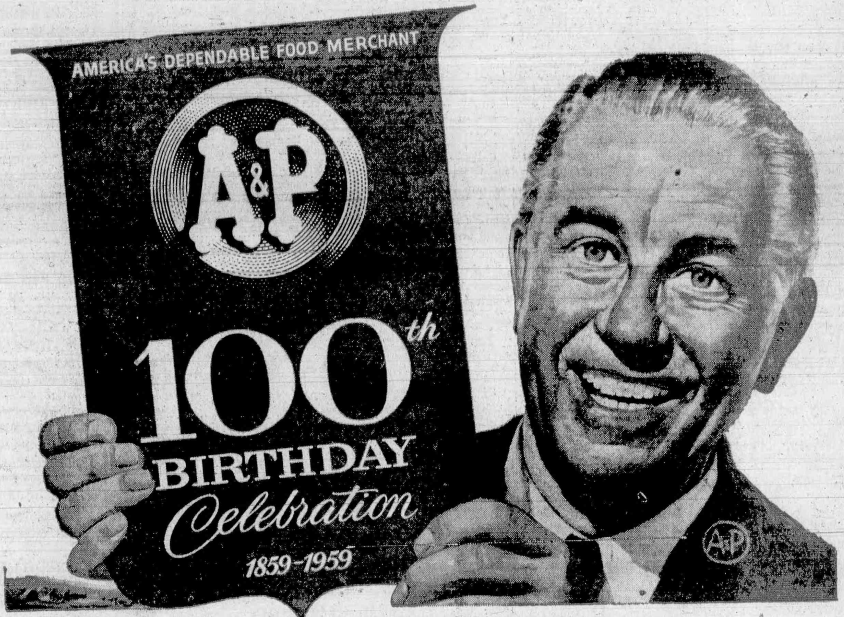

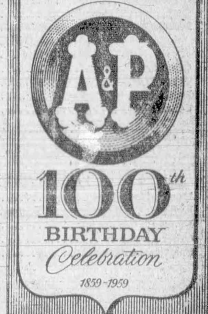

Raymond L. Mahony, who moved to Bloomfield ten years ago after having lived in Nutley more than 20 years, resigned last week from three Essex County posts he has held for many years, as director of the Essex County Welfare Board, as county adjutor and secretary to the county council.

Mahony, who is 69, told The Nutley Sun, "My resignations were entirely voluntary. I'm just tired."

A county employee for the past 47 years, 11 months, his resignations from the three posts were contained in a letter sent last Tuesday to Mrs. Eliza Wright, director of the Board of Freeholders.

Mahony's retirement will open the way for the incoming Democratic majority on the Board of Freeholders to pick up three more political thorns. His total income from the three posts is \$22,000 annually.

Presently residing at 111 Overlook Terrace, Bloomfield, the Mahonys lived both in Prospect Street and in Oak Crest Place during their twenty years in Nutley. Active in local Republican affairs, Mahony was also a well known golfer and bowler. His favorite sport today is surf fishing.

His wife is the former Miss Frances Hickey, of Passaic. They have two children. Their son, Raymond Mahony, is married to the former Miss Helen Saunders, of Nutley. They live in Mountain Lakes with their eight children.

The elder Mahony's daughter, Betty, is the wife of Albert Ciccone formerly of Nutley, and at present secretary and business manager of the Essex County Vocational School system. The Ciccones have two daughters and reside in Maplewood.

Mahony's intimate knowledge of county affairs won him the appellation of "Mr. Essex County." In 1950, the Board of Freeholders marked the 20th anniversary of his entry into county service, with

the citation, "the best informed public official on county government in the entire nation."

The position of county adjutor entailed making arrangements for applications to state, county and sometimes private hospitals for the mentally ill and tubercular. Beyond that he had charge of institutions for the aged, the blind and permanently ill and disabled.

One of the associations in which he takes the most pride, is his fifteen years as a member of the Essex County board of trustees of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

BERGEN GENERATING STATION will have a rated capacity of 500,000 kilowatts.

While we do not like to gaze into crystal balls or take on the role of a soothsayer, the future growth of New Jersey is clearly reflected in the actual planning and construction of new electric generating facilities in the territory which we serve. New generating stations, being constructed by Public Service will cost a total of \$340,000,000 when completed.

By 1962 the installed electric generating capacity of Public Service will exceed four million kilowatts.

Additions and improvements to the company's gas properties are being made continually. We serve more than a million customers with gas, and at present, about one third of them are supplied with natural gas. By the end of 1959, nearly one half of our customers will be served with natural gas.

All of these facts reflect the growth of New Jersey and Public Service is growing along with this great state. The years ahead hold great promise. We are planning ahead to fulfill that promise.
