

Citizens To Give Views On Board Of Education Budget Monday Night

Public Hearing Scheduled Monday At 8 P.M. In School Board Offices At School Eight; Tentative Budget Available At Office For Public Inspection

Belleville residents will have a chance to give their views on the tentative Board of Education budget for the school year 1959-60 at a public hearing 8 p.m. Monday in the Board offices at School Eight, Union Avenue.

In the event of a larger turnout than anticipated the hearing will be transferred to the school auditorium. The entire budget is printed on the inside pages of today's Times and will be on file from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. today and Monday at the Board offices for public inspection.

Figures released to the press this week indicate a total expenditure for the year of \$2,481,000 against a total anticipated revenue of \$2,502,046. Last year's expenditure figure was \$2,440,376.25.

A drop in state aid of about \$20,000 from last year's \$251,000 means that the total income will be an estimated \$2,481,046, or 40 cents less than the \$2,502,046.

Almost every other item among the appropriations shows an increase over last year's figures. The insurance premium which, last year, was \$12,000, is being increased to \$12,500. The furniture and equipment account dropped \$4,000 from \$26,500 to \$22,500.

Other items which rose significantly are the education and retirement accounts, which almost doubled from \$32,700 to \$61,000, and the teachers' pension fund, which rose from \$10,000 to \$13,428.

Public Works Department Head Clerk James Sardo reported that the annual salary schedule for the Water Department has been attached to the budget. He said that the breakdown of salaries, Hugh Welsh, who has been in charge of Public Works during the past year, has recommended that the Water Department's salary schedule be increased.

Belleville May Buy Land Strip At Soho For New Firehouse

Report That Belleville Might Consider Purchase Of Entire Hospital Land And Building For Town Use; New Playground Set For 250-Foot Tract

Land at the site of the County Isolation Hospital will figure prominently in Belleville's future expansion, it was learned at Tuesday's Commission meeting.

Commissioner George F. Kiernan has been authorized to approach the Board of Chosen Freeholders concerning the purchase by the Town of a 250-foot strip of land at the rear of the hospital. In addition, it was revealed that, in the event of the County abandoning the Hospital, Belleville may consider purchasing the entire tract for municipal use.

The land for which Kiernan will negotiate is located on Center Street, south of the Berkeley Avenue house. Previous plans for the land included the creation of a firehouse. Kiernan suggested, however, that a portion of the strip also be devoted to a play area and recreation house.

He pointed out that the present playground located in lower Fairway Avenue is inadequate due to the fact that heavy rains have caused the ground to be so eroded that the playground is unusable.

Kiernan was scheduled to bring the matter before the freeholders yesterday.

Pico Critical Of Proposal To Move Patients To Soho

Suggestion By County Supervisor Sheets That Senile Male Patients Be Moved From Cedar Grove Hospital To Belleville Is Scored

A suggestion by County Supervisor Weldon R. Sheets that senile male patients at the Essex County Hospital in Cedar Grove be transferred to the isolation hospital in Belleville has drawn fire from Commissioner N. Pico, director of public affairs.

Pico viewed the idea of moving such patients into a residential district in the neighborhood of a school as dangerous. Sheets said, however, that the men were not considered a security hazard.

The Supervisor had proposed the change as a means of saving money. He said that the change was not in the proper interests of the people of Belleville.

A survey to see whether the isolation hospital has outlived its usefulness is under way, he reported that only 200 patients were occupying beds in the 340-bed hospital. He suggested the hospital might be used as a state geriatrics center.

However, Pico said such a transfer would be "the beginning, and other patients will be transferred from Cedar Grove to Cedar Grove. It is in the heart of a residential district with school children all around. There is always the danger that patients of this type may become a nuisance to the neighborhood," he added.

"It seems that no consideration is given to the people of Belleville by the county freeholders," Pico said. "A few years ago they tried to force through a law which would have transferred without giving the people a chance, is another attempt to impose on the people of the Town of Belleville projects of other communities."

RODINO MOVES TO END DUAL TAXING OF NON-RESIDENTS

Introduces Bill In Congress To Prohibit Taxing Of New Jersey Workers In New York

Congressman Peter Rodino re-introduced legislation in Congress, yesterday, calling for Constitutional amendment prohibiting states from taxing the personal incomes of non-residents.

Rodino pointed out to The Times-News that his re-introduction of this legislation is a consequence of his fight to bring about more equitable taxation for its residents and other taxpayers in New Jersey.

In the requirement of the 10th District Congressmen, the House Judiciary Committee will undertake staff study of corrective legislation.

An estimated 155,000 New Jersey residents pay approximately 20 million dollars in non-resident income taxes annually to the State of New York on income earned in that state and about 17,000 Connecticut residents pay another 7 million dollars, Rodino said.

In contrast to this, 50,000 New Yorkers working in New Jersey pay no income taxes in New Jersey.

A substantial number of New Jersey residents in the Camden area also pay similar taxes yearly to the City of Philadelphia under its wage and net profits tax ordinance and to the State of Delaware under its personal income tax law.

Commenting on this situation, Congressman Rodino said: "To require a non-resident to pay a contribution toward the expenses of a state in which he happens to earn his money is to require him to pay something which in justice and good conscience, he should not pay."

"It is inequitable for New York to contend that non-residents of New Jersey, Connecticut and Delaware pay the taxes which benefit New York State as do its own residents."

While a Constitutional amendment limiting the power of states to tax persons outside their borders would be a desirable step, it is more difficult to bring about since amendment of the Federal Constitution requires a two-thirds vote of the membership of Congress and the Senate ratification by a three-fourths of the states.

Rodino has suggested a fight only on the Federal level but on the state level as well.

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BUILDING DRIVE GETS UNDER WAY AT CLARA MAASS

Other School Of Nursing Will Be Modern, 5-Story Building Housing 100 Girls

The Clara Maass Memorial Hospital is nearing reality, according to hospital officials, as the initial stages of the \$750,000 Building Fund solution began today among the 400 medical staff members.

A large lecture auditorium, also, will be a part of the building. It will seat all students of the school for daily lectures, instructions, and special lectures.

Belleville Foundation Would Back Planning Board Proposals

Foundation President William J. Orchard Indicates Group Would Give Aid In Forming Board; Points Out Need For Such A Step

William J. Orchard, president of the Belleville Foundation, yesterday indicated that the board of Commissioners Tuesday might request on behalf of the Foundation that the commissioners also again study the possibility of creating a planning board.
