The service will be presided over by the Rt. Rev. Leonard Stark, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese, of Newark.

Christ Church is one of the oldest in the Diocese of Newark, the original grant being authorized on February 10, 1746 by a direct Royal grant from King George II of England as a part of Trinity Church in Newark.

The men became victims of a carbon monoxide while doing repair work in the pipe. A fireman had arrived on the scene. Cafone tied a rope around his waist and proceeded along the pipe. However, the gas fumes became too much for him, and he lost consciousness before he could reach the men.

The two workers never recovered consciousness, and Cafone lay in critical condition for several days before recovering.

## Pico Lists Advantages In Baby Station Move

**Director of Public Affairs Says Relocation Of Baby Keep Well Stations To School One And Seven Will Make Services Convenient**

Commissioner Nuncio R. Pico, director of the Department of Public Affairs, today explained the reasons behind the proposed relocation of the Baby Keep Well Station at Town Hall to Schools One and Seven.

The new locations, he said, would permit a more "equitable distribution" of the service. It would also be a more convenient arrangement for the people now using the stations, he added.

"The use of school space for baby stations is nothing new. There is one now in operation at school 4 for at least 10 years. At various times, this station has been located in Schools 2 and 3.

## BOARD APPROVES PAID MEDICAL STAFF AT SOHO

**Board Of Freeholders Will Explore Possibility Of Regaining Free Service**

Hope is still held out that free medical service to welfare patients at the Essex County Isolation Hospital may again be made available in the future.

The freeholders adopted a report of the hospital's six-man medical advisory board which recommended that the hospital be paid fees based on the current schedule of the Medical-Surgical Plan of New Jersey.

Establishment of a paid visiting staff of physicians and surgeons at the hospital was approved at the last meeting of the Board of Freeholders.

The board's action met the deadline of March 1 at which time the free care heretofore provided to welfare patients at the hospital will no longer be available.

At that time, the reluctant and younger surgeons to continue the practice of free service was called to the board's attention.

## IDENTIFY BODY FOUND IN RIVER BY FINGER PRINTS

**Cite Detective Harry Winfield For Work In Investigation Of Case**

The body found in the Passaic River February 24 has definitely been identified as that of Joseph Karkus, 23, who had last been seen February 24 in a rooming house at 31 Southbrook Place, Newark, where he lived.

The body was discovered floating in the river by a barge captain, from where it was brought to shore. An autopsy revealed that the man had received a blow on the right side of the head before he entered the water. Death was by drowning.

The Essex County Prosecutor's Office is continuing to list the case as an apparent homicide according to Lt. Leonard Winfield. Police also noted that Southbrook Place dead ends at the Passaic River.

Tentative identification first was established through fingerprints by the FBI in Washington and by the Newark Police.

Although the body was found partially decomposed, special treatment of the fingerprints enabled Winfield to obtain the fingerprints from which the FBI was able to establish Karkus' identity.

## Padula To Lodge Protest On Dropping Of Trains

**Mayor Says Large Number Of Belleville Commuters Use Trains In Question; To Join Nutley Mayor In Protesting Examiner's Proposals**

Mayor Isadore J. Padula will join Nutley Mayor Harry W. Vanoy in protesting the dropping of trains by the Erie Railroad.

Padula said he was acting on behalf of a large number of Belleville commuters who would be seriously inconvenienced by the move.

The Erie Railroad division management filed with McGrath an appeal to cut the present service to three trains a week, in half.

Westbound, out of Hoboken, the Erie would drop three trains now leaving there at 4:40, 5:00 and 5:20 p.m. to one at 4:40 p.m.

The Erie introduced a statistical report indicating that the 7 a.m. train to Hoboken carries only 38 passengers on most days.

The heaviest commuter loads towards Belleville and Paterson from Hoboken are carried by the trains leaving there at 5:04 and 5:30 p.m., averaging 125 each.

## CARNEY SAYS TAX COUNCIL WILL NOT GO OVER BUDGET

**President Of Citizens' Tax Council Calls Past Efforts To Change Budget 'Wasted'**

Edward Carney, president of the Citizens Tax Council, told the Belleville Times-Newspaper this week that the Council will concentrate its efforts on obtaining petition signatures for a referendum to change the present form of government to council-manager rather than spend time going over the individual commission's budgets.

Carney said that past efforts of the Council have been "wasted" due to the commissioners' refusal to take action on the group's recommendations.

"These efforts by the Tax Council have been wasted by the absolute refusal of these same changes in their inefficient methods of handling town business."

The Citizens Tax Council will not make a study of the budget of each department with the commissioners as they have in the past.

The Citizens Tax Council will instead focus their efforts to obtaining signatures on the commissionary referendum. Only a complete removal of politics from the Tax Council to reduce taxes and improve services to the citizens of Belleville, Carney said, would be a good idea.

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4 States to Lift Drivers' Licenses  
Of Speeders in Any One of Them

TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 18.—A four-state compact in which out-of-state motorists convicted of driving at excessive speeds in New Jersey, Delaware, Pennsylvania and Connecticut will have their licenses suspended in their home states was voted by motor vehicle directors from each of the states today.

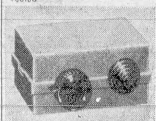
Under terms of today's compact and effective immediately, any motorist on a revoked list in one state for speeding and who drives in that state again while on the revoked list will lose his right to drive in any of the four states for at least three months.

In addition, the four states agreed that an out-of-state driver who is convicted of going sixty miles an hour in a fifty-mile-an-hour zone or seventy miles an hour in a sixty-mile zone and who has his license automatically suspended for thirty days as provided by New Jersey law will also have his license lifted for thirty days in each of the other states.

## TO THE TAXPAYERS OF THE TOWN OF BELLEVILLE:

The foregoing, "Summary of General Section of Budget" develops the local municipal tax levy only and includes "Reserve for Uncollected Taxes" or cash basis "over-1958" for school and county purposes as well as for our local needs. School and County taxes are expressed only in the amounts of cash required and not in terms of the taxes that must be raised to meet those cash requirements.

The Budget for the Year 1959 produces an estimated tax rate of \$7.99 per \$100.00 of assessed valuation an estimated 79 point increase when compared with the 1958 rate of \$7.20. The exact rate cannot be determined at this time and will not be final until certified by the County Board of Taxation.

The following table compares the estimated 1959 tax levy and tax rate with the actual elements for 1958:

Taxes levied for County and School purposes are mandatory, being fixed by the Board of Chosen Freeholders and the voters respectively. These elements, together with the amount raised for their portion of the Reserve for Uncollected Taxes, account for 70.84% of the total estimated tax levy for 1959, 46.81% for Schools and 24.03% for County needs. The levy for Schools represents an increase of 43 points in the 1959 tax rate when compared with 1958 and the County levy shows an increase of 24 points in the 1959 tax rate after inclusion of the increase in the Reserve for Uncollected Taxes for each.

The estimated levy for Municipal Purposes, together with its portion of the reserve "over-1958" accounts for an increase of 12 points in the estimated tax rate for 1959.

Revenue anticipations are set at levels believed fully realizable.

Many elements of the municipal levy, such as outlet sewer charges, garbage removal service contract, street lighting and other public utility charges and pension funds, are not directly controllable by the Commissioners. Increases in operating appropriations were necessary due to the increase in costs of essential goods and services to provide for the continued efficient administration of the affairs of the Town.

The budget shows 1959 and 1958 in parallel, thereby facilitating comparison of each item and is supported by detailed departmental worksheets developing amounts appropriated. At the public hearing each Commissioner will be ready to explain and discuss any items in this budget subject to his control and discretion.

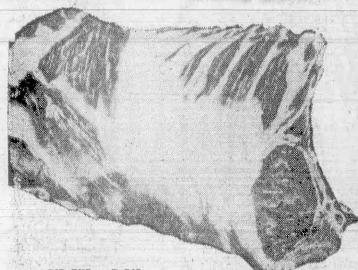

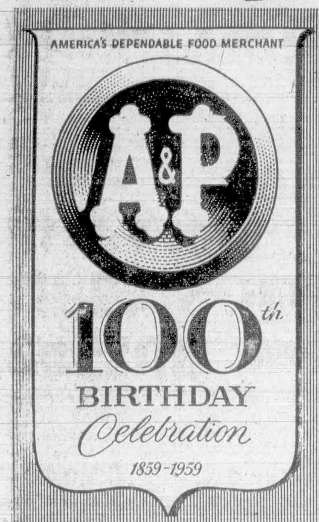
