Portable Kitchen Aids Summer Eating

Small electric appliances make informal meals easier, because you can cook and serve right on the spot. We didn't want to clutter valuable counter space with appliances, so we planned a portable kitchen that can be wheeled to any part of the house or to the patio. It holds all the equipment that's not in use and has a plug-in panel, just under the top, that takes six appliances at once. A flexible cable attached to the panel can be plugged into 230-volt outlets specially installed in the kitchen, family room, and patio. The top provides plenty of space for serving and clearing.

Clara Maass Hospital Opens New Poison Control Unit

The new Poison Control Unit of Clara Maass Memorial Hospital was officially opened to the public Thursday.

Attending the brief ceremonies, in addition to the Hospital officials, were Mayor Isadore J. Padula, Richard Russo, poison control consultant of N. J. State Department of Health; Lucius Bowers, N. J. Pharmaceutical Association; and Pat De Spirito, Essex County Pharmaceutical Society.

This unit, one of a number being sponsored throughout the State by the State Department of Health, will enable Clara Maass Memorial to provide more effective emergency treatment for residents of the several communities it serves.

Under the general supervision of William L. Post, M.D., Chief of the Pediatrics Department at the hospital.

A complete record file of the specific antidote to be used in each case is available and both the nurses and the Resident Physicians at the hospital will receive special instructions on the treatment and techniques to be used. Like the Emergency Department, of which the Poison Control Unit is a part, it will be operated on a 24-hour per day schedule.

While everyone, regardless of age, will be treated in case of emergency, it is anticipated that most of the patients brought in for treatment will be children between the ages of two and six. The incidence of poisoning in the case of small children and the resultant mortality rate is the primary reason for the establishment of these Poison Control Centers.

The opening of this particular unit is another step by Clara Maass Memorial in its efforts to provide local residents with the most modern treatment in all cases of emergency. With many people in this area are aware of the hospital's reputation for medical and patient care, only a few realize the part the Emergency Department has played in the health program of the community.

In the first four months of 1959, a total of 662 people were brought in for emergency treatment, an average of five cases a day. During the past two weeks alone, 133 patients were treated by the Emergency Department. Most of the patients are sent home following the emergency treatment. However,

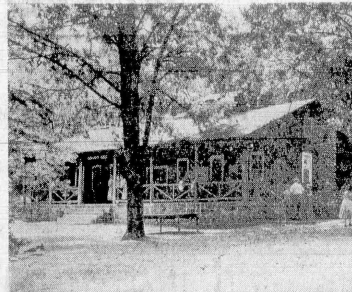

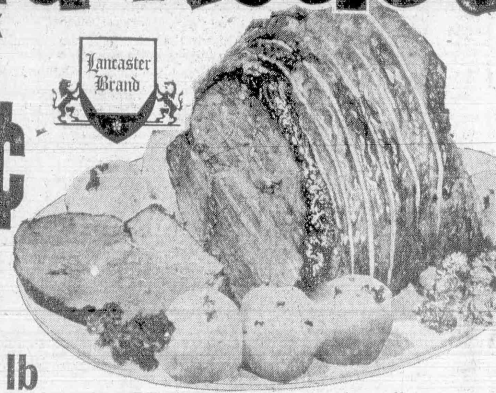
