

Board Of Education Asks For Proposals On School Survey Plan

Board Secretary To Contact Rutgers University
In Preparation For Proposed Survey Of School
Building Situation; Residents Question Need

The Board of Education authorized the Secretary to contact Rutgers University and request that they submit a proposal to the Board for making a survey on school facilities at Monday's meeting.

The survey will determine the extent of a planned school building program in town, to be financed by a bond issue.

Belleville residents Lee Garson and Sal Calabro questioned the necessity of spending money on a survey. Calabro added that the Board should first make sure that it is making maximum use of its present facilities.

Board member Richard Dineen replied that the Board would be unwilling to make plans for any expansion of facilities without first getting all the necessary facts. Superintendent of Schools Evan Thomas added that a representative of the school population, especially in the parochial schools, is a major reason for the survey. The last such survey was made in 1949.

Thomas said that a representative from Rutgers had conferred with the Board Friday, and that he indicated the survey would cost about \$3,200. He gave assurance that the survey would work with local lay groups on the survey.

Representative of School Two suggested that the School Board consider a proposal for adding three rooms and an all-purpose room to the school. It was pointed out that School Two is the only school which does not have the entire eight grades, and means that the school children must make more adjustments in new schools than is normally required. School Two spokesman also said that new building in the area will mean almost 100 more pupils in the next two years.

Chris Albano, spokesman for the Citizens Tax Council, told the Board that the Council favored the additions to School Two.

Commissioners Move To Speed Up Clearing Of Overhill Conditions

Board Moves To Give Property Owners Five Days
To Correct Situation Which Presents Hazard
To Children Playing In Neighborhood

The Board of Commissioners moved to give Krugman & DePetro, Clifton real estate agency, who own the large tract of property in the rear of homes on Riverside Avenue, Overhill Road and vicinity, five days to clear up what was termed a "dangerous condition" on their property.

Adolph Gandio, of 39 Overhill Road, told the commissioners that the conditions about which residents in the area complained two weeks ago were still present. The most pressing problem is an open ditch on the property which is both an unsanitary and a dangerous to children.

Hugh Welsh, of the Department of Public Works, reported that he had been assured by Krugman & DePetro that the ditch would be cleared up by the end of the month. A bulldozer has been leveling off the land during the past two weeks.

Welsh added that he had told Krugman & DePetro that if progress were not made on the matter he would refer the problem to Town Attorney Lawrence Keenan for possible legal action. The motion passed Tuesday calls for legal action if nothing is done within the five-day period.

In other business, the commissioners passed a resolution making an emergency appropriation of \$10,000 to handle an unexpectedly large number of cases in the Welfare Department.

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The Toll Booth Compromise

The controversy that has waged over the past few months concerning the toll booths on the Garden State Parkway north of the Bloomfield Avenue exit, northbound, will probably result in a compromise measure of establishing a 15c toll for motorists getting off the Parkway at Hoover Avenue and other exits above that. The purpose of attempting to do away with the 25c toll at the location in question was to reduce the traffic jams at the Bloomfield Avenue exit. Motorists who would normally get off north of Bloomfield Avenue almost invariably use this exit to avoid the toll.

From our point of view, the compromise will not be a successful one. We can't see the difference of 10c making that much difference to a commuter interested in saving toll money which amounts up to a not inconsiderable sum when considered over a period of a year.

If the Parkway commission is genuinely interested in easing the pressing problems of traffic jams at Bloomfield Avenue, it would seem that a more imaginative solution could be found. For example, wouldn't it be possible to allow toll-free passage only to those getting off the Parkway on the one or two exits immediately north of Bloomfield by setting aside a single lane for such commuters?

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Beware Of Hazard Of Plastic Bags

The use of plastic bags as playthings, has resulted in the death of a number of small children in the United States, thus far in 1959 warns Edward G. Burdy, Health Officer.

Burdy indicated that an electrocution charge is generated when children put the bags over their heads to peer through them thus cutting off the supply of air and causing the child to asphyxiate.

There is some evidence that the same hazard applies to plastic sheets, if used as mattress covers in cribs of infants and to plastic pillow cases. The National Safety Council recently issued a statement saying more than 20 children were reported to have suffocated because of the use of plastic sheets, pillow cases or bags in the first three months of 1959. Its statement was based on material supplied by State Health Departments. Plastic sheets were mentioned in 7 deaths and plastic pillow cases in 8.

The National Safety Council estimates that as many as 100 children may lose their lives from this hazard in 1959 unless parents exercise care.

In addition to plastic covers for mattresses and pillow cases, plastic bags are used to package foods and as coverings for laundered garments. "While they may be excellent for these intended, children must be protected against their misuse."
