# Town Awards \$2,800 to Malone Ave

At the Town Commission meeting this week a \$2800 emergency appropriation was awarded for the reconstruction of the sanitary sewers in Malone Avenue which have been obstructed by rocks.

The commissioners also passed a resolution to send their condolences to the widow of Raymond P. Williamson, a member of the Board of Adjustment for eight years. Williamson had been active in fraternal, religious and charitable organizations.

An ordinance was passed on first reading and will be read again next week for approval providing for the removal of nuisances created by stagnant or obstructed water causes which are or may become dangerous to life and health. The commission ordinance will assess the cost of removal as a municipal lien against the premises affected and provide a penalty for the violation of provisions of the ordinance.

Mrs. Edna Ducko of Riverdale Avenue complained at the meeting of just such a nuisance existing in the rear of the street. The nuisance, in this case is an open ditch upon which Mrs. Ducko said she had been provided five day action. The ordinance, if passed next week, will cover this.

Its members he said were most active in affairs of civic interest. The post obtained a small piece of property from the town in 1955. Mr. Noonan, a local activist, merely initiated the proposal.

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# PARK PROGRAM TO BE OPENED ON JUNE 29TH

The nine parks in Belleville will open on June 29 under the direction and supervision of the Belleville Recreation Department. One of the highlights of the summer season is the Point Tournament which begins when the parks open and is culminated at the end of the summer.

Under the point tournament system, each youngster who goes to the park is awarded a variable amount of points for each achievement. Listed among the achievements are not only sports but arts and crafts achievements and helper achievements.

In the arts and crafts division no youngster is allowed to make one item over and over again for points. In this manner the child is taken through eight phases of arts and crafts, i.e., feltwork, metalwork, etc. This is done under the guidance of the point system.

The park also organizes sports teams and inter-playground games are set up. For this, points are given out.

During the summer on Wednesday afternoons, the parks will feature special events such as pet shows, hobby shows and puppet shows. Points are distributed to participants and winners.

Under the heading of Special Activities clinics are set up for football, baseball, volleyball, archery and weightlifting.

The point system, which is in effect for the special activities, also serves for prize points and horsehoes. However, here there is a 100 point limit which will prevent any one youngster from coming all hours in only one field of endeavor. The point youngsters must participate in a variety of activities.

At the end of the summer there are four winners and a town wide winner. The winner with the most amount of points.

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A charge made in a letter to the Belleville Times-News that Commissioner Harry Sullivan, Director of Public Safety, was serving in dual capacity because of the location of billboards on Town-owned property and his alleged employment by the owners of the billboards was refuted this week by Mr. Sullivan.

The letter, by John Brewer Moore, an Associate Planner with the Passaic Valley Citizens Planning Association, also questioned the desirability of the location of the Belleville Police Pistol Range as a factor threatening to mar both the appearance of a proposed new county park and the bi-municipal neighborhood of Nutley and Belleville.

Mr. Moore's communication states that in front of the police range are "six gigantic signs facing on to Bloomfield Avenue at the head of Hoover Avenue."

"On one of these signs," the letter goes on, "appears the name of the municipal facility along with that of the Town official in charge of Public Safety. Two of the billboards advertise brands of beer, one a brand of cookies, one a brand of gasoline, and the last a national grocery chain. Is it possible that this commercial advertising is located on municipally owned property? You will note that all these commercial billboards are owned by United Advertising."

"We believe," Mr. Moore continues, "that the Commissioner of Public Safety for the Town of Belleville, in this instance serves in a dual capacity— isn't it correct that he is an employee of United Advertising?"

K. C. Library On Communism Offers Books

The Belleville Council, Knights of Columbus No. 835 library-stock offers new books concerning the communist party, ranging from communistic theory to stories about refugees from Red tyranny.  
For members who like action, the list includes several adventure books about the victims of Communist persecution. These include Salvomir Rawicz's "The Long Walk," a story depicting the escape of Polish prisoners from unescapable Siberia, and William Bridgley's "The Deliverance of Sister Cecilia," which deals with a Catholic nun's flight from Czechoslovakia.  
Two more semi-adventure books, "Four Years in a Red net" written by the Reverend Herald Rigg, and "In Silence I Speak" by Cardinal Minzenty, both depict confinement in a Communist prison.  
For the more serious-minded, the library has Milyan Djilas' "The New Class," an analysis of the communist system, and "Masters of Deceit," written by J. Edgar Hoover. The latter describes Communist strategy and tactics in the United States, telling how to combat them.  
The popular book by James Michener, "The Bridge at Andau," treats the recent Hungarian revolution.

Now a statistical team does not just gather data; it interprets and analyzes the facts that they obtain. This is not a layman's job.

When a man has a bad heart condition does he not go to a specialist and have him take a cardiograph? Can he read the cardiograph? Of course not. He must have the specialist interpret the cardiograph for him and explain what it means in terms of his health and his life.

It would seem, therefore, that it is indeed wiser to have the path lit up for us rather to stumble blindly into a million dollar spending spree. No private citizen would spend that much money without proper guidance and therefore neither should the town officials who represent the people.

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## GARSON CHARGES REPORT FAULTY

At a regular meeting of the Board of Education on Monday evening, Mr. Lee Garson of Jefferson Street accused the Board's subcommittee on Curriculum of conducting an investigation on curriculum and initiating a final report without consulting any of the volunteers on the subcommittee.

Dr. Frank D. Ruggiero, President of the Board of Education, denied the Board's contact with the committee and stated that he was "not aware of the report."

Mrs. Mary Shader, secretary of the Board, said that the report had been submitted to her, but was not yet ready for distribution.

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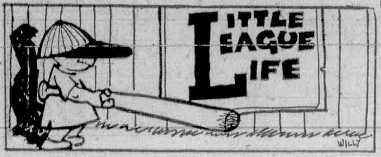

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### Basic Iced Tea Recipe



Make iced tea by the gallon and store it daily in a picnic vacuum jug with a spigot. Makes iced tea service as easy as turning a faucet whenever you want to quench your thirst. Separate bowls of fresh blueberries, sauce, and whipped cream make it equally easy for calorie counters to make a shortcake to their liking.

Pre-measure 1/2 cup loose tea (or remove tags from 15 tea-bags). Bring 1 quart of freshly drawn cold water to a full rolling boil in a saucepan. Remove from heat and while water is still bubbling, add all the tea of one kind. Stir, brew 15 minutes, uncovered, 8th and strain into pitcher holding an additional quart of freshly drawn cold water. (Do not refrigerate.) Serve in ice-filled glasses, with lemon and sugar to taste.

**Points to stress:**

1. This recipe can be prepared in half the total time because it requires boiling only 1 quart of water.
2. Boiling measures loose tea by a cup, rather than by "teaspoon spoons"; thus assuring accurate measuring.
3. Requires less ice cubes.

**General Information Regarding "Clouding"**

a. Clouding in food tea is caused by precipitation which occurs when food tea meets a cup of any degree of coldness.

b. Clouding does not impair the flavor or quality of food tea.

c. Clouding can be removed by adding enough boiling water to restore its crystal clearness.

d. Food tea should not be refrigerated. It will hold its flavor and quality 2-4 hours after preparation.



## \*KITCHEN NOTES

By MARIAN KEMP, Home Economist, Acme Markets

June is a month of many occasions, one of which is the annual celebration of Dairy Month. A time when one of the nation's greatest industries is honored for its contribution to our healthy society.

If you are looking for something easy for dessert or for when some special friends drop in, arrange an assortment of cheese and crackers on a large tray, with a cheese ball in the center. This is a wonderful combination of Cheddar cheese, Blue cheese, Cream cheese, choice seasoning and nutmeats and can be made a day or two in advance. Then for a special family treat serve ice cream sodas or milk floats for dessert. They are cooling and captivating.

**MYSTERIOUS CHEESE BALL**  
1 lb. wedge Blue Cheese  
1 lb. 6 oz. package sharp Cheddar Cheese  
1 (5 oz.) package Cream cheese  
1 tablespoon minced parsley  
1 tablespoon grated onion  
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 cup very finely chopped nutmeats  
1 cup finely chopped nutmeats

Allow cheese to stand at room temperature to soften. Combine all ingredients except 1/2 cup nutmeats. Mix well. Place mixture on waxed paper and shape into ball. Refrigerate for 1 or 2 hours and then roll ball in the 1/2 cup nutmeats. Refrigerate until about 1 hour before serving time. Use as a spread on crackers.

**MILK FLOATS**  
Milk  
Flavoring  
Ice Cream

In each glass put flavoring syrup and a small amount of ice cream. Stir with a long spoon until the glass is full with milk, give another stir, top with a scoop of ice cream.

**ICE CREAM SODAS**  
Prepare same as milk floats, using a carbonated beverage instead of milk.

**FLAVORING FOR SODAS AND MILK FLOATS**  
Chocolate Mint:  
One 8 1/2 oz. pkg. chocolate peppermint patties  
3/4 cup half and half

Place mints and half and half in a saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mints are melted and sauce is smooth. Cool. Use 2 tablespoons for each large glass.

**Pineapple:**  
Use frozen pineapple juice concentrate. Spoon suggested amount from the can into glass. Add sugar to taste and mix well. Use 2 tablespoons juice and 1/4 teaspoon sugar for each large glass.

**Cherry:**  
Shimmer two cups frozen tart, red cherries and their liquid in a saucepan until cherries are soft. (If cherries are water packed or are very tart, add 1 to 1 1/2 cup sugar.) Remove from heat and mash thoroughly. Cool. Use 3 tablespoons for each large glass.
