Planning Board Adopted by Town

The Belleville Board of Commissioners Tuesday night passed on final reading an ordinance creating a nine-member Planning Board for the Town of Belleville. The vote was 4-1 with Commissioner Robert C. Gruhin voting negatively.

The Board will be comprised of the Mayor, a member of the governing body, a town official appointed by the Mayor and six citizen members. The laymen's terms will be from one to six years.

According to law, these appointments are to be made by the Mayor. However, Padula declared Tuesday night he would allow each of Commissioners to recommend one member. The Mayor will thus have two citizen appointments. His appointment of a town official will be of the Town Engineer, he reaffirmed to The Times-News this week.

Mayor Padula declared the names of the appointees probably will be ready for the next session of the town Commission.

Chief objector to the ordinance was James R. Golden of 62 Tappan Avenue. Golden repeated arguments he stated at the introduction of the ordinance that the Planning Board is unnecessary and costly and the work could and should be done by the Commissioners rather than delegating authority to another body.

Also appearing was Max Schwartz, counsel to Belleville Board of Education. Schwartz said he was directed by Board President Frank D. Ruggiero to appear on behalf of the Board. Schwartz suggested that the ordinance be deferred so the school board could study it, since the Planning Board superseded the Board of Education in certain areas.

Schwartz later spoke as a private citizen and said he could see no need for a Planning Board in Belleville at this time. Mr. Golden declared at the (Continued on Page 2)

Hold-Up Man Is Captured Five Minutes After Taking \$429 from Preferred Finance

A hold-up man who chose the smaller city of Belleville to do a larger city of Newark to pull a stick-up because he thought he would have less trouble here was caught within five minutes after he took \$429 from the Preferred Finance Company at 228 Washington Avenue and making off with \$429.

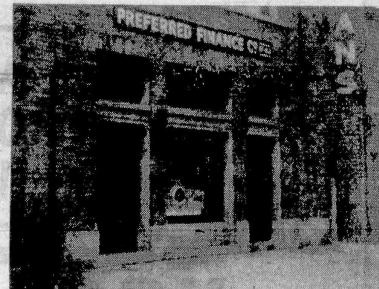
Charles Arthur Ambrosia, 38, of Scranton, Pennsylvania, told his preference to detectives while being questioned after being apprehended by motorcycle patrolman Kenneth Place, who made the arrest as Ambrosia walked along High Street, south of Rossmore Place.

On The Spot Promotion
Place was given an on-the-spot promotion by Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan, Jr., director of public safety.

The incident took place about 1 p.m. last Thursday. As reconstructed by police after questioning, Ambrosia had "casual" both the Preferred Finance Company and General Public Loan, which is located across the street from Preferred, but is on the second floor.

When Ambrosia checked General Public, he realized that the long stairway down to the first floor would impede his getaway. He walked into Preferred Finance on three occasions. The first time he applied for a loan, and was turned down. The second time he came in and said he was waiting for a bus. Both of these occasions did not prove to his liking to try the stick-up.

On the third trip, he came in brandishing a gun, while only two persons were in the office, Richard Kenly, the manager, and Jo-Elaine Morrocco, an employee. According to the account, Ambrosia pointed his gun at Kenly and demanded money. Kenly drew out some bills from the drawer (Continued on Page 7)

Bellboys Lose to Nutley By 7-0

Belleville High lost to Nutley for the sixth consecutive year, Saturday, by a score of 7-0 before a crowd of 4,500 at Park Oval. Nutley, Roger Peterson scored the only touchdown of the game on the 58-yard dash. The loss was Belleville's second along with one win.

The touchdown came in the fourth period when with six minutes left to play Vince Marino punted to the Nutley 41. On the first down Peterson took a handoff from quarterback George Hosenlopp and with some fine blocking scampered 58 yards for the TD. Hosenlopp then kicked the extra point.

Nutley threatened twice in the first period. The first time they intercepted a jump pass on the Belleville 20 yard line, and the second time they recovered a blocked punt on the Belleville 14 yard line.

However, on both occasions the Belleville was recorded.

This year Belleville has been plagued with injuries. Ron San Filippo and Nick De Guercio were hurt earlier in the season. Last week quarterback Joe Visco was injured in a junior varsity game and Saturday against Nutley the Bellboys lost the services of Pete Brindisi, a lineman and good kicker.

Saturday Belleville plays West Side High at Municipal Stadium. Kick-off time will be 2 p.m.

Richard Laugel of 128 Malone Street, Belleville, was unanimously elected by the Catholic War Veterans to serve as commander for the coming year of the Father James Giotz Memorial Post 1771 at a meeting in the lower hall of St. Mary's Church last week.

All Divisions of United Fund In Full Swing For Donations To Reach Goal Of \$88,000

The drive for contributions from residents of Belleville to the United Fund officially got under way last Monday, October 12th, under the leadership of F. Douglas Wadsworth, Residential chairman.

All divisions of the campaign are now under full steam with every effort being bent toward reaching the goal of \$88,000. While this is the largest sum that the trustees of the Fund have attempted to raise in Belleville, it represents the minimum budgets of the 13 agencies making up the Fund.

In short, it is the sum that they must have in order to do an effective job—the kind they feel they should and must do in a community like Belleville.

Pledges Up
General Campaign Chairman Harry T. French announced that pledges and contributions had reached a total of \$23,277 as of October 9th. This represents 26.3% of the goal.

By far the largest percentage has been turned in by the Industrial Division, under the leadership of Harry Fox of Westinghouse, with the Special Gifts Division under the leadership of B. Thomas Aitken of the People's National Bank running second.

Going, Going, Gone... Town Lot on Acme St. Brings \$ 9,100 At Auction

A Town-owned lot on 8-14-2 Acme Street brought \$9,100 at public auction a week ago last Monday morning Town Hall.

The lot, 100 x 157 feet, was the last substantial piece of the town had for sale. Base bid the town would have accepted was \$3,000. Full value of the land, according to the Town Treasurer, was \$6,000.

The lot was bought by Costas Hrousis, a builder, of 76 James Street, Newark.

Competing in the spirited bidding were three other participants, the Barbone-Mosca Post of Italian War Veterans; James L. Barrella of 6717 Smith Avenue, North Bergen and Charles Nisiwocia, who gave an address of 48 Little Street, Belleville.

The Barbone-Mosca Post, represented by former Post Commander Nicholas Raimo and present Commander Pat Parigi, went up to \$9,050 in their bidding for the property.

The Post has a plot of land 100 x 157 (47' in the rear) adjoining the Acme Street property, which was needed to it for the nominal fee of \$1 by the Town several years ago. No building on the property has taken place as yet.

As long as last November the Post expressed an interest in the additional property for building purposes. However, others also expressed an interest in the property.

A 21-year-old girl, Miss Ann Monica of Acme Street told the Board of Commissioners that she and her fiancé had plans for building a home on the property, with the assistance of relatives who were in the building business.

Attorney John Noonan, appearing on behalf of Barbone-Mosca, urged the Commissioners to use a State ordinance by which the Town might grant the land to the veterans' group.

Stressing a desire to show good faith in bidding on the property, Miss Monica placed a \$3,000 bid on the property. The Post followed by placing a \$3,500 for the property and Noonan requested that Barbone-Mosca be granted the land under the State Veterans act, without public bidding.

Noonan, in a presentation to the Board, stated that the Post contemplated use of the land in plans for a proposed Post home. He submitted an architect's drawing showing the proposed plans.

The Board eventually decided to allow public bidding for the land.

Miss Barrella, fiancée of Miss Monica, placed up to around \$3,000 and then dropped out. Mr. Nisiwocia dropped out at about \$7,600.

Public Notice is hereby given that the following ordinance was passed on second and final reading at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville held Tuesday evening Oct. 13, 1959, having been read in its final form at least one week prior thereto and is therefore now a law and hereby published according to law.

TOWN ORDINANCE ...
AN ORDINANCE FOR THE CREATION OF A PLANNING BOARD IN THE TOWN OF BELLEVILLE, COUNTY OF ESSEX AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY, PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS THEREOF, AND SETTING FORTH THEIR DUTIES IN ACCORDANCE WITH CHAPTER 432 OF THE LAWS OF 1953, AMENDMENTS AND SUPPLEMENTS THEREOF (40-20-11, et seq.).

BE IT ORDAINED BY the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville that:

Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 432 of the Laws of New Jersey, 1953, and amendments and supplements thereto, the planning board is hereby created, and is hereby created.

1. The members constituting said planning board shall consist of the following:

Class I ... The Mayor.

Class II ... One of the officials of the municipality to be appointed by the Mayor.

Class III ... A member of the governing body to be appointed by the governing body.

Class IV ... Six citizens of the municipality to be appointed by the Mayor.

2. All members of the board shall serve without compensation, and the members of Class IV shall hold no other municipal office, except that one of such members may be a member of the zoning board adjustment, and one may be a member of the board of education. The terms of the members constituting Classes I and III shall correspond to their respective official terms. The term of the member designated under Class II shall terminate with the term of the Mayor appointing him. The respective terms of the members of Class IV first appointed shall be one, two, three, four, five and six years, respectively, and each shall be the same number of years as there are members of Class IV on the board. No member of the planning board shall be permitted to act in any matter in which any personal or financial interest exists.

3. The planning board is authorized to adopt by-laws governing its procedural operation. It shall elect a chairman from the members of Class IV, create and fill

such other offices as it shall deem necessary, and shall have the power and authority to employ clerks and a staff and to pay for their services and such other expenses as may be necessary and proper, not exceeding in all, exclusive of gifts, the amount appropriated by the governing body for the use of said planning board.

4. In accordance with Section 14 of Chapter 432 of the Laws of 1953, the planning board is hereby designated as the referral agency to the governing body submitting the provisions of any and all ordinances hereinafter adopted. The planning board is authorized to appoint a subdivision committee in accordance with Section 15 of the above mentioned laws.

5. The governing body by ordinance only, may provide for the reference of any matter or class of matters to the planning board before final action is taken by the municipal body or municipal officer having final authority.

6. Whenever a public hearing is required on any matter the planning board shall follow the procedure as described in Chapter 432 of the Laws of 1953, and amendments and supplements thereto.

7. This ordinance shall take effect after publication and final passage according to law.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION AND CONTROL OF VEHICULAR TRAFFIC ON CERTAIN STREETS IN THE TOWN OF BELLEVILLE, AND PROVIDING FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF," Adopted January 21, 1958.

The Board of Commissioners in the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, do ordain:

SECTION 1. That Section 4 of said Ordinance be amended by adding the following thereto: "That the streets upon which said traffic shall be so restricted are: Brighton Avenue, Sanford Avenue and Waterless Avenue."

session that he had directed Di Ruggiero's attention to the Planning Board's lower.

A motion by Commissioner Grubin to defer action on the ordinance so the Board of Education could study the matter was defeated, 3-2, with Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan Jr. voting for the deferment. Sullivan, in later voting for the passage, made it clear he was in favor of the ordinance and only had voted for deferment to allow the School Board its requested time to study the ordinance.

Another speaker was Walter P. Weiss of 242 Ralph Street, who declares himself in favor of the idea of the Planning Board and said the Board might devise ways of collecting revenue for the town from the County properties, especially the golf course within Belleville. Weiss also volunteered his services as a member of the Board.

Lee Garson of 301 Jorammon Street also spoke and commented on Weiss' remarks to the effect that in favoring the Planning Board a citizen apparently was asking for additional taxes.

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William Daddis Is Semifinalist In National Merit Scholarship Test ... Tops His Classmates

William Daddis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Daddis of 41 Forest Street has been named a semifinalist in the 1959-60 National Merit Scholarship Competition. The announcement was made by H. D. Kittel, principal of Belleville High School, where Daddis is a senior. Upon graduating Daddis plans to major in engineering.

The local student is among 10,000 of the highest scores on the educational development given in over 14,500 high schools last spring.

Daddis moves a step closer to achieving a Merit Scholarship to be awarded in the 1959-60 program. All semifinalists now must take a three-hour examination, the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board, to confirm their high scores.

This will be given December 5. Those who repeat their high scores will become finalists in the competition.

Scholarship awards are sponsored by 100 business and industrial organizations, professional societies, foundations, individuals and the Merit Scholarship Corporation itself. Winners will be announced in May, 1960.

Five hundred and fifty thousand students took the Merit tests. The scores are sent to colleges all over the United States.

The total composite median score on a percentile basis is always 90th percentile. Sixty-five Belleville High School students finished above the 50 percentile nationally. Twenty-seven students scored over the 90 percentile nationally.

The littering of streets and private property throughout our community is unsightly, unhealthy, costly and shows a lack of community pride. A clean town is an asset to business and health and a sign of alert civic minded citizens.

The citizens of the community should remember that the laws alone, cannot keep Belleville clean; but you can do your part by observing the following rules:

- Garbage must be kept in a metal container with a water tight cover. The garbage should be wrapped in paper or paper bags before placing in the can, to prevent it from sticking or freezing to the can.
- Place other refuse and waste substances or materials such as hedge clippings, grass cuttings, yard sweepings, bottles, leaves, ashes and hard substances in any other kind of container except cardboard cartons or paper bags. Containers weighing over 100 pounds will not be taken.
- Newspapers, books, magazines or substantially similar paper articles shall be securely bundled and tied and all paper boxes and cartons must be made flat, bundled and tied. Loose paper shall be placed in a jute or cloth bag or substantially water resistant container.
- Limbs of trees, roots and wood will not be picked up unless tied and must be in small bundles, not over three (3) feet in length.
- Contractors' building waste will not be removed by the garbage contractor. Garbage, refuse and other materials put out for collection must be placed between the sidewalk and curb, not earlier than 8 P.M. the night before collection day, not later than 6 A.M. on collection day. Garbage, refuse and other materials must not be placed out after the collector has passed. Empty containers must be removed after collection.

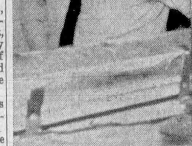

and then the hold-up man stated: "Give me all of it . . . or else." Gave Him Contents Kenly gave him the contents of the drawer, which later proved to be \$429. Ambrosia then shoved Kenly into the back room, where Miss Morocco was, and told both to stay there ten minutes and not to call. As soon as they heard the door slam, Kenly called police. Taking the call at the desk was

Lt. Fred Singer, who alerted the radio cars. The cars sped to the scene and police got a description of the man. In Police Headquarters at the time of the call was Patrolman Place, who also went on call. With the description given by the employees, the police circled the area, and had a car stationed at the bridge at Rutgers Avenue and Main Street. At this time the police did not know whether the man was alone, walking, or in a car. He was stopped by Patrolman Place as a likely suspect. "Halt, I want to see you," Place

ordered, with his gun on the man. "Don't shoot. You got me," Ambrosia responded. Place disarmed the bandit and found in his pocket a new 88 calibre snub-nose detective model revolver, cocked, ready to shoot. In the chamber was one bullet. In Ambrosia's pocket were 12 additional bullets. Uncocked The Gun Place carefully uncocked the gun and started marching him back to Police Headquarters. He was met by two detectives, Mike Marotti and James Mundy, who also were patrolling the area in a police car. They returned to headquarters in the car. In his flight from the office, Ambrosia walked along Washington Avenue to Academy Street, through rear yards in Academy Street and was just coming out of rear yards on Prospect Street and walking on High Avenue when he was encountered. While fleeing, he discarded his hat and a coat, which were recovered. Ambrosia was questioned more than two hours by Detective Jack Marigno and Mundy. Police Commissioner Sullivan, notified of the hold-up came immediately from his office to Police Headquarters, where he participated in the questioning and made the promotion of Patrolman Place. Detective Marigno told the

Times-News that Ambrosia had come up from Florida recently. He had spent two weeks in Pennsylvania and two weeks in Newark, where he resided at the Benall Hotel, on Fourth Street. Detectives believe he was waiting to make a "big haul" and then go back to Florida. They found a key to a locker where his bags were stored, ready to pick up when he left. Stole The Gun Ambrosia said he stole the gun he used in a sporting goods store in Scranton. Ambrosia is married and has two children in Scranton. The FBI has been alerted and will question Ambrosia, since he crossed state lines in traveling up and down the coast and might be involved in other cases. Ambrosia told detectives he had been arrested before on minor offenses but did not admit to anything bigger. In the meantime, he was held without bail pending arraignment before Magistrate Edward Ambrosion on charges of armed robbery. The arraignment was to have taken place yesterday (Wednesday). When Ambrosia was taken out of the detective's room where he was being questioned to pose for photographs, he was sobbing and had a hankerchief at his eyes. "This will ruin me," he said. He first tried covering his face, and looked aside when he was directed to take the hankerchief down. When a photographer for a Newark paper asked him to look in the direction of the camera, he faced him angrily and shouted "No!"

APPROVAL AND ACCEPTANCE OF STREETS, SANITARY AND DRAINAGE SEWER, AND OTHER IMPROVEMENTS IN THE TOWN OF BELLEVILLE, INCLUDING REQUIREMENTS NECESSARY FOR THE APPROVAL OF FILING OF REAL ESTATE DEVELOPMENT MAPS.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, do ordain: Section 1. That the aforesaid ordinance be amended by inserting the following Section:

15 (a). Where any premises adjoin a stream or river or have stream or river passing through its limits, topographical maps showing the drainage area limits must be filed in addition to any layout of the stream.

Plans of said stream or river must be submitted showing proposed depth, widths and encroachment lines.
The stream may be enclosed in reinforced concrete culvert or pipe of sufficient capacity to fulfill the runoff requirements of the drainage area of the district.

If stream or river cannot be enclosed or where course of stream or river is to be changed, altered or affected, then the channel as constructed shall be at least 40 feet in width, with walls of concrete to the height of ground of slope adjacent thereto. Said walls shall have a concrete base so that the channel course is contained within permanent walls; and the river bottom shall be of concrete.

force of the stream or river does not necessitate construction of concrete walls and concrete base by reason of the lack of forceful flow at all times, then in lieu of said concreting an open channel method may be substituted, provided however, no slope adjacent to such stream or streams or river shall be graded steeper than 1 1/2 feet to 1 foot slope. All slopes shall be riprapped in accordance with certain standard specifications of the New Jersey State Highway Department.

Notwithstanding anything set forth above, in addition thereto, approval where necessary shall be obtained from the Division of Water Policy and Supply of the State of New Jersey by anyone in connection with any construction proposed which is regulated by this amendment and other pertinent parts of the ordinance herein being amended.

Notice of filing plans in accordance with this ordinance shall be given in writing to all persons, firms or corporations who own property along with the part of any stream, river or rivers through which the current or flow of water will affect, alter or change the aforesaid adjoining lands. Said notice shall be served personally if the aforesaid property owners are residents of Belleville, New Jersey, or by registered or certified mail if said property owners are located outside the limits of the Town of Belleville.

Proof of giving of said notice shall be in the form of affidavits of mailing and return of receipt filed with the Building Department.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after final passage and publication according to law. PASSED FIRST READING: Oct. 13, 1959.
