Freeway Opened Between Nutley And Belleville

TRENTON—A stretch of road, 1.3 miles long was opened this week in Belleville. The opening makes another link of the new 11-mile Newark to Paterson freeway available to motorists. The 1.3 stretch consisting of

Goes to Nutley

Construction of the route as a freeway means that there are limited points of access. Marginal development, such as residences or business establishments, have access to Main Street in Belleville and River Road in Nutley. The stretch extends from Roosevelt Avenue in Belleville to Highland Lane, Nutley. No direct access driveways are permitted on the Freeway.

Construction of the segment to be opened this week was begun in the spring of 1958 with the \$2,800,000 cost split by the State and Federal Bureau of Public Roads. The roadways are separated by a 10-foot wide depressed center island. As an additional safety measure, a two-foot high steel down the middle of the center island throughout the length of the project.

Connections for each direction of traffic to and from Park Avenue, which is overpassed by the Freeway, are provided in Nutley.

Early Route 21 Freeway construction resulted in improvement for 1.2 miles between Clay Street and Herbert Place, Newark. The new 1.2 mile section from Herbert Place to William Street in Belleville has passed the public hearing stage with right-of-way acquisition slated for the near future.

The area from William Street to Roosevelt Avenue, Belleville, was opened in the fall of 1958 and adjoins the section to be opened this week.

A \$7.5 million contract was awarded last summer for extending the freeway past Route 3 to South Parkway in Clifton. Work on this contract is currently underway.

The additional five miles north to the alignment of Interstate Route 80 in Paterson is in the preliminary stages with engineering studies for the Route 21 alignment in Passaic now active underway.

Belleville Chairman Reports \$6,966.10 Received So Far

The Belleville-Tutley Tuberculosis Association has collected \$6,966.10 toward its goal of \$12,000.00 needed to carry on its full program of service to the two towns, according to Edward G. Burdy, Belleville Seal Sale Chairman.

Burdy said that many people who were mailed seals have not yet sent in their contributions. He urged that they do so now in order that the Association's vital health services may be continued in the two towns without interruption. Otherwise, services will have to be curtailed according to the funds available to pay for them, he said.

The services include—Community X-raying projects, nurse visits, Patch Testing of School Children, Maintenance of a Chest Clinic, X-raying of school employees and provision of patch testing material to local physicians. All of these services are essential, Mr. Fellers stated, if we are to maintain our present program of prevention and early detection of tuberculosis.

Belleville High's basketball team split two games last week, the season opener at Garfield, on Tuesday, December 15, but winning at Orange, Friday the tenth. Both games were close and hard-fought down to the wire. In the Garfield game, the Belles had led all the way from opening minutes and at one due to the scoring of Richie Boyce, Bob Laird, and Richie Spud' Sandamino.

The Belboys kept this lead ever a six point Garfield late in the third period. Then, in the beginning of the fourth period, after Belboys had taken a four lead, George Luckeskie tied the score for Garfield at 34-34, in a layup and two free throws. Two editorials which appeared in last week's Belleville Times-News were inadvertently commingled. Because of their great public interest they are reprinted below.

Kiernan Is Right

Last week, Commissioner George F. Kiernan voted against the approval of a bill for \$154.00 for printing fees submitted by Commissioner Robert C. Gruhin. The invoice submitted by the Supreme Printing Company was for printing a legal brief pertaining to a "petition for certification" filed by Commissioner Gruhin with the State Supreme Court seeking a review of a June 26th Appellate Division Superior Court decision.

At that time, Superior Court Judge Coolahan held that Belleville had been "arbitrary and discriminatory" in drafting an ordinance to assess Rutan Estates for water mains while other mains had been installed at municipal expense.

The filing of the legal brief was a unilateral action by Commissioner Robert C. Gruhin. He did not ask for nor did he receive the prior approval of his colleagues on the Board of Commissioners.

In voting against payment of the invoice, Commissioner Kiernan said that he would have voted in favor had the legal action been authorized by Town Attorney Lawrence Keenan. Commissioner Kiernan further observed that he was opposed to the Board of Commissioners going it alone in matters such as the instant case, since the ultimate obligation would have to be absorbed by the community at large.

We agree with Commissioner Kiernan's reasoning and though the resolution to approve payment was passed by a vote of 3 to 1, with Commissioner Nuncio Pico absent, we trust the commissioners will at some future time spell out a policy position with respect to matters of this nature for future guidance by all members of the Board. In this case only \$154 was involved.

Some future commitment might involve much more money.

Tax Council Is Wrong

The Belleville Citizens' Tax Council has been circulating a tax chart showing how taxes have increased in Belleville in the last 16 years. The Council allegedly selected a typical homeowner, who in 1943 paid \$158.00 in taxes. By 1959 the tax bill rose to \$440.00, according to the chart.

The Citizens' Tax Council is using the

tax chart as a principal argument in favor of a change in government from the present commission form to a council-manager form of government.

The inferences of this tax chart are misleading. If the chart is the strongest argument the Citizens' Tax Council can develop in favor of a change in form of government, the movement for a change must fall flat on its face.

The rise in taxes is not peculiar to Belleville alone. Throughout the length and breadth of New Jersey — in fact, across the nation — real estate taxes have risen, in many cases more than Belleville. To illustrate a point, we have prepared a comparison using figures published by the New Jersey Taxpayers Association in September, 1959.

To obtain some idea of how Belleville stacks up with a comparable community, we have secured comparable statistics regarding our neighboring Nutley.

The 1958 estimated population for Belleville is 36,420; for Nutley, 30,936. The school resident enrollment for Belleville in 1957-8 was 5276.5; for Nutley, 4693.4.

The 1954-55 operating budget for the Belleville school system was \$1,697,703; for Nutley, \$1,344,657. The Belleville operating budget for the 1959-60 school year rose to \$2,421,181 and for Nutley, \$2,066,010.

The Belleville increase was \$723,478 and the increase for Nutley was \$721,353. The increase in the operating school budget for both municipalities was practically identical despite the fact that the resident enrollment of Belleville was 583 more than Nutley!

Statistics concerning municipal expenditures of the two communities are more revealing. Belleville consists of 3.30 square miles while Nutley covers 3.40 square miles. The Belleville operating budget for 1954 was \$1,356,127. The 1959 operating budget rose to \$1,876,351, or an increase for the Town of Belleville of \$520,224.

The operating budget for the Town of Nutley in 1954 was \$1,010,102, and in 1959, it rose to \$1,565,301, for an increase of \$555,199.

While the increase in the municipal budget for the Town of Belleville was \$35,000 less than the increase for the Town of Nutley for the same period, Belleville was saddled with the additional responsibility of taking care of the needs of approximately 5,484 more citizens than Nutley.

We are not suggesting that higher taxes are a good thing. All we are trying to say is that it behooves the Belleville Citizens' Tax Council to develop more valid reasons for a change in form of government than they have thus far presented to the citizens of Belleville.

Maybe a change is a good thing. All we ask of the proponents of change is to prove their point. Based upon the evidence thus far on record, there is no proof that a change in the form of government would produce lower taxes for the citizens
