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DR. DIRUGGIERO FIRMLY SUPPORTS SUMMER SCHOOL

School Board President Asks New Budget Include Plan

Dr. Frank DiRuggiero, president of the Board of Education, has come out strongly for a full-time schedule of academic classes through the summer months.

Speaking at the last Board of Education session, Dr. DiRuggiero pointed out that a recent survey conducted by the Belleville School System indicated that 107 students attended out-of-town classes last summer.

Continuing the school board president said that another 107 students participated in the remedial reading program in Belleville and that 150 additional students attended musical classes.

"A summer program would definitely be a forward step in education progress in Belleville," Dr. DiRuggiero told the Board of Education.

He asked the board to consider a summer program when formulating the new school budget. Completion of the budget is expected momentarily but no word of such an announcement was received by The Belleville Times at press time.

Dr. DiRuggiero noted that when Belleville students attend summer classes out-of-town, tuition costs must be paid by parents. He said that a privately operated summer school in Bloomfield, for example, charges Belleville students a \$35 tuition fee.

Granese Not Head Of School Campaign

Says Article in Times Last Week Incorrect Releases Statement Clarifying Position In Last Year's School Elections

Joseph Granese, who has announced his candidacy for the Belleville Board of Education, today issued a statement explaining and clarifying a report appearing in last week's publication of The Belleville Times.

The report stated that Mr. Granese had served as campaign manager for school board candidates in the election a year ago. The statement was in error.

Mr. Granese's statement points out that he stressed "he had supported four of the five winners."

The press release also stated that Mr. Granese is discounting a published statement of Belleville Commissioner George Kierulff, who stated that Mr. Granese had endorsed certain political parties.

Granese said he "insists that politics be divorced from school matters." The release said "He

accentuated he would not permit his injection in matters pertaining to affairs of the school system."

"The text of the remaining portion of the press release issued by Mr. Granese follows:

"Emphasizing the growing need of all citizens to properly appreciate the vital need of an efficient and progressive school system to provide the preparation of our children in coping with the mounting complexities presented by a highly competitive business world, Granese said he would dedicate his efforts—as a school trustee to provide Belleville's youth an educational opportunity comparable to any other state, thus assuring an equal opportunity for either job placement or acceptance in accredited universities to continue their educational aspirations."

Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan of the local March of Dimes drive, has announced the appointment of Mrs. S. John Coronato, 2 Reservoir Place, as chairman of the women's division.

Mrs. Coronato has for many years been active in civic and charitable affairs in Belleville. Past president of the Ladies' Auxiliary, Belleville Elks No. 1123, Mrs. Coronato is also a member of the Belleville Board of Education, St. Peter's Rosary Confraternity, Court Santa Maria No. 61, Catholic Daughters of America and the Iara Maass Hospital Guild.

Asked why she had accepted the job of organizing the women in Belleville on behalf of the March of Dimes drive she said "I have always been interested in any worthwhile cause, particularly I am interested in children."

The 1960 campaign of the March of Dimes seeks to raise funds for a fight against birth defects and arthritis as well as polio. Through the National Foundation, the money will be used for research, patient aid and a program of scholarships to students aiming to be medical technicians. Research will include studies of viruses and cells, infant birth defects, a Rhema told factor occurring in the blood of arthritic patients, and the perfection of an oral live virus vaccine against polio.

Area Catholic Youth Organization units are set for the annual Snow Queen contest planned for Saturday, January 2. The contest to elect a Snow Ball Queen has been won by Belleville girls the past three years, all representatives of Saint Peter's parish.

The dance will be held at Seton Hall University in South Orange. The date marks the 15th time the annual event has been enjoyed by C.Y.O. groups throughout Essex County.

Each parish in the Essex-Went Hudson area is eligible to enter a girl in the competition. The winner will be decided on the basis of votes cast in her name by those buying tickets to the dance up to a week before January 2.

Was Founder Of this Paper Back in 1909

James J. Kennedy, of 53 DeWitt Avenue, Belleville, co-founder of The Belleville Times, died Monday, December 21, at home of a heart attack. He was 80.

A lifelong resident of Belleville, Mr. Kennedy was an active and devoted journalist. In addition to his co-founding The Belleville Times, he served in editorial capacities on the Daily Advertiser, which later became the Star Eagle in Newark, on the New York Herald and with the War Information Office.

Funeral services were conducted Thursday morning at 8 o'clock from the Kiernan Funeral Home, 101 Union Avenue, Belleville. A Solemn High Mass of Requiem was offered at 9 o'clock in Saint Peter's Church. Interment was in the Immaculate Conception Cemetery.

Founded Paper in 1909

Mr. Kennedy and the late Augustin McNery of The Newark News, co-founded The Belleville Times in 1909. They managed the publication for several years.

In 1922 and again in 1924 Mr. Kennedy was appointed as recorder in Belleville.

PLANNING BOARD EXPECTS VISITS TO OTHER TOWNS

Group To Appoint Chairman Tuesday Meeting; Guest Speakers

The Belleville Planning Board organized on December 8, 1959 held its second official meeting at Town Hall on Tuesday, December 15, with 100 per cent attendance. William Sawyer, former chairman of the Nutley Planning Board was the guest speaker. He is also a former member of the Nutley Board of Adjustment.

The speaker emphasized the importance of frequent meetings by Planning Board members, since municipal planning involves a great deal of work and civic responsibility. The Board had voted to meet every first and third Tuesday of each month, but after hearing the speaker decided that more frequent meetings could be held during the period of orientation.

The chairman expressed the hope that the Board could meet and discuss its business without interference from non-member, since no action can be taken by the Board on major problem without public hearing.

At the January 5 meeting, Ralph Visco, chairman, will appoint a chairman for the sub-committees: Major and Minor Subdivision, Parking Traffic Control and Publicity.

A representative from the Passaic Valley Citizens Planning Association will be the speaker and on January 6, the Board expects to hear a speaker from Candebit and Fleissig, Newark Firm of Planning Consultants. Other experts will be heard at subsequent meetings.

The consensus of the Board was that it would move slowly, visit Planning Boards in other municipalities and gain a wide range of information on the fundamentals of planning before launching an expert study of Belleville.

Municipalities listed for visits so far are Verona, Nutley, Montclair, Bloomfield and Newark.

Mayor Padula gave each Planning Board member a copy of the state law on planning and also a copy of the 1950 Planning Program for Belleville, made by the Regional Planning Association Inc. of New York.

Mr. White joined the staff of the Pompton Lakes Bulletin in 1954 while still in high school. He has been with the Bulletin since then, working at the regular basis for The New York Times. The New Brunswick Daily Home News and for several other newspapers, wire services and magazines as a news and feature writer.

He has been active in radio work primarily as a news writer and broadcaster.

Born in New England

Before his appointment as editor of the Little Falls and Totowa newspapers, Mr. White served as assistant editor of The Bulletin and a chain of seven weekly newspapers covering the upper portions of Passaic, Bergen and Morris counties.

Born in Hartford, Conn., he is the son of Mrs. Albert Pallavicini of Erskine Lakes, N.J. and of Warren C. White of Windsor, Conn. Single he resides at Erskine Lakes.

"To act in an emergency, to clarify the procedures concerning projects involving research and recommendations, the following regulations are observed:

"The Consolidated P. T. A.'s of Belleville may engage in research and discussion of community problems concerning education within the scope of P. T. A. as defined in the Manual published by the National Congress of Parents and Teachers and rules to apply to any committee formed by the Consolidated P. T. Why The Secrecy?

Last week, this newspaper endeavored to obtain from the Belleville Board of Education a copy of the Presentment against former members and employees of our Board of Education, handed down by an Essex County Grand Jury on April 4, 1954. On that decision, we were denied access to a copy of the Presentment; however, we were advised by the school board that the Essex County Prosecutor's Office has a copy of the Presentment and since the Prosecutor's records are public records, we would be entitled to obtain such a copy from the office of the Prosecutor.

We are bewildered by this inconsistent decision. We fail to understand how a Grand Jury Presentment against former Board of Education members can be considered "classified" or "confidential" in a Belleville file but public information in a Newark file!

In our effort to obtain a copy of this Presentment at the local level, we have run head-on into some very startling facts, not the least of which is the ruling by the Board of Education that we are not permitted to obtain from the local Board of Education a copy of a Presentment in which the public has a very vital interest. We are continuing to investigate the facts and basis for this weird decision. We shall obtain a copy of the Presentment. Its contents shall be discussed in future issues of this newspaper. We intend to provide this public service because we firmly believe that the taxpayer-public is entitled to know what progress, if any, the school system has made since the Essex County Grand Jury Presentment of April 4, 1954.

the responsibility for our own safety and that of our friends. This may mean such a simple thing as having tire chains put on when needed or it may mean a checkup of your windshield wiper equipment.

You're Working For The Government

If you ever wonder why taxes and government debt are at outer-space levels, some facts issued by a New York bank may help to clarify matters.
