

## April Election Power Test For Demos

Belleville Democratic leader Ralph A. Vara tashed back today at Ralph Risoli who is behind the scenes directing a rival group seeking to upset party leadership in town.

Risoli, who charges that Vara's Regular Democratic Organization has "weakened party leadership" in Belleville, has put up a slate to oppose the regular group in the April county committee election in eleven of Belleville's 21 districts.

Vara calls Risoli's charges

"unwarranted, untrue and wild." Continuing, Vara notes that even the Newark Evening News "which strongly favors the Republicans, on November 5, 1959 said, '... The County has moved towards the Democrats. There were Democratic gains in Maplewood, the Oranges, Bloomfield and Belleville in particular.'"

The Democratic Town Chairman concludes, "everyone admits we're making gains, except Risoli who somehow or another concludes that we've weakened the party leadership with 'hand-picked paper leaders.' He conveniently forgets Belleville's going Democratic the past eight years."

Vara went on to criticize Risoli by noting that of the regular party's 42 candidates in the April county committee election, "all but four are incumbents. Risoli says, 'we've supposedly hand-picked' our leaders out of these same men and women he is criticizing have been leading the Democratic Party in Belleville for many years and have been establishing party policy."

Vara, who is running for county committee in his home fourth

ward, sixth district, has served the party 23 years.

Risoli, who also lives in the fourth ward, "doesn't even have the courage to run himself," Vara comments. "The reason he won't run is because no one knows you better than your neighbors," Vara said.

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## Attorney Robert Gruhin Ends Lengthy, Novel Case

Robert C. Gruhin, Belleville attorney and a Town Commissioner, successfully concluded a lengthy and intricate case involving the liability of parents where weapons are in the home and used by a child.

The novel case, concluded last week after three court trials, two appellate division hearings and two trips to the New Jersey Supreme Court.

A jury in Hudson Superior Court before Judge Joseph L. Smith awarded \$10,000 damages to Louis Mazzilli, 39, of 65 Leonard Street, Jersey City, against Accident and Casualty Insurance Co., of Switzerland. It was another step in a 10-year-old legal battle.

Back on April 21, 1949, Mazzilli was shot by Kenneth Selger, now 20 but then 9 years old, in Secaucus. While working on the 3-acre property of the boy's father, Adam Selger, 835 Cedar Avenue, Secaucus. ## Resurfacing Of Avenue Coming Soon

Belleville Commissioners Tuesday night tabled final approval of an ordinance authorizing the purchase of two Valley Street lots which would be used for parking. At the same meeting, Commissioner Robert Gruhin announced he expects the state highway department to resurface Washington Avenue through Belleville,

possibly during the current year. Gruhin also introduced the motion to postpone action on the Valley Street lot purchases. He said he felt the commissioners ought to have additional time to study the proposal "and since there isn't any immediate rush, I don't feel anything will be impaired if this is held up until our next meeting."

## CD Test Saturday In Town

Belleville will join other New Jersey communities this Saturday for "Operation Spring," a state-wide civil defense test. The public is required to participate and persons not obeying instructions of CD police will be arrested.

Sirens will sound at approximately 9:30 Saturday morning to give the alert signal. This long steady tone means the community is to be alerted for a take cover signal. After the alert sounds residents are instructed to listen to radio broadcasts for instructions.

At approximately 10:30 a.m. Saturday the take cover signal, a long broken tone, will be sounded. The take cover signal tells the entire population to take cover. Traffic will be stopped until the "all clear" sounds 15 minutes later.

The test in Belleville will activate the entire Civil Defense and Disaster Control unit. CD officials here are Ludwig Pesa, director, and George Spatz, deputy director.

"Operation Spring" is designed to test attack warning communications network, evaluate siren coverage, gain full cooperation of the public to respond to warning signals and to serve as a mobilization drill for auxiliary police, control center personnel and others responsible for the conduct of the public under emergency conditions.

Pesa said that emphasis is placed on getting the auxiliary police on duty with instructions to both regular and auxiliary police. He added that individuals who do not comply with regulations will be arrested and brought into court for trial.

## Hospital Opens Bids In Belleville For Nurse School

Sealed bids covering the construction of the new Clara Maass Memorial School of Nursing were opened last week at the Belleville hospital under the direction of G. Crosby Hiss, chairman of the building committee, and Raymond B. Platt, architect.

The aggregate of the low base bids is \$866,656 which is considerably higher than the cost originally estimated. This means that even on the basis of the revised building plans, the completed structure, including the furnishings, will be much closer to a \$1,000,000 project than the \$750,000 project contemplated a year ago at the time of the fund-raising campaign.

The increased costs indicate clearly that more money will have to be raised by the hospital authorities to start and complete the building program.

Kiernan said he believes the \$15,600 asking price for the two lots "is well worth it." Although the price was pegged too high by critic James Golden of Tappan Avenue, Gruhin said the question of cost had no bearing on his asking for the issue's postponement.

After the meeting Tuesday, Kiernan told The Belleville Times that his original estimate of the lots' parking capacity as 30 cars was too low. "There's plenty of room for 40 cars," Kiernan said. Present plans would use the space to park town employees' vehicles, thus freeing to some degree the already congested Washington Avenue.

Golden earlier had knocked the commissioners for thinking about purchasing the lots. Golden said he was against the proposal not only because "of the exorbitant price," but because "I don't think the parking is needed and I don't think citizens ought to be asked to pay \$15,600 for parking space for town employees."

# Commission Moves Toward Adoption of Civil Service Plan Would Mean Salary Increases

Several public works employees would benefit by increased salaries if the proposed civil service plan is adopted in Belleville. The board of commissioners Tuesday night introduced an ordinance to adopt the civil service recommendations. Public hearing on the proposal is scheduled for April 12 at 8 p.m. in the town hall.

Increased salaries are proposed for only full-time personnel excepting patrolmen, firemen and school crossing guards. Several reclassifications of titles and positions are also involved.

Charles B. Tedesco, present administrative clerk, would keep the same title and receive an increase in salary from \$7,500 to a maximum of \$7,881.

Frank Rovell, presently receiving \$6,800 as police and fire signal system superintendent, would receive a salary up to \$7,508 with the same title. Alfred Westby who is receiving \$5,300 would get a maximum of \$5,980

for the same position he holds today, police and fire signal line-man.

Fred Ellis and Philip Newsman today are listed by civil service as "laborers." Ellis' title would be changed to garage attendant, with a maximum of \$4,391. Newsman would receive the title of traffic maintenance man with a maximum of \$5,880.

School crossing guards' salaries are not changed from \$7 per day and affects the following persons: F. Gertrude Coomer, Walter Devoy, John Eyre, Thomas Farrell, Augustus Kistner, Henry Riepe Sr., George Schomp, John Serivanich, Edward Smith, Joan White, James Wood.

The following persons would be listed as "temporary appointments" as school crossing guards and today all receive \$7 per day: Ann DeFranza, Bernard Fitzpatrick, Cecelia Godfrey, Harper Mulligan, Vincent Naylor, Arthur Sheridan, Gerard Utrachi and Henry Werner.

Mr. Frank Orechio, Publisher of the Belleville Times-News and The Nutley Sun was singularly honored by the Nutley Family Service Bureau's Board of Directors last Tuesday night when Orechio received the first Family Service Bureau Community Service Award from David H. Jackman, president of the Board.

In presenting the plaque to Mr. Orechio, Mr. Jackman said, "The history of the Bureau reflects the partnership tie which it has enjoyed with The Nutley Sun and the tremendous support it has always received both through news coverage and on the editorial page.

ly possible insurance firm in sight, the Switzerland company which had issued a comprehensive liability policy on the premises at 836 Cedar Avenue, Secaucus.

The insurance company, represented by James P. Beggans, argued that their policy did not cover the shooting incident because Mrs. Selger was separated and living apart from her husband at the time. Judge Smith disagreed with the insurance company's argument, but was later reversed by Appellate Division. However, Supreme Court later upheld Judge Smith's decision and thus made it possible for the trial which resulted in the verdict requiring the insurance company to pay. This will probably also be taken up on appeal.

The nine-year-old boy who did the shooting is now a student at Bucknell University.

annual international convention held in various cities throughout the world.

Application for fellowship award must be filed with the local Rotary Club before July of this year. In filing application, the candidate must furnish all information in the language of the foreign country in which he chooses to study, and in later interviews must establish his fluency in this foreign language. Selection of the British Isles of course requires a knowledge only of English.

The fellowship grant provides full expenses, including round trip transportation, room and board, tuition, college fees, books, minor incidental living expenses, and a small stipend for education travel.

Fellows are selected on the basis of their suitability as "good will" ambassadors of our country abroad, their scholarship, personality, and attitude toward promotion of better understanding among nations.

Msgr. Powers was ordained to the priesthood in 1927, and assigned that year to Seton Hall College as dean of men and professor of Latin and Religion. He was appointed director of the Seton Hall Divinity School in 1941, and seven years later was appointed a Private Chamberlain of His Holiness Pope Pius XII, with the title of Very Rev. Monsignor.

Msgr. Powers was made rector of Immaculate Conception Seminary, Darlington, in 1950, and was elevated to a Domestic Prelate, with the title of Right Rev. Monsignor in 1954. He was appointed pastor of the Montclair Church the following year.

Msgr. Powers is a member of the Archdiocesan School Board of Essex County and is district moderator of the Essex - Montclair Council of the Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women. He is a deputy of discipline of Immaculate Conception Seminary.

ALL-AMERICAN

Regarded as one of the greatest players to come out of Newark in modern basketball history, Regan was All - State at West Side High School, and gained all - American honors in his senior year in Seton Hall University in 1953. He holds the second leading scorer's record at the University with 1,267, and holds the lifetime Seton Hall record with assists.

Regan served in the U. S. Marines for two years, and upon his discharge joined the Rochester Royals for the 1955 - 56 season. He played the following year with Cincinnati, where he was captain of the team, and at the end of the season signed as freshman coach at Seton Hall. He will succeed Coach "Honey" Russell as Seton Hall basketball Coach next year.

Four new candidates are among 38 incumbents running on the county supported Regular Democratic Organization ticket in Belleville.

Anthony Agresta of 39 Washington Avenue, (second ward, fifth district) was originally listed as a candidate of the Regular Democratic Organization. However, Agresta sided with Risoli and is now running on Risoli's "Regular Democrat" ticket and opposing Christopher F. Poole of 176 Mill Street who the regular group put up to fill the vacancy.

The second new candidate is Frank Pulidore of 30 Bayard Street (first ward, second district) who is replacing Thomas Wynn on the county ticket. Wynn has moved out of Belleville.

Third new candidate is Sam Mobillo of 86 Heckel Street. Last year Barton Risoli, brother of Ralph Risoli, ran in the spot on the regular ticket. However, Barton pulled out and joined his brother's rival group.

It appears to me that you hold some kind of animosity toward Jim Golden, who spends many hours each week doing research work in the interest of the town, and the people. I'll gladly pay an admission fee of \$2 to hear him in a debate with you or the commissioners. His agreements in his breakdown of each department are based on facts, and very educational. You cannot take a man such as Jim Golden who has been going to Commissioners' meetings for many years, and has never dodged any questions put to him, to tell you in ten minutes when it takes him many hours, weeks and months to get the facts. 3,700 people who voted for Jim Golden have faith in him, and many more are jumping on his bandwagon because his arguments make sense. There is too much bickering and wasteful spending of the taxpayers' money under the Commission form of Government. In your article you admit that the Commission Budget is far from being perfect. Jim Golden has proved by his outline of the budget in each department that \$147,000 could be cut from the present budget, or a reduction in our tax rate of 30 points, but you cannot tell that to the Commissioners who have made many mistakes. When Mom and I got married, golden weddings seemed just as remote to us as they probably do to you. Matter of fact, folks celebrating them seemed like museum pieces!

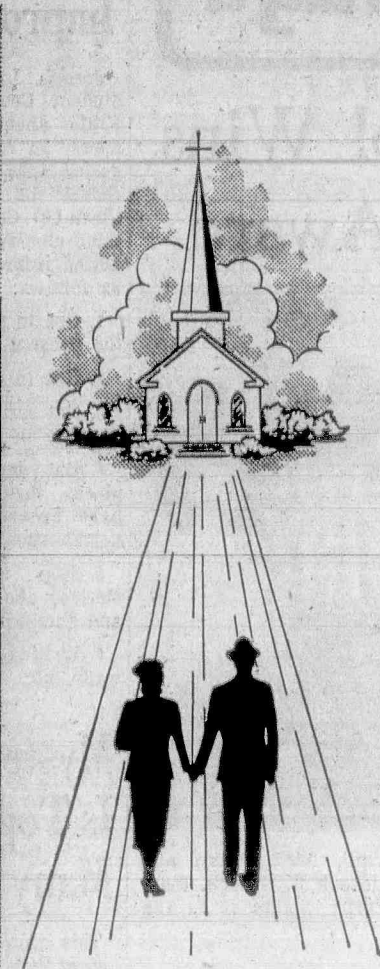
Now here we are, posing for our fiftieth anniversary picture! Funny part of it is that we don't feel a bit like "old folks!"

## Edward E. Robinson, Founded Newark Firm

Edward E. Robinson of 209  
New Street, Belleville, founder of  
Edward E. Robinson, Inc., of  
Newark and a pioneer in the me-  
chanization of the paint brush  
manufacturing industry, died

March 11 in his home of a long  
illness. He was 85.

Mr. Robinson, who was born  
in Boston, began his career in  
the brush industry in Somerville,  
Mass., by perfecting a combing  
and mixing machine for bristles,  
hairs and fibers used in brushes.  
He sold the machine to Hanlon  
and Goodman Co., then in New  
York in 1906.

The machine proved workable  
and Mr. Robinson was hired by  
that company. He moved to  
Belleville in 1907 and became a  
foreman for Hanlon and Good-  
man.

In 1917 he founded his own  
company in New York. Mr. Rob-  
inson devised the first machine  
used to trim bristles on brushes.  
Prior to that time they were cut  
by hand with scissors.

Mr. Robinson also was one of  
the first manufacturers to use  
vulcanized rubber to set bristles  
into brushes. When he began in  
the industry shellac was used.  
He also developed a machine  
that would pour the rubber  
instead of doing it by hand and  
his concern was one of the first  
to stamp brushes.

For many years, the Robinson  
concern made both brushes and  
the machinery for making brush-  
es, which is still used by many  
other concerns. The company  
now makes only the brushes.

Mr. Robinson's company moved  
to Nutley in 1947 and to New-  
ark about four years ago. He re-  
tired about 10 years ago as presi-  
dent of the concern, which now  
is headed by his son, Edwin J.  
Robinson of Livingston.

Mr. Robinson was a member  
of the American Brush Manufac-  
turing Association of America  
and of Belleville Lodge 108,  
F&AM.

Besides his son, he is survived  
by two daughters, Mrs. Miriam  
Baker of Belleville and Mrs.  
Eleanor M. Schwartz of Berkeley  
Heights, and nine grandchildren.

High school or business school graduates between the ages of 20 and 30, as well as former service women, are eligible for three-year enlistment in the Women's Reserve of the Coast Guard.

SPARS are assigned to one of the Reserve Training Centers near their homes and attend unit meetings one evening a week or one weekend a month. Young women with clerical ability are extremely valuable in the administrative offices and can relieve men for training in sea-going and port security rates.

Uniforms are furnished and pay and other military benefits accrue to SPARS while attending meetings and performing two weeks active duty annually. The first summer after a SPAR is enlisted, she spends two weeks on active duty at "Boot Camp" in Maryland.

She is usually assigned to the Third District Office in New York for two weeks active duty during the following year. 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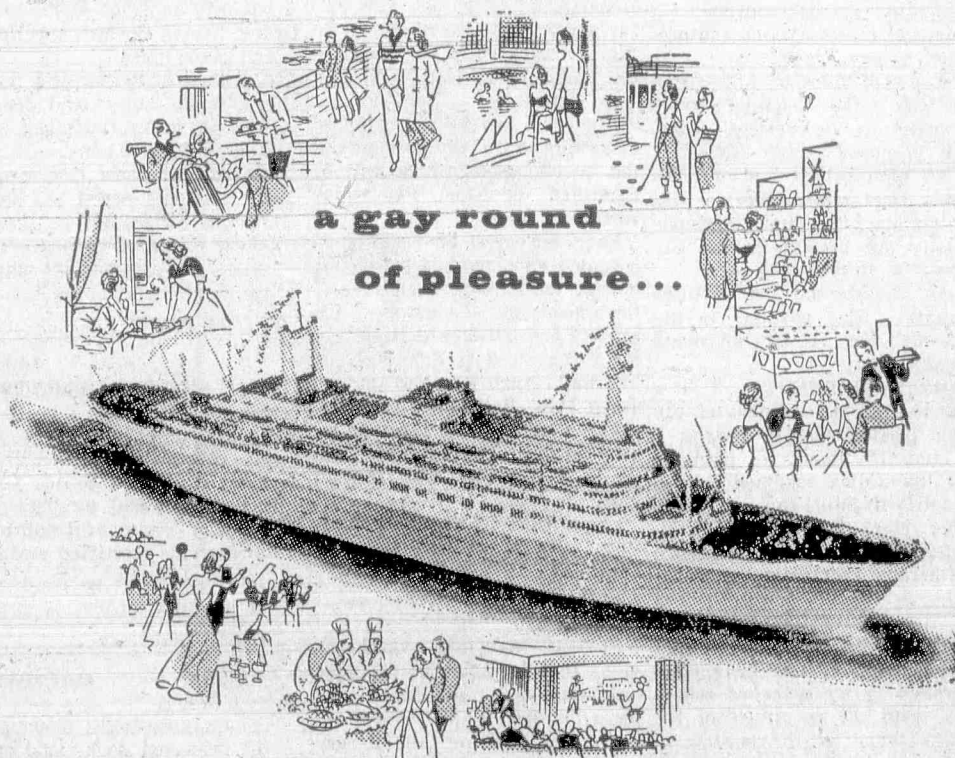

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Civil Service Commission, at the request of the Department of Public Safety of the Town of Belleville, New Jersey, has completed a survey of all positions of said Department, and, WHEREAS, the New Jersey Civil Service Commission has submitted to the local governing body three (3) separate and distinct schedules, as follows:

Schedule 1.  
1. A list of employees, together with their dates of last permanent appointment.  
2. Their present status, salary, title and divisional classification.  
3. Their proposed status, title and divisional classification.

Schedule 2.  
1. Class specifications in alphabetical order including definitions, examples of work, educational and experience requirements, and knowledge and abilities.

Schedule 3.  
1. An alphabetical list of titles of full-time positions in the Classified Service with divisional classifications and proposed salary ranges.  
2. A list of titles of full-time positions in the Classified Service in schematic arrangement with divisional classifications and proposed salary ranges.  
3. A list of titles of full-time positions in the Classified Service arranged in descending order, with proposed salary ranges.  
4. An alphabetical list of titles in the Unclassified Service with the statutory or other provisions placing the position in the Unclassified Service.  
5. An alphabetical list of titles of part-time positions in the Classified Service with divisional classification.

NOW, WHEREFORE, The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, do ordain:

1. That the classes of positions and the duties assigned thereto as set forth in the three (3) schedules referred to above and incorporated herein by reference are hereby created and adopted; and,

2. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the salary ranges setting forth annual increments specified in the attached schedules, with the exception of the salary range for the position of "Traffic Maintenance Man" which said range shall be \$3,612. to \$5,334, are hereby adopted as and for each and every class of position mentioned in said schedules, and that the increment payments contained therein are contingent on the availability of funds; and,

3. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the adoption of this ordinance shall operate to provide increments only to those employees who have satisfactorily performed the duties of their positions; and,

## Revenue Dept. States Time Requirements

New rules relating to requests for extensions of time for filing individual income tax returns were announced recently by District Director of Internal Revenue, Joseph F. J. Mayer. The new requirements are contained in Treasury Decision 6436, and are effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1958.

Every individual requesting an extension of time for filing his income tax return will be required to furnish all of the following information: Why he needs more time, for how long, whether he filed and made timely payments on any required declaration of estimated tax for the year, whether each of his returns for the last three years was filed on time or within an approved extension.

Mayer explained that the Service, in fairness to the tens of millions of taxpayers who file their returns on time, must do everything reasonably possible to insure that extensions are granted only when there is a real need for more time. These new items of information are for the

## Census Bureau To Open Office On Broad Street

Establishment of a district office for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing at 1060 Broad Street, Room 301, Newark, was announced recently by Director John Gibson of the Census Bureau's regional office at Philadelphia.

George A. Bernard will be supervisor of the district office. He will direct a force of 54 crew leaders, 829 census takers and 51 field reviewers in Essex County and the western part of Hudson County.

Taking the 1960 Census nationally will require the services of 160,000 enumerators, 10,000 crew leaders, and 400 district supervisors, all temporary workers. The district supervisors, working under the general direction of the permanent regional field directors, are responsible for all phases of the census in their districts. Duties of the district supervisor include the recruiting of the crew leaders, obtaining space for crew leader training, recruiting and training a small office staff, reviewing the completed questionnaires, and direct supervision of the field canvass which begins on April 1.

Prior to the start of the census, all households will receive in the mail an Advance Census Report Form, a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form, which contains the basic population and housing questions, gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit.

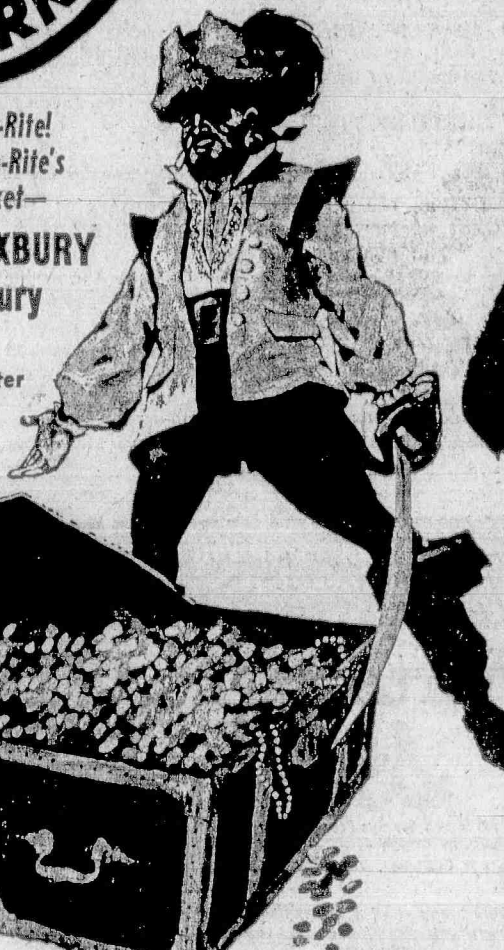

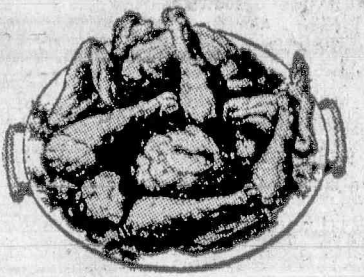
