## Democrats Will Vie for Power At Polls Tuesday

Primary election polls will be open next Tuesday between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. at scattered points throughout Belleville. Only significant contest on the local level involves the heated contest within the Democratic Party for a number of county committee posts. A rival group headed by Ralph Risoli is out to unseat Ralph A. Vara as Town Democratic Chairman.

Outside of the local level, the only attraction of the ballot is the senate contest on the Republican ticket between incumbent Clifford A. Case and Robert Morris. Although this is a presidential year, New Jersey voters do not directly vote in the pri-

mary for any of the candidates but merely select the delegates to the national conventions. Climaxing the Democratic Primary Election race in Belleville this week is a release from the regular organization submitted by Vara which appears elsewhere on this page. No statement was received this week from Risoli.

There are 42 county committee seats in Belleville. Risoli's organization is presenting opposition in only 13 posts.

The regular county-supported ticket, headed by Vara, is running in all 42 spots and all but four of the candidates already hold the office.

## Ralph Vara Asks Support Of Regular Slate Tuesday

Democratic Town Chairman Ralph A. Vara today appealed to all Democratic party voters "to close ranks" in next Tuesday's primary election and to "vote exclusively for men and women whose party loyalty and political acumen have stood the test of time."

Vara is facing opposition in his own district, Ward 4, fourth district. Even if he were defeated as district leader, his re-election as town chairman, a position he

has held for 12 years, seems assured, since only 11 seats in the town committee are being contested by opposition candidates, the Belleville Democratic Committee has a total of 42 votes.

In his statement today, Vara questioned the sincerity of the opposition candidates and charged all 11 of them with being "mere puppets, whose strings are being manipulated by a couple of characters whose party allegiance is—to say the least—a very doubtful quality."

Vara told The Times, "I have had opposition before. But at least the insurgents of two years ago were honest party Democrats. That cannot be said of the so-called candidates of today and their backers."

Coe of the candidates, Vara said, "is a young man of about 30, who had never taken the trouble to register until a few weeks ago. Consequently, he never voted, in either a general election or a primary. Is that the caliber of a party leader?"

"Another of these would-be leaders today aspires to succeed me as town chairman. He became a district leader last year for the first time without ever winning an election. In fact I, Ralph Vara, did cast the decisive vote in the town committee that gave him the district leadership on a silver platter."

"A third 'Democratic' candidate happens to be the daughter of a Republican leader in the same district. Are they now going to run both parties from under the same roof?"

"The only claim a fourth of these so-called candidates can put forth for the support of his neighbors is, 'Please, vote for me. I live in Belleville, too.'"

"Of the same doubtful political quality as these 'candidates' are the men who are actually 'running' them. One of them, though admittedly and nominally a party Democrat, has for years been peddling his little neighborhood influence to Republican office seekers."

"The other of these two opposition backers voted for the first time as a Democrat two years ago—and not since. Yet in the same year—1958—he was selling his hot-dogs and a Republican candidate from the same bill-board. He supported the GOP candidate against Congressman Peter W. Rodino. And in last year's general election he again flatfootedly supported Republican Assembly and Freeholder candidates,—and that calls itself a Democrat?"

Vara pointed to his record as town chairman and that of the present district leaders and county committee members of Belleville. "These devoted Democratic

## Easter Egg Hunt Is This Saturday At Stadium Area

Commissioner George F. Kiernan announced that the Recreation Department's annual Easter Egg Hunt for the younger children will be held at the Municipal Stadium Saturday morning, April 16 at 10 a.m. The Easter Egg Hunt is planned for children up to the age of 12. Any child over 12 will not be eligible for prizes.

Commissioner Nuncio R. Pico and Executive Officer Edward Burdy today urged all Belleville residents to participate in the annual Spring "Clean Up Weeks Drive."

The official sprucing up period will start on Monday, April 25 and continue until Saturday, May 7.

Both the director of Public Affairs and the Health Department stress that this annual observance affords every householder an opportunity to rid their premises of untold hundreds of useless and dangerous items which have accumulated in the home over a period of time. Perhaps one of the most important reasons for the disposal of this accumulation of waste and other inflammable materials is the fire prevention angle. To that end, a concerted drive by each and every home owner during Clean Up Weeks, will go a long way towards ridding the community of many of the causes of residence fires.

Clean Up Week has resulted in many advantages to community life, in safe-guarding health, in furthering fire prevention, in promoting cleanliness, rodent control, and in stimulating civic pride and making the home and town beautiful.

Pico requested the cooperation of all in helping to make Belleville better, brighter, cleaner and more beautiful, by giving the cellar, attic, garage, and yard a Spring clean up.

## Maglione Appeals For Top Support In Seal Campaign

Thomas Maglione, Belleville realtor and insurer, today urged Belleville residents to return their contributions for the Easter Seal Drive of the Essex County Society for Crippled Children and Adults.

Maglione said that during the past month there were 871 treatment hours—an all time record at the Easter Seal Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center at the N. J. Orthopaedic Hospital, Orange.

Maglione, the municipal chairman here for the drive quoted Dr. Sidney Keats, medical director at the center, as saying that there was a waiting list of children who need help.

Dr. Keats said that although the youngsters were being fitted into the schedule, incoming youngsters could not be provided regular treatment hours.

Maglione added: "No child who requires care is ever turned away from the center. However, this generous attitude has strained the staff facilities at the center."

"Without your help, children suffering from Cerebral Palsy may be denied the help which they need. Please send your contributions to Easter Seals, Federal Trust Office of the National State Bank of Newark."

Maglione reports that the Belleville Unido Club has made a donation of \$25 to this project.

Any Belleville resident who desires to help out in this Easter Seal campaign is urged to contact Maglione. Volunteer workers are desperately needed in order that the goal for this year be met.

Donations to this fund will be allocated to the Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center for Essex County at the N. J. Orthopaedic Hospital.

## Mayor-GoldenDuel Over Costly Gov't; Heard After Session

Perennial town critique James Golden exchanged strong words with Mayor Isadore Padula during and after Tuesday's Town Commission meeting. The debate concerned with lack of efficiency in Belleville's Department of Revenue and Finance continued after the session adjourned in the meeting room, then the loud talk went into the adjacent halls, down the stairs and corridors and finally ended up at the entrance to the mayor's office.

Golden charged that the revenue department, headed by Mayor Padula, is "full of political hacks and appointees" and added that because of these people, "there is gross inefficiency in the department."

Golden, who resides in Tappan Avenue, began his remarks when an ordinance proposed (and later passed Tuesday) asked for a \$33,000 purchase order for department equipment, mostly for an Addressograph machine.

"Now you want machines to make your jobs even easier," Golden said at the top of his voice. He mentioned specific names of workers in the department, saying these people enjoyed too many coffee breaks, showed up for work late and so forth.

**MAYOR'S STATEMENT**

Mayor Padula didn't offer any resistance to Golden's remarks but commented toward the close of the evening that "I deny everything Golden said tonight."

The mayor went on to say that effective immediately, "The Department of Revenue and Finance wants to be notified at least 24 hours in advance of requests to see office records," Padula said the ruling is needed because "Mr. Golden has a habit of twisting things around he gets from office assistants." Padula said that when Golden wants to see records and obtain informa-

tion, "he will have to get it from office officials and I want to be sure he won't waste any time by appearing at the Town Hall and not having the proper persons here to answer his questions."

Golden commented he doesn't think it's legal for the mayor to require him to make an appointment 24 hours in advance. Pad-

## Commissioners OK Major Bills; Related Topics

Belleville Commissioners Tuesday passed several major ordinances including one authorizing the purchase of two Valley Street lots which are to be used as parking areas.

Another ordinance adopted Tuesday accepts the reclassification of Civil Service in the Belleville Department of Public Safety.

Others include expenditures of \$25,000 for radio equipment for police and firemen, and \$38,000 for office equipment in the department of revenue and finance.

Only citizen to object to ordinances Tuesday was James Golden of Tappan Avenue. Golden spoke more than 30 minutes on ordinances Tuesday. Primarily he was concerned with the Civil Service ordinance which Golden said caused it "apb-e etaoia"

"is unfair and a rarity" because it "neglects the rank and file members of the police and fire departments who in the first place started the move for salary increases."

The Civil Service ordinance adopted Tuesday provides, generally speaking, for salary increases for officers and office employees of the department of public safety but not for regular patrolmen and firemen.

**VALLEY STREET LOTS**

The two Valley Street lots were purchased Tuesday for \$15,600. This ordinance had been originally scheduled for adoption but was tabled at the Commissioners' meeting, March 22. Kiernan untied the bill this week and it passed without comment.

**WILL SELL PROPERTY**

Belleville Commission is asking a minimum bid of \$1.00 for a tract located off Morse Place on the Belleville-Nutley line. Legal description of the lot is given in a legal notice appearing in today's Belleville Times. Bids are to be returned Monday, April 25 at 10:30 a.m. in the commission meeting room.

## Capitol Theatre Now Marking 40th Year, Seeks 1920 Programs

The Capitol Theatre has been on the Belleville scene 40 years this week. As part of its 40th year anniversary celebration, George Karros, manager, reports that the old show place is looking for copies of the first program issued back in 1920.

"Anyone who brings in one of those 1920 programs," Karros told The Belleville Times, "will receive a pass not only for himself, but for his entire family!"

The Capitol Theatre, located at 362 Washington Avenue, was built in 1920 by Joseph Stern. It was sold in the same year to the Stanley - Fabian Corporation which ran the theatre until 1935 when Stanley Warner Theatres Inc., present owners, purchased the site.

Karros has been manager of the theater which seats 1,100 since 1956. He came to Belleville with 10 year's experience with Leows Theatres of New York.

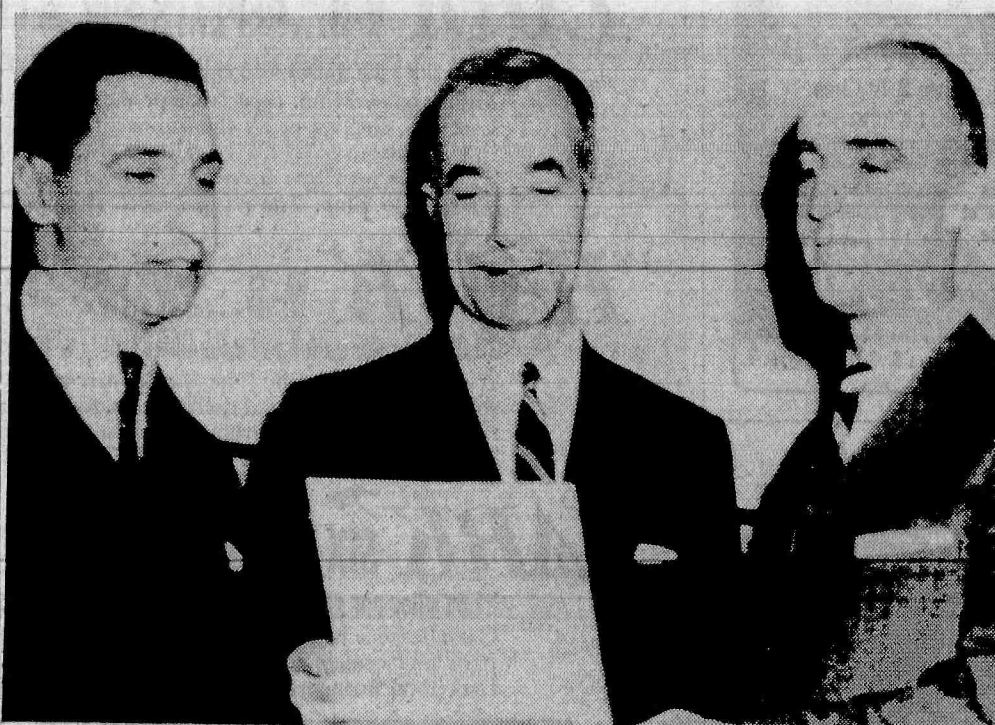
The new Cinemascope and stereophonic sound processes were added to the Capitol in 1953 under the management of M. Mulnick who joined the firm in 1939.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO CIVIL SERVICE TITLES AND SALARY RANGES," Adopted April 27, 1949.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, do ordain: WHEREAS, the New Jersey Civil Service Commission, at the request of the Department of Public Safety of the Town of Belleville, New Jersey, has completed a survey of all positions of said Department; and, WHEREAS, the New Jersey Civil Service Commission has submitted to the local governing

body three (3) separate and distinct schedules, as follows:

Schedule 1.

1. A list of employees, together with their dates of last permanent appointment.

2. Their present status, salary, title and divisional classification.

3. Their proposed status, title and divisional classification.

Schedule 2.

1. Class specifications in alphabetical order including definitions, examples of work, educational and experience requirements, and knowledge and abilities.

Schedule 3.

1. An alphabetical list of titles of full-time positions in the Classified Service with divisional classifications and proposed salary ranges.

2. A list of titles of full-time positions in the Unclassified Service with the statutory or other provisions placing the position in the Unclassified Service.

5. An alphabetical list of titles of part-time positions in the Classified Service with divisional classification.

NOW, WHEREFORE, The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, do ordain:

1. That the classes of positions and the duties assigned thereto as set forth in the three (3) schedules referred to above and incorporated herein by reference are hereby created and adopted; and,

2. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the salary ranges setting forth annual increments specified in the attached schedules, with the exception of the salary range for the position of "Traffic Maintenance Man" which said range shall be \$3,612 to \$5,334, are hereby adopted as and for each and every class of position mentioned in said schedules, and that the increment pay-

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF POLICE AND FIRE RADIO EQUIPMENT FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY, APPROPRIATING THE SUM OF \$25,000.00, THEREFORE, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES FOR SAID PURPOSE.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, do Ordain:

Section 1. That improvement be made by purchasing and installing Police and Fire Radio equipment for the Department of Public Safety.

Section 2. It is hereby determined and declared that it is necessary that the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, shall raise money for the above purpose, and that the estimated maximum amount of money necessary to be raised from all sources for said purpose is \$25,000.00, and that the estimated maximum amount of notes to be issued for said purpose is \$23,750.00.

Section 3. To finance said purpose there is appropriated the sum of \$1,250.00, which sum has

been made available for said purpose in previously adopted budgets of said Town, under the caption of "CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND," in said previous budgets.

Section 4. To finance said purpose there shall be issued, pursuant to the Local Bond Act of the State of New Jersey, in anticipation of the issuance of bonds, Bond Anticipation Notes of said Town, which shall not exceed in aggregate principal amount the sum of \$23,750.00. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6 per cent) per annum and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Act. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 5. Not more than \$200.00, of the sum to be raised by the issuance of said notes may be used to finance interest on obligations issued to finance said purpose, whether temporary or permanent, or to finance engineering or inspection costs and legal expenses, or to finance the cost of the issuance of such obligations as provided in Section 40:1-55 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of the purpose for the financing of which said notes are to be issued is a period of (10) ten years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 7. No part of the cost of making said improvement has been or is to be specially assessed against property specially benefited thereby.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and declared that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Act has been duly made and filed in the Office of the Town Clerk of said Town, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Town as defined in Section 40:1-76 of Revised Statutes is increased by this ordinance by \$23,750.00 and that the issuance of said notes is permitted by an exception to the debt limitations prescribed by said Revised Statutes contained in Subdivision (d) of Section 40:1-16 of said Revised Statutes of New Jersey.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

ula's only answer to Golden was "if you don't think it's legal, then take it to the courts."

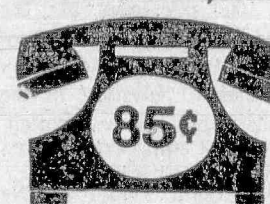
## Clean-Up Campaign Will Start After Vacation

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE TO RESTRAIN AND SUPPRESS GAMING HOUSES, AS WELL AS ALL INSTRUMENTS AND DEVICES USED FOR GAMING AND TO PROHIBIT AND PREVENT ALL GAMING AND FRAUDULENT DEVICES OF EVERY KIND." Adopted April 25, 1944.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, do ordain:

SECTION 1. That Section 3 of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to restrain and suppress Gaming Houses, as well as all instruments and devices used for

gaming and to prohibit and prevent all gaming and fraudulent devices of every kind," adopted April 25, 1944, be amended as follows:

"Section 3. - Any person or persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall upon conviction thereof, be punishable by the payment of a fine not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars or by imprisonment in the County Jail for a term not exceeding ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment."

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication according to law.

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
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
