

Town Turns Down Plan for Insurance In Recreation Dept.

Belleville commissioners turned down a plan offered by George Kiernan to insure participants in the town-sponsored recreation department.

Commissioner Kiernan noted that \$1,150 for insurance coverage for the remainder of this year would be required. The insurance suggestion was made for a little over \$300 for medical expenses incurred by an injured participant during a department activity.

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Police Administrators Would Give Psycho Tests To Prospective Officers

Psychiatric and psychological testing of prospective policemen to determine their stability to become police officers will be required in Belleville if the municipal governing body accepts a proposal of the Essex County Police Administrators' Association.

Copies of a resolution adopted by the association will be forwarded to each municipal body with the request that it require these examinations of all candidates before any is appointed.

The association also will seek to have Civil Service Department require that as part of the job specification for each examination for policeman that candidates successfully complete a police training course before becoming eligible for appointment.

It was pointed out that the examinations would have to be done at municipal expense since the Civil Service Department has no funds to provide for such professional service in its examinations. The proposal has the approval of the Essex County Police Chiefs Association.

Extension of the probationary period is provided in Assembly Bill 635 which the police administrators believe should be amended to provide that the probationary period begin after completion of the training course of six weeks conducted by the County Police Chiefs.

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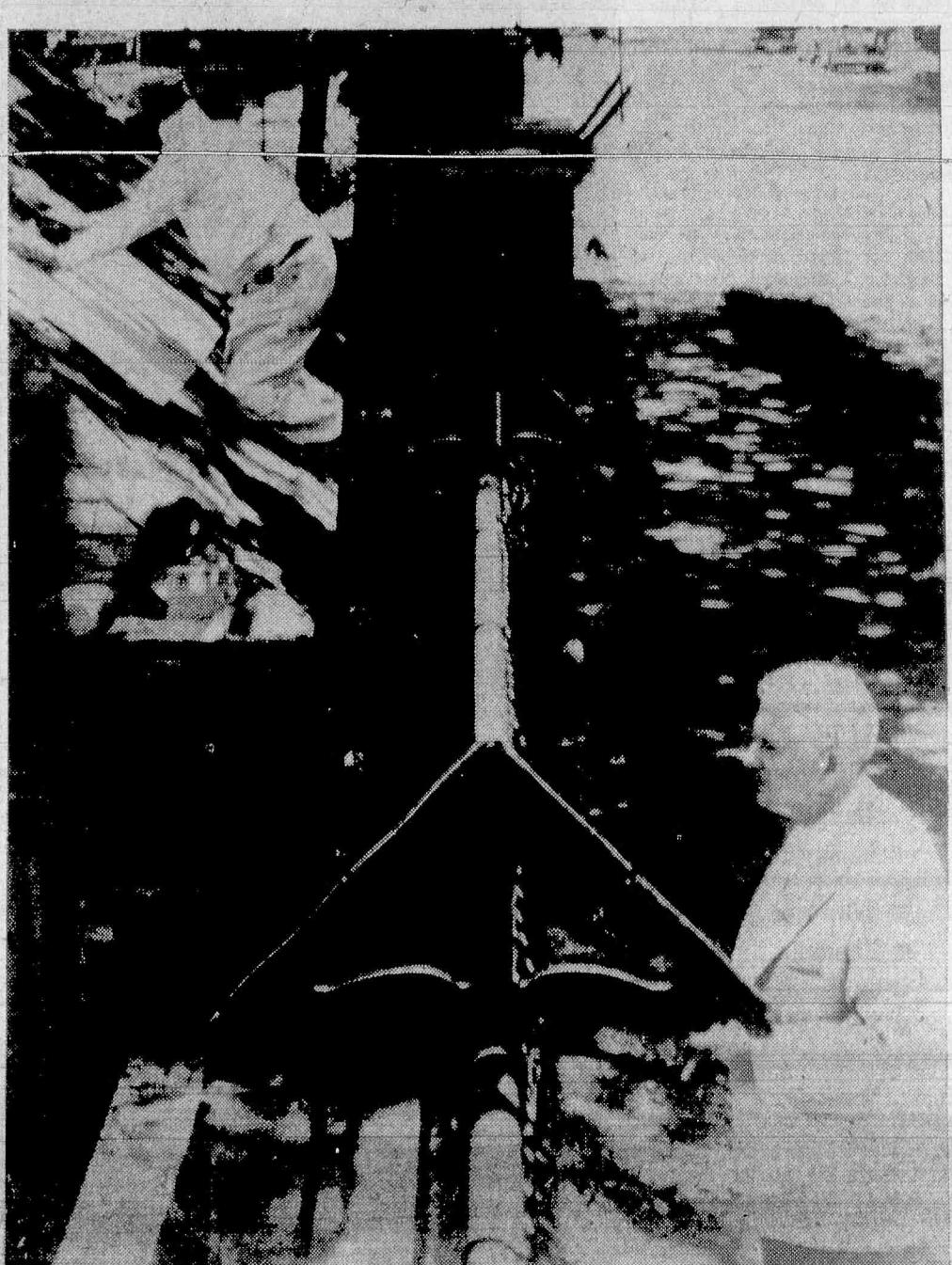
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School Vandalism Increases After Session With Police



Several hundred dollars' damage was done by vandals on school property this past week. Vandalism also was experienced at School eight and at other sites throughout town. The school board and administrators are concerned. It's costing far more than the schools can afford. Lack of adequate police protection is cited by the school board but despite a special school board meeting with police, this past weekend "was one of the worst ever" according to school officials.

Other officers, all active men in local activities, include David Robbins, vice-president; Henry Lewis, second vice-president; Harry Ziegler, secretary; Don Bowden, treasurer; Joseph Moore, tail twister; William Roemmele, lion tamer and Robert Williams and Leslie Finch, directors.

Belleville Lions had their big day April 21 at Christians Lounge in Washington Avenue where a huge anniversary banquet was held. In addition to the local officers, several dignitaries of the regional, state and national organization attended. A run down of the important dates in the history of the Belleville Lions Club follows:

- Club organized March 7, 1925. Sponsored by Rutherford Lions, Dr. L. Clee, president.
- March 9, 1926 - Charity committee cooperated with school principals in giving shoes to worthy school children.
- June 9, 1926 - Boys' Week Celebration presented school board with sub-target gun for training in marksmanship.
- Won bowling matches with Nutley Lions and Rotary.
- December 2, 1926 - Committee at work in cooperation with Rotary for a Central Welfare Agency to administer the poor relief work in town.
- March 11, 1927 - Contributing weekly to the support of a boy handicapped with diabetic trouble.
- December, 1943 - Purchased sweaters and gloves for children ill of tuberculosis.
- August, 1934 - sent six boys to camp for week paying all expenses.
- November, 1935 - gave \$50 to Community Chest and \$10 to Catholic Building Fund.
- June, 1935 - served needy families with \$25 worth of milk.
- April, 1935 - donated to local Elks Charity Fund.
- February, 1936 - furnished glasses to needy children.
- August, 1927 - sponsored circus for charity fund.
- September, 1929 - Donated \$250 to Boy Scouts of America, Belleville Chapter.
- December, 1931 - distributed Christmas baskets to poor. Held a minstrel show to raise money for charity fund.
- April 1932 - Donated \$100 to Community Service Bureau for milk for needy children.

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New Incidents Blamed on Lack Of Protection

Despite a lengthy meeting between the Belleville Board of Education and the police department last week, a meeting was called in an attempt to increase policing of school property, vandals were at work again over the weekend, especially at Clearman Field where a field house was almost completely destroyed.

The recent incidents have touched off some bitter comments by both board of education members and the higherups in the school system. Administrative officials are somewhat hesitant to speak in public, it's known they all place the blame on the Belleville Police Department for failure to provide adequate protection.

One administrator told The Times this week that the schools' relationship with the police department has nearly reached the breaking point. "We feel hesitant in calling them," one spokesman said.

Chief of Police George R. Spatz told the special meeting of the school board that his force was undermanned and underpaid and couldn't do a better job than it's doing now.

The police department has suggested that the board of education hire its own watchmen to guard grounds after school hours.

Even Thomas, superintendent of schools, however, made it clear in an interview with this newspaper that the "board cannot furnish its own police force—that's just not part of education and you can be sure if we did go out and hire detectives that the townpeople would have something to say about the added expense."

Thomas noted that this past weekend's activity "was just about the worst we've had yet." He's deeply concerned with the outlook for the future since history indicates that vandalism increases with warmer weather.

HOLES IN ROOF

A full force of workmen were on the scene Monday repairing and cleaning the area and the keld house visited by vandals over the weekend. The culprits cut huge holes in the field house roof at Clearman Field which were used as an entrance to the interior where fires and other malicious behavior was noted.

Harold Duffer, assistant superintendent of schools, told The Times that the activity at the field house necessitates a complete new roof on the building which will cost \$400 not including labor.

The amount dropped into the box of the poppy worker is a donation to relieve the suffering caused by war. The purpose of the Auxiliary's poppy program is to place the symbol of heroic sacrifice above the heart of every true American, giving at the same time an opportunity to aid the wars' living victims.

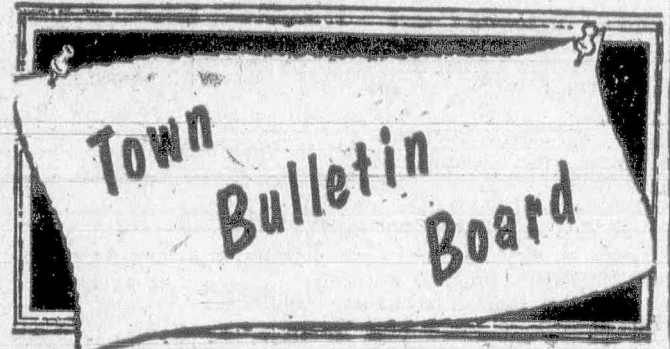

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Our Vacant Stores

Thirty months ago Mayor Isadore Padula invited Washington Avenue merchants and landlords to a meeting at town hall. The date was November 25, 1957, time — 9:30 p.m.

According to the official minutes of that meeting Mayor Padula's opening statement is reported as follows: "The reason for the letter (invitation) is as I go out onto Washington Avenue I see so many vacant stores. There must be a reason for their becoming vacant, which might prove dangerous and we could find the town, some day, unable to collect taxes from the stores that are vacant. Why are there these vacancies?"

Answering the Mayor one merchant said, "The real key to the problem affecting merchants on Washington Avenue is the problem that we must have people come into the town and shop. We are a nation on wheels. Everyone comes in on wheels and finds no parking facilities. If you want people of Belleville to shop in the area, ways and means must be made if we are ever to be a prosperous town, such as providing parking facilities. Suppose you consider how this can be done."

Mayor Padula's final statement was, "There is no question in my mind that parking facilities are needed. I don't however, know what the other commissioners will say."

Two and one half years and one commission election have passed us by since the mayor made this observation. One wonders whether or not Mayor Padula has been able to ascertain the attitude of his fellow commissioners. Our understanding is that a majority of the present commission is in favor of constructing municipal parking lots to alleviate a problem everyone admits is critical.

The question at the moment is—do we need to waste precious time conducting surveys to determine a need for parking which Padula 30 months ago admitted existed? If anything, with the passing of time the condition is further aggravated. Everyone knows two Washington Avenue chain stores are moving out of Belleville. Why? Your guess is as good as ours.

An emergency faces Belleville. Let's

dispense with conversation, stalling and studies. Action is needed if we are to survive as a first class community. The commission is under compelling obligation to tackle the dual problems of inadequate parking facilities and traffic flow with vigor and vision.

35 Years of Service

December, 1944—Club raised \$939,000 for 6th War Fund.

April, 1945—In cooperation with local Rotarians, established Camp Ro-Li.

May, 1950—Pledged \$2500.00 to Clara Maass Hospital.

July, 1951—Donated \$50.00 to purchase 8 oar rowing shell to high school.

May, 1958 — Furnished equipment to Clara Maass Hospital for eye surgery, valued at \$1400.00.

March, 1959—Sponsored Belleville High School senior to Boys' State Convention. Also furnished eye glasses to needy children.

The list is endless. The unselfish deeds of the Belleville Lions are written indelibly in the hearts and minds of our citizens. It is a grateful community that salutes the Lions Club as its members take time out to celebrate and reminisce. The organization has been part of the pulse beat of our community. It has earned our eternal thanks for a job well done.

Seniors Take Banking Firm's Scholarship Test

Nine Belleville students are included in the record number of 191 seniors who have entered the seventh annual National Newark and Essex Banking Company scholarship competition, it was announced recently by Robert G. Cowan, president. Two finalists will be selected from this group and each will be awarded a \$4,000 college scholarship later this month.

"The number of applications for these two scholarships had increased each year that we held our competition," Cowan noted. More than a third of the group listed out-of-state colleges, Rutgers University, Montclair State College, Newark College of Engineering and Princeton University in that order as the first school they want to attend.

As to careers, the field of teaching again was the favorite. There were 57 students who made this choice. Engineering was the next in line, while medicine was third on the list out of a total of 23 different career preferences.

The selection of the two winners is being made by a committee of three well-known educators. The students are being judged not only for their scholastic ability and academic promise on the college level, but also for their citizenship and leadership as indicated by extra-curricular activities in their schools and communities.

grounds for some time now, the situation reached a peak this weekend at school eight where a custodian spent nearly the entire morning sweeping up broken glass from the driveway. Duffer said "the grounds at school eight were completely covered with broken glass."

The vandals deliberately trampled flower beds which again will result in the board of education's far exceeding the maximum figure budgeted for such mischief.

One workman visited by this newspaper's staff this week commented "we just can't keep up with this vandalism. It's really a shame; something should be done."

CLOSE PLAYGROUNDS

A possible solution offered by some school officials would be to close all playgrounds after

school hours. But this plan has been knocked down by those who proposed it, mainly because they don't feel Belleville residents would like the public grounds closed to local children. "There aren't any other play areas," the superintendent of schools noted.

SPOT LIGHTS

Another plan of the school board is the use of spot lights on school grounds. At school one (Cortlandt Street) spot lights were turned on full force the first time Monday night. But it's still too early to determine their effectiveness, if any.

A board of education member this week, said simply that "we're at our wits end. We don't know what to do. Maybe we ought to appeal to the public to report to the police immediately any suspicious activity at night on school grounds."

Civil Service Says Post Office Test Deadline May 27

Deadline for applicants to file for openings in several area post offices is Friday, May 27, the Civil Service Examiners reported this morning.

The examinations are for appointment to custodial laborer positions in the Bloomfield, Caldwell, East Orange, Livingston,

Morristown, Newark, Short Hills and Washington post offices.

Competition is restricted by law to persons entitled to veteran preference.

A number of appointments to janitor and charwoman positions in the Livingston, Morristown and Newark offices are also available, today's announcement said.

Gustave H. Meissner, executive secretary of the Board of Civil Service Examiners told the Belleville Times that although not every one of the post offices

have immediate vacancies, the lists for each position will be used as the vacancies occur.

Starting salaries for the posts are custodial laborer \$3,405, to \$4,125 a year, and janitor and charwoman, \$1.52 to \$1.86 an hour.

Competitors will be rated on a scale of 100 according to skills and abilities as follows: ability to read and follow simple signs and directions, ability to use hand or power cleaning equipment including waxers, polishers mowers and so forth, ability to operate independently without

weights and loads.

There is no residence requirement for employment at the named post offices. However, certification to fill vacancies at each office will be made first of the highest eligibles who actually reside in the delivery area of the post office for which application is made or who are bona fide patrons of such office.

Persons employed by the post office are considered to be bona fide patrons of such office. Non-local eligibles will be certified only in the absence of sufficient local eligibles.

Magistrates Open Drive to Improve Law Enforcement

"It is our plan," Kinsey added, "to enlist the active cooperation of the citizens of the county through civic, fraternal, religious, business, veteran, school and other organizations in which they are active, to work with our organized police departments to suppress crime in Essex County."

"It is obvious that in the single field of traffic law enforcement alone, no municipality can possibly have enough police officers to patrol all of our streets all of the time. In addition we must continue our attacks on all other law violations at the same time. If our citizens will help our police officers only to the extent of policing themselves so that they do not violate the law we will have accomplished a great deal.

"We do not expect to revive vigilance committees but we do believe that if our citizens will work with their police departments a greater respect for law will result. We believe that law observance is one of the first requisites of good citizenship and we are convinced that our fellow citizens want to be good citizens."
