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Board is Closing All Playgrounds After 9 at Night

School playgrounds will be closed to the public effective immediately, daily after 9 p.m., the Belleville Board of Education ruled this week.

The board was forced to take the drastic action because "vandalism of school property after school hours has become an increasing and costly problem to the town."

More vandalism this past week led the school board to prepare for exceptionally high costs, a larger figure than has been included in the current budget.

Members instructed attorney Max Swartz to appear before the Belleville Commissioners to officially notify the town board of action taken at Monday's school board meeting. While the school board's resolution states that "use of school grounds after 9 p.m. shall be unlawful," Swartz has suggested that a town ordinance be passed which would enable violators to be prosecuted.

Swartz did not make his comments to Commissioners at Tuesday's session.

Assistant Superintendent of Schools Harold Dufford has repeated several times in recent weeks that unless something was done to check the increasing rate of vandalism, the school board would be forced to close the playgrounds.

"We don't want to close the playgrounds," Dufford told The Times, "because we know there just isn't any other area for the children to play, and we certainly don't want the children playing in the streets."

According to the resolution, "playgrounds and property of the Belleville School System will be closed to the public after 9 p.m. (daylight saving time) from May 1 through October 31, and after 7 p.m. (Eastern standard time) from November 1 through April."

Copies of the resolution have been forwarded to the police department and newspapers.

In approving the resolution, the board states its opinion "that immediate action must be taken to prevent this needless destruction of public property."

In other business Monday night a resolution was defeated by a 4-2 vote which would have given adjustments in the salaries of Seymour Grossman, school seven principal, and Mrs. Viola Spray, school nine principal, effective September 1. Voting in favor of the resolution were Dr. Frank Di Ruggiero and Michael Albertine.

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Tax Council Joins Tiff With Police

The Citizens' Tax Council has given next Tuesday as a deadline for a reply from the police commissioners' office clarifying statements which Police Chief George R. Spatz allegedly made concerning vandalism on school property.

The police chief was reported in the press as telling the board of education that the force is undermanned and can't do a better job watching school property than is now being done.

Letters from the tax council have been sent to Belleville Commissioners and local newspapers noting that the group is disturbed over the reported remarks of Chief Spatz. Unless an answer is received by Tuesday from Police Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan's office, the tax council says it will take legal action against the department.

Salvatore R. Calabro, president of the Citizens' Tax Council, mailed the letters stating that "we are disturbed by the alleged attitude of the police department as reported in the May 19 issue of The Belleville Times."

Calabro continued by saying that "the police department has suggested that the board of education hire its own watchman to guard grounds after school hours. In other words," Calabro continued, "if this statement is true the police administration is refusing to perform its sworn duty to protect public property."

The tax council head noted that the attitude of police, as reported, "constitutes nonfeasance and as such the guilty officials can be prosecuted under the law."

LEGAL ACTION?

"In all fairness to your department," Calabro concluded, "prior to taking any legal steps we request that you verify whether the statement appearing in the press constitutes a policy of your department. If it does not constitute your policy, we would like a positive indication that the police will protect school property. This should include a description of the routine that will be used and an indication of what records will be maintained to substantiate that the police checks are actually being made."

GIVES DEADLINE

The tax council reports that if a replay is not received from the police commissioner's office by next Tuesday, "we shall then proceed to take whatever legal recourse is necessary to assure the people of Belleville adequate police protection."

MAYOR

A second letter was mailed to Mayor Isadore Padula in which Calabro admitted that he is aware that "under commission government you do not have the authority to order the police department to execute any particular function."

Calabro said, however, that he believes "the prestige of your (the mayor's) office could be used to assure that the demands of the people for police protection of public property are commensurate."

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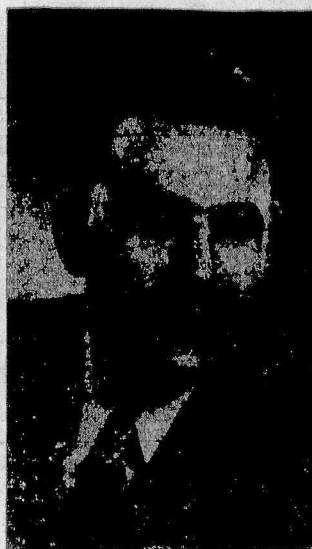
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Gruhin Disclaims Politics From Role In Vara's Suspension

Calls Action Very Unusual. Hints Probe

Commissioner Robert Gruhin ruled out completely any hint that politics played a role in his suspending Ralph Vara from the public works department three days last week for insubordination. When Vara reported at the town garage Tuesday morning after the three-day lapse, he asked Gruhin for a four-day leave without pay which was granted.

Gruhin admits that "It is unusual for me as a Democrat to suspend the town Democratic chairman but I'm running the public works department here, not the Democratic Party."

Vara is superintendent of public works.

The controversy started last Thursday morning when Gruhin saw a copy of a letter which had been sent the day before to the Civil Service Administration. Written by Vara, the letter notified Civil Service that Vara had suspended Joseph Fornoratto, a public works employee for insubordination.

Vara reported that Fornoratto was lagging in his work and neglected Vara's corrective order. This all happened on Wednesday.

SAME LANGUAGE

After reading the copy of Vara's letter to the Civil Service Administration, Gruhin typed a near-identical copy using the identical language but substituting Vara's name for Fornoratto's and presented this copy to Superintendent Vara.

What was Vara's reaction? "Yes, he was surprised, and I'd say he was amazed," Gruhin said. A copy of Gruhin's letter suspending Vara was also forwarded to Civil Service.

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Insurance Dumped Again; Authorize Master Plan

A Greylock Parkway resident appeared before the Belleville Commissioners Tuesday to provide the latest spark in the somewhat touchy question of the town's furnishing insurance coverage for participants in its sponsored recreational activities.

Another highlight of Tuesday's meeting was a \$9,000 emergency appropriation for the preparation of a master plan for the newly-formed planning board. The survey will be made by the New Jersey Department of Conservation and Economic Development.

INSURANCE

Stephen Kostowicz of 507 Greylock Parkway asked the town to pay a medical bill between \$350 and \$400 for his son. The bill is for injuries sustained in last fall's Little League football program.

The only accomplishment Kostowicz made Tuesday was an assurance from Mayor Isadore Padula that he "will investigate the matter further and give you an answer soon one way or another."

Commissioner George F. Kiernan, director of parks and public property, recently asked the board to appropriate the \$400 item for Kostowicz but the motion was defeated.

Kiernan told this newspaper after Tuesday's session that he still holds firm to his belief that "the town is morally obligated to pay the item. After all we did invite the boy to participate in our program."

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Belleville does not carry insurance for the program. Kiernan reported that cost of an insurance policy for the program for an entire year would cost approximately \$2,500.

Noting that the Commissioners not too long ago approved a \$17,000 Blue Cross benefit plan for town employees, Kiernan remarked that "I think our children are just as important and I don't see any reason why the insurance plan at a relatively small cost of \$2,500 can't be adopted."

The Commissioner however added that Mayor Padula's department of revenue handles all insurance for the town and for this reason Kiernan can not include the \$2,500 item in his public property budget.

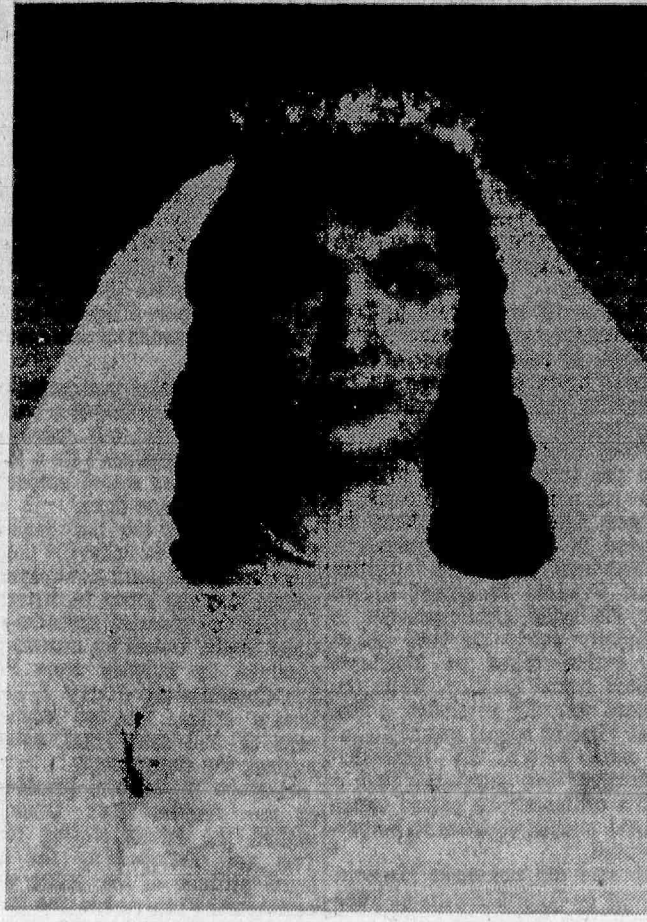

CLARA MAASS STUDENTS RECEIVE CAPS

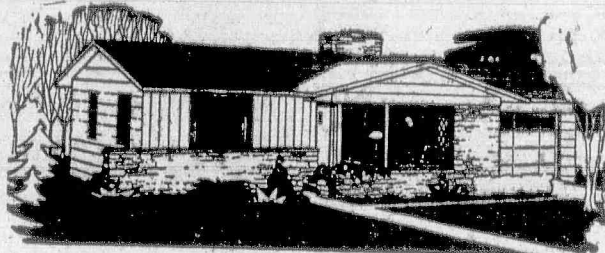

Rinaldi to Head School Fund Drive In This Area

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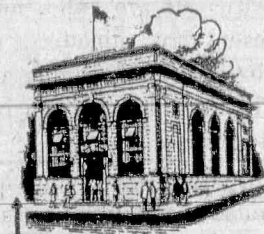
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Memorial Day

When the commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, General John A. Logan, issued the order designating May 30th, 1868, as a day for decorating the graves of the men who fell in the War Between the States, he observed "from year to year while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of the departed."

The custom of thus paying homage to the war dead, which had originated in the South and represented at that time only spontaneous local activity on the part of a relatively few women and children, thus came into being.

The appeal of such an annual commemoration to large numbers of people was soon demonstrated throughout the reunited Republic.

By 1900, President William McKinley, himself a Union veteran, declared, "The army of Grant and the Army of Lee are together. They are one now in faith, in hope, in fraternity, in purpose and in invincible patriotism."

Memorial Day, observed annually since that time, reminds us that human freedom was bought at a great price, and that in this country must be obtained and preserved by hard work and consecrated effort.

The Nation's Most Unnecessary Tax

World War II ended 15 years ago. But, there's a hangover from that war that has just stayed on and on—the Federal transportation tax. As a senator said: "It's the one tax nobody approves." And for good reasons.

1. It favors business travel over personal or emergency travel.
2. It handicaps the communities, and the individuals and companies, that depend on tourist dollars.
3. It works against lower income groups since the tax is regressive and since the person who must use public transportation must pay the tax.

At present, the tax is 10 per cent. Congress has voted to reduce the tax to five per cent beginning July 1. The Administration, however, has asked that the tax be raised back to 10 per cent.

The tax was put on in wartime to discourage non-essential travel, to keep civilians off the buses, planes, and trains. Now, it's 1960, and people want to travel and when they do, the national economy benefits from their expenditures.

About Letters to Editor

To the Editor:

The Belleville Times must be congratulated on the candor with which, in its issue of May 12, it corrected the misleading impressions created by one of its contributors to the "Letters to the Editor" column in connection with the school board building program.

The speed and sincerity with which The Times took the first opportunity to set the record straight clearly implies a growing awareness on the part of its publisher and its editor of the heavy responsibility that rests with any paper for checking the factual contents of all items published by it, whether gathered by its own reporting staff, or submitted as "Letters to the Editor."

But far too frequently that privilege has been abused in the columns of our local press. Under the guise of his personal acter may attempt to foist a deliberately misleading picture of things as they are on an unsuspecting publisher.

Worse even, a "Letter to the Editor" frequently becomes the vehicle for personal abuse and slander.

Ironically, the same issue of much pains to correct one "Letter," also contained a perfect example of the second sort. In going far beyond what the law classifies as "privileged communications," to indulge in personal abuse and slander the author of this second "Letter to the Editor" clearly laid himself open to prosecution.

It does not take a great deal of knowledge of New Jersey libel laws to understand that a paper which makes itself the transmission belt for slander, is as much subject to redress under the law as the originator of the slander.

The Times has earned itself a vote of thanks from the public at large by its announced intent of using more care in the selection of what it publishes under the "Letter to the Editor" heading. No doubt, the paper will come in for some abuse of its own in consequence of such a policy. The publisher and editor of The Times should keep in mind that freedom of the press is a wonderful thing indeed. But freedom of the press does not compel a paper to open its columns wide to irresponsible characters to carry on their private and personal feuds. Abuse of the privilege to be heard can only lead to forcing the paper, for its own self-protection, to close its "Letter" columns to unprivileged communications.

Echoes of Festival

To the Editor:

On Friday May 6th, there appeared in the Belleville Telegram in the Current Events Column "Here and Elsewhere" under the name of Nann Page; an article which needs clarification. The writer who represent the Belleville Auxiliary Police had tried to clear these slanderous misstatements through proper channels but with all the good efforts of our Superior Chief of Police, George Spatz, a stalemate was met. Well that is the way of all politics.

Our good narrator comes up with a fantastic story of picturing that the events were to have taken place in the park but admitting having read contray directions in the papers. Here is where the "Diligent Auxiliary Policemen" come in for cheap publicity. "My gracious, I had to hoof it to Town Hall pronto-Diligent Auxiliary Policemen seemed to be operating on the motto "They Shall Not Pass" end of quotation.

Rebuttal number one -- There were no Auxiliary Policemen assigned below Belleville Avenue and this can be verified by Chief George Spatz and Captain Don Smith who was in direct charge of both the Regular and Auxiliary Police. In fact, there were only one Captain, a Sergeant and five Patrolmen of the Auxiliary Police assigned to the area of the Town Hall between Belleville Avenue and Rutgers Street. The writer was assigned to work with Captain Don Smith in his patrol car to direct Police activities in the parade.

The orders given to us by Chief George Spatz were to keep people off the street in front of the Town Hall area. Further orders after the parade of closing off Washington Avenue between Belleville Avenue and Rutgers Street were issued under regular Police directives -- not Auxiliary Police. Let it be known here that the Auxiliary Police operates only under orders and directives of Chief George Spatz or any of his subordinate officers who were delegated to issue orders.

Chief George Spatz' investigation of these misstatements disclosed that "two unidentified" merchants saw Auxiliary Patrolman No. 45 stop a prospective customer from going into a store. This was disproved and checked into by Chief George Spatz that Auxiliary Policeman No. 45 had not checked in at Police Headquarters and was April 30, 1960 at his place of employment-being out of town from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Chief George Spatz checked into who his regular Police Officer No. 45 was. He, Officer No. 45 of the regular Police is assigned to assist the Court Clerk and was also not on duty April 30, 1960 during this Festival.

It is high time that the person or persons responsible for these misstatements come out and make a public apology to a group of citizens and taxpayers who deserve better treatment for the 19 years of free service given to the town and citizenry of Belleville.

This affair was the first attempt to celebrate the Cherry Blossom season. Being a first, mistakes are made. But that is not the Auxiliary Police' fault, in that merchants through their

own committees and leadership had their Saturday business interfered with by a parade and beauty contest in front of their doors.

The Belleville Ailiary Police is not a political organization. And through its 19 years has served under several directors of Public Safety and Civil Defense Directors. We can produce records of commendation from Director of Public Safety, Harry Sullivan; Chief George Spatz; Judge Edward Abramson, etc., and last but not least from the Belleville Patrolmen's Benevolent Association.--On the wall of the Officer's Desk at Headquarters is an engraved plaque which reads "Presented to the members of the Belleville Police Auxiliary Division in recognition of their personal sacrifice and devotion to the Town of Belleville, dated November 19, 1957." Our records can also prove that personal injuries have been suffered in line of duty. An Auxiliary Patrolman spent six weeks in Columbus Hospital after being injured during one of the hurricanes. Another, was injured at the 4th of July celebration, last year, protecting a group of money collectors for Clara Maass Memorial Hospital. Some incompetent driver starting his car let the back door open, knocking down the Auxiliary Policeman and two hospital workers. This Officer finished his tour of duty before receiving medical attention. And the women were taken by ambulance to the hospital.

In closing may I publicly state that if the Town of Belleville wants to continue the Belleville Auxiliary Police this matter has to be promptly adjusted along with other matters known to Civil Defense Director, Ludwig Pesa. This matter has been discussed with Director Pesa last February but until now there is no answer despite the fact that \$10,000 is in the Town Budget as of last year--what have the taxpayers received for their investment?

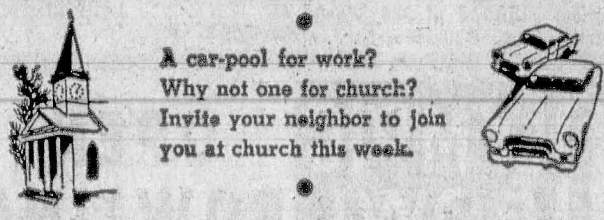

Most disturbing to Gruhin is Vara's suspending Fornoratto without consulting Gruhin. "I'm at the town garage every morning," Gruhin said. "If a man is to be suspended, and this is a very unusual thing, I don't see why Mr. Vara couldn't have waited until Thursday morning and talked it over with me. After all, Vara made Fornoratto's suspension effective as of Thursday anyway."
Gruhin said his attitude would have been different "if I were out of town for a week or couldn't be contacted. But this was not the case last Wednesday."
Gruhin admitted that from what he knows about the Vara-Fornoratto incident, "I seriously question that his (Fornoratto) action was severe enough to constitute his suspension. After all, suspending our employees is not a regular habit. It's been five years since this kind of action has been taken here."
ANOTHER QUESTION
Another facet was thrown into the controversy this week. Gruhin reports that Civil Service officials are questioning Vara's right to suspend an employee.
The public works director concluding his remarks to this newspaper by repeating that "I would not have been nearly so concerned if I had been contacted. But as I have said, I am at the town hall every day. I was available

by telephone all day Wednesday and I see no reason why I could have been and should not have been consulted on such a serious matter as this before such drastic action was taken."

Times Front Commission members he read a recent report indicating that Belleville has saved \$15,000 over the past six years by not carrying this type insurance and then added that "It's my opinion that there is a real obligation on your part to pay this bill now."

But for the time being, Kostowicz has received public support only from Kiernan. Padula can be expected to comment on the issue after his study — probably at the next board meeting.

MASTER PLAN

The \$9,000 emergency appropriation for a master plan was approved quietly except for comments by James Golden of Tappan Avenue. Golden's questions to the board assured him that the funds would be spent "solely for professional services." Padula also told Golden that next

year's budget will include only a \$1,000 new appropriation for the planning board.

The master plan will cost a total of \$18,000. The \$9,000 figure appropriated Tuesday will be added to an equal sum already in the budget. The work will be done by the state department of conservation and economic development.

Ralph Visco, chairman of the planning board, was in the audience at Tuesday's meeting.

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
