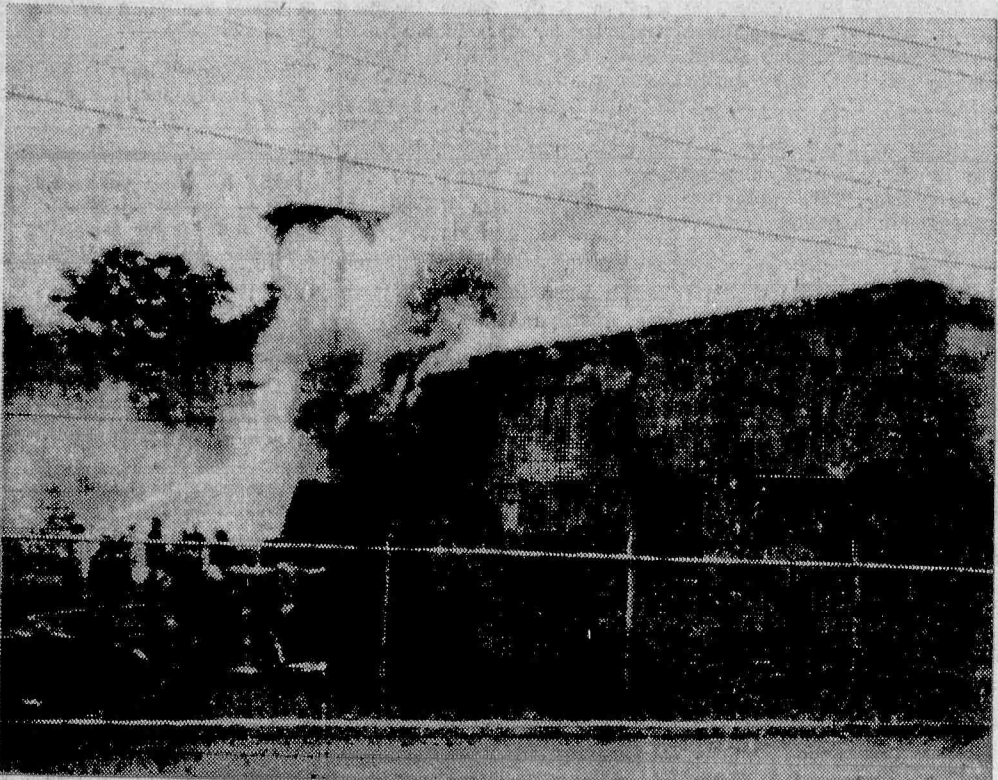


Belleville-Nutley Vamps Battle Blaze

Fire Destroys Sonneborn Warehouse

Two firemen and a worker were overcome by smoke at a two-alarm blaze Tuesday morning which ripped through a warehouse at the L. Sonneborn and Sons Inc. Plant, 65 Hancox Avenue.

Irving P. Schwerd, plant engineer at Sonneborn, said that the warehouse contained drums of mineral oil, machinery and a large quantity of cardboard cartons which were chemically treated.

Overcome by smoke were two Belleville firemen, Edward McGonigle, 53 and Robert Shafter, 40 and an employee, Charles D. Addario. All were treated at the scene for smoke poisoning.

Belleville and Nutley fire and first aid units responded to the alarms.

Before the blaze was brought under control, firemen hosed a nearby oil tank in a successful attempt to prevent its contents of fuel oil from igniting.

UNDETERMINED ORIGIN
The fire remains of undetermined origin. The first alarm was turned in at 10:50 a.m. Tuesday and a second alarm was sounded five minutes later.

The two-story warehouse suffered extensive damage both to its contents and interior structure.

Census Report: Belleville Has 34,926 Population

Belleville is a growing town but the old days of rapid population expansion seem to be over. The town's population has increased a nominal 2,907 persons over the past decade.

According to Census Bureau figures released Tuesday afternoon, Belleville's population is now 34,926. This is a nine per cent increase over 1950 when the town was the home of 32,019 persons.

Although several heavily populated areas such as Newark, East Orange, Irvington, Maplewood, Montclair and Orange show population drops in the count just completed, the census indicates that the move is to the more distant suburbs such as Oakland in upper Bergen County which had a 416 per cent population increase.

Newark's count was down 43,743 since 1950 to give the city a 1959 population of 395,033.

PRELIMINARY COUNTS

District Census Supervisor George A. Bernard told a press conference Tuesday that the figures released are preliminary ones. He emphasized that the official census results will probably not be ready until the fall. Bernard noted that the figure for Belleville will probably "remain firm" when the official count is announced.

In no case, Bernard continued, should there be a revision of more than "a fraction of one per cent."

BELLEVILLE TEAM

The census was taken in Belleville by a squad headed by Mrs. Gerard J. Ferrara of 72 Perry Street. Twenty-four members of the team took the count in the town.

The enumerators all passed rigid examinations. Mrs. Ferrara conducted a special series of classes for the census takers prior to the launching of the survey.

Little Damage To Schools Noted Over Weekend

Vandalism at Belleville schools was little over the holiday weekend. Assistant Superintendent of Schools Harold Dufford said he is "very pleased with the decrease in vandalism on school property."

Dufford told The Belleville Times there were several windows broken at various schools. "but we think this was a result of stray baseballs rather than the work of vandals."

Only one school where a few Canna flowers were uprooted did vandalism occur.

"This is quite an improvement over past weeks," the assistant superintendent said. "And quite frankly, we are pleased with the change."

Dufford ran down the list of damage done over the long holiday weekend.

School one—one rear window broken, apparently by a stray baseball.

School two—no damage noted. School three—one broken window in room 23, also probably done by a stray baseball.

School four—six windows broken on the playground side of school. Dufford said the windows were small ones. Again, baseballs are blamed for the damage.

School five—no damage.

High school—no damage.

School seven—no damage.

School eight—Canna flowers uprooted. Broken glass was scattered throughout the playground and one window was broken on the Clearman Field side of the school.

School nine—a wired-glass pane in a door was broken and a drain leader was bent somewhat, apparently by boys trying to retrieve balls on the school roof.

School ten—no damage.

Court Adopts Strict Policy For Loitering Convictions

Five Belleville boys each paid \$50 fines at the last municipal court session on loitering charges. Magistrate Edward J. Abramson gave out the high fines with the comment "this is the only way we can break up these corner gangs." Abramson added that "if it keeps up, someone is going to end up in jail."

One of the five appeared for the second time on a loitering conviction in the local court. The last time Matte M. Jannicelli of 240 William Street appeared before Abramson he paid a \$10 fine—but that was a year ago.

Others fined were Angelo A. Gangerelli of 81 Linden Avenue, Ronald C. Oscielowski of 29 Corelli of 8 Cedar Hill Avenue

and Ralph P. Palumbo of 38 Maier Street.

All five were arrested by Sgt. David Waddell and Officer Harry J. Sullivan Jr. for loitering at the corner of Belleville and Cedar Hill Avenues. The arrests were made May 17.

LARCENY

In another case before the magistrate's court, William E. Kitzman of 582 Washington Avenue was convicted of petty larceny. Kitzman pleaded guilty and was given a six-month suspended jail sentence, a \$50 fine and placed on probation for a year.

Kitzman was arrested May 15 by Detective James Mundy for stealing a tire and spare wheel.

Vara Slaps Back at Gruhin; Says Politics Was Factor In Suspension from Town Job

Ralph A. Vara, superintendent of the department of public works and Democratic Town Chairman, today denied Commissioner Robert C. Gruhin's inference that "politics had played a role" in his recent three-day suspension. Vara told The Belleville Times today.

"Politics had everything to do with what I consider the highly unfair treatment to which I have been subjected by Commissioner Gruhin," Vara stated.

Vara's suspension by Gruhin followed in the wake of Vara's own suspension of Joseph Fornoratto, an employee of the department, for insubordination.

Vara told The Belleville Times that "first and foremost, the man whom I suspended for insubordination happens to be close personal friend of, and a highly active political worker for Commissioner Gruhin. In fact, the man was appointed to his job by Commissioner Gruhin. I, as

superintendent of public works, was neither consulted nor advised in advance of his hiring."

"Perhaps the close personal relationship between Fornoratto and Commissioner Gruhin may account for his overbearing and sullen attitude as well as for his lackadaisical attitude towards his assigned work which this man has displayed for some considerable time past."

"When on Wednesday, May 18 after his lunch hour, I questioned this employee's lack of interest in the job to which he was assigned, he became abusive in the presence of several other departmental employees, cursed, and used vile language in answering me."

"To maintain the discipline of the entire public works department, and out of respect and consideration for Commissioner Gruhin and his responsibility as director of the department, I

was compelled to suspend this belligerent employee."

"To indicate his influence with Commissioner Gruhin the recalcitrant employee, upon being informed by me of his suspension, answered: 'Don't kid yourself. I will be back working tomorrow morning.'"

"Secondly, Commissioner Gruhin, as an eminent member of the New Jersey bar, certainly should have displayed more legal discernment in settling the matter, even if he assumed that I was wrong, than by suspending me in turn. It is mere logic, that if my suspension of Fornoratto was justified, which seems proven by the fact that Gruhin did not revoke it, then Gruhin's suspension of me appears unjust, and must be based on other motives than the Commissioner's desire to uphold the working discipline in the department."

"If Fornoratto was right, he should have been immediately reinstated by the Commissioner. However, the Commissioner did not do so. It must be assumed therefore that his good friend, Fornoratto was definitely guilty of the charges I filed against him. By the same logic, if I was right, then my suspension by Commissioner Gruhin was obviously wrong. Can we all be right and wrong at the same time? And how can one have responsibility without adequate authority?"

"Nor can it be claimed, as Commissioner Gruhin did in last week's Belleville Times, that this employee's action did not seem severe enough to warrant his suspension. It is significant to note that Commissioner Gruhin failed to rescind the suspension. If Commissioner Gruhin is trying to suggest that I am a dictator, he is dead wrong because he admitted, that 'suspending our employees is not a regular habit.' Moreover, by Gruhin's own admission it has been five years since I took similar action. I have been superintendent of the department of public works for the past seven years, served previously as assistant superintendent, and altogether have been an employee of the department for more than 22 years."

"It is therefore obvious that Commissioner Gruhin's motives in his apparent unwarranted disciplinary action against me could be of a political nature. He certainly implies that himself when he states in The Belleville

The principal role of Radio Liberty is similar to Radio Free Europe but with different audiences. While Radio Free Europe broadcasts to the Communist satellite countries in Europe, Radio Liberty broadcasts to the Soviet Union in Russian and 17 other languages.

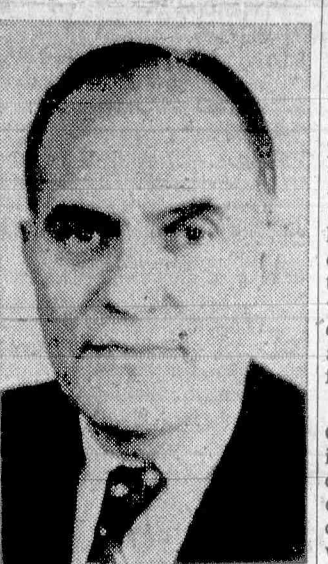
Radio Liberty maintains one of the most extensive radio monitoring systems in the world. All Soviet broadcasts directed to

the Soviet population are monitored to enable Radio Liberty to more effectively combat Soviet propaganda inside the U.S.S.R.

Headquarters of Radio Liberty are in Munich, Germany.

King attended public schools in New York, the Raymond Rioran Preparatory School in Highland, N.Y., and is a graduate of the Ohio State University School of Journalism, class of 1934.

After being graduated by Ohio State, he became an all-night disc-jockey at WEVD, New York and in 1940 joined the staff of WOR as a producer of such shows as those of Lena Horne, Cab Calloway and Helen Hayes.

In 1951 he went to Paris to head the American broadcasting activities in Western Europe for the Marshall Plan. Later he directed broadcasting for the United States Information Agency in Paris.

He later returned to the United States as program director for the Voice of America and after the formation of the American Committee for Liberation in 1956, he accepted the post of radio programming director for Radio Liberty.

Town To Replace Stadium Seats

Seating and rails at the municipal stadium will be repaired, Commissioner George Kiernan reported at the last Belleville Commission meeting. The board authorized expenditure of \$3,200 for the improvements and advertised for bids which will be received at the May 24 session.

According to Kiernan, about two-thirds of the stadium's seats will be replaced. The seating capacity is 4,200. Many seats and railings have become splintered by years of weathering.

Although the Rutgers Field Team which surveyed Belleville's school facilities has recommended the stadium area as a site for a new high school, the board of education has not endorsed the recommendation.
