Chamber Lists Its Objectives For Year Ahead

David Robbins, president of the Belleville Chamber of Commerce, recently made public a statement of objectives which the Chamber hopes to accomplish in the year ahead. Robbins said, "The Chamber of Commerce has spelled out ten objectives which we believe are necessary not only for the welfare of the Chamber of Commerce, but more important for the betterment of Belleville. Our purpose and policy are also defined in concise terms. The Chamber of Commerce will not be an instrument of political interference or action."

The purpose and policy as outlined by the organization are:

"An organization dedicated to the economic, social and cultural betterment of Belleville, its membership being open to every individual and organization living or working or rendering service within the Municipality -- freed from and not affiliated with politics as related to elective office at any level."

The ten objectives are:

1. Cooperation with the Municipal Government to the end that Belleville's citizens will enjoy administration.

2. Cooperation with the Board of Education to the end that Belleville's children will enjoy sound, economical, forward-looking education.

3. Cooperation with the Belleville Planning Board to the end that Belleville will become a more attractive area in which to shop, do business, manufacture and live.

4. Cooperation with all groups of citizens interested in promoting wide-spread citizen participation in efforts to promote the prestige of Belleville and the pride of its citizens in the community in which they live.

5. Cooperation with the Municipality in bringing about the establishment of adequate parking facilities conveniently located in shopping areas.

6. Cooperation with the New Jersey State Chamber of Commerce on matters of statewide importance.

7. Cooperation with the New Jersey Taxpayers' Association on matters relating to taxation at all levels.

8. Promotion participation in efforts to bring light, clean industry to Belleville in order to broaden and increase taxables.

9. Cooperation in efforts to improve transportation facilities.

10. Cooperation with the Belleville Planning Board to study redevelopment possibilities in Belleville."

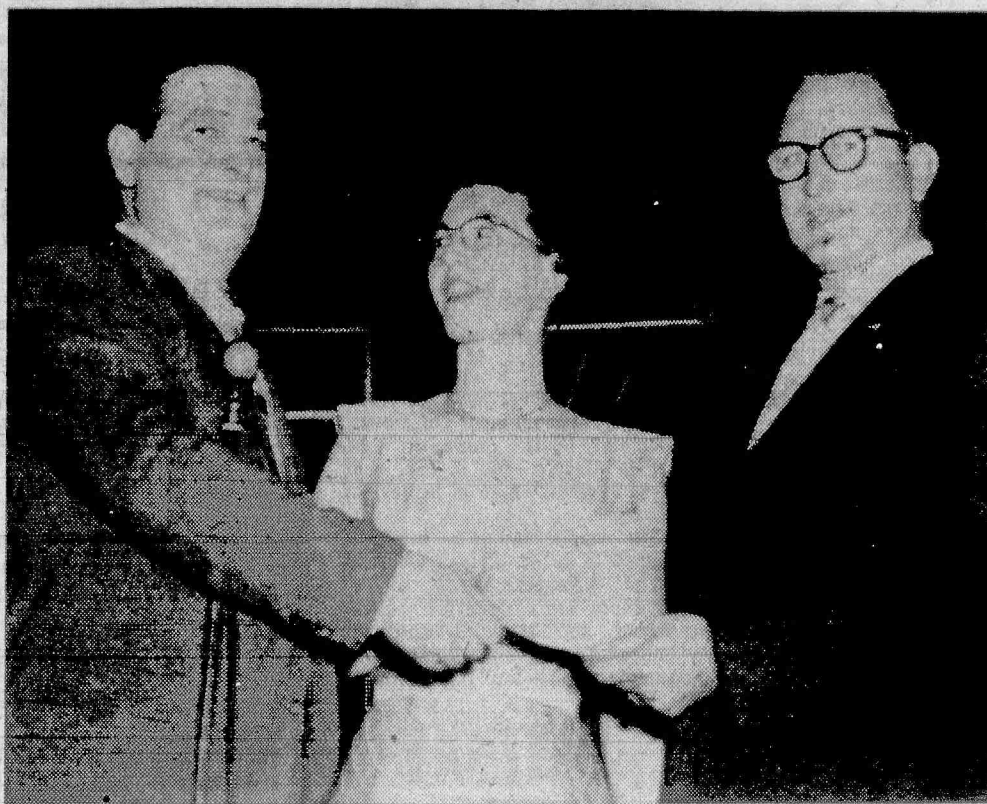
Will Resurface Cortlandt Street, Gruhin Reports

Zoning Board Grants Variance On Greylock Pky.

The board of adjustment granted two variances for conversion to two-family homes Tuesday night and then adjourned for the summer. Barring the possibility of an emergency session, the board's next meeting will be the first Tuesday in September.

Variances granted Tuesday night were to Mrs. E. J. Cunard and Mrs. R. R. Anderson both residing at 361 Greylock Parkway and to Jamers T. Serafini of 199 Main Street.

There were no objections, either from the audience or from the board itself in granting the variances which await the formal approval of the board of commissioners.

"Mrs. Cunard told the board that 'when we bought our house, we knew nothing about the zoning ordinance.' Their Greylock Parkway home is in an A-1 Zone where two-family houses are prohibited.

Building Inspector Thomas Greco had the pair appear before the board for the variance noting that "it looks to me as if work has already started up there."

Although board chairman S. John Coronato voted for the variance, he commented during the testimony, "you have lived in the home since 1958 and so far I have heard nothing to indicate there is a hardship."

Mosquito Control Starts Wednesday Throughout Town

Mosquito extermination work in Belleville will get underway for the summer months about June 15, Daniel Ilaria, chairman of the shade tree commission told The Belleville Times today.

The work will be done in all parts of town and will be performed by employees of the Belleville Shade Tree Commission.

"In order for this work to be successful," Ilaria said in an interview, "we must have the cooperation of Belleville residents." He gave what he called "the ten commandments for mosquito control."

Continuing, Ilaria said, "if the people pay heed to these 'ten commandments' we shouldn't have a mosquito problem in Belleville this year."

He listed the ten rules as follows:

1. Eliminate all standing water, (2) cover rain barrels with mosquito-proof screen, (3) seal cesspools tightly, (4) drain clogged roof gutters and flat roofs, (5) cut up or take away old tires, (6) tilt wheelbarrow to prevent its holding water, (7) oil sewer inlets, cisterns or excavations weekly, (8) change water in troughs, fountains and bird baths twice weekly, (9) empty or crush cans and other water-holding receptacles and (10) be sure that screens fit tightly, that doors open out and that screen mesh is not larger than 16 to the inch."

STEP-UP PROGRAM

Ilaria said that while Belleville will resort to the same methods employed last year, use of a machine which spreads a fog of insecticide, "we will increase our program and do a lot more of the so-called fogging this year."

The fogging operation will be done Mondays through Fridays starting at 6 p.m. and continuing to dusk. However, Ilaria reports that "if the situation warrants it, we'll be spraying on Saturdays also."

Residents noting infested areas overlooked by the sprayers may contact the shade tree commission by telephoning the Belleville Town Hall at Plymouth 9-9100.

Members of the shade tree commission, in addition to Ilaria, are Mrs. Irene Whittemore, secretary, and Harry Bennett, Victor Pomponio. Activity of the shade tree commission is under the direction of Commissioner Nuncio R. Pico, department of public affairs.

No Room for Police Union, Belleville PBA Delegate Says

"There is no room for a union in police work" Bernard J. Tinsdale, Belleville PBA delegate to the state council said today. But Tinsdale did say that "it's a sad state of affairs when some clerks are paid more than police sergeants and lieutenants."

Speaking in behalf of PBA Local 28, Tinsdale said that "our organization is on record as opposed to any union for policemen."

Tinsdale gave a warning when he described Newark's police force as being "vulnerable" to an organizing effort by a union because of that city's low salaries, lowest in Essex County and among the lowest in New Jersey.

"It is this kind of a climate that stimulates union activity," Tinsdale said. "Municipal officials are going to have to recognize the problem and offer incentives-through better pay and allowances or they must face the fact that their men are vulnerable to union efforts."

He said that "we have continually warned that low pay for policemen would leave them open to the temptation of joining some

Highway Department Begins Area Transportation Survey

New Jersey State Highway Department started a month-long series of on-the-spot interviews Monday with drivers of vehicles entering and leaving Newark as part of an overall transportation study of Newark now underway by the department.

Survey teams of the department will stop drivers for one-minute quizzes that are aimed at determining the origin, destination, and nature of the trip.

A group of college students were stopping motorists at the Newark-Belleville line in Mount Prospect Avenue Monday between 3 and 6 p.m. About 1,000

motorists entering Belleville Monday were stopped and questioned by the team.

The majority of interviews will be conducted at approximately 40 key locations that form a corridor around the city. Some, however, will be held in downtown Newark as drivers park their vehicles.

Approximately 30 employees split into several survey teams will be engaged in conducting the interviews. The number assigned to each survey station will vary depending upon the anticipated traffic volumes to be encountered at each location.

The teams will operate only on weekdays between 3 and 6 p.m. Local police will cooperate in handling traffic at the interview sites. According to a Highway Department spokesman, interference to traffic movement will be kept to a minimum and vehicles will be "waved through" if they appear in numbers greater than the survey team can handle without undue delay.

The Newark Area Transportation study was begun as the result of several conferences between Newark, State Highway Department and Federal Bureau of Public Road officials. Its purpose is to get the complete picture on the city's existing transportation habits and needs.

The information gathered will be useful to both the city in its long-range redevelopment campaign and to the State and Federal road agencies in planning and facilities.

The State Highway Department expects that the overall study will require approximately seven months to complete.

Vandals Break Into Dutch Reformed Church, Inflict Minor Damage

Vandals broke into the Dutch Reformed Church in Belleville last Wednesday and inflicted minor damage to the church office. Police said the church itself was not desecrated.

Police said that a penny bank was broken into, but no money was taken, an imitation wedding cake was broken and the minister's desk blotter and an envelope containing dividend checks were torn and scattered about the office.

Rev. Thomas Ten Hoeve, pastor of the church which is located at the corner of Rutgers and Main Streets, reported the entry. A small back door window had been broken, police said.

A grandson of the Parsells was graduated from the West Point Academy this month.

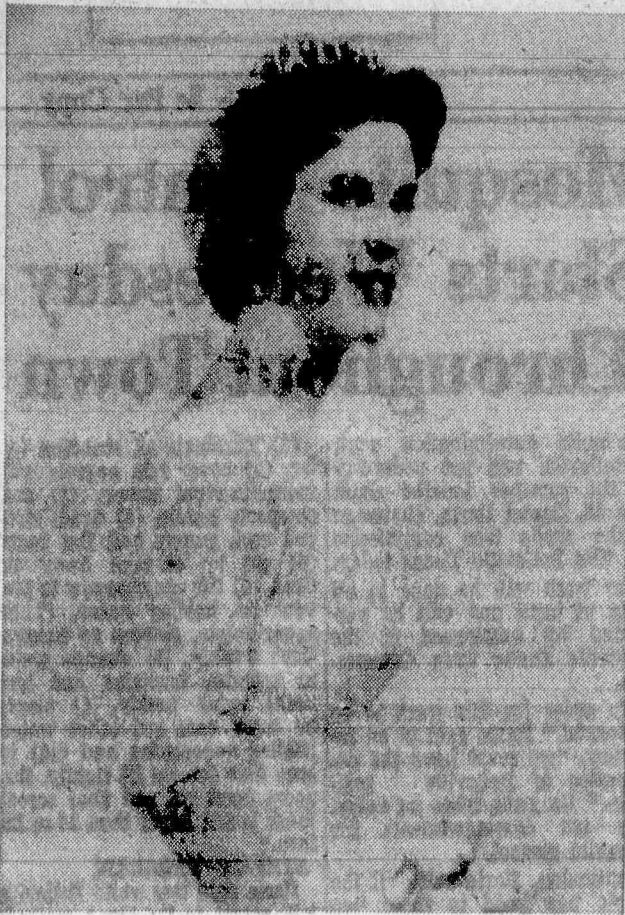

N.J.Scholarship Commission Awards 18 Grants At BHS

The New Jersey State Scholarship Commission has awarded scholarships to 18 Belleville High School seniors, it was announced Monday.

A total of 2,252 grants were made to members of the graduating classes of secondary schools in the state in the second group of scholarships granted under the program which went into effect last July 27.

The 18 local students will receive \$400 or the amount of tuition at the college they will attend, whichever amount is less. The Belleville students receive the award for a four-year period provided they remain in full-time college attendance and maintain a satisfactory academic record.

Awards are based upon demonstrated financial need and scholastic ability as determined by a qualifying examination. In addition, the law provides that a successful applicant must have been a resident of New Jersey for a period of not less than 12 months immediately preceding the date of his application, that he must be graduated from high school within a period not greater than one year from the date of his application (except for time spent in the Armed Forces of the United States), and must have demonstrated high moral character, good citizenship, and dedication to American ideals. Also, he must enroll in an approved college as a full-time student.

For the awards now being announced, a total of 6,512 students filed preliminary applications with 3,748 completing the application process. The scholarship law provides that not more than 15 per cent of the total number of scholarships available may go to students who attend college outside the state. On this basis, 431 scholarship awards were available to students in college outside New Jersey.

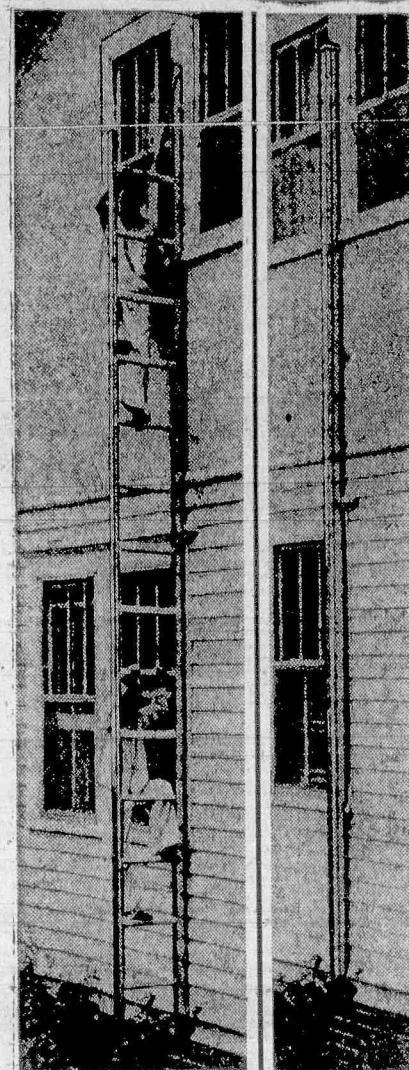

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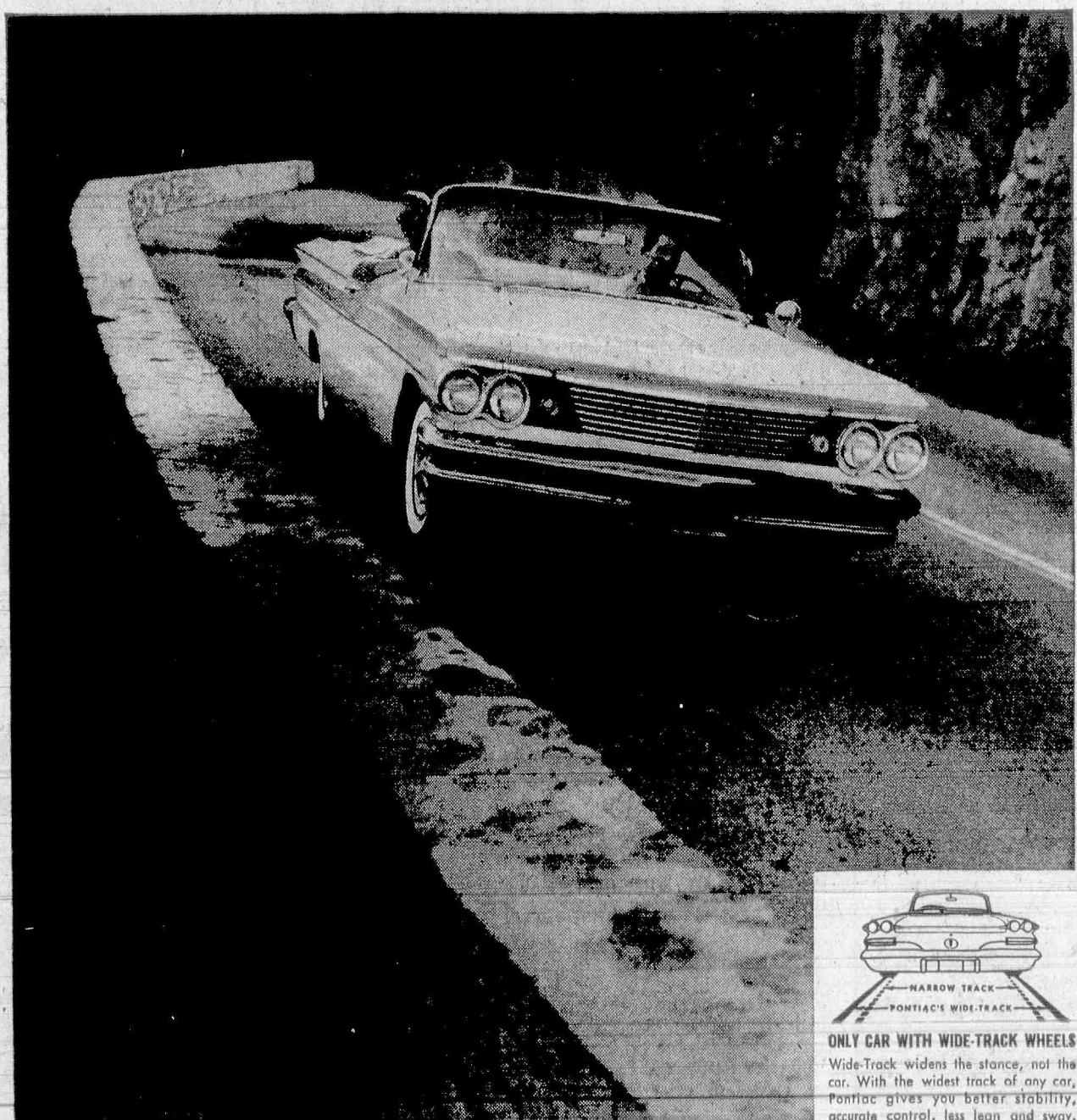
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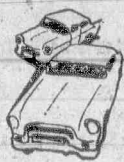

Rockefeller And Kennedy

In one sense of the political word, Governor Nelson Rockefeller of New York and Senator John Kennedy of Massachusetts, are encountering similar political pressure.

Asked for a comment on this statement, Governor Rockefeller said that the remark had not changed his mind "in the slightest."

On the Democratic side, Senator John Kennedy is battling pressure that he run in the second spot on the Democratic ticket. There are those who fear that Kennedy's Catholicism will be a dangerous gamble in the 1960 campaign.

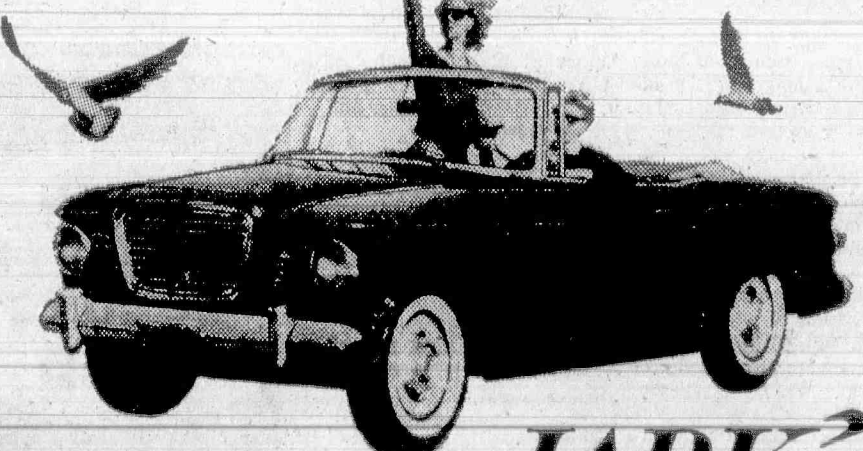

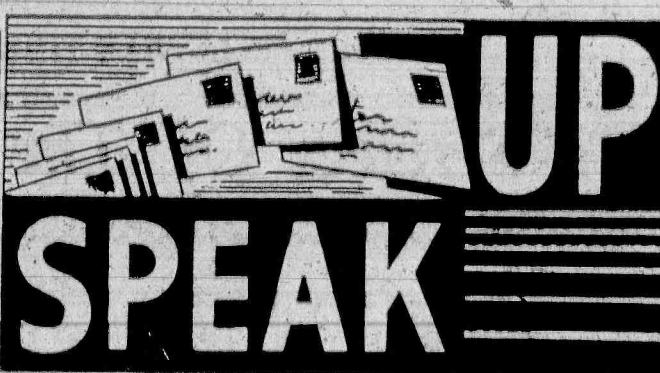

Gilby, president of the association. This is the second dividend increase for De Witt of the year.

"The anticipated dividend extra is in addition to our regular annual rate of three and one-half percent," Mr. Gilby pointed out. 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On September 8, 1959 an application was filed for state aid by the commissioner for the resurfacing of Cortlandt Street. Subsequently a communication was received from Commissioner Dwight R. G. Palmer of the State Highway, to the effect that the application was being returned "not approved."

On February 13 last, the Commissioner again wrote Senator Fox as follows:

Dear Senator:

You will recall that on June 11 last I forwarded you a copy of a letter sent by me on that date to Commissioner Palmer with respect to the damage done to Cortlandt Street, Belleville, during the construction of Route 21 Freeway, from truck traffic re-routed to that street. At that time I asked the commissioner if it would be possible for any additional state aid funds to be allocated to Belleville to take care of the resurfacing of this street.

On June 19 you replied and enclosed a copy of letter which you had sent to Commissioner Palmer, suggesting that if it were not possible for the State Highway Department to allot funds for 1959 that it bear it in mind for allocation in connection with the Herrick Funds in 1960.

In the meantime, Mr. Faxon, of the State Highway Department, advised that all state aid funds, which were made available, had been allocated. He forwarded forms to be filled out for the Cortlandt Street project, which forms were returned immediately.

Will you please do all you possibly can to see that funds are allotted for this project without any further delay.

GOOD REPLY . . .

Dauntlessly, Commissioner Gruhn again contacted Senator Fox and Commissioner Palmer, practically begging the state's

financial assistance for the resurfacing of Cortlandt Street. On May 25 last the very pleasant news was received by Commissioner Gruhn that the state was allocating the sum of \$7,500 to Belleville as the state's share in this reconstruction project. An ordinance was immediately introduced at a town commission meeting appropriating the full amount of the construction cost of \$10,600. Thus with the state aid allotment of \$7,500, the cost for the resurfacing of Cortlandt Street to the town of Belleville will be \$3,100. This, we feel, should be brought to the attention of the Belleville taxpayers.

Enrichment courses are being offered in mathematics, science, English, typewriting, reading improvement (7-12), and art. The topics to be covered in mathematics, science, and English are topics which are not usually included in a high school curriculum. These courses are for the very able juniors and seniors.

Students who are not reading at their grade level will find the reading improvement course for grades 7-12 invaluable.

Art is being offered for those students having interest and ability in art.

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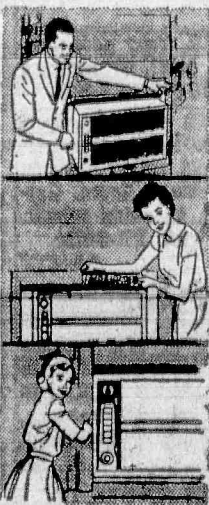
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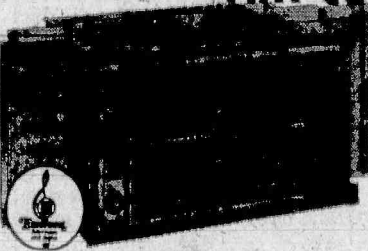
