In one sense of the political word, Governor Nelson Rockefeller of New York and Senator John Kennedy of Massachusetts, are encountering similar political

Governor Nelson Rockefeller is the choice of most Republicans as the Vice-Presidential nominee in 1960. He is, of course, the preference of some for the top spot on the G.O.P. ticket, but it is generally acknowledged that Vice President Richard Nixon has this practically in the bag.

Mr. Nixon recently came closer to calling for Rockefeller's assent to run with him than he ever had before. The Vice President noted that a majority of Republican leaders believed a Nixon-Rockefeller ticket would be the strongest the party could offer in 1960.

Asked for a comment on this statement, Governor Rockefeller said that the remark had not changed his mind "in the slightest."

On the Democratic side, Senator John Kennedy is battling pressure that he run in the second spot on the Democratic ticket. There are those who fear that Kennedy's Catholicism will be a dangerous gamble in the 1960 campaign.




