

The Rev. Benedetto Pascale At Silver Lake Baptist Church Is Marking 46th Anniversary

Plan Father's Day Service
Friends Will Give Him Car

The Rev. Benedetto Pascale, pastor of the Silver Lake Baptist Church, will be honored in a special Father's Day service at the church this Sunday. The service will recognize Mr. Pascale's 46 years of service as pastor of the Belleville Church.

A highlight of the day will be the presentation of a new automobile to the pastor by the members and groups of the church and their many friends throughout town.

The Rev. Pascale was graduated 44 years ago this Sunday, was ordained a Baptist minister from the Divinity School of Colgate University, now the Colgate-Rochester Divinity School. He started in the mission work in 1914 as a student of pastor when he was associated with the First Baptist Church of Bloomfield.

The pastor, well-known throughout town, was chosen Belleville's leading citizen in 1942 "for outstanding service to public education in Essex County."

FRIENDLY HOUSE
There are several important and interesting dates in this man's life. In 1930 for example, the Friendly House opened its doors to youth of all religions. The Friendly House today has an indoor swimming pool, gymnasium and bowling alleys where are often used in town-sponsored recreational activities.

Silver Lake Baptist Church has always carried on a social and recreational program for the entire community. It's interesting to keep in mind that the Friendly House and playground was constructed by voluntary labors.

Another award was given the church in 1929 when the American Baptist Home Mission Society presented its silver-loving

cup "in recognition of (the church's) having attained self-support."

The late Mrs. Pascale, during the 40 years she lived at the parsonage, always had an open house for friendly advice and service to all people. She was a fine harpist and a good friend of all.

Ordinances Total \$129,000 Tuesday; Half Would Install New 12-Inch Water Mains

Construction and improvement projects costing more than \$129,000 were proposed in ordinances introduced or passed at Tuesday's meeting of the Belleville Board of Commissioners. The biggest project planned is the installation of a 12-inch water mains along portions of Washington Avenue; this work will cost approximately \$62,000.

Public Works Commissioner Robert Gruhin said that a fire hazard has forced the town to make the new installations. He noted that there have been two recent fires in the industrial district near the Nutley line in recent weeks. One fire was at Sonneborn, the other at General Dynamics.

Gruhin said the water pressure has reached the critical point and is not adequate for proper fire-fighting control.

Installation of new water mains was recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters which surveyed the town about a year ago.

Basically, the new mains will supplement a six-inch pipe running along the easterly side of Washington Avenue. The new 12-inch main will eventually run

the entire length of Washington Avenue on the westerly side. Gruhin noted that most of the work will actually be done under the sidewalks and added that the under-the-road work will be done first before the state highway department re-paves the avenue, a project reportedly scheduled for later this year.

The initial ordinance, introduced Tuesday, provides for additions to the water system by the construction of mains from Little Street to the Nutley line.

The under-the-street connections with the old line will be made 800 feet north of Greylock Parkway at the Nutley line and at Little Street. Public hearing on this ordinance is set for June 28.

AMBULANCES
Another ordinance requests a new 1960 ambulance with equipment to replace the fire chief's vehicle and the erection of a fire tower at the rear of fire headquarters. These items will cost about \$25,000 and the ordinance was passed on final reading this week.

Due to the installation of new heating and electrical systems at

The second effort of the Belleville Master Barbers' Association to force the town commissioners to pass a law closing all shops on Wednesday failed Tuesday night. Instead of flatly denying the association's request, the entire matter has been shelved somewhere in the health department where it is "being studied further."

School Board Meeting Moved Up One Week - Will Meet Monday

The regular meeting of the board of education has been moved up a week for this month. The Belleville board will meet next Monday night at 8 o'clock instead of on the fourth Monday of the month.

A special meeting will also be held next Tuesday night at 8 o'clock at which time board members will meet with the citizens' committee studying the Rutgers Report of the Belleville school system.

A formal resolution concerning the Rutgers Report will probably be introduced at next Tuesday's session.

Boy 10, Says He Set Fire In Belleville

A 10-year-old Belleville boy has been arrested by police on the charge of setting a two-alarm blaze which routed four families and injured a fireman June 8 at 23 Dow Street.

Deputy Fire Chief James Murray said the fire probably started in the basement where furniture was stored. Damage, he said, was confined mostly to the basement.

According to Detective Michael Marotti, the 10-year-old boy has been in frequent trouble with police. He also admitted setting a fire in a confessional box at St. Peter's Church two months ago. Marotti said the boy admitted taking matches from a box in a supermarket and then going to the Dow Street building where he ignited a sheet covering a box of Christmas ornaments in the cellar.

Marotti said the boy was unable to explain why the fires were set. He has been brought up on charges of breaking parking meters and entering parked cars.

Fireman Theodore DelGross, 32, driver of engine number seven suffered a finger injury while fighting the fire and was treated by town physician, Dr. Martin Meehan.

The building on Dow Street is owned by Mrs. Roseanna DiMaio of Hackettstown.

Salvatore L. Vecere of 360 Belleville Avenue, president of the master barbers' association, noted that other area towns have passed similar ordinances requiring all shops to close on a specified day, usually Wednesday in the county. "All we want is a five-day work week," Vecere said.

Mayor Isadore Padula spoke for the commissioners saying first that other towns "were probably pressured into passing their ordinances by petitions." He quickly added that if Belleville requires all barbers to stop clipping on Wednesdays, "it would be the same as if we told the A&P that it must close every Tuesday."

The mayor later asked the question, "Do you commissioners see any difference between a barber and a shoemaker?"

While most barbers in Belleville close Wednesdays, one does close on Monday. Avoiding a direct answer to the question whether or not the association's requested ordinance is designed to force the one shop to close Wednesday, Vecere said "no, it's for the future."

Commissioner Robert Gruhin said he would go along with an ordinance forcing shops to close one day a week providing the day was left unspecified and up to the discretion of each individual barbershop.

"What's the basis of weekday closings anyway?" Gruhin asked. "I can see the religious reasons for closing on a Saturday or Sunday, but why a Wednesday?"

None of the five commissioners expressed any hope the requested ordinance would be introduced let alone passed.

Belleville Man In \$1,000 Bail After Wild Chase

A local man in a stolen car was arrested last Thursday night after leading seven East Orange patrol cars on a wild chase through the southern portion of the city.

He was identified as Irving T. Carver Jr., 21, of 200 Franklin Avenue, Belleville and charged with auto larceny, leaving the scene of an accident, reckless driving and failing to heed an officer's signal. He was held in \$1,000 bail.

The car he was driving was reported stolen Sunday, June 5, while parked in Prospect Street by the owner, Harry Schenkel of 270 South Harrison Street, East Orange, police said. It was spotted at 7:25 Thursday night by Sergeant William Connelly at Main and Walnut Streets.

The stolen car kept going and turned into Lenox Avenue. Carver slowed down and leaped from it as the vehicle crashed into a tree in front of No. 11, then rolled into a traffic sign.

The driver was trapped a few minutes later by Patrolman Carmen Longo, who found Carver hiding in the basement of an apartment building at 4 Carnegie Avenue. The chase covered almost two miles, police said.

Lt. Harold Patterson said Carver is free on federal parole for auto larceny charges committed in Ohio.

PUBLIC WORKS INVESTIGATION

The New Jersey Civil Service Commission is currently investigating Commissioner Robert Gruhin's Department of Public Works. The inquiry is confined to the alleged dilution of the job of Superintendent of Public Works. Ralph Vara has been the superintendent for the past eight years.

Since Gruhin's election in 1958, Vara has seen his authority in the Public Works department whittled down to a point where he is no longer discharging the duties of his office as outlined in the ordinance which created the post and as defined by the New Jersey Civil Service Commission.

If Gruhin has in fact relieved Vara of major duties which by law repose in the title of Superintendent of Public Works, it is high time our citizens were told the facts. If investigation proves otherwise, Commissioner Gruhin should be cleared of the unwritten charge of stripping a major public official whose functions include major municipal responsibilities.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that the following ordinance was passed on second and final reading as amended at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville held Tuesday evening June 14, 1960 having been read in its final form at least one week prior thereto and is therefore now a law and hereby published according to law.

AN ORDINANCE TO IMPROVE THE FIRE DEPARTMENT, APPROPRIATING THE SUM OF \$25,000.00 THEREFOR, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES FOR SAID PURPOSE.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, do ordain:

Section 1. That improvement be made in the Fire Department by the purchase of the following equipment:

1. One (1) new 1960 Ambulance with equipment;
2. One (1) New 1960 Vehicle to be used as Ambulance.
3. Erection of Fire Tower at rear of Fire Headquarters-material and labor.

Section 2. It is hereby determined and declared that it is necessary that the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, shall raise money for the purpose above set forth, and that the estimated maximum amount of money necessary to be raised from all sources for said purpose is \$25,000, and that the estimated maximum amount of notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$23,750.00.

Section 3. To finance said purpose there is appropriated the sum of \$1250.00, which sum has been made available for said purpose in previously adopted budgets of said Town, under the caption of "Capital Improvement Fund" in said previous budgets.

Section 4. To finance said purpose there shall be issued, pursuant to the Local Bond Act of the State of New Jersey, in anticipation of the issuance of bonds, Bond Anticipation Notes of said Town, which shall not exceed in aggregate principal amount of sum of \$23,750.00. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6 per cent) per annum and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Act. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 5. Not more than \$150.00 of the sum to be raised by the issuance of said notes may be used to finance interest on obligations issued to finance said purpose, whether temporary or permanent, or to finance engineering or inspection costs and legal expenses, or to finance the cost of the issuance of such obligations as provided in Section 40:1-55 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of the purpose for the financing of which said notes are to be issued is a period of 5 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 7. No part of the cost of making said improvement has been or is to be specially assessed against property specially benefited thereby.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and declared that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Act has been duly made and filed in the Office of the Town Clerk of said Town, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Town as defined in Section 40:1-76 of Revised Statutes is increased by this ordinance by \$23,750.00, and that the issuance of said notes is permitted by an exception to the debt limitations prescribed by said Revised Statutes contained in Subdivision (d) of Section 40:1-16 of said Revised Statutes of New Jersey.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6 per cent) per annum and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Act. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 5. Not more than \$2000.00 of the sum to be raised by the issuance of said notes may be used to finance interest on obligations issued to finance said purpose, whether temporary or permanent, or to finance engineering or inspection costs and legal expenses, or to finance the cost of the issuance of such obligations as provided in Section 40:1-55 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of the purpose for the financing of which said notes are to be issued is a period of 15 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 7. No part of the cost of making said improvement has been or is to be specially assessed against property specially benefited thereby.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and declared that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Act has been duly made and filed in the Office of the Town Clerk of said Town, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Town as defined in Section 40:1-76 of Revised Statutes is increased by this ordinance by \$21,375.00, and that the issuance of said notes is permitted by an exception to the debt limitations prescribed by said Revised Statutes contained in Subdivision (d) of Section 40:1-16 of said Revised Statutes of New Jersey.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

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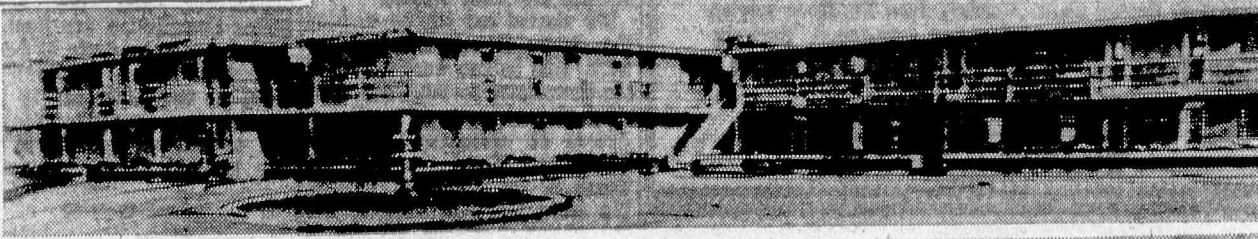

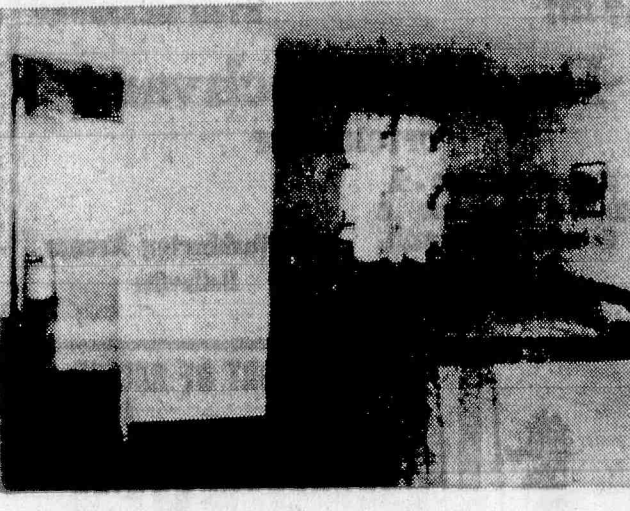

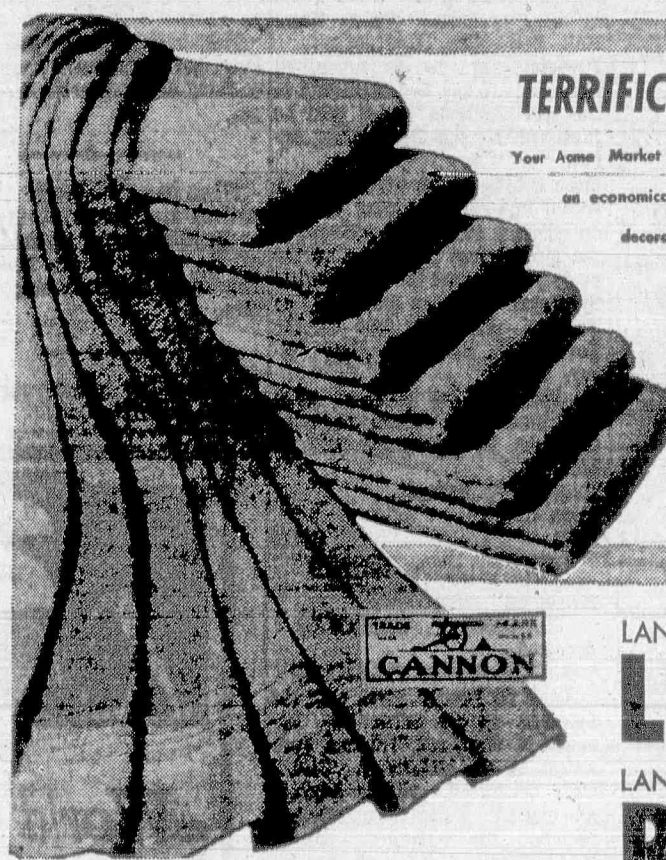

the firehouse, a sum of \$22,500 has been requested "for the erection of a second floor over garage of fire headquarters to house the kitchen, recreation room and office." The sum also includes the replacing of existing heating equipment and all electrical fixtures throughout the William Street firehouse.

Gruhin reported Tuesday that the two street sweeping machines are "in poor condition." He said that a repair bill due soon on a 13-year-old machine will come to approximately \$1,000.

In an ordinance with public hearing scheduled for June 28, Gruhin is asking for \$14,500 for the purchase of a motor pick up sweeper.

Belleville presently has a 13-year-old Elgin machine and a Wayne sweeper which is seven years old. Gruhin said that little if any money could be gained by trading the old machines toward a new one.

SANITARY SEWER

June 28 is also the date of the public hearing on an ordinance providing for the construction of an eight-inch sanitary sewer, manhole and house laterals in Morse Place. The lines would be extensions from a manhole 250 feet away. A total sum of \$1,500 has been appropriated for the project. The new line would serve one home and several town-owned tracts.

Finally, an ordinance appropriating \$1,300 for the construction of traffic signals at Franklin Avenue and Belmont Avenue was introduced Tuesday. The bill also authorizes the issuance of bond anticipation notes for the project. Public hearing on the traffic signal plan is June 28.

School Board Debates Thomas' Right-to-Hire

Superintendent of Schools Evan Thomas may be running into his first major conflict with the newly-elected board of education.

Indications of a conflict came up Monday night when the board considered a resolution authorizing Thomas to grant contracts to personnel for teaching vacancies occurring during the summer, the contracts would be later confirmed by the board and the appointments made by Thomas would be made with the knowledge of the president or vice-president of the school board.

The resolution passed Monday night but board members have some reservations and plan to

thrash out the subject of the superintendent's authority to hire teachers on the spot at a future meeting.

New Jersey statutes technically state that the board of education must do all hiring of personnel. But as Thomas said Monday, "the board has to delegate responsibility." He said that Belleville board members are fortunate in being able to take as active a part in hiring teachers as it does now. "In Newark, for example, there are so many teachers to hire that the board couldn't possibly do all the hiring and therefore it has delegated its responsibility to the superintendent," Thomas said.

WHY A QUESTION?

Thomas explained that during the summer months, it is imperative to be in a position to offer a contract to a prospective teacher immediately after an interview.

"If I must tell a person she has to wait 48 or 72 hours for the board to confirm the contract, she will be offered another job before the board even meets because in other towns the superintendent does the hiring."

Once the discussion had gotten underway on the subject Monday night, Thomas suddenly interjected the remark, "This is fantastic. For nine years I have been able to do this and all of a sudden this becomes a legal complication. It's an obstruction to good education."

Thomas said that Montclair and East Orange even "send principals on recruiting trips who return with signed contracts."

Attorney Max Schwartz noted that the board reserves the right to not approve a contract grant.

Barbers Bark Back at Attitude Of Commission

The Belleville Master Barbers Association this week sent a stiff letter to the board of commissioners criticizing the board's attitude toward the association's request for an ordinance to limit barbershop operation to a five-day week.

A copy of the letter was given to The Belleville Times.

The Belleville barbers' group is asking the town commissioners to pass a law which would force all barber shops to close every Wednesday. The board referred the matter to Commissioner Nuncio Pico's department of public health "for further study."

Salvatore L. Vicere, of 360 Belleville Avenue, president of the barbers' association, wrote the letter this week to the commissioners "to clarify our request."

Vicere said that the board "apparently forgot about the State Statute at the last meeting when misleading and baseless comments were made." The statute he refers to was passed in 1927 and authorizes municipal governments to regulate hours and holidays of barber shops according to a petition submitted by a majority of barber shop owners within the municipality.

The majority of town barbers are members of the Belleville Master Barbers' Association.

Vicere calls Mayor Padula's reference made at the last meeting to the A&P "misleading." Padula had said that if Belleville requires all barbers to close on Wednesdays, "it would be the same as if we told the A&P that it must close every Tuesday."

The barbers' association president said the comment made by Padula "gives the public the wrong opinion." His letter noted that "only if the A&P had received the same right by legisla-

Start Plans to Revamp Entire Belleville School System

Evan Thomas Hoping For Drastic Improvement

Superintendent of Schools Evan Thomas delivered a revealing and emotional talk on Belleville's existing educational program and the hopes for the future during Tuesday's board of education meeting.

Thomas was prompted by the Citizens' Tax Council and his talk was made largely in response to statements made early in the meeting by the council's president, Salvatore Calabro.

Calabro stated that he computed "Belleville's school system is operating at 50 per cent capacity." He said he computed the percentage by taking the number of existing classrooms as reported in the Rutgers survey and averaging 25 pupils per room as recommended by the State Board of Education.

Thomas rose to his feet and stated that "First of all, it's very easy to prove that, according to the space used in the elementary grades, we do not need any more room. This is true -- if all we want are classrooms." He added that if schools had only classrooms, there would be no provision for such things as libraries,

Additional Details Will Appear Next Thursday; Tax Council Takes Stand

Next week's Belleville Times will carry in greater detail the position of the Citizens' Tax Council as presented Tuesday concerning the resolution passed on a new high school by the board of education. Basically, the tax council is not opposed to a new school but attacks the method being used to resolve Belleville's educational program. Next week's paper will also have other information not yet revealed concerning the proposed high school.

Tuesday night settled the first in a long series of questions presented by the school building study made by Rutgers University. By resolution, board members decided that Belleville needs a new high school.

Many of those attending Tuesday's meeting, including four representatives of the Citizens' Tax Council asked, "what are the details?" Actually, the details of a new high school are few; Tuesday's resolution merely was the first step in formulating a complete revamping of this town's educational system.

The site of any new high school will probably come up early next month.

Before the questions concerned with a new high school and other changes in the educational program of Belleville are put in the form of a referendum for voters, a lot of work remains. In fact Mrs. Violet Rochau, president, said that she expects it will be a year before the study is ready for the voters' approval or rejection.

So far, the one resolution passed is concerned with a new 1,000 pupil high school and the construction of multi-purpose rooms at schools one and four. The present high school would be converted to a junior high school.

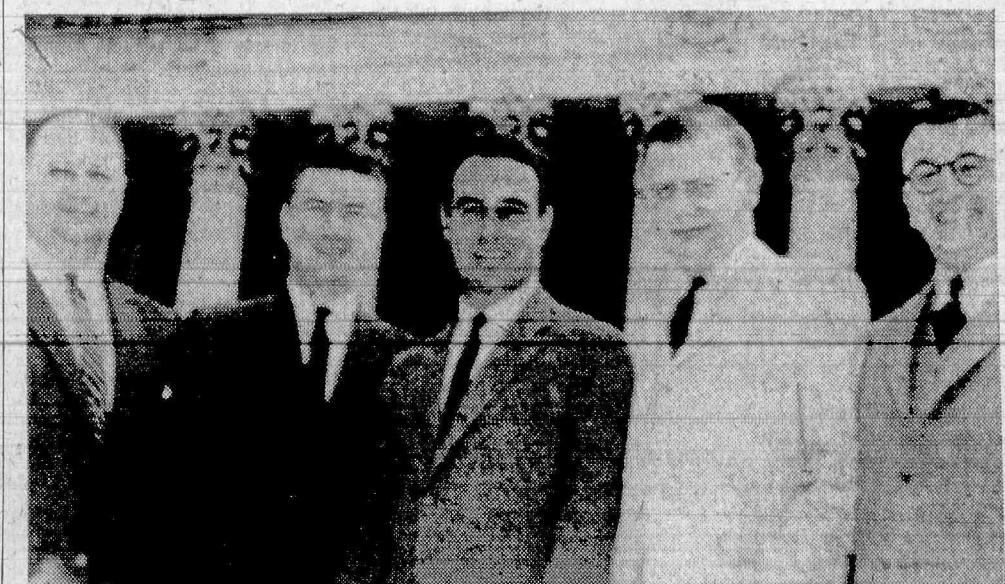
