First News Report, 1916

We copied from "The Independent Press and Bloomfield Citizen's for June 23, 1916, under the topic "Church News" the following:

"In spite of the rain the Silver Lake Chapel was crowded on Monday evening (June 19, 1916) to witness the ordination to the Baptist Ministry of Mr. Benedetto Pascale, pastor who graduated last month from the Divinity School of Colgate University, and who has given Saturdays and Sundays to the work of the Chapel for two years (he came September 25, 1914). The service was almost entirely in the Italian language, and was very impressive. Rev. Henry S. Potter, D.D., presided and Mr. N. O. Wilhem of Orange, N. J., reported the finding of the Permanent Council in accord with which the ordination service was held. Rev. Ariel Bellondi of Haverhill, Mass., preached the ordination sermon, and eight other clergymen took part in the service. The brass band connected with the Chapel furnished the music. The Choir of the Italian Baptist Church of Newark, N. J., sang an anthem, and Miss Ethel C. Severence sang in Italian. The members of the congregation surprised Mr. Pascale by presenting to him an excellent pulpit suit in which to be ordained.
