Our streets aren't what they used to be." They are dirty. And one doesn't have to hire a private eye to make this discovery either. Nor do we need 20-20 vision. Perhaps the condition is the fault of no one. Maybe our Public Works Department does not have enough men or equipment. The cost to provide them may be prohibitive.

Our streets lack modern lighting. The installation of modern street lighting along our business sections will redound to the benefit of our shoppers, our merchants and our community. There are many advantages to be gained by the installation of more adequate and modern street lighting.
