Kidde Reveals New Type Alarm Now Available

A new capacitance alarm designed to guard safes, filing cabinets, and other metal objects which can be insulated from the ground has been introduced by Kidde Ultrasonic and Detection Alarms, Inc. Called Prox-O-Larm, it is approved by Underwriters' Laboratories.

Prox-O-Larm can be used to protect up to 40 standard filing cabinets and can be adjusted to trigger an alarm signal when an intruder approaches to within a few inches of the protected object or to trigger on actual contact only. The alarm signal is transmitted by a single pole double throw relay with contacts so arranged as to open or close any alarm circuit, making the equipment suitable to trigger a local alarm or to transmit an alarm signal to a central station.

Power for over 2,000 hours of operation is provided by self-contained dry cells, or the unit can be powered by a 12 volt bell-ringing transformer, in which case the dry cells will function as automatic standby power.

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## OUR STREETS — DIRTY AND POORLY LIGHTED

Our streets aren't what they used to be. They are dirty. And one doesn't have to hire a private eye to make this discovery either. Nor do we need 20-20 vision. Perhaps the condition is the fault of no one. Maybe our Public Works Department does not have enough men or equipment. The cost to provide them may be prohibitive.

The point we wish to make is that dirty streets do not help build the spirit of civic pride in the minds of our citizens. And Civic Pride is one commodity we can ill afford to do without.

Our streets lack modern lighting. The installation of modern street lighting along our business sections will redound to the benefit of our shoppers, our merchants and our community. There are many advantages to be gained by the installation of more adequate and modern street lighting.

One can measure the benefit of good street lighting eight ways. It saves lives by reducing night-time traffic fatalities, sometimes almost one hundred per cent. It cuts crime — on a nation-wide average — by at least 40 per cent. Better lighting reduces traffic accidents — at night, frequently by 50 per cent or more. It increases real estate values. It helps

business by increasing night activity and window shopping. It increases civic pride. It saves taxpayers money by reducing accident costs — savings may amount to three times the cost. And most certainly it helps the police and fire department.

## WE WANT A JUDGESHIP

The New Jersey Legislature recently enacted legislation permitting the appointment of four more District Court Judges for Essex County. Governor Robert Meyner has signed the measure into law.

Governor Meyner has promised to continue bipartisan appointments to the judiciary. The Governor must make the appointments with the advice and consent of the New Jersey Senate. In practice the home-county senator must approve the judicial appointments otherwise a stalemate develops.

In Essex County, the able Democratic Senator, Donal Fox will be consulted by Meyner before the newly created vacancies are filled. In the memory of old timers our community never has been honored with a high judicial appointment. In this regard the northeast corner of Essex County simply doesn't exist, that is — except when it comes time to count our votes.

Both Meyner and Fox now have the opportunity to right this wrong. Since there are four vacancies — equally divided between the Republicans and Democrats — surely there resides an attorney among us who will merit the high honor of sitting as a member of the Essex County District Court.

Carolyn, now completing her sophomore year in Belleville High School, has been studying music seven years, the last five with Mrs. Adell Williams.

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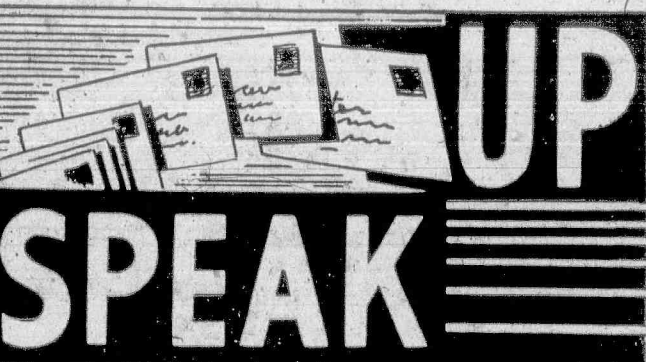

## Placing The Blame

To the Editor:

I am still fuming under the label that some one is trying to pin on me as false. Some of Dr. Walling's statements at both meetings have been very confusing many other citizens' interested in the School issue have questioned him on that score, that includes the name of the School, which is the Jr. or Senior High, but that is immaterial, it still is a New High School, and the People want the facts. If the Price tag Placed on the new School is \$2,070,000 dollars which Dr. Walling has stated many times it was, before the Public, its a good price. but it Now has created more confusing, since some one now says its false, if this new school will only increase our tax rate 18 Points the People will go for it, and so will I but that is just the interest, which I Place at 30 Points. 5 per cent of 3 Million dollars. thats questionable.

In 1955 the board of Education made the mistake of trying to sell the People a \$3,290,000 Dollar high School, that cost was also in error, by \$1,195,000 Dollars; or a new estimate of \$4,485,000 dollars, the school board met in an emergency session with the firm of Emil Schmidlin of E. Orange who Presented the New figure. Mrs. Rachou can verify this to be a fact. Main reason for the increase to the new figure was cited by the architect as an increase in building cost since the original estimate was made, increased costs for Construction of the basement area, which requires special support because the site of the School is in a so called Bog area, near the Municipal Stadium, also the furniture which was not included in the initial estimate.

Dr. Palmer D Burke a board member declared he would recommend the Board reject the building and re consider the entire Project, which they did. No doubt the Board was guided in its thinking by the 1950 Columbia

survey which recommended the vicinity, and was Paid several thousand Dollars for its work, the People rejected it as too costly and expensive. Dr. Walling has stated that his service for the New School is free, but is anyone Paying for the survey. Emil Schmidlin the architect in 1955 who drew the Plans is very good in that field, and much sought in School Construction. I understand he was Paid \$10,000 dollars for the Drawings, if the School was Approved he would have received \$180,000 Dollars or a 36 Point increase in our tax rate in his Commission of 5 per cent of the Cost. I suppose thats false too. After 5 years of many sleepless nights regarding that \$3,600,000 Dollar School the People who worked so hard for its defeat have been justified, the Proof has come to light in a recent article Printed in the Belleville Times.

Let us compare the \$3,600,000 dollar school rejected by the People and the Present high School which the survey shows we need in 1955 the rejected School had 40 rooms to accommodate 1,000 students, 5 years later Construction cost has gone up 25 per cent yet this New School with 53 rooms to accommodate 1,000 students has 13 more rooms than the one rejected for \$3,600,000 dollars, and will only cost the People \$2,700,000 dollars or \$900,000 dollars less.

Can you figure it out. Less Money for a bigger School.

## Defense of Barbers

To the Editor:

Although I'm not a resident of Belleville, I have felt that I belong in the community because of my business connections. I am by no means a stranger to your town.

I've read the June 16th edition of The Times which featured an article in which the commissioners claimed they "refuse to be pressured" in adopting an ordinance, closing the barber shops one day a week, excluding Sunday, of course.

It may interest the readers of your paper to know that the State Legislature permits your community to legally adopt such a resolution upon the wishes of the majority of the barbers.

Mayor Isadore Padula, who spoke for the commissioners at a meeting held Tuesday, June 14, stated that other towns were "probably" pressured into passing their ordinances by petition. He's not sure, though. He also attempted to liken the situation to that of telling the A&P or the shoemakers for that matter.

Why don't the commissioners abide by the wishes of the majority? Is Mayor Padula ignoring the principle of majority rule?

Many of us did not vote for legislation requiring us to pay taxes, but we do and must.

Many of us belong to clubs, political clubs, associations and unions and are required to pay dues and sometimes assessments. The minority never likes the decision, but in a democracy the majority rules.

There's also another point to consider in this case: Unless some type of ordinance with teeth in it is adopted, it could pave the way for other barbers, who have no compunction about working 80 hours per week, invade the community and tear down the working conditions the barbers have labored all their lives to build up.

I, and my many friends of Belleville, would like to see the mayor and commissioners reconsider their denial.

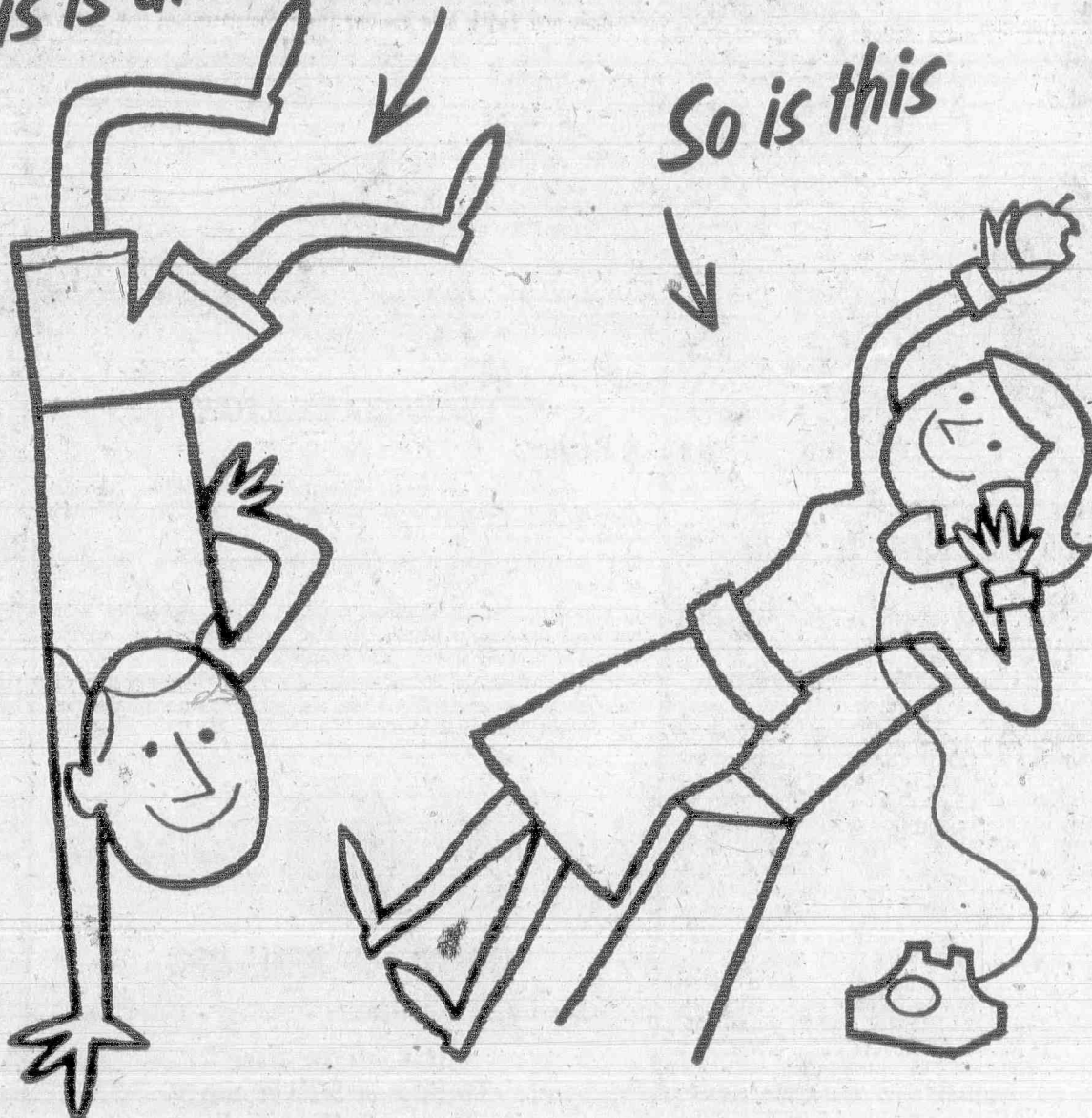
The exercise, conducted under realistic combat conditions, was designed to determine unit efficiency.

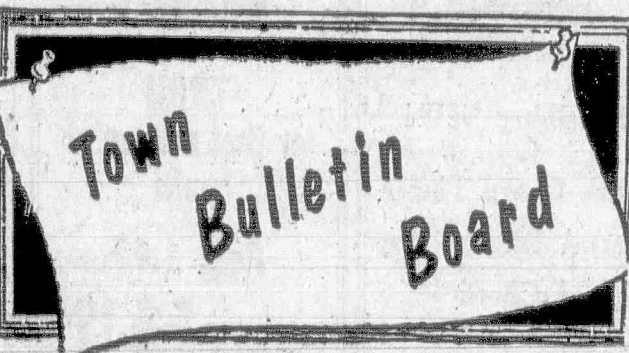

tors of the State of New Jersey as the barbers have could they petition the municipality for control of hours and holidays."

While most barbers in Belleville close Wednesdays, one does remain open and closes on Monday instead. The commissioners said they thought it unfair to tell a man what weekday he has to open and what day he must close.

The text of Vecere's letter to the commissioners follows:

**LETTER**

"Gentlemen:

"We wish to clarify our request to you asking for the adoption of an ordinance requiring Belleville barbers to limit operation to a five-day week.

"Comments from your board which made reference to the possibility of application of a similar ordinance to the A&P is misleading. Our request is based entirely on the right given New Jersey barbers in the State Legislature 1927 Laws (R. S. 40:52-1) which state that barber shop owners in any given municipality have a right by petition to regulate hours and holidays set forth by barber shop owners by majority; therefore the governing body has the right to regulate hours.

"Apparently the Belleville Board of Commissioners forgot about the State Statute at the last meeting when the misleading

by the school board "cannot be sold to the public on the basis of our enrollment; the program can only be sold on the basis of improving our curriculum."

**SPACE IS USED**

Referring to all the empty rooms mentioned by Calabro, Thomas said that this is not the case as, although the space isn't being used as classrooms, they are housing such facilities as libraries, music art and visual aid rooms.

"We simply cannot think in terms of 1930-type education for Belleville today," Thomas continued. "Back in 1955 and 1956 the Middle States Conference came into our high school for their survey made every ten years. They harped on the fact that the two places where we rated lowest were the school building and facilities."

Concerning facilities Thomas called inadequate the high school woodworking department able to accommodate only five percent of the boys who need it "and I think every boy should have it, not only for the woodworking, but for the electricity and metal programs offered."

Continuing, Thomas stated, "I think our high school students should have at least one year of art appreciation and music. Do you know that I had to move heaven and earth six years ago to get a partition knocked down between two rooms to make space for a music room which is still being used today and which is sadly inadequate?"

**HS LIBRARY**

"The high school library can accommodate far less than ten percent of the population. We don't even have the space for shelving new books and we can't enlarge the library where it is.

"I want to go on record now as saying that we are not trying to hoodwink the public. There is only one way to improve our educational system and I think it's about time we begin to be honest about this."

Again referring to Calabro's remark about the low percentage of space being used for classrooms in the schools, Thomas said, "True, you can give me an extra 1,200 students tomorrow and I can seat them, perhaps not in the closest school district, but I can get them all seats."

**A DISGRACE!**

"We can not sell this building program on the basis of enrollment or available space. But have you visited the high school

The local operators will work in teams exchanging reports and "emergency" messages with similar groups in the United States and Canada. George Kupp of station K2DQT is in charge of the local program.

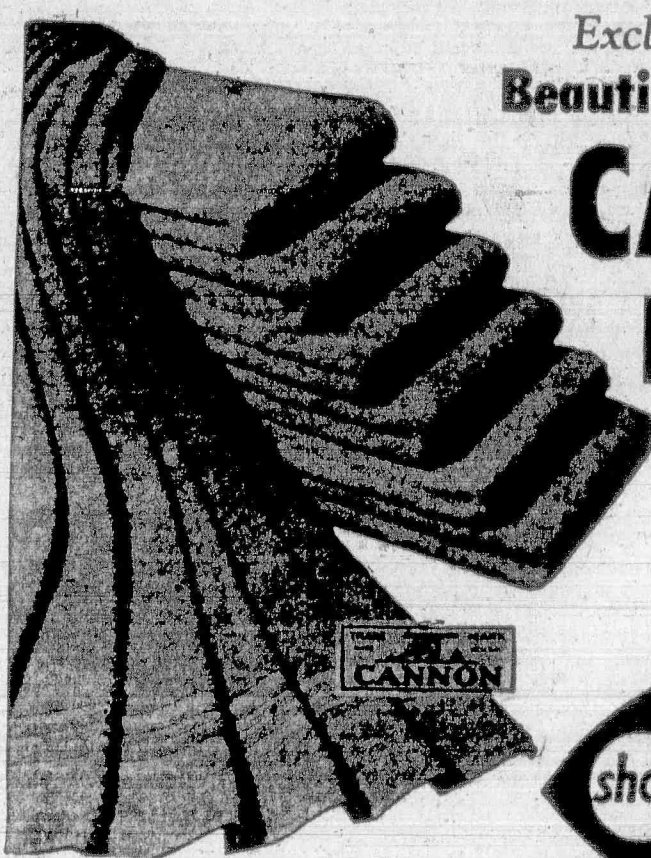
Boy Scouts from Belleville will assist the radiomen with the erection of the tents. Scouts will also serve as messengers during the two-day operation.
