## Tax Council Attacks New H. S. Plans

Four representatives of the Citizens' Tax Council expressed dissatisfaction of the resolution asking for a new high school which was adopted a week ago by the Belleville Board of Education. The tax council made its objections known at the June 21 school tax council, said his group was interested in having the board come up with an overall plan for the entire school system instead of "going about this on a piece-meal basis." The board was unanimous in adopting the resolution.

Calabro several times said that he wished to make it clear that the citizens tax council is not opposed to a new high school.

"We are faced with a problem which faces no other community," Calabro said, "how to deal with a declining school population." He added that "we are in a marvelous position to improve our education facilities." And then Calabro repeated that the tax council is strongly against improving the school system on a "piece-meal" basis. "We want a complete package," he told the board.

**CONFLICT?** Actually, from what was said at the board meeting, there is really only a fine line, if any at all, between the wants of the tax council and what the school board is actually doing.

Board member Richard Drake said, for example, "It is our hope that we do not handle this project in 'piece-meal' fashion." Drake noted that the recently completed Rutgers survey presents an over-all picture of the school system today and makes suggestions for its improvement.

"However, we must set an objective and since the Rutgers Report stresses the need of a new high school, we must set a new school as our objective and then work out the details," Drake said.

### Belleville Times Repeats 'Picture' Information For Organizations

Several months ago, The Belleville Times announced the requirements which must be met when submitting photographs for publication. Because in recent weeks so many photographs have been delayed from appearing in the newspaper due to failure to meet the requirements, we urge all publicity chairmen and groups to note the following:

Engagement and other one-column pictures should be submitted in wallet-size prints. Weddings and group pictures should be 5 by 7 glossy prints. When these requirements cannot be met, it's best to check in advance with the editor; often times submission of the negative instead of the "wrong size" prints is preferred. Because of reproduction requirements, Polaroid pictures are discouraged.

When employing the services of a photographer, be sure to inform of these requirements for pictures to appear in The Times-News.

## Project's Cost is \$110,000; Hear 'Rat' Complaint

The Belleville Board of Commissioners Tuesday substituted a new ordinance to provide 12-inch water mains along the westerly side of Washington Avenue. A similar ordinance, introduced at the board's June 14 meeting, was defeated.

The new ordinance would provide the new mains from the Nutley line to Rossmore Place. The defeated ordinance had asked for mains only from the Nutley line to Little Street.

Totalling a cost of \$110,000, public hearing on the proposal is scheduled for July 12 at 8 p.m.

Public Works Commissioner Robert Gruhin said that a fire hazard forced Belleville to ask for the new installations. He noted that there have been two recent fires in the industrial district near the Nutley line in recent weeks and that the water pressure has reached "the critical point."

Gruhin said the existing water pressure is not adequate for proper fire-fighting control.

Only one of the several ordinances up for public hearing Tuesday night came under fire. James Golden of Tappan Avenue said he thought money was being wasted by spending \$14,500 for a new sweeper when an existing sweeper could be repaired for \$1,000. This ordinance however passed without objection by any commissioner.

Also passed Tuesday was an ordinance providing for the erection of a second floor over the garage at fire headquarters and authorizing the replacing of the heating system of the department building. Cost for this project totals \$22,500.

The commissioners approved on final reading the construction of traffic signals at Franklin and Belmont Avenues near the Walter Kidde Company.

Cost of this project will be split three ways with Belleville, Essex County and the W. Kidde Company each paying \$1,200 shares.

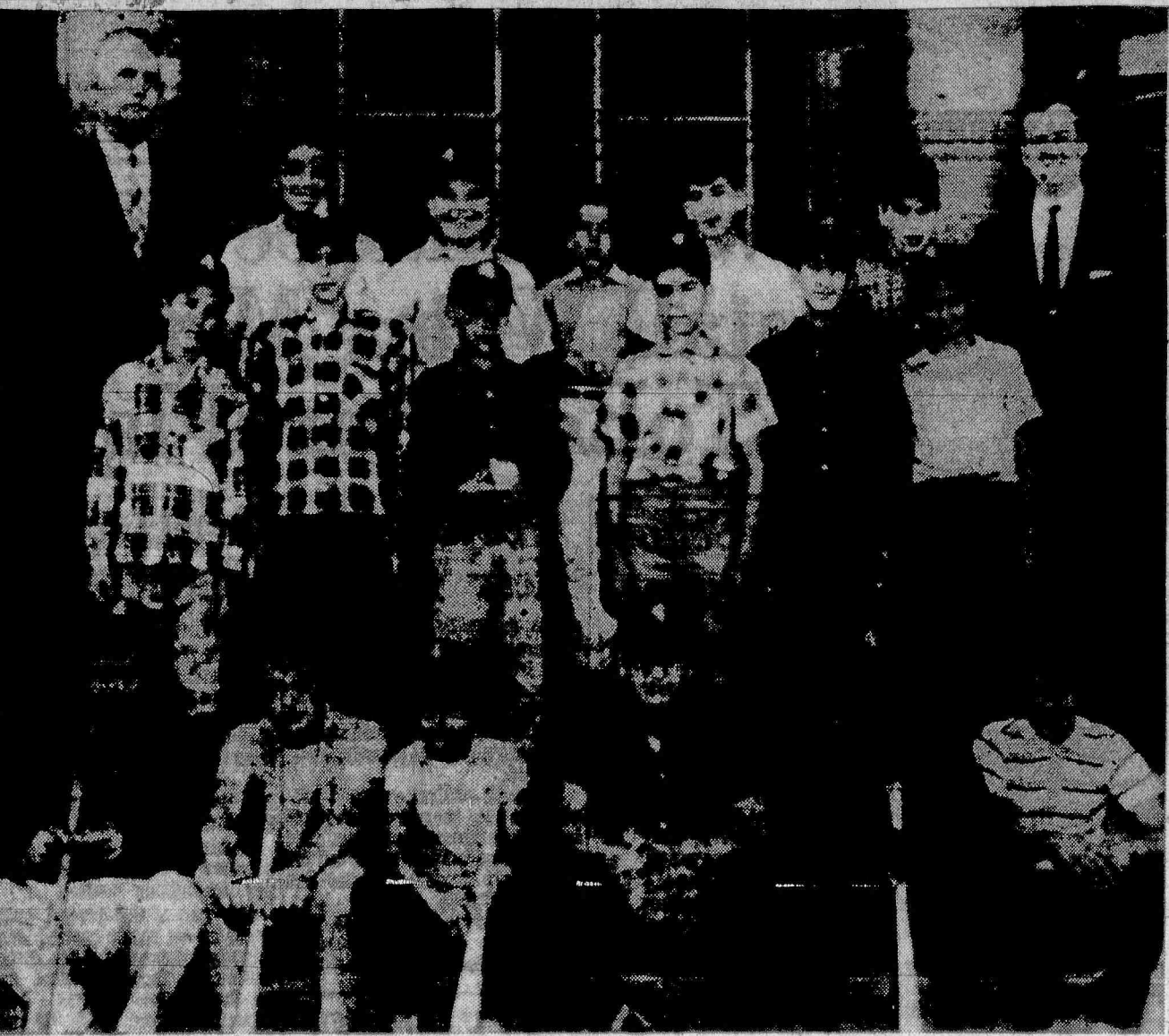
"I've enjoyed every bit of public work," Keenan said adding that he's looking forward to return to the practice of law in the Belleville firm of Keenan and Finch.

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## An Unfair Attack

Last week Congressman Peter Rodino was attacked for having a financial interest in a TV station located in Albany, New York. Permission was granted recently to the operating corporation by the Federal Communications Commission.

Members of the FCC are appointed by President Dwight D. Eisenhower, undoubtedly after approval by the Republican National Committee. Mr. Rodino is a Democrat. Those who are attempting to make political capital out of the situation are accusing him of a conflict of interests, and they infer that his being a Congressman may have influenced the Republican-appointed FCC.

There is no evidence that Mr. Rodino attempted to influence the FCC. We do not believe the FCC would be influenced by a Congressman—or Senator, for that matter—especially after the scandal-ridden TV award of a Miami station two years ago.

We see the attack upon Mr. Rodino as a partisan effort to reduce the Congressman's popularity with the 10th Congressional District voters. Republicans had better campaign at a higher level if they expect to win anything in Essex this fall.

## Inadequate Bus Service

A recent survey of housewives conducted by the TIMES-NEWS revealed great unrest over the fact that our community suffers from inadequate round-town bus transportation.

The Silver Lake and Rutan Estates sections seem to be among our community's neglected step-children. First class citizens all, residents of these areas are given second class status.

Our ladies are most anxious to visit our business centers for their family needs. A lack of proper municipal parking facilities practically rules out the use of the family auto. And since there exists no convenient bus transportation to our shopping centers, Belleville purchasing power is constantly being drained off by the better parking and transportation facilities offered by neighboring Bloomfield, Newark and Nutley.

The Town commission must accept the blame for lack of adequate parking and transportation facilities. In recent months we have witnessed heroic efforts by some businessmen on Washington Avenue to initiate a bus route that would take our citizens crosstown and around town. Inherent in this expression of self-help is the feeling of futility concerning aid from

Town Hall to help solve problems of long standing.

We believe the Town Commission is failing in its obligation to our citizens and our businessmen when it continuously closes its eyes to the problems facing our community. A transportation committee out of Town Hall should be studying the feasibility of a crosstown — round-town jitney service operated by either Public Service Transport or by the Town of Belleville. We need more imaginative leadership at Town Hall if we are to survive as a first class city.

## Our New 3 Million \$ School

Our school board apparently has decided to proceed with the plan to build a new high school, involving also a change from our present K-8-4 education system to a K-6-3-3 system.

Belleville has known only the K-8-4 system; Kindergarten, eight years of grammar school and four years of high school. Primarily because of the physical limitations of our present school buildings, it is recommended that we convert to the Kindergarten, six-year grammar, three-year junior high and three-year high school educational system.

The advantages and disadvantages of these two competing systems must be carefully weighed before we commit ourselves to a course of action that leaves us no alternative.

Despite the fact that a committee of 100 citizens has been added for apparent window-dressing effect, the Rutgers Report seems to be very vague in areas that may well cost our taxpayers untold hundreds of thousands of dollars above the three millions that proponents of a new school expect to spend for such an undertaking.

There is no doubt that a good school system is a basic requirement for the maintenance of a first class community. There is no doubt that Belleville suffers from antiquated, outmoded school buildings.

What we need now is a complete airing of all the facts, particularly the overall costs involved, including maintenance and amortization costs of an additional building and proposed additions to our grammar schools. We need, too, a thorough discussion of the alleged merits of the K-6-3-3 system over the K-8-4 system. A first rate school system can well contribute to the building of greater civic pride. More important, it can do justice to our children, who are young only once.

Commissioner Sullivan, usually glib, may have to call upon all his felicity to explain his tardiness in granting the local cops and firemen the clothing allowance promised them.

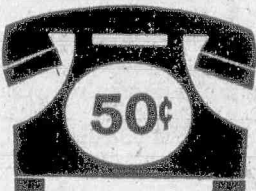

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that the following ordinance was passed on second and final reading at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville held Tuesday evening June 28, 1960, having been read in its final format least one week prior thereto and is therefore now a law and hereby published according to law. AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF TRAFFIC SIGNALS AT FRANKLIN AVENUE AND BELMONT AVENUE, BELLEVILLE, N. J., APPROPRIATING THE SUM OF \$1300.00 THEREFOR, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES FOR SAID PURPOSE.

Whereas, it is contemplated to enter into agreement with the County of Essex in connection with the project of erection and installing fixed-time control traffic signals at Franklin Avenue and Belmont Avenue, Belleville, N. J., which agreement will provide that the Town of Belleville will pay to the County of Essex one-third of the cost of such construction, which total cost is estimated to be \$3700.00;

Now, therefore, the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, do ordain:

Section 1. That improvement be made by the Town of Belleville contributing to the cost of installation of traffic signals at Franklin Avenue and Belmont Avenue, Belleville, N. J., which installation is to be done by the County of Essex.

Section 2. It is hereby determined and declared that it is necessary that the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, shall raise money for the purpose above-mentioned, and that the estimated maximum amount of money necessary to be raised from all sources for said purpose is \$1300.00, and that the estimated maximum amount of notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$1253.00.

Section 3. To finance said purpose there is appropriated the sum of \$65.00, which sum has been made available for said purpose in previously adopted budgets of said Town, under the caption of "Capital Improvement Fund" in said previous budgets.

Section 4. To finance said purpose there shall be issued, pursuant to the Local Bond Act of the State of New Jersey, in anticipation of the issuance of bonds, Bond Anticipation Notes of said Town, which shall not exceed in aggregate principal amount the sum of \$1253.00. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Act. 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## How To Join New Army Told By Recruit Unit

Sgt. Granville Marshall, of the Montclair Army Counseling Office, announced this week that the qualifications for men and women applying for enlistment in the new regular army are as follows: men 17 to 34 years of age, inclusive, for non-prior service; prior service 35 to 55 years of age; but present age cannot exceed 35 years, plus active years of federal service.

Men applying who have had no prior service cannot have more than one dependent; prior servicemen can have not more than two dependents, unless eligible to enlist in the grade of corporal or higher or have had at least six years of active federal service.

Applicants must score 31 or higher on mental tests if they have not had prior service; prior servicemen with dependents must score 50 or higher on mental tests. In both cases, the mental score must be 100 or higher for a man to choose the training or school of his choice.

Non - prior servicemen with more than one dependent are not eligible for enlistment but are not exempt from draft.

All men 18 years of age and over must have draft cards, social security card and birth certificates when applying for enlistment.

Women must be between 18 and 34 years of age, high school graduates or the equivalent, furnish character references, job references, police records and hospital checks. Parents must sign for women under 21 years of age.

Most army guaranteed technical school courses have prerequisites of algebra, geometry, trigonometry, physics or a combination for the choice of enlistment options. But the aforementioned prerequisites do not prohibit a man or woman from enlisting in the regular army unassigned so that he or she may be assigned at reception stations according to qualifications.

Tests may be taken before enlistment to determine what one is best qualified for.

impression that the board of education should have kept the project behind closed doors until every detail and unanswered question was solved before making any appearance with the project before the public. This conclusion, however, would probably

be termed exaggerated by Calabro.

School board members explained their position carefully. Board attorney, Max Schwartz said that "this resolution is merely a formalization of principals ... and is not the one which will be submitted to the voters." Schwartz said that since the board received the findings of the Rutgers study team, "we are duty-bound at this time to do something with this report. We must decide if we want a new high school or that we do not want a new high school."

Schwartz said that later, when the details have all been worked out, the entire plan will be complete and then will be presented to the voters.

The board of education once asked the question, in answer to the objections of the tax council, that in order to get the "complete package" requested by Calabro, "that we have to consider each problem one at a time and that's what we're doing now."

In addition to Calabro, representatives of the tax council at the Jke 21 hearing included Lee

Chris Albanese.

Garcon opened the discussion from the floor by asking for a detailed plan, "not a drawing where a consultant has to come in ... but a plan from the superintendent. We want to know if he wants a high school, for example, with 50 or 150 rooms. We want to know about gymnasiums and cafeterias and how big the school will be."

Garcon, in effect, was asking for the final plan which the board doesn't expect to have Rochau quickly explained the ready for another year. He wanted to know cost figures, how the funds would be raised and so Board president, Mrs. Violet Rochau quickly explained the purpose of the June 21 meeting which was attended by a citizens committee which has worked with the school board since the Rutgers study team was hired.

Mrs. Rochau explained that "I have and am again advising the citizens committee for schools

that before any action is taken the committee would be the first to be advised. So far the board has agreed that we need a new high school building, but it is about the only thing the board has actually agreed upon so far. We have not agreed on a site. However, we certainly would not have a referendum on this without spelling everything out to the people."

She said that the June 21 meeting was called merely to permit the public to know how the board is approaching the school problem and its conclusion with respect to a new high school building.

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
