cators.
WHAT WILL THE JUNIOR HIGH DO FOR BELLEVILLE.
"1. It will make possible a more effective program of studies for early adolescents. More extensive curricular and co-curricular offerings are possible in a school program that more adequately provides for meeting the wide range of individual differences existing particularly in this age group. Such a program is built upon the needs, interests, abilities and capacities of maturing boys and girls. Thus, in equalizing educational challenge, general instruction is not geared to the average pupil, but rather is adapted to all levels of potential achievement.
"The modern junior high school aims to promote for each early adolescent optimal mental, physical, social, and moral development. Our pres-

ent upper grade program can, in only a very small degree, attain the individualization of instruction possible under a junior high school unit organization. The heterogeneity of subject groupings in respect to mental abilities alone make it well nigh impossible to adapt the present school programs to the below average, average, and above average boys and girls.
"2. The adoption of the junior high school unit will provide for our seventh and eighth grade boys and girls educational facilities largely non-existent under present upper elementary grade organization. Among such facilities needed to improve instruction in our upper grades and which a junior high would provide are:
a. Well - equipped, properly staffed and organized library. A functioning library is absolutely essential to today's school program. It provides for curriculum enrichment, for pupil exploration, for pupils' realizing the library is a tool of in-

tellectual achievement; it teaches skillful use of books; it stimulates appreciation of books; it creates an atmosphere favorable to the growth of the reading habit; it provides for fruitful social experiences. The school library does not operate as a separate activity. Classroom learnings find a proving ground in the library and library discoveries inevitably add to classroom interest.
"a-1. At present Belleville has elementary school libraries only in Schools 1, 3, 4, and 7. These libraries are under the sponsorship of teachers with full - time teaching assignments. While these staff members are conscientious and give much extra time to the library, they are trained as teachers and not as school librarians. A junior high school library would be directed and supervised by a teacher certified by the state for the specialized task of administering a school library.
"b. Science rooms. For the first time such units will make pos-

sible experimentation and adequate demonstration. Such rooms will provide real laboratory conditions almost completely lacking. Present provision for science instruction is extremely inadequate and the best - planned instruction often falls short of the objectives of science teaching.
"b-1. It is true that with the help of matching funds made available under the National Defense Education Act we have in the last two years improved our upper grade science instruction by providing science laboratory tables and basic equipment. But present organization demands that much of upper grade science teaching must be done by teachers not basically trained as science teachers. In our smaller schools in particular, schools 1, 9, and 10, the science teacher of necessity must teach in other subject fields. Well-trained science teachers seek junior or senior high school positions where they can teach solely in their area of specialization. (See "5")
This presents one of the really serious staffing problems in the traditional K-8-4 organization and it exists as a problem not alone in science but also in other major subject matter areas. The junior high by virtue of assembling all our seventh, eighth, and ninth grade pupils in one building would result in perhaps twelve to fifteen or more sections in each major subject field and teacher specialists in each field could be assigned work in his major field of preparation. Such specialized upper grade teaching in any of our present elementary schools is very limited.
c. Gymnasium. For the first time a gymnasium will make possible the development of a completely adequate well-rounded program in physical education. Without exception educators and laymen, who have studied problem of education, agree that a well-equipped gymnasium is indispensable to well - organized health and physical education instruction of all boys and girls particularly those at the age of greatest growth and development. Along with a gym goes a staff responsible for the development of a program that sets in balance real strength and the natural verve and physical stamina of adolescents. Poorly planned physical education, largely the result of inadequate facilities, can be as harmful as none whatsoever. The gymnasium unit will make possible provision for an health program and greatly improved intra - school competition. Thus will tremendous impetus be given to senior high school athletics, which can be built on a well - rounded junior program. There is no better time for inculcating good athletic form and for thwarting development of poor physical habits than in the plastic years of early adolescence.
"c-1. In the past several years, our board of education has wisely converted most of our old elementary school auditoriums with fixed seats into so called multi - purpose rooms. These conversions have added greatly to the utility of these old auditoriums, making them available for many varied and valued activities not before possible. However, each of these old auditoriums is non-standard in size and appointments and consequently requires ingenious adaptation - though entirely inadequate - for use part time as elementary school gyms. Only in school 3 and possibly in 7 do these multi-purpose rooms even remotely approach adequacy. And of course, when it is realized we have in none of our elementary schools lockers and shower room facilities so essential from a health viewpoint alone for a well-rounded early adolescent (boy or girl) physical education program, the need for gymnasiums becomes the more pressing. Renovating our present elementary schools

to provide such facilities necessary for a good health and physical education program for adolescents would be so costly as to make the suggestion foolhardy.
d. Industrial arts and home economics units. Such units will give boys and girls some appreciation of the nature of practical activities that make up the world about them. The girls will become acquainted with ideals and practices contributing to attractive, well-managed homes. The boys will have an opportunity for shop courses, including metal working and electricity, for printing, for mechanical drawing. None of our seventh and eighth grade pupils get such instruction. Such facilities also afford pupils a chance to try out courses to discover interests and aptitudes for certain vocations. Special training can be given those with special aptitudes. Through these units, the junior high will reach many boys and girls for whom the present program is totally inadequate. These, whose higher education will be limited, we have long neglected.
e. Music and Art rooms. These rooms are essential to the school that professes to serve the interests of all types of pupils. The artistic and emotional elements of education should not be neglected to any degree. Complete realization of the fine objectives of these fields is possible only with special provisions being made for them in the school plant. Art and music for well nigh on to a half a century now have proved themselves essential to a sound educational program. In fact it could well be argued that graduated instruction in the appreciation of art and music should be a requisite for every pupil.
f. Cafeteria. Few relatively modern school services contribute more largely to pupil development and welfare than the cafeteria with well - balanced hot lunches. In modern schools, the cafeteria, in addition to supplying food to pupils, also provides equipment and materials for instructional pupil experiences.
"3. A junior high school organization will make possible an extensive co-curricular (extra-curricular) activities program which is an integral part of effective present upper grade organization. The co-curricular program is inevitably limited in scope, and thus our boys and girls are being deprived of rich experiences which are part and parcel of complete education. During early adolescent years, youth is eager engage in group activities when they are afforded opportunity to learn to work together on meaningful, worthwhile problems. They derive great social satisfaction from participating actively in a going group. A well-organized activities program meets vital needs and interests and should be given a regular place in the school time schedule. Thus do pupils learn self-responsibility, and build self - esteem and confidence. Among activities the junior high school makes definite provision for are: student council, school clubs, assemblies, school paper, music groups, visual aids groups, intramural athletic groups, etc.
"4. A junior high school will make possible the development of an effective program of guidance for our seventh, eighth and ninth grade pupils. Teachers specially trained as counsellors of early adolescents feel a special sense of responsibility for ferreting out possible causes of maladjustment, for nipping in their incipency the buds of overt perhaps asocial behavior. Today psychologists emphasize the importance of teachers' and counsellors' early recognition of the symptoms of unusual behavior if the number of cases of the maladjusted are to be reduced. A well - organized guidance program has a significant role to play. During junior high school years, the problems of personal and social adjustment are made more pronounced with the onset of puberty. Modern education

has accepted and must continue to accept a major responsibility for helping junior high pupils make satisfactory, all - around adjustments. Effective school guidance at this level provides help to pupils in choosing most suitable educational offerings as indicated by individual needs; in adjusting to the adolescent's ever-widening social horizons; in bringing about wholesome parent - child relations and control; in developing individual regimens contributing to physical well-being. In respect to the guidance of early adolescents, our present school organization is stifled in performing effectively. Only the well - organized, competently administered guidance service of a junior high school can accumulate, collate, and bring to bear in problem solving essential data for aiding in the adjustive problems of the adolescent.
"5. A junior high school will provide a teaching staff specially trained to instruct early adolescents. This staff will, so far as possible, provide for a balance between men and women teachers. Boys approaching and in adolescence, need some association with men who are generally better fitted than women to give counsel on many problems of growing boys. The junior high teaching staff will offer a greater degree of specialization in respect to subject matter background than now pertains.
"The junior high school organization affording as it does an early introduction to science, foreign language, commercial training, etc., tends to eliminate necessity of a vast amount of overlapping and repetition in respect to subject matter in upper elementary grades of the traditional school. High school work in tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades can therefore be stepped up to higher level, with the result that high school curricular offerings are enriched to a degree impossible under the 8-4 plan.
EFFECT ON JUNIOR HIGH ON PRESENT ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS
"By eliminating grades seven and eight from our elementary schools, a junior high organization plan will make available in those schools additional rooms sorely needed for providing libraries, audio - visual aids rooms, music and art rooms, industrial and household art rooms remedial reading and speech rooms, and nurse's room. The number of rooms made available will vary from two to six in our elementary buildings, and constructive, practical use for these rooms can readily be found. Thus the junior high school pattern will result in enrichment of our educational program all along the line. Present elementary buildings (excepting School 7 - Wager School) are so lacking in standard classroom space that only in schools 1, 3, 4, and 7 at the present time do we have even a central library room.

Rooms vacated by the removal of seventh and eighth grades from our elementary schools will certainly not be vacant but for the first time will make available vitally needed extra room space for enrichment of our elementary program. An elementary school building today that provides only classroom space falls far short in making possible a full educational program for our boys and girls. Remedial instruction, fine industrial and home arts instruction, availability of a central library - these require the additional space the junior high pattern would give our elementary schools.
EFFECT OF K-6-3-3 ORGANIZATION ON OR HIGH SCHOOL
"A new Senior High building for Belleville would -
"1. Make possible K-6-3-3 organization.
"2. Solve the problem of present high school over crowding.
"3. Replace pre World War I vintage physics and chemistry laboratories.
"4. Replace a library improvised by joining two standard classrooms with a modern school library essential to well - organized, up-to-date instruction.
"5. Replace the single high school music room improvised by joining two classrooms. A modern music department provides space for vocal and instrumental music teaching, instrument storage and small group vocal and instrumental instruction.
"6. Add to the one and one-half room manual training shop, basement level, so that a modern industrial arts department could be organized, providing for the teaching of electricity, metal working and auto mechanics.
"7. Replace the single high school art room with space sufficient to accommodate all pupils talented in this area.
"8. Replace the two standard rooms now available to the girls for instruction in cooking and sewing with a home and family unit adequate to enable every girl in high school to elect at least one year's study in the department, a goal we fall far short of reaching now.
"9. Provide modern gymnasium facilities, with adequate locker and shower facilities, for both boys and girls. From a health as well as physical education point of view this facility in our present building is not nearly adequate for high school boys and girls. A new gymnasium would also provide spectator seating space that could accommodate at least 1,000 instead of the meager few that can now be seated.
"10. Provide for expansion of space now allotted for high school guidance and counselling. The one standard room available falls greatly short of the needs of this department whose importance Doctor Conant (former Harvard president and High Commissioner to Germany) stressed in his

recent study of the American high school.
"11. Provide much needed specialized instruction areas modern up - to - date secondary level instruction demands; such as language arts laboratories, speech rooms, and departmental workshop areas for special study or research by teachers and/or individual pupils.
"12. Make possible a greatly enriched curriculum for the 65 to 70 per cent of our high school student body for whom high school represents the end of formal schooling. Improved terminal education is an essential for the non-academic. At the same time, the instruction of the college bound pupils will be enormously enriched by added, up-to-date facilities.

BHS Graduate To Play Aug. 17 In County Bowl

An additional honor has come to Tom Worley of the Belleville High School football team.

Worley, a 6-1, 185-pound end who snares passes neatly on offense and is a bull on defense, has been selected to appear in the second annual College Scholarship Bowl the night of August 17 at Jersey City's Roosevelt Stadium.

It's an honor all right but only a fitting tribute to a tremendous athlete. Worley is certain to see plenty of action. And plenty of action there will be. Under head coach Angelo Bertelli, the All-American quarterback from Notre Dame and winner of the coveted Heisman award in 1943, Worley will be among a hand-picked collection of Essex County 1959 schoolboy stars that will meet the cream of the crop from Hudson County. Bertelli will serve as head coach of the Essex aggregation.

The more than 20,000 fans who jammed the stadium a year ago to thrill to Hudson's 12-0 victory in the then unprecedented extravaganza can expect even more excitement, more drama and more brilliant football, if that's possible.

Some 25,000 tickets for the attraction, sponsored by Hudson County's CYO, are now on sale throughout Hudson and Essex Counties. A terrific advance sale is anticipated.

A total of 44 senior stars, 22 from each county, will take part in the big show. All will again be fully covered by college scholarship insurance; that is, any boy who is already assured of a scholarship needn't worry about losing that scholarship should he suffer an injury in the game or during practice sessions. The insurance will then send him through school.

On the other hand, those boys interested in entering college in September and do not as yet have a scholarship will get the opportunity to display their wares before a bevy of the nation's college coaches, who will again be special guests of game director Jim McManus. Last year's Bowl sent no less than five participants to college.

The outstanding player on each side will receive a \$1,000 scholarship while the game's top back and lineman will get handsome trophies. Every player will also get a jacket at a post-game banquet.

The Garfield Cadets will provide pre-game and half-time entertainment. It all adds up to a major sports spectacular.

He also gave description of the circus acts—especially the 66-year-old acrobat who "flew through the air with the greatest of ease" from atop a slender pole-reaching high in the air.

Both operators were assisted from time to time by Harry Ford, K2DRL, Tommy Campbell and Tom McCann.

As far as the historians can tell us of Belleville, this marked the first time such events have been put on the radio.

He is a 1959 graduate of Belleville High School.

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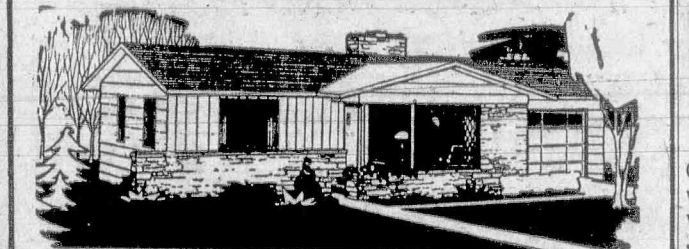
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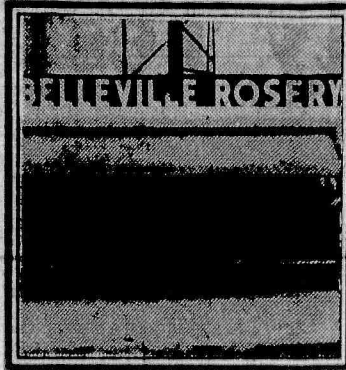


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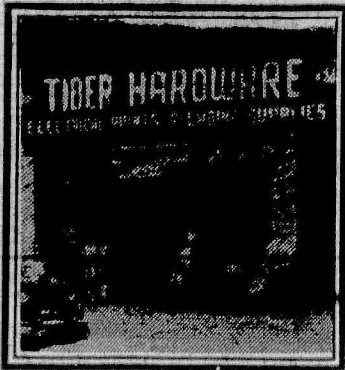


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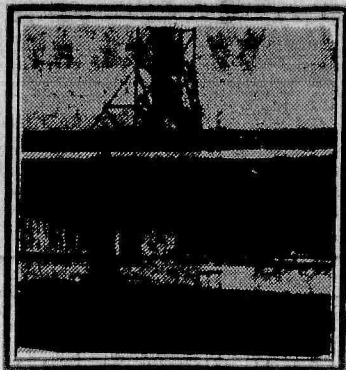
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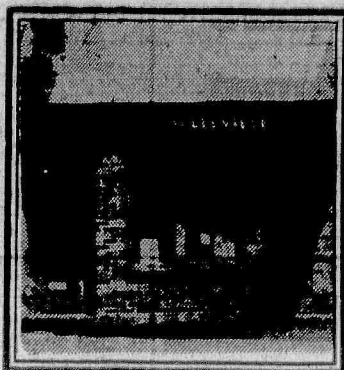

deemed to receive by reason of such improvement; and (3) the portion of the cost of such improvement which shall not be so assessed shall be paid by the Town as in the case of a general improvement which is to be raised for by general taxation.

All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of said purpose, according to its reasonable life, is a period of 5 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 9. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Town Clerk of said Town, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Town, as defined in Section 40:1-76 of said Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$1,700 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.
