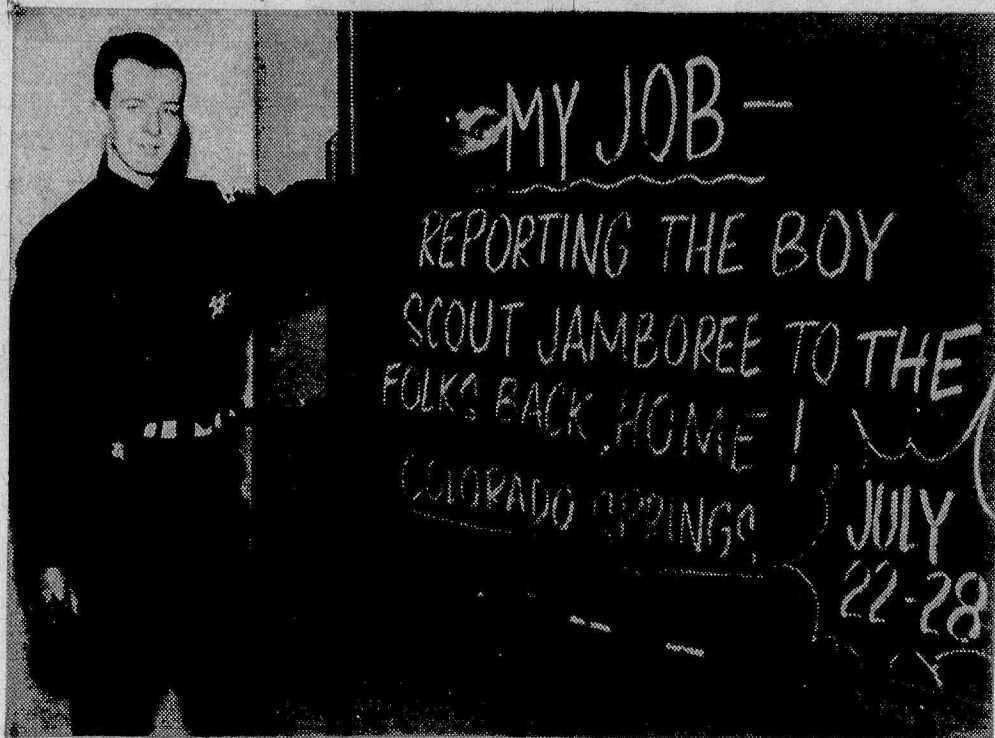


Will Report From National Jamboree

5 Local Scouts at Colorado; Big Campout Opens Here

Five Belleville Boy Scouts are now on their way to Colorado Springs where they will join some 55,000 scouts from the United States for the Golden Jubilee Jamboree. The scouts' fabulous tented city will occupy 2,000 acres just opposite the U. S. Air Force Academy and the official opening is scheduled for tomorrow, the closing date is July 28.

While the five scouts are in Colorado, others from the local Robert Treat Council will take over the plains of Branch Brook Park from tomorrow until Sunday afternoon. The local camporee is conducted in connection with the Colorado ceremony.

Belleville residents are invited to visit Branch Brook Park this week when for the first time in many years, local scouts will set up a real camp just a few blocks off Washington and Belleville Avenues.

An announcement from the Robert Treat Council continues saying that if "anyone wants to stay the night—they are welcome but be sure to bring your own food, utensils and camping equipment."

The exact area of the Belleville encampment is the football and soccer fields south of the field house opposite Elwood Avenue.

School Board May Act Monday on 'Vandalism'

Vandalism on school-owned property is again the cause of much concern in the high circles of the Belleville Board of Education. Even while the board is studying various protective devices, the group reports that authorities have agreed not to release names of informants calling police with new information.

Three methods of combating the vandalism have been discussed by the board in recent weeks. First is the installation of an ultra-sonic alarm system which only recently has been made available by the W. Kidde Company of Belleville.

The second method being studied is hiring a private detective agency to patrol school property during the evening hours.

MAY HOLD PARENTS
The third alternative would be to prosecute the vandals in court and hold parents responsible for property damage. This method has been adopted with success in many New Jersey municipalities.

Final Hearing On 'Rip-Rap' Next Tuesday

An ordinance authorizing \$11,500 for the construction of a rip-rap slope along the Third River adjacent to Rutan Estates comes up for final reading next Tuesday night.

Public Works Commissioner Robert Gruhin said the appropriation will provide about 500 feet of protection along both sides of the river from the Public Service right-of-way on the north to the property line of Samuel and Clara Lobnitz on the south, between Chestnut Street and Carolyn Road.

The ordinance provides for the issuance of bond anticipation notes to finance the project.

Gruhin said the rip-rap wall will provide protection against flooding in the area.

PROPOSALS

A number of bids will be received at next Tuesday's commission meeting. Among the items to be purchased are one 1960-model ambulance for the fire department and a 1960 station wagon also to be used as an ambulance.

OK APARTMENT

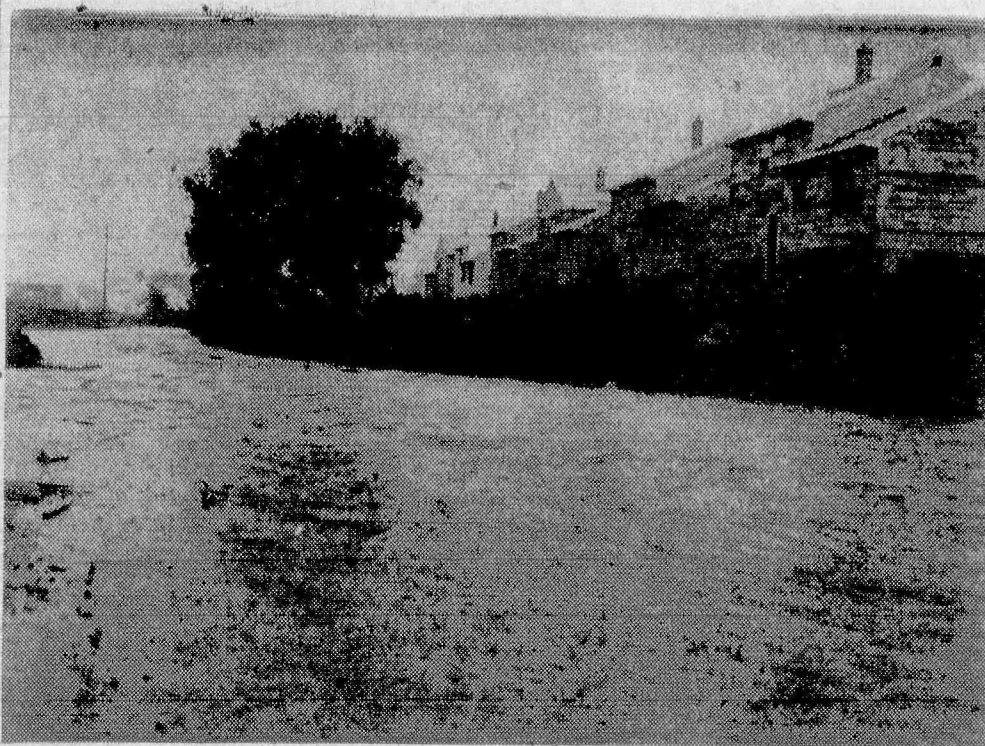
A two-story, 10-family apartment building was approved at the last commission meeting. The structure will be erected at 542 Joralemon Street. Frank Chieffo of Belleville is the owner of the property.

The commissioners approved a variance for the project which has been recommended by the zoning board May 3. Chieffo estimates the cost of the project at \$75,000. James Centanni of Newark is the architect.

Another variance, also recommended by the zoning board, was approved. The commissioners granted the variance to James T. Serafini who will convert from a one to two-family home at 199 Main Street.

During the Rain

The Angry Third River



About 500 feet along each bank of the Third River will have a rip-rap slope to prevent erosion and flooding if an ordinance coming up for public hearing next Tuesday is approved. The Third River rises several feet during a rain fall but is almost stagnant during dry spells. Note the new homes being erected near the river bank in the Rutan area.

Lack of good drainage on open stretches bordering the Third River results in puddles, many up to eight inches deep in the Rutan Estates area. Residents are complaining the puddles are causing a mosquito problem and a danger to children.

Say Town Doing Little To Assist

Attorney Nicholas Brescia, representing the Rutan Estates Home Owners' Association, told the Belleville Commissioners that although the area he represents is zoned A-1, "the conditions there are disgusting and the situation continues to plague these people today."

He spoke first of persons using properties adjacent to the homes as dumping grounds. Then he complained that rats and rodents are infesting the areas. He told Commissioner Nuncio Pico's Department of Health that spraying operations for mosquitoes are inadequate.

He called attention to flooding of the Third River which leaves stagnant deep puddles behind where mosquitoes propagate. Finally Brescia told of flooding on Rutan Road, "a condition that has been going on more than two years."

The attorney, a resident of 94 Ligham Street, noted that John Bass, president of the Rutan Estates Home Owners' Association, had complained "weeks ago" about these very same problems and that "this board has done absolutely nothing to correct them."

LETTER CAMPAIGN

A query in the group's news letter about the extent of rodents and rats brought a total of 19 letters telling of "deplorable" conditions, Brescia said.

"Women and children are actually afraid to go outside at night. We know that these rodents carry disease," he told Health Commissioner Pico.

Continuing, Brescia reported that "one of the reasons these conditions exist is because many people are using the area as a dumping ground. Everything is dumped up there from pumpkins to an old dump truck. And tonight one man told me that a private car dumped a load of tires which are burning and right now the fire department is up there putting the blaze out," he stated.

COMMISSION

Commissioner Pico said he definitely would look into the situation from a health point of view and Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan promised he would instruct the police department to keep a keen lookout for persons using the area as a dumping ground.

Commissioner Robert Gruhin had already come to the meeting prepared with an ordinance to authorize the construction of a rip-rap fence on both sides of the Third River from the southerly line of the Public Service right-of-way to the northerly line of the property owned by Samuel and Clara Lobnitz. Cost of this project is estimated at \$11,500.

Brescia recommended that the commissioners conduct a survey of the area to learn first hand how "very serious these prob-

Heart Fund Nets \$4,119 in Town

The 1960 Essex County Heart Fund drive, which officially ended June 30, was an outstanding success, Thomas Allsopp, general chairman announced here today.

Funds raised in Belleville during February's Heart Month, not including memorials and bequests, amounted to \$4,118.79 as compared with \$4,387.20 in 1959. The final figures totaled \$194,770.23, the largest sum raised in any one year by the association. It compares with \$166,946.25 obtained in 1959, and represents an increase of over 16 per cent.

During February, which is Heart Fund month, \$96,273.76 was obtained as compared with \$95,404.55 in 1959, the bulk of which was obtained through the house-to-house canvass in the county. Memorial contributions accounted for \$18,063.12, bequest funds \$50,286.53, the Newark-Irington United Appeals \$28,831.71, and special contributions \$1,815.11.



RUTAN ROAD
Samuel Giaccone of 2 Rutan Road, located at the corner of Joramemon Street, blamed an in-

adequate drainage system for flooding in front of his home. Giaccone said the water in heavy downpours floods his lawn and reaches his front steps.

"This has been going on for two years and two months," Giaccone said. "Everytime we get a flood, I get on the phone and call everybody I can get a hold of. What am I suppose to do, buy a row-boat?"

Bass also addressed the meeting and blamed the town engineering department for the present conditions at Rutan Estates. When Gruhin said that John Blauvelt of Little Falls did the engineering work on Rutan Estates, Bass remarked that "even so, all the maps had to be approved by the Belleville engineer."

HOW TO PAY?

Before the topic was dismissed, several other residents of the Rutan area spoke complaining of weeds and the need for a larger "no dumping sign." However, one Plenge Drive resident remarked that "the sign that's there is big enough now for anyone with normal eyesight."

The commissioners agreed that much work remains to be done in Rutan Estates but the question remains who is liable for the costs of the improvements. Commissioner Gruhin said that

much of the work is up to Rutan Estates developers to complete and if necessary, the matter would be taken to court. Belleville has lost the two court actions against Rutan developers which dealt with similar problems.





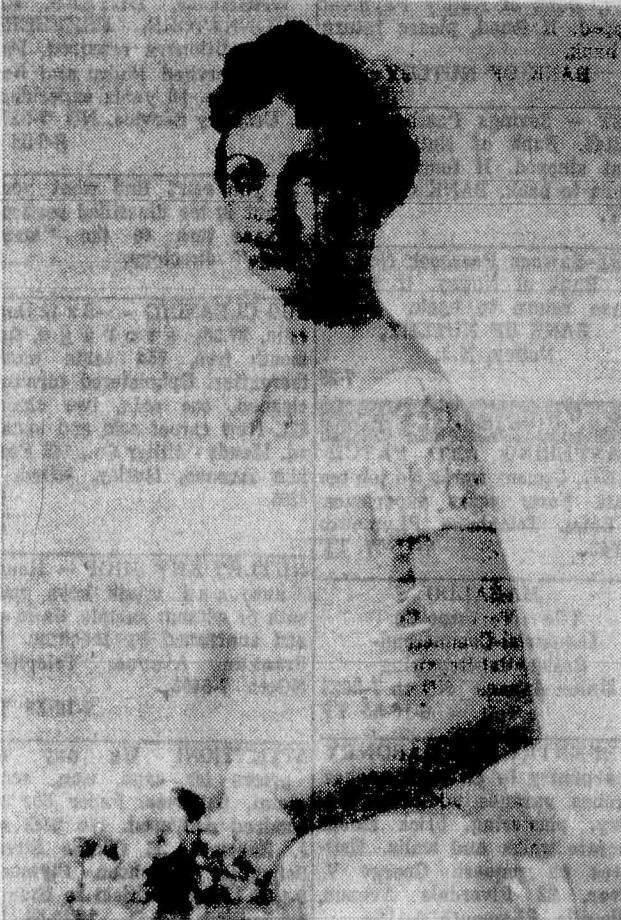

Senator Sandman Makes Sense

Over the weekend, a leading New Jersey delegate to next week's GOP Presidential-picking conclave in Chicago, urged his fellow New Jersey delegates to join him in supporting New Jersey's James Mitchell for the Vice-presidential nomination. The delegate was Cape May's State Senator Charles Sandman, Chairman of the powerful Senate Labor Committee.

Sandman (38 yrs. young), sees in the Secretary of Labor, an individual whose presence on the national ticket can help keep New Jersey, Republican in the November election. The five year veteran of the New Jersey Senate said, "We need Mitchell on the ticket to help. U.S. Senator Case win re-election. The Democratic ticket of Kennedy and Johnson will be a tough combination to beat, and unless we present an equally attractive slate I'm afraid the Democratic U.S. Senate candidate in New Jersey may be elected

on the Kennedy coattails."

The South Jersey GOP leader's warning makes sense to us. If the election were held tomorrow it is conceivable that Kennedy would sweep New Jersey, carrying with him most of the local Democratic candidates, the Democratic U.S. Senate candidate, and emerge the victor in 18 of the state's 21 counties. Moreover some incumbent GOP Congressmen stand to be defeated in a Kennedy landslide.

Indeed, the stakes are high for the GOP this November. Should it lose the election by landslide proportions it probably will have earned for itself a permanent status as a minority party—certainly for the next decade.

All Republicans should harken to the warning from New Jersey's Senator Sandman. For them in November it will be a life and death struggle. Even the Champ himself, Dwight D., would have a difficult time taking the measure of Roman Catholic Kennedy and Protestant L. B. J.

Conservative Johnson from the deep south, and labor's liberal Kennedy from the North-East, join together political machines, territories, and diverse power groups which made possible FDR's unprecedented four-term incumbency of the White House. If anything the current FDR model appears more highly powered. Sandman's warning appears to be very timely.
