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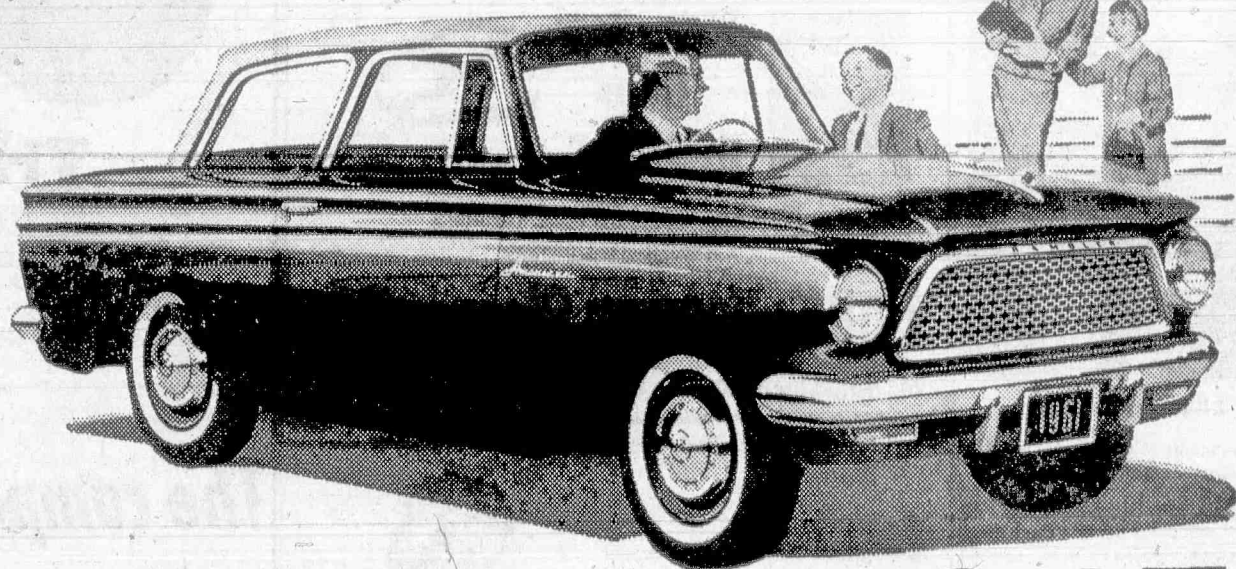
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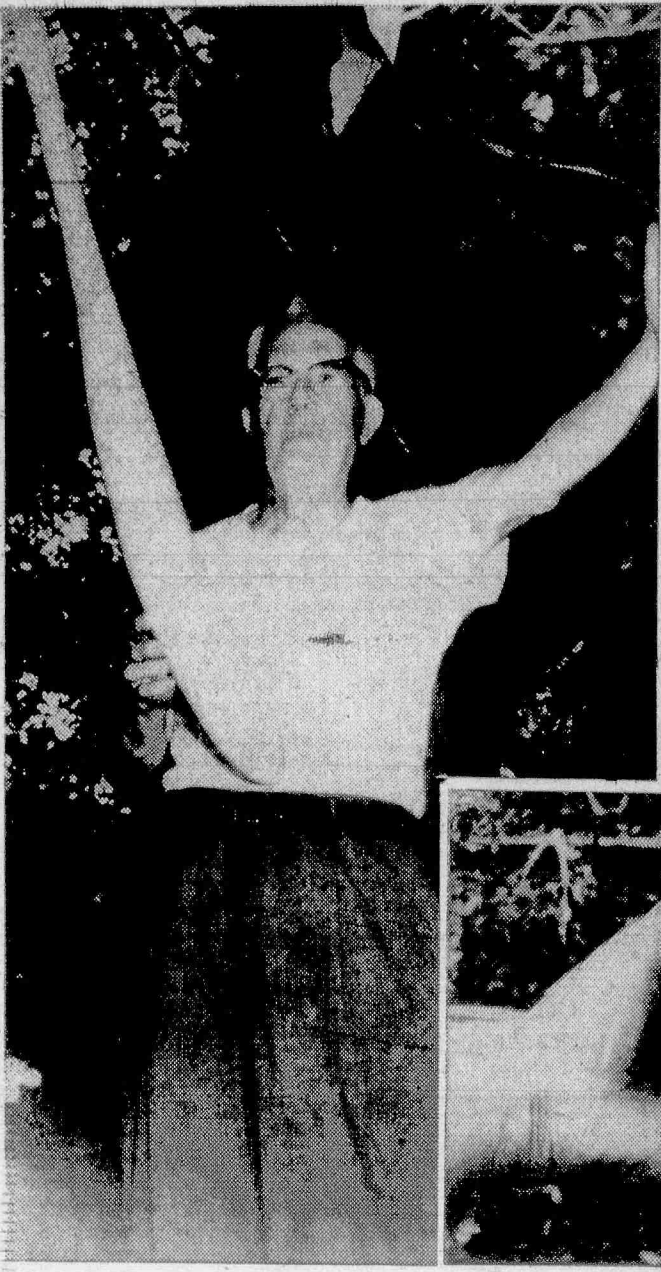
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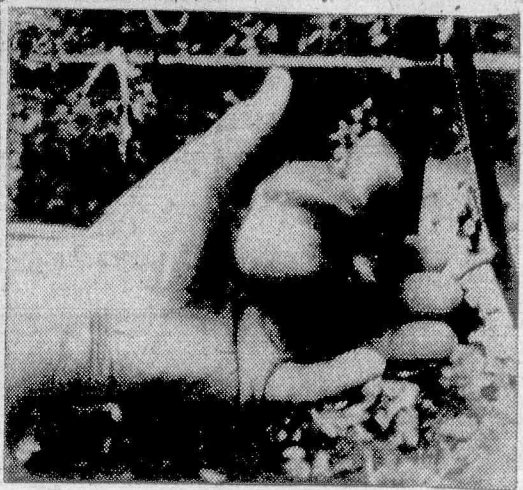
Anthony Cottone of 198 Heckel Street (left) is a gardener in and among a very small group which can claim to have grown a squash 42 inches in length.



## Iron Dukes Shine In 32-13 Victory Over Mt. Vernon

The Belleville - Nutley Iron Dukes had their finest hour Sunday afternoon, October 23, in Belleville Municipal Stadium as they crushed the previously unbeaten Mt. Vernon Eagles 32-13 before 1500 amazed Iron Dukes fans. Not only did the defeat drop the Eagles from the ranks of the unbeaten, but it also dropped them out of first place and into a tie for second with the Swedesboro Red Devils. The victory gave the Dukes a 4-3 record for the season and was their third consecutive win.

Fullback Chuck Munford, our candidate for ALL-ECF FULLBACK, was the chief executioner with three TD's, on runs of 80, five and 27 yards. Brother Beau tallied on a 23-yard beauty, as did Frank Barnes on a sparkling 50-yard punt return. Brother Don Munford galloped 45 yards to an apparent score, only to have a clipping penalty called on the five although it was obvious the infraction occurred after Don had crossed the

goal line. In a consultation with referee Tierney, it was confirmed that, under "PRO" rules, if a man crosses the goal line the score is allowed because at that instant the ball is dead and the infraction then occurs after time is out.

However, it was revealed that Umpire Mazza had ruled that the clip had occurred before Don crossed the goal line. Suffice to say that such a call could only have been made under conditions of extreme myopia.

The victory was, in the final analysis, a magnificent effort on the part of the Iron Dukes, who never played a finer game. They were up against a team of well seasoned "Pros", sprinkled liberally with ex-big college stars and service performers who were unbeaten and well nigh invincible. At the end, however, the Mount Vernon eleven appeared shell shocked from the ferocity of the Dukes' tremendous defense and their bone-crushing running attack.

The entire squad played beautifully and it is difficult to single out individual stars. Defenders Tom Appicella, Bob Paganelli, Nick DeBenedetto, John Reid, Gerry Skidmore, Dom Pomponio, and Frank Barnes were outstanding. Offensively, every back ran hard and blocked like demons. The entire offensive line was tremendous as led by tackle Fred Sperduto.

Chuck Munford, in addition to his three touchdowns, gained 139 yards to take the lead in yards gained rushing in the EFC.

Down 13-6 at the half, after the officials blunder in the second quarter, the Dukes were unstoppable as they roared for 19 points in the third quarter. Tom Appicella, sterling linebacker, started the drive by swiping Jim Reese's pass on the Eagle 37 and returning it 22 yards to the Mount Vernon, 15, before Reese just caught him. Chuck Munford attempted to sweep his own right end was thrown for a four-yard loss, before Cary Willis hit Ron Gasparinetti with a short pass on the 14, and the big halfback dashed for 10 more and 1st down on the five. 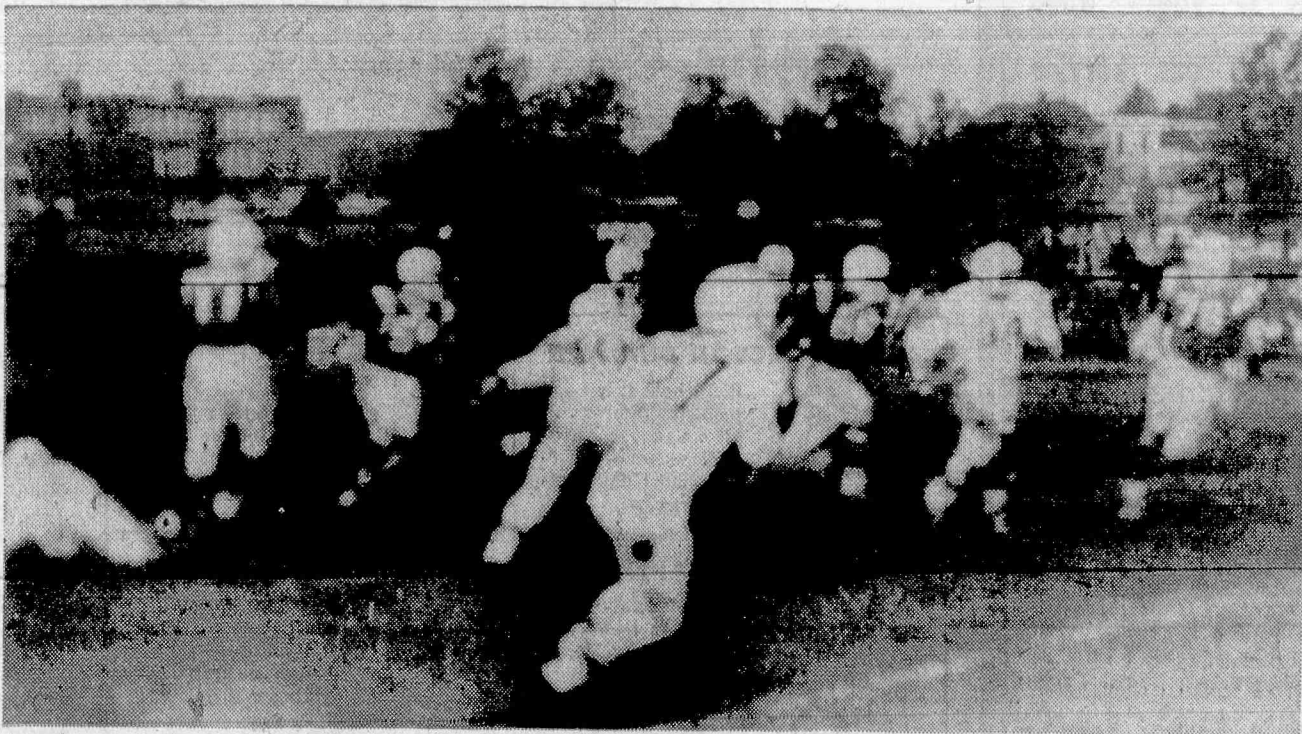
Swedesboro's only defeat was administered by Mount Vernon and a defeat would drop them out of possible contention for the EFC crown.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that the following ordinance was passed on second and final reading at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville held Tuesday evening, October 25, 1960 having been read in its final form at least one week prior thereto and is therefore now a law and hereby published according to law.

AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE RECONSTRUCTION OF THE TOWN HALL AND THE WILLIAM STREET FIRE HOUSE OF THE TOWN OF BELLEVILLE, IN THE COUNTY OF ESSEX, AND TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES TO FINANCE THE COST THEREOF.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, DO ORDAIN as follows:

Section 1. The Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, shall make the following improvements:

(1) The Town Hall of the Town shall be substantially reconstructed, including new ceiling and eaves;

(2) The William Street Fire House shall be substantially reconstructed, including the walls and the roof of said building. Each of said buildings is a building of non-fireproof construction, as defined in Section 40:1-34 of the Local Bond Law.

Section 2. Said improvement shall be undertaken as a general improvement and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property specially benefited. The sum of \$4,000 is hereby appropriated to the cost of such improvement. Such appropriation shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized, and by the down payment hereinafter provided, by this ordinance.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the making of such improvement (hereinafter referred to as "purpose"), is not a current expense of said Town; and (2) it is necessary to finance said purpose by the issuance of obligations of said Town pursuant to the Local Bond Law of New Jersey and (3) the estimated amount of money necessary to be raised from all sources for said purpose is \$4,000, and (4) \$200 of said sum is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance said purpose, and (5) the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$3,800 and (6) the cost of said purpose, as hereinbefore stated, includes the sum of \$200, which is estimated to be necessary to finance (a) engineering and inspection costs and legal expenses and (b) the cost of issuing the obligations authorized by this ordinance and (c) interest on such obligations, to the extent permitted by Section 40:1-55 of said Local Bond Law.

Section 4. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$200, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for said Town are now available to finance said purpose. The sum of \$200 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purpose.

Section 5. To finance said purpose, bonds of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$3,800 are hereby

authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6 per cent) per annum. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 6. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$3,800 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6 per cent) per annum, and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Law. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 7. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of said purpose, according to its reasonable life, is a period of 12 1/2 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Town Clerk of said Town, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Town, as defined in Section 40:1-76 of said Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$3,800 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

"That it shall be unlawful for the proprietor of any barber shop to keep open said shop for the purpose of conducting business of any nature whatsoever on Wednesdays, except when a legal holiday falls within a work week, then the barber shops shall be open on Wednesday of the week upon which the legal holiday falls between the hours of 8 A.M. to 7 P.M. Eastern Standard Time or (Daylight Saving Time, when in effect)."

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

workers as a result of a confusion and misconception concerning the United Fund itself. Secondly, although United Fund now encompasses 12 agencies, whereas the Community Chest served only seven, donations on the part of Belleville citizens have not reflected a proportionate increase. As a matter of fact, too many people are still giving \$1.00 which results in a gift of eight cents per agency.

"Referring to the misconception concerning the Belleville United Fund, it has been brought to my attention that numerous inquiries have been made of our office by industry, residents and participants in the campaign itself as to why United Fund of Belleville is presently limited to 12 agencies. Specifically, the charge has been made that we are discriminating against one particularly worthwhile charity which participates in the Newark United Appeals, and it has been urged that people neither participate in nor contribute to our drive, and in fact, to give to Newark's drive.

### NOT TRUTHFUL

"Nothing could be further from the truth than the reasons underlying this misconception. Since the United Fund of Belleville began in 1958, 12 agencies have asked to join the Belleville United Fund. They include: Salvation Army, Medical Research Program, National Foundation for Muscular Dystrophy, Inc., Leukemia Society Incorporated, Associated Catholic Charities, American Hearing Society, United Seamen's Service, American Social Health Association, Travelers Aid, Blinded Veteran's Association, American Social Hy-

giene Association and International Social Service. Decisions on all of these agencies were made after exhaustive study, first by the Executive Committee and Admission and Participation Committee of the Board of Trustees, and finally, by the entire Board itself.

### LIST REQUIREMENTS

"Among the factors considered are the requirements that the agency service Belleville residents, that it has conducted a town-wide appeal in the past, and that it submit a budget outlining its requirements for consideration. No consideration of religious or other affiliation has ever been considered as a bar to participation by an agency in the Belleville United Fund."

"There is, however, one factor which constantly enters into each evaluation, and that is: by admitting this or that agency at this time are we merely sharing failure? The prior two campaigns barely reached 50 per cent of goal, and until the 'people of Belleville demonstrate by their participation in the United Fund and by their contributions that we can fully and effectively support the requirements of more than the present 12 agencies, we cannot in good conscience revise our policy of admission.

"Speaking on behalf of the Board of Trustees, I fervently hope that our goal will be reached so that the innocent victims who are serviced by the 12 agencies without regard to race, creed or color will not be made to suffer the loss of desperately needed aid due to lack of funds."

To Get Out Vote

Belleville Scout troops are joining the five million Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Explorers in the United States in participation of the third national "Get-Out-The-Vote" campaign. Over 5,000 Scouts and leaders of the local Robert Treat Council are preparing for the starring event of the Golden Jubilee Year.

As it was in 1952 and 1956, this great nonpartisan effort to get out a record vote in the national election is under the joint sponsorship of the Boy Scouts of America and the Freedoms Foundation, Inc., of Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.
