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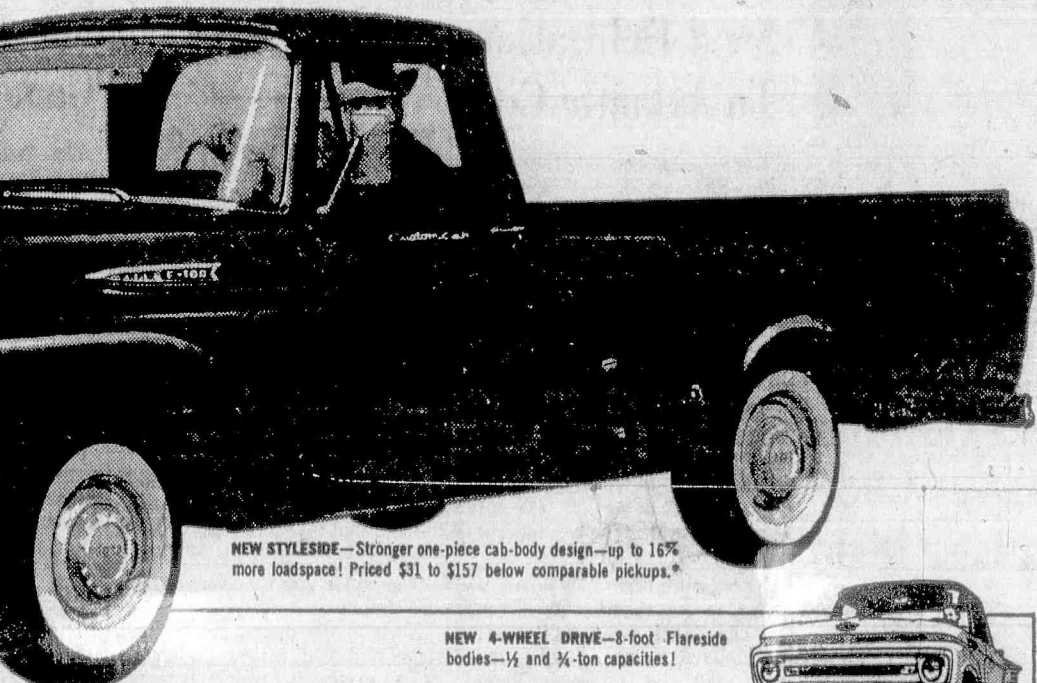
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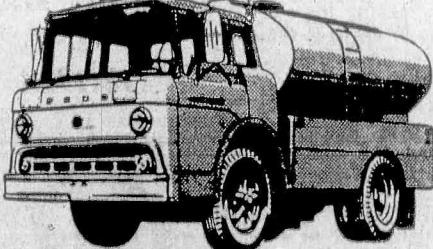
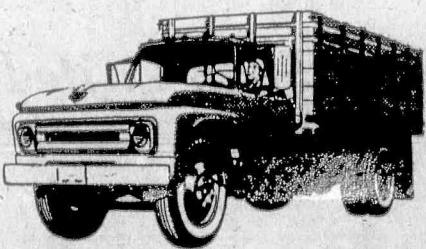

AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE IMPROVEMENT OF THE WATER SYSTEM OF THE TOWN OF BELLEVILLE, IN THE COUNTY OF ESSEX, AND TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF \$26,000 OF BONDS TO FINANCE THE COST THEREOF AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, DO ORDAIN,

as follows:  
Section 1. The water system maintained by the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, to supply the Town and its inhabitants with water, shall be improved by the making of the following improvements at the Belleville Reservoir:

1. Enlarging the present high pressure service meter pit;
2. Constructing a new meter pit for the low pressure service;
3. Constructing a new pit for regulators and by-pass on high service line;
4. A new water meter on low service line;

including manholes, check valves, pressure regulators and all necessary pipe, valves and other appurtenances necessary for such improvement. The sum of \$26,000 is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of such purpose. Such appropriation shall be met from the proceeds of the bonds authorized by this ordinance.

Section 2. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the making of said improvement (hereinafter described as "purpose") is not a current expense of said Town, and (2) it is necessary to finance said purpose by the issuance of obligations of said Town pursuant to the Local Bond Law of New Jersey, and (3) the estimated amount of money necessary to be raised from all sources for said purpose is \$26,000 and (4) the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$26,000, and (5) no part of the cost of said purpose has been or is to be assessed upon property specially benefited, and (6) the cost of such purpose, as heretofore stated, includes the sum of \$500 which is estimated to be necessary to finance (a) engineering and inspection costs and legal expenses and (b) the cost of issuing the obligations authorized by this ordinance, including printing, advertisements of ordinances and notice of sale, and (c) to the extent permitted by Section 40:1-55 of said Local Bond Law, interest on such obligations.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that such water supply system would have been self-liquidating, as defined in Section 40:1-79 of said Local Bond Law, during the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1959, had there been included in the interest and debt redemption charges for such year an amount equal to interest for one year at the rate of four and one-half per centum (four and one-half per cent) per annum, on said bonds or notes, and the amount of the first installment of serial bonds legally issuable to finance such purpose.

Section 4. To finance said purpose, bonds of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$26,000 are hereby authorized and shall be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law. Said Bonds shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (six per cent) per annum. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 5. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$26,000 are hereby authorized and shall be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law, in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (six per cent) per annum and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of outstanding notes hereby authorized shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding notes and bonds issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the

moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of the principal of such notes then outstanding.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and stated that the period of usefulness of said purpose according to its reasonable life is a period of 40 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 7. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Town Clerk of said Town, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Borough, as defined in Section 40:1-76 of said Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$26,000 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance is permitted by and excepted to the debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law, contained in Subdivision (f) of Section 40:1-16 of said Law.

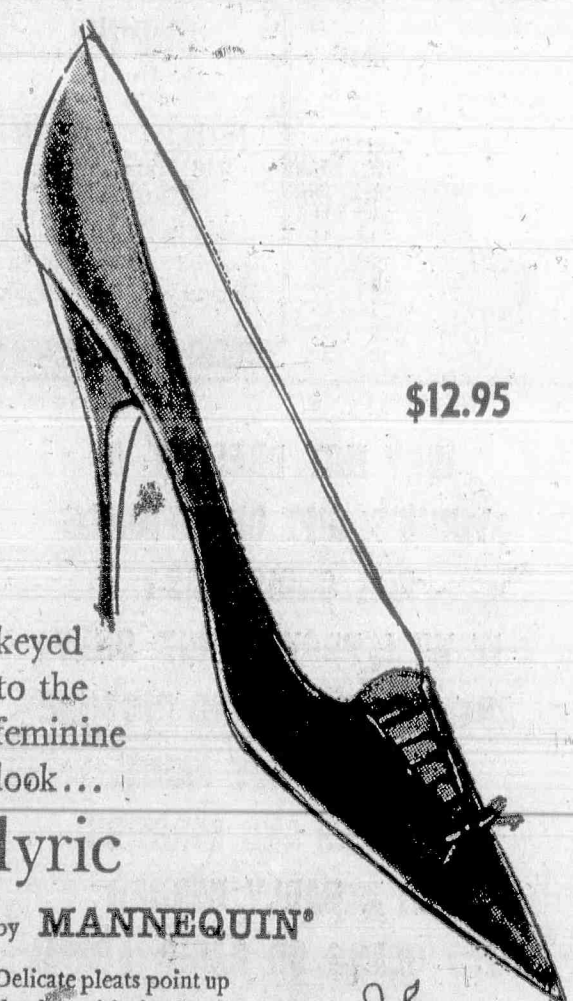

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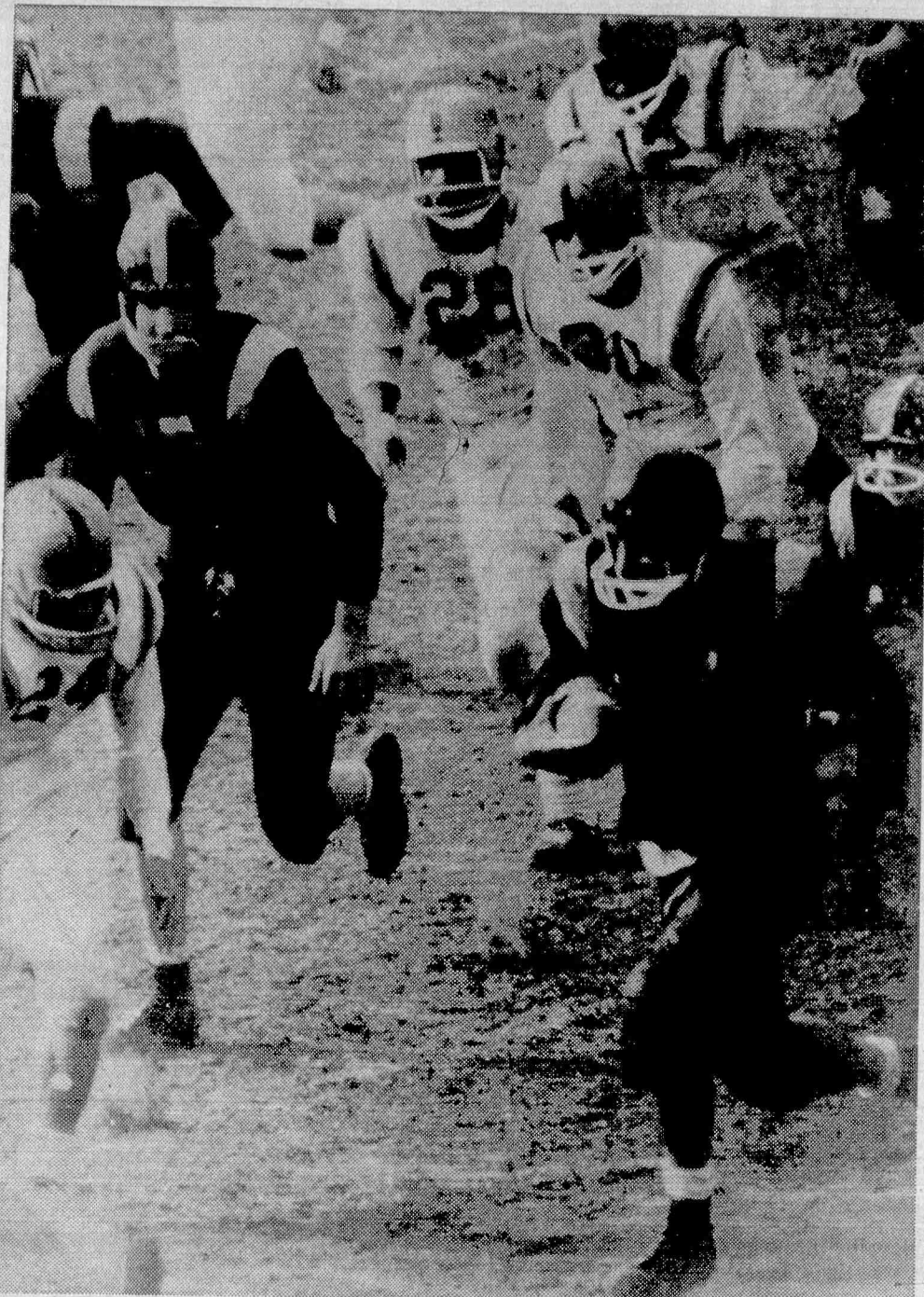

## Belleville High Plays Spirited Game But Drops to Orange on Thanksgiving

Belleville High was handed its first Thanksgiving Day loss since 1953 last Thursday as Orange High, led by star quarterback John Scott, scored 19 points in the second period to give them a 25-13 holiday victory before 7,500 fans at jammed Bell Stadium in Orange.

The Bellboys looked real good against the Tornadoes, who are 8-1 on the season and in line for a sectional group IV championship.

The biggest portion of the Bellboy offensive strength was shown by two sophomores, quarterback Joe Latore and halfback Richie Luzzi.

Latore's great arm accounted for over 100 yards while Luzzi ran for 42 in 17 tries, about half of the team's total rushing yardage.

Belleville began to show its strength right away taking a 6-0 lead in the first period. The score came on a 25 yard pass by Joe Latore to end Sal LoCoco in the end zone. This play capped a 55 yard drive which began when Frank Annichiarico took an Orange punt to the Belleville 45.

On the second play from scrimmage, Latore tossed a beauty to Richie Luzzi who was in the clear; he was finally brought down on the Orange 22. After three plays brought the ball back to the 25, Latore let loose with the TD pass. LoCoco's placement was blocked.

Seven plays after the succeeding kickoff was taken by Orange on its own 35, John Scott kept and went over from the three to tie the score at 6-6. Scott had been the key man in the drive going 21 yards to the Bellboy 44, and later 34 yards to the 4 yard marker. However his run attempt for the conversion failed.

The Tornadoes took the lead easily when a bad Belleville punt shortly after this TD gave Orange the ball on the Belleville 37. Four plays later as Orange had gotten to the 5, left halfback George Miles leaped over the Bellboy line and landed on his shoulders in the end zone to give

Orange a 12-6 lead. Scott's run again failed.

### ORANGE SCORES

A short while later, Orange took a punt on its own 44 yard line and covered the necessary 56 yards in 10 plays. The scoring play was a seven - yard - pass from John Scott to Sam Jandoli. Scott elected to kick and split the uprights to make it 19-6.

In the third period, both defenses tightened as the ball changed hands several times and the closest approach to a score was to the Belleville 29 by the Tornadoes.

The Tornadoes took advantage of a Bellboy fumble early in the final period when Luzzi was unable to hold a bad pass from center on a punt attempt and was dropped on the Bellboy 15. Four plays later, Scott went to

the right and over from the one. His kick failed making it 25-6.

Belleville took the kickoff on its own 35 and mostly on short gainers, marched downfield to the one half yard line where Orange recovered a Bellboy fumble to end the threat. Luzzi's 27 yard around end jaunt had brought the ball to the Orange 28 while George Sheridan carried ten yards to the two where three plays were only able to produce the fumble.

But after taking a punt a minute or so later, Joe Latore on the first play from scrimmage tossed to Luzzi who made a fine catch in the end zone, the play going 26 yards. Sal LoCoco then kicked the extra point for the final score of the game.

## Iron Dukes to Face Miners Sunday in New Peace Bowl

### Star-Studded Game Key To 'Pro' Titles

Belleville - Nutley Iron Dukes have accepted a bid to play in the first annual "Peace Bowl" game in Newark Schools' Stadium this Sunday at 2 p.m. The opponents will be the fabulous Franklin Miners. A victory for the Iron Dukes would give the locals a bonafide claim to the Professional Football Championship of New Jersey, as well as the Minor League Championship of the United States. The Miners won 15 of 16 contests this season. (The first 14 were consecutive) and 19 out of 20 over the last two campaigns.

The Miners 18 - game winning streak was snapped by the Union County All-Stars in the last EFC game of the season, but the Franklin entry then travelled to Columbus, Ohio and although down 14-0 at the end of the first quarter, rallied strongly behind the passing and talented toe of QB Neal Buckman to defeat the Columbus Colts, 20-14, Thanksgiving Day for the "Minor League" Pro Football Championship.

The Miners will enter the game as a definite I.T.D. favorite, but an upset is very possible. If the Dukes display the same "will to win" as they did during the second half of their contest with Mount Vernon the title will come to Belleville. The Iron Dukes are the only team to hold Franklin scoreless (via TD's) during 1960. Neal Buckman's field goal in the last four minutes defeated the Dukes 3-0, in the season's opener. It remains for the offense to score a couple, and for the defense to do another superlative job, and Belleville will pull the upset of 1960.

### THE PLAYERS

Now to personnel for the big game. For the Miners: Ex Philadelphia Eagle Star, Neal Buckman gets the nod at QB, with Willie Bethea and Bob Walsh (Lyndhurst) at the halfbacks. Both are big, strong and exceptionally fast. If Rufus Chatman (the Miner speed merchant) is unable to start, Warren "Dent" Allen will get the nod at the slotback post in the Miners "Pro" type offense.

The first three backs are all EFC choices for 1960.

The offensive line consists of 6'4" Bob Gunderman and 6'3" Walt DuVall at the flanks. Gunderman, back in action only three weeks after a preseason injury, is rated as one of the top ends in the league. He is head football coach at Dickinson High School Iron Dukes.

in Jersey City and a tremendous blocker.

Tackles Lew Schultz (255) and Joe Jackson (240) are extremely mobile for big men. Jan Capriano (225) and Bob Edwards (200) are great blockers. Richie Walsh (ex-Rutherford and Notre Damer) anchors the line at center. He stands 6'5" and weighs 225. Walsh and Capriano are also all-EFC for the Miners.

The defensive line features ends, Stan Derry and Don Wernes. Both check in at more than 200 pounds plus Tackles Stan Stoltz (280) and Bob Klang (240) are virtually immovable. The linebackers are Tom Gunderman (235) from the University of Maryland, Bob Walsh (2-ways), Dave DeLea and Drew Darrah. The halfbacks are Frank Bell and Pat DeLuria, while Bob Moody gets the nod at safety. Derry, Stoltz, T. Gunderman, Bob Walsh, Bell and Moody are also all-EFC.

### FOR THE DUKES

Offensively: Lou Borelli and Bob Marcy (both honorable mention EFC) at the ends. Fred Spurduto (All-EFC) and Nat Revis at the tackles. Unsung ex-Bellboy stickouts at the guards are the brothers McCabe, Pat and Jack, while capable Jay Easterday gets the nod at center.

The backfield will consist of Cary Wills (H. M. EFC) at QB and All - League Chuck Munford at fullback (694 yards gained). The halfbacks will be Dick Bartolazzi (Penn State) and Ron Gaspari-netti (second team EFC) if Ron doesn't start. Don Munford may go both ways (also second team-EFC).

Defensively, All - League Bob Castell and Perry Mayers are at the flanks. The tackles are All-League Dom Pomponio and Nick DeBenedetto (H.M. - EFC). The linebackers are All-League Tom Appicella, together with second team-EFC linebackers Bob Paganelli and Gerry Skidmore. The other linebacker will be either Babe Owens, Gene Mitchell or John Reid. The halfbacks are All-League Frank Barnes and Don Munford. John Pucciarelli gets the nod at safety.

Sure to see plenty of action are backs Augie Longo, Beau Munford, Jim Chamberlain and Barry Desprez; linemen Bob Shotwell, Bob Battleson and Ken Jacobsen will spell the regulars quite well. As a matter of fact, Jacobsen is probably the most improved player over 1959 on the Iron Dukes.

## Letter in 'Times' Causes Barrage of Questions About Football Facilities

It's often been said: don't believe everything you read and a recent letter in the "Speakup" column gives strength to the maxim.

The letter, written by a Mr. J. Curtis, was unusually critical of the entire high school athletic program and stated the football coaches are unqualified because they never were football players. Other misstatements were made saying that the high school team is working with inferior equipment and so forth.

Since the letter has appeared, the high school athletic department has been the target of questions from persons who read the letter in this newspaper. To set the record straight, we urge sports fans to read the facts as uncovered by this newspaper before running to the high school Phys Ed office with needless questions.

Here are the facts which were contradicted by the letter:

The two freshman coaches, George Nucera and Stanley Schere both played football in their college days; Nucera played at

Montclair State and Schere at N.Y.U.

Varsity line coach Tom Testa was a teammate of Nucera at Montclair State.

Belleville boasts one of the best equipped teams in the state. Although the letter says that 10 years ago the team had a seven man training sled, this was not true; the team in 1950 had a two man sled. However a home-made multi - man sled was used in past years.

Each player on both the varsity and junior varsity teams is equipped with the best type helmet costing \$25 each, shell pants worth \$20 and \$15 under pads. Even the shoes are provided for the teams, including the freshman squad players.

The letter of Mr. Curtis says that the two-man training sled now in use is 20 years old and has never been repaired. The Times learned that cast iron sleds such as the one now in use usually last at least 35 years. However the padding on the sled is repaired periodically.

### HIS OBSERVATIONS

Mr. Curtis' letter, in addition to making false statements which now stand corrected, also makes some illogical conclusions.

Concerning the freshman program, it is factual that head coach Ed Berlinski each year has asked that Nucera and Schere be retained as the frosh coaches, thus showing his confidence in the freshman program and staff.

The freshman concept of teaching football fundamentals seems to be paying off when one looks at the perfect season just finished by the junior varsity squad. We make this observation to correct Mr. Curtis' statement that freshman coaches aren't any good and lack experience.

The letter concludes saying that there is no reason why this town should always be at the bottom of the heap in sports. The facts, however show this: that out of about 400 high schools in New Jersey, Belleville rated 15th last year, about 45th in 1958 and second in 1957.

Finally, if any readers plan to write a letter to "Speakup" on this topic, don't confuse the issue any more by presenting unchecked rumors as facts.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, DO ORDAIN as follows:

Section 1. Concrete sidewalks 4-feet in width shall be constructed on the west side of the portion of Franklin Avenue, a public street in the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, which extends from the existing sidewalk at Mill Street to the existing sidewalk near Copper Place, a distance of approximately 770 feet. The existing concrete walk at the Erie Railroad shall not be replaced. Said improvement shall be made in accordance with the plan and specifications entitled "Proposed Sidewalk Construction in Franklin Ave. between Mill St. and Copper Pl." prepared by the Department of Public Works of the Town of Belleville, dated September 29, 1960, and approved by the Town Engineer and the Board of Commissioners, a copy of which is on file in the office

of the Town Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 2. The said sidewalk improvement shall be undertaken as a sidewalk improvement and the cost thereof shall be assessed in the following manner: An accurate account of the cost of constructing or laying the sidewalks shall be kept and such cost shall be assessed upon the several properties fronting on the improvement in proportion to their respective frontage thereon pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 65 of Title 40 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey.

Section 3. Before making said sidewalk improvement or awarding any contract for such sidewalk improvement, the Town Clerk shall cause notice of the proposed sidewalk improvement to be given to the owner or owners of all real estate affected thereby. The notice shall contain a description of the property affected sufficient to identify it, a description of the improvement and a statement that unless the owner or owners complete the same within 45 days after service thereof, the Town will make the improvement at the expense of the owner or owners. Such notice shall be served in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 65 of Title 40 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey, in particular Sec-

tion 40:65-3 and Section 40:65-4, and the proof of service shall be filed with the officer of the Town in charge of the records of tax liens of the Town within 10 days after service thereof.

Section 4. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the Town will contribute no part of the cost of said improvement, it being expected that the cost of the improvement will be borne wholly by the owner or owners of the real estate affected by the improvement and that the special assessments levied therefor will equal \$2,700, and (2) no special assessments for such purpose have been levied or confirmed and (3) such special assessments may be paid in two annual installments.

Section 5. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the making of such improvement (hereinafter referred to as "purpose"), is not a current expense of said Town, and (2) it is necessary to finance said purpose by the issuance of obligations of said Town pursuant to the Local Bond Law of New Jersey and (3) the estimated amount of money necessary to be raised from all sources for said purpose is \$2,700, and (4) \$135 of said sum is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance said purpose, and (5) the estimated maximum amount of

bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$2,565 and (6) the cost of said purpose, as hereinbefore stated, includes the sum of \$100, which is estimated to be necessary to finance (a) engineering and inspection costs and legal expenses and (b) the cost of issuing the obligations authorized by this ordinance and (c) interest on such obligations, to the extent permitted by Section 40:1-55 of said Local Bond Law.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$135, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for said Town are now available to finance said purpose. The sum of \$135 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purpose.

Section 7. To finance said purpose, bonds of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$2,565 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6 per cent) per annum. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 8. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of said \$2,565 of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$2,565 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (six per cent) per annum, and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Law. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 9. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of said purpose, according to its reasonable life, is a period of 10 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 10. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Town Clerk of said Town, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Town, as defined in Section 40:1-76 of said Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$2,565 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 11. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage. Fee: \$55.80

## Waste at Town Hall

Recently 18 of Belleville's Town Hall inhabitants braved the wintry blasts of the Atlantic City boardwalk to attend the annual convention of the New Jersey League of Municipalities. About the only town hall people missing from the Belleville group which went south were some office clerks and custodians.

The invasion of Atlantic City by Belleville town employees cost our taxpayers approximately \$2400. We believe this sum represents a terrible waste of taxpayer dollars. From what we can see of the results of such conventions, it appears the main objective of the League of Municipalities is to preserve the status quo. For Belleville this is not good enough.

We need someone in Town Hall who can treat tax dollars with greater respect. We need someone at the head of our government who will lead — and not be led. We need someone at the head of our government who will place taxpayers' interests before greedy political interest.

Waste at Town Hall must end. And for us — the end cannot arrive too soon.

## Dominic Lally

On October 24, 1958, the Belleville Board of Education received an estimate of the cost involved in making alterations to the field house at School No. 8. Based on approved specifications, the bid submitted to the board came to \$17,490.

After much discussion and debate, Board member Dominic Lally offered to undertake the project as a Summer, vacation-time volunteer job, and promised to save the taxpayers approximately \$10,000.

At the time we asked him to put up, or else. Well, the Summer of 1959 came and went but Dominic Lally was denied the opportunity to prove his point. No action was taken during all that time on the much-needed repairs to the field house. The Summer of 1960 presented a different situation for Lally. The Board agreed to permit him to proceed with the construction project.

With great vigor and determination Lally tackled his job shortly after the school year came to a close. Employing the skills and service of the school board's maintenance crew, Lally, a teacher by profession, completed the project at a savings of \$8,416 to Belleville taxpayers. Not only did he follow the plans and specifications accepted in October, 1958, but Lally gave us ten showers instead of the

six provided for in the plans. And he replaced the cement-faced walls called for in the specifications with a marble-faced block wall.

As a member of Belleville Board of Education, Dominic Lally has performed service beyond the call of duty. As an honest and dedicated official, whose first love is Belleville's school children, Lally has earned the thanks of a grateful community. In saving our taxpayers approximately \$9,000 he has quite innocently built for himself a perpetual monument to remind future citizens of Lally's unselfish devotion to our school system.

What could easily have been "LALLY'S FOLLY" should be officially renamed "LALLY'S FIELD HOUSE."

## Dennis F. Carey

Within a few days the Essex County Democratic Committee will meet to elect a chairman. The incumbent, Dennis F. Carey, was re-elected last April in a disputed election. The courts recently ruled the election illegal and ordered a new election. Meanwhile, Dennis F. Carey remains in office.

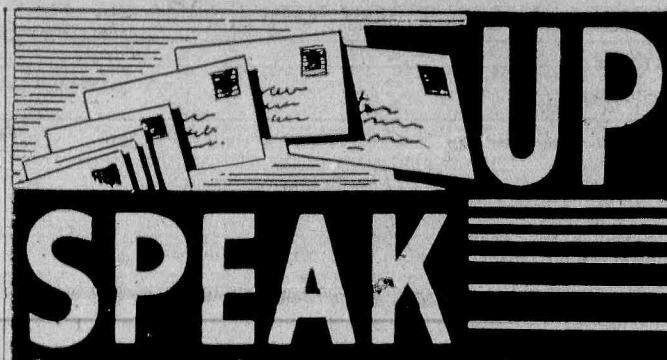

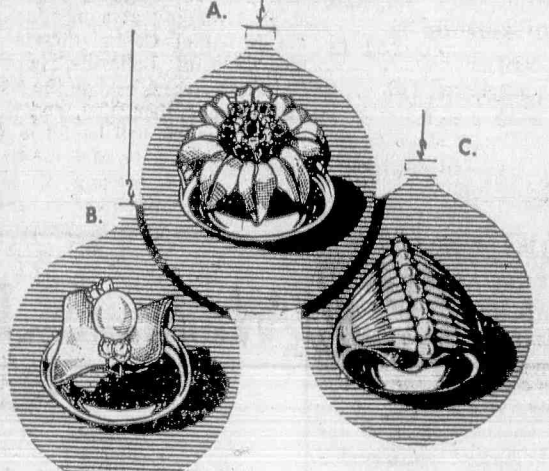
