

Board of Education Wants Stadium for New School; Commission May Say 'No'

Belleville Board of Education is going to have a rough time with its request to the Board of Commissioners for transfer of the entire stadium property as the site for the proposed new high school.

In fact, if the behind-the-scenes

prophecies materialize, the school board won't get the stadium at all. None of the commissioners has expressed any desire to comply with the formal request for the transfer made Tuesday night. School board members voted last Friday night to send their

attorney, Max Schwartz, to Tuesday's commission meeting to ask for the transfer. Schwartz said Tuesday that if a high school is built off Passaic Avenue near the stadium that the playing fields would be half under the jurisdiction of the school board and half under the jurisdiction of Commissioner George Kiernan's department of parks and public property.

KIERNAN'S VIEWS

Kiernan noted that the town presently permits the school to use the stadium "and there doesn't seem to be any problems at all." He said he didn't understand why everything has to be changed now.

"If the school board puts up its high school, what makes school officials think that all of a sudden we won't let the teams and so forth use the stadium?" Kiernan asked.

"What's the difference who manages the stadium, the town or the school board. Both agencies will continue to use the facilities anyway," Kiernan told The Belleville Times.

NEW APPROACH

Commissioner Robert Gruhin told the school board members Tuesday night, "I am alarmed at the approach you have taken to this problem." Gruhin noted that when the matter originally was presented to the commissioners several months ago, "all you wanted was a little strip of land to supplement some privately owned property off Passaic Avenue. Now you want the whole stadium."

THE FUTURE

Mayor Isadore J. Padula offered this explanation as to what "will probably happen in the future." He said that the commissioners would probably transfer "temporarily" enough property for the school board to erect a high school. Padula explained some property transfer will be necessary to permit the school board to hold a referendum on the high school plan; the referendum is scheduled for April. "If the referendum is turned down," Padula said, "then the property would revert back to the town."

Sal Calabro, president of the Citizens' Tax Council, told the commissioners his group is opposed "to the transfer of the property if it is premised upon the assumption that a high school is going to be built." Calabro said, however, that a transfer would result in added "financial efficiencies."

The Tax Council head stated he is a great believer in "letting the people rule." Along this line he said if voters approve the high school referendum in April, "I would be the last person to object to the plans for a new school."

Others speaking at Tuesday's commission session included Mrs. Violet Rochau, school board president, and Allan Crisp, chairman of the citizens advisory committee.

One Death In Belleville Due to Storm

Here's a statistical summary of the blizzard which has disrupted life in Belleville since Sunday:

20.4 inches—the depth of the snow, a record fall for the pre-winter season;

8 degrees—the lowest temperature during the storm and a new low record for December 13 since 1933 when the previous record of 14 was set;

73 miles per hour—the highest measured gust during the storm; heavy winds drifted snow and complicated snow clearing tasks;

1 casualty—Roy W. Tasney, 68 of 25 Mertz Avenue, Belleville died of a heart attack while shoveling snow;

2 days—the length of the special no-school vacation in Belleville. Classes resumed yesterday.

16 telephone calls—the number of complaints to Town Hall, complaints of poor snow removal service;

11 pieces — of snow removing equipment was used throughout the storm by the Belleville Public Works Department;

2 stork calls—one was a false alarm but Public Works Foreman Vincent Mustacchio took Mrs. Rae Turilli of 30 Wallace Street to Clara Maass Memorial Hospital in a CD truck; a baby girl was the result.

There are undoubtedly thousands of interesting stories which are constantly being discovered by The Belleville Times staff. One example is the Clara Maass Memorial Hospital where the storm kept at home all but seven members of the dietary staff.

To add to hospital complications, the automatic device which carries food trays to the different floors broke down—and well everyone at the hospital donned a temporary uniform and acted as waiters, carrying trays from the kitchen even to the sixth floor when necessary.

Commissioner Robert Gruhin reports that preparations for the snow clearance began Sunday afternoon before the white flakes began falling.

"We were told to expect four to six inches," Gruhin said, "and we planned to keep up with the storm."

It wasn't long before 11 pieces of equipment, 10 trucks and 1 payload, were put into service. Ralph Vora, superintendent of public works, was on the job from 3:30 Sunday afternoon to 1 a.m. Monday. He returned to work the same afternoon.

Although, at 1 a.m. Monday the snow was still falling, the public works department still believed only four to six inches would fall and plowing efforts were continued in the hope of having all the streets cleared by Monday morning.

Well the snow didn't stop, but

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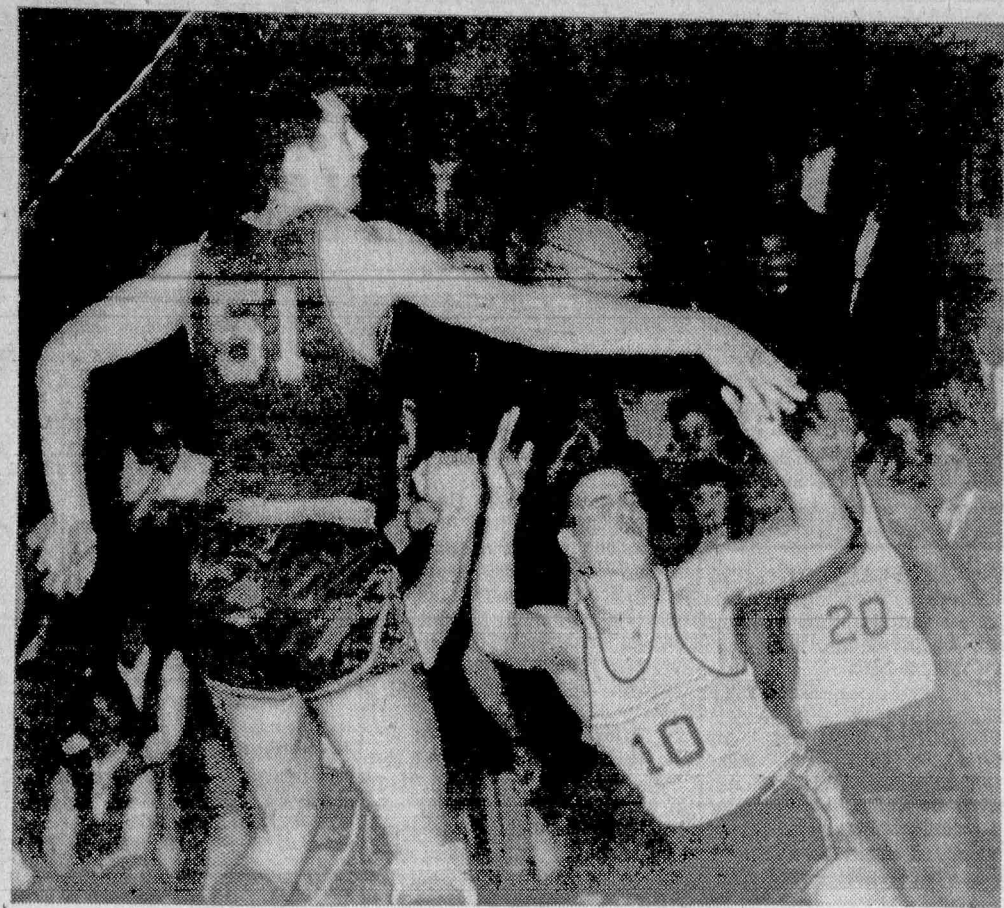

BHS Quintet Scores 63-46 Victory Over Garfield High

Belleville High opened the 1960-61 basketball season Friday by romping Garfield High 63-46 in the Belleville gym. The Bellboys played a very fine game showing an ability to come back in the second half, and gave promise of a fine season to come.

The Blue and Gold exhibited some fine team play in the third quarter to break a 25-25 half-time deadlock and go out in front 45-30 at the end of three periods.

In the first minute of the third period, the game stayed fairly close with the Blue and Gold taking a 30-29 edge. But then Belleville exploded for 15 points to the Boiler-makers' one and iced the

game. Belleville used a series of fast breaks here, as they were led by Larry Latore's six points in that rally. Latore played an exceptionally fine game as Belleville's alert playmaker, besides scoring 22 points.

Early in the second period the Bellboys had led by five points, 13-8, and again 15-10, but Garfield came back to go ahead 25-23. Latore tying it up just before the buzzer with a jump shot.

In the final quarter the Bellboys worked up to a 20-point lead at one point with Latore and Ray Hackett providing the punch. But five straight points by Garfield, their biggest rally of the night, closed that margin quickly. Mike Chieffo then ended the Bellboy scoring with a jump shot.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that the following ordinance was passed on second and final reading at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville held Tuesday evening, Dec. 13, 1960 having been read in its final form at published according to law.

AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE CONSTRUCTION OF SIDEWALKS IN FRANKLIN AVENUE FROM MILL STREET NORTH TO THE EXISTING SIDEWALK, AS A LOCAL IMPROVEMENT, AND TO MAKE AN APPROPRIATION TO PAY THE COST THEREOF AND TO PROVIDE A DOWN PAYMENT AND AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, DO ORDAIN as follows:

Section 1. Concrete sidewalks 4-feet in width shall be constructed on the west side of the portion of Franklin Avenue, a public street in the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, which extends from the existing sidewalk at Mill Street to the existing sidewalk near Copper Place, a distance of approximately 770 feet. The existing concrete walk at the Erie Railroad shall not be replaced. Said improvement shall be made in accordance with the plan and specifications entitled "Proposed Sidewalk Construction in Franklin Ave. between Mill St. and Copper Pl.," prepared by the Department of Public Works of the Town of Belleville, dated September 29, 1960, and approved by the Town Engineer and the Board of Commissioners, a copy of which is on file in the office public inspection.

Section 2. The said sidewalk improvement shall be undertaken as a sidewalk improvement and the cost thereof shall be assessed in the following manner: An accurate account of the cost of constructing or laying the sidewalks shall be kept and such cost shall be assessed upon the several properties fronting on the improvement in proportion to their respective frontage thereon pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 65 of Title 40 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey.

Section 3. Before making said sidewalk improvement or awarding any contract for such sidewalk improvement, the Town Clerk shall cause notice of the proposed sidewalk improvement to be given to the owner or owners of all real estate affected thereby. The notice shall contain a description of the property affected sufficient to identify it, a description of the improvement and a statement that unless the owner or owners complete the same within 45 days after service thereof, the Town will make the improvement at the expense of the owner or owners. Such notice shall be served in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 65 of Title 40 of the Revised Statutes of New Jersey, in particular Section 40:65-3 and Section 40:65-4, and the proof of service shall be filed with the officer of the Town in charge of the records of tax liens of the Town within 10 days after service thereof.

Section 4. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the Town will contribute no part of the cost of said improvement, it being expected that the cost of the improvement will be borne wholly by the owner or owners of the real estate affected by the improvement and that the special assessments levied therefor will equal \$2,700, and (2) no special assessments for such purpose have been levied or confirmed and (3) such special assessments may be paid in two annual installments.

Section 5. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the making of such improvement (hereinafter referred to as "purpose"), is not a current expense of said Town, and (2) it is necessary to finance said purpose by the issuance of obligations of said Town pursuant to the Local Bond Law of New Jersey and (3) the estimated amount of money necessary to be raised from all sources for said purpose is \$2,700, and (4) \$135 of said sum is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance said purpose, and (5) the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$2,565 and (6) the cost of said purpose, as hereinbefore stated, includes the sum of \$100, which is estimated to be necessary to finance (a) engineering and inspection costs and legal expenses and (b) the cost of issuing the obligations authorized by this ordinance and (c) interest on such obligations, to the extent permitted by Section 40:1-55 of said Local Bond Law.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$135, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for said Town are now available to finance said purpose. The sum of \$135 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purpose.

Section 7. To finance said purpose, bonds of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$2,565 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6 per cent) per annum. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by

resolutions to be hereafter adopted. Section 8. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of said \$2,565 of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$2,565 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (six per cent) per annum, and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Law. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 9. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of said purpose, according to its reasonable life, is a period of 10 years computed from the date of said bonds. Section 10. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement re-

quired by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Town Clerk of said Town, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Town, as defined in Section 40:1-76 of said Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$2,565 and that notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 11. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

STATEMENT

The ordinance published herewith has been finally passed and the twenty day period of limitation within which a suit, action or proceeding questioning the validity of such ordinance can be commenced as provided in the Local Bond Act, has begun to run from the date of the first publication of this statement.

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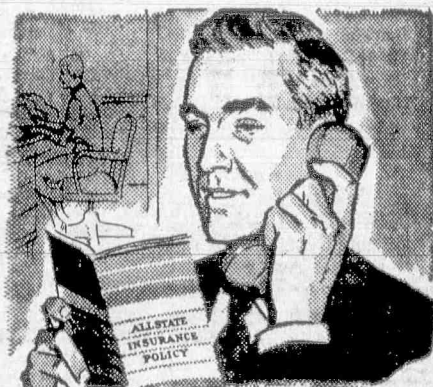

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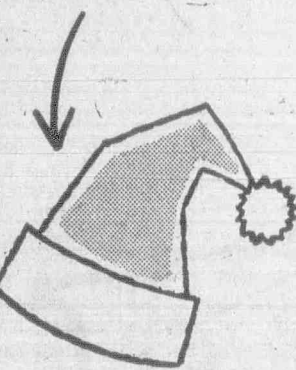

Section 1. The water system maintained by the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, to supply the Town and its inhabitants with water, shall be improved by the making of the following improvements at the Belleville Reservoir:

1. Enlarging the present high pressure service meter pit;
2. Constructing a new meter pit for the low pressure service;
3. Constructing a new pit for regulators and by-pass on high service line;
4. A new water meter on low service line;

sum of \$500 which is estimated to be necessary to finance (a) engineering and inspection costs and legal expenses and (b) the cost of issuing the obligations authorized by this ordinance, including printing, advertisements of ordinances and notice of sale, and (c) to the extent permitted by Section 40:1-55 of said Local Bond Law, interest on such obligations.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that such water supply system would have been self-liquidating, as defined in Section 40:1-79 of said Local Bond Law, during the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1959, had there been included in the interest and debt redemption charges for such year an amount equal to interest for one year at the rate of four and one-half per centum (four and one-half per cent) per annum, on said bonds or notes, and the amount of the first installment of serial bonds legally issuable to finance such purpose.

Section 4. To finance said purpose, bonds of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$26,000 are hereby authorized and shall be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law, in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 5. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$26,000 are hereby authorized and shall be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law, in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (six per cent) per annum and may be renewed

from time to time pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of outstanding notes hereby authorized shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If standing notes and bonds issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of the principal of such notes then outstanding.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and stated that the period of usefulness of said purpose according to its reasonable life is a period of 40 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 7. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Town Clerk of said Town, and that such statement so filed shows that the sum of \$500,000 plus 30 per cent defined in Section 40:1-76 of said Local Bond Law, is increased by

Monday morning the regular public work staff, about 25 workers, went home to sleep and 25 emergency drivers and personnel were called in and the snow removal job continued.

Actually, Belleville kept up with the storm fairly well, superior to any other town in New Jersey if you take the word of truck drivers, post office truck drivers, milk and breadmen who journeyed throughout different sections of the state.

By 10 p.m. Tuesday, every street in Belleville was open, including the side streets. "When the only complaint we have left is that the town hall parking lot needs to be cleared," Vara told The Times smiling, "we know we've done a good job."

Today and tomorrow, public works trucks will widen intersections and continue to salt and cinder streets. Gruhin said he hopes to be able to begin trucking snow in the business sections late this week.

COSTS MONEY

Belleville commissioners Tuesday night gave Gruhin's department an emergency appropriation of \$5,000 to cover the added payroll expenses.

Comparing the storm to the big one in 1947, Gruhin feels that the public works department did a superior job in the past few days. He cited the lack of public transportation facilities today as compared to those in 1947 and the greatly increased number of private cars on the road which complicated snow clearing work since Sunday.

"I think the town should be proud of the job done; our streets are passable and I sincerely think our men did a terrific job," the public works director said.
