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### Winter Welcome

## Town Was Ready For More Snow, It Rained Instead

The first day of winter arrived yesterday at 3:27 p.m. and Belleville joined other east coast communities in welcoming the season's first storm originally forecast as heavy snow but which turned out to be nothing but rain and mild temperatures.

Public Works Department workers however had begun preparations early Tuesday afternoon for the predicted storm and director Robert Gruhin told The Times that he had 25 men on stand-by alert Tuesday evening in anticipation of any snow fall.

spread rock salt and cinders were ready for service. Superintendent of Public Works Ralph Vara said that his men began repairing plows and continuing maintenance on the snow removal equipment Monday. Vara said that last week, Monday and Tuesday, workers cleared drainage basins which prevented the more serious street flooding conditions encountered in several municipalities yesterday.

The Public Works Department now plans to continue the clean-up after last week's storm: the basic plan was first to keep up with the snow fall in clearing main streets, and second to continue snow removal efforts until all streets are open in Belleville.

Once streets were cleared, the department began widening intersections, clearing spaces in front of public buildings including churches, banks, the post office and so forth, and clearing of bus stops, and finally, removing snow in trucks from the business districts.

Both Gruhin and Vara told The Belleville Times they received very few complaints from residents irritated by snow removal operations.

Vara said that side streets are sometimes icy because residents clearing driveways toss the snow into the streets. "Once driveways are cleaned," Gruhin said "we hate to go back and plow because we'd be filling in the driveways, and then we would really have complaints." Yesterday's rain melted much of the snow remaining in some side streets.

Tuesday during the day, workers were still cleaning up after last week's storm. Snow was removed from the business district along Washington Avenue between William Street and Belleville Avenue.

### Theatre Party This Saturday

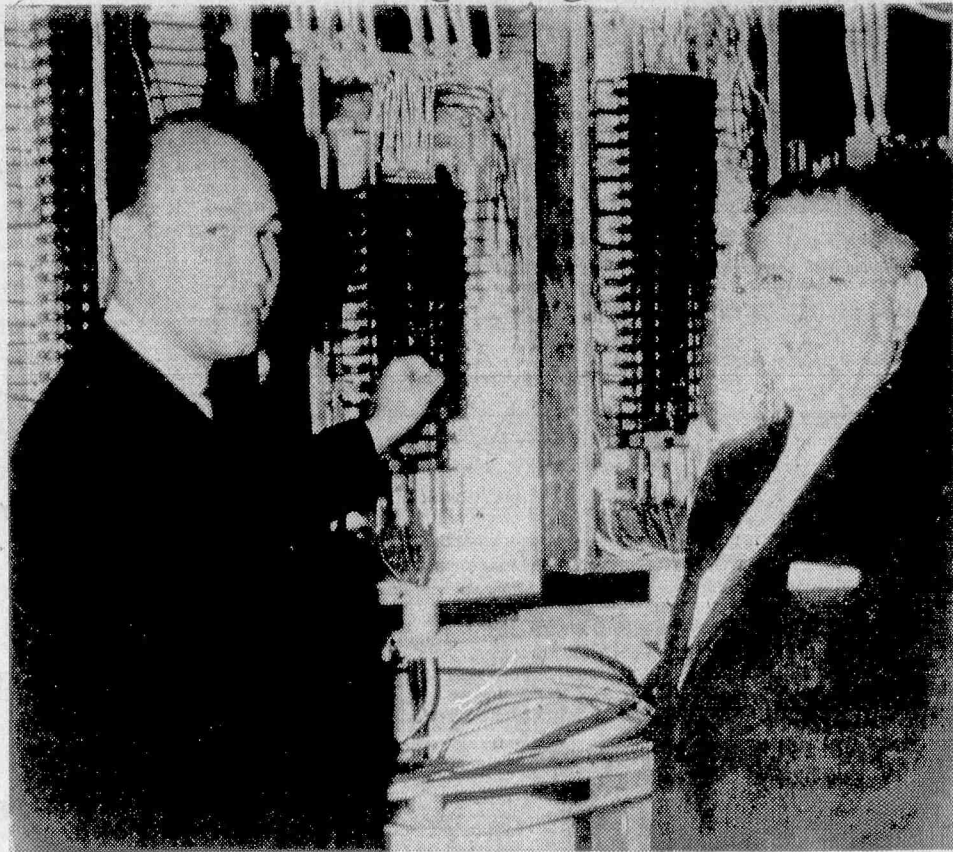
A full house is expected for this Saturday's Christmas children's party at the Capitol Theatre, 362 Washington Avenue, Belleville.

### Wallace-Tiernan Merges With Strassenburgh Co.

Wallace and Tiernan Inc., of Belleville and the R. J. Strassenburgh Company of Rochester, N. Y., have merged. The merger was approved by stockholders this month with a two for one stock split authorized. The merger and stock split was "overwhelmingly approved" by over 98 per cent of the shares voted.

Under the terms of the merger, Strassenburgh stockholders will receive 400,000 pre-split shares of Wallace and Tiernan stock. The merger and stock split are effective as of the close of business December 9, 1960 and distribution of the additional shares will be made on or before December 20, 1960.

The merger brings together the ethical drug operations of the R. J. Strassenburgh Company and the Maltbie Laboratories Division, under the direction of Robert J. Strassenburgh II as president of the division and as a corporate vice-president of Wallace and Tiernan Inc., in charge of pharmaceutical operations. Edwin G. Strassenburgh Sr. and Robert J. Strassenburgh II both become directors of Wallace and

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## Arthur M. Pico Will Run for Board Seat; Opposed to New HS

### Clifton School Teacher Says 'ABC' is Plotting With Board of Education

Arthur M. Pico of 128 Celia Terrace has today announced his candidacy for the Belleville Board of Education and released a platform strongly opposed to the construction of a new high school. Pico is a school teacher in Clifton and holds a masters degree in administration of education.

He said he believes Mrs. Violet Rochau and Richard Drake, incumbents seeking re-election, are plotting with a group of individuals labelled as the ABC group "to influence Belleville citizens to vote for a new high school which in my considered judgment we do not need."

The new candidate said he would have the present high school expanded which, he contends, "would more than satisfy Belleville's educational requirements."

**ENROLLMENTS**  
He cited decreasing school enrollments in Belleville as the primary reason he is opposed to a new high school. Pico also noted that parochial schools have a growing influence with the St. Peter's School extension and the relatively new schools at Holy Family and St. Anthony's Churches. Pico said that the new Essex Catholic High School currently has an enrollment of 1,200 students and that the enrollment will grow to 3,000 by 1965.

**ABC "BRAINWASHED"**  
Pico charged that the ABC group has been "brainwashed" into believing a new high school is needed. He said that "members of the . . . ABC for the most part constitute the majority of the committees allegedly studying high school requirements."

He said the ABC's endorsement of Mrs. Rochau and Mr. Drake was an "obvious demonstration of (their) bias." He questioned the ABC's ability to make the statement that Mrs. Rochau and Drake are "the best qualified candidates to serve on the board of education prior to their knowing what other candidates would declare themselves."

The candidate said that if the ABC was truly unbiased, they would have waited and studied "the full slate before making their alleged selection."

Pico together with Mrs. Rochau and Drake are the only persons who have entered the February race for two expiring seats on the school board. Mrs. Rochau is presently the board's president and Drake the vice-president.

The complete text of Arthur Pico's statement announcing his candidacy follows:

**PICO STATEMENT**  
"After studying, what I consider to be the improper behavior of the Board of Education, I have decided to become a candidate for the board so that I might be in a position to rectify its immature current actions."

"It is apparent to me, that Mrs. Rochau and Mr. Drake act-

ing in consort with a group of individuals labelled as the ABC group are plotting to influence Belleville citizens to vote for a new high school, which in my considered judgment we do not need. ## Town to Take Control of Dental Clinic January 1

### Belleville Foundation Maintained Service 11 Years at \$60,000 Cost

The Belleville Dental Clinic for medically indigent school children will be turned over to the town health department January 1. The clinic was organized in 1949 by the Belleville Foundation.

Commissioner Nuncio Pico, director of public affairs, told the last commission meeting the new minimum state health code to become effective, next April requires municipalities to offer dental clinic facilities.

The clinic is presently being run by the Belleville Foundation. The service is conducted two days each week for needy children from parochial and public schools in Belleville. Dr. Cecelia Dows has been the dentist in charge for the clinic's entire 11-year history.

Nearly \$60,000 has been spent on the clinic by the foundation. All equipment will be given the town on January 1. After January 1, the town also will finance the clinic's operation.

## Howard Savings Opens Branch

The Howard Savings Institution celebrated the opening of its new Wessex branch with gifts for all who opened savings or personal checking accounts for \$10 or more December 10. The gifts included a choice of lamp, bathroom scale, electric clock, six - piece casserole set or six - piece set of souvenir glasses. The new branch is at 27 Mountain Avenue, in North Caldwell, midway between Caldwell and Verona centers.

The attractive new building is an authentic adaptation of early 18th Century Dutch Colonial architecture, according to William L. Maude, president of the bank. The exterior walls are of brownstone in which multipaned windows, hung with solid paneled wood shutters, have been set at regular intervals.

The brownstone used in the Wessex branch was taken from old New York homes, reworked and then cut in oblong blocks. As in Dutch Colonial days, these blocks have been laid in even coursing on the front of the building, more at random along the sides and quite irregularly along the back. Both gabled ends of the bank building, each pierced by a simple stone chimney, are finished with "shakes" or hand-hewn shingles. There are entrances to the bank from both Bloomfield Avenue and the free parking area to the rear on Elm Road; modern drive - in tellers' windows are set in the side (east) and rear walls.

The interior of the Wessex branch, completely air conditioned for both Winter and Summer weather, is designed to offer the cordial welcome so characteristic of large early American rooms, combining the best features of living room and kitchen. The entire floor surface is covered with black, white and tan carpeting and the windows are hung with Turkey - red draperies. All hardware and lighting fixtures are of authentic Colonial design wherever possible.

## How To Prevent Christmas Fires

How many persons will die in fires during the Christmas holiday?

"Not a one, necessarily," the National Safety Council declared today. "The grim picture of frequent fires at Christmas does not need to be... not if people take a few precautions."

The Council cited these facts about fires:

1. More than 1,000 persons died last year in December - month when most fire deaths occurred.
2. Chief victims are the very young - children under five - and persons 75 years of age or more.
3. In recent years, more than half a million homes have been struck by fire.
4. Fire losses in the home will total more than 300 million dollars this year.

To keep yourself and your loved ones from becoming fire victims, the National Safety Council makes these life - saving suggestions:

- Don't let gift wrappings accumulate so they become a fire hazard.
- Don't smoke in bed. And at holiday get - togethers, use deep ash trays that will hold burning cigarettes securely.
- Check your Christmas tree wiring for possible shorts. Better to buy a new string of lights than to risk having tragedy visit your home.
- Don't leave the Christmas tree lights burning if you're away from home or out of the room for long.
- Don't put your tree up too early. And don't leave it up so long it gets dried out. Keep it moist.
- Metallic Christmas trees are fine - if you use the floor flood-dealing short by putting a string lights most manufacturers recommend. Don't risk a death - of lights on a metallic tree.

## John W. Johnson, 65; Board Vice-Chairman At Pettit Paint Co.

KINNELON—John W. Johnson, a resident of this community, a pioneer marine paint manufacturer, and vice chairman of the board of Pettit Paint Company, Belleville, died December 11 at the age of 65, after a short illness.

Mr. Johnson was one of the founders of the Pettit Paint Company, joining that firm in 1923. He was treasurer from 1923 to 1948, president from 1948 to 1953, and elected vice chairman of the board in 1953.

He was born in Stanton in 1895, graduated from Rutgers University with a degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1916. He served as a non-commissioned officer in World War I. After the war he was a salesman for Edgar Minor and Sons, chemical manufacturer, New York. In March 1920 he married Hilda Titus of East Orange.

Surviving are his wife; a son, Warne Johnson of Upper Montclair, now president of Pettit Paint Company; and four sisters: Mrs. John Topping of Summit; Mrs. Howard Sauter of West Orange; Miss Helen Johnson of Jersey City, and Mrs. William Dilts of Flemington.

Mr. Johnson was a trustee of the Smoke Rise Community Church in Kinnelon and services were held there Wednesday, December 14, at 11:30 a.m.

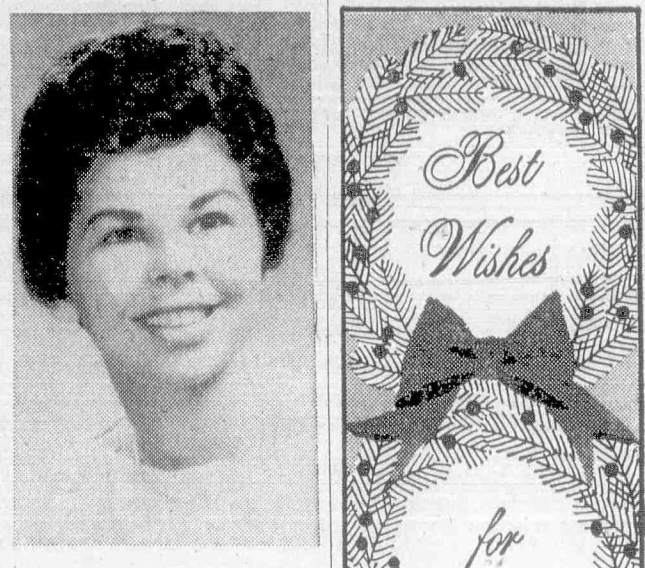

The ABC Committee, a group of Belleville citizens interested in the election of the best qualified candidates to membership on the board of education, has announced it will back Board's President Mrs. Violet F. Rochau, and Vice-President, Richard H. Drake for re-election next February.

In so doing, co-chairmen William N. Bennett, Jr., William A. Boyd and John B. Di Rienzo, issued the following statement:

"In order to encourage fully qualified citizens to run for office, we must assure them of our support for re-election when they have shown the mature judgment and seasoned ability required to serve the town capably and efficiently.

"That is the case in this election, and it is of particular importance at a time when the present Board has embarked on a long awaited improvement program. We do not believe that a break in the continuity of the present leadership would serve any useful purpose, particularly when there are already rumors of politically backed candidates entering the field.

"Because of our success last year, we expect to increase the membership of our committee of 100, and will wage a factual campaign, free from personalities, to convince our fellow townspeople that, first, they should take an active interest in the campaign and express their opinion at the polls, and secondly, that it is to our mutual advantage to re-elect Mrs. Rochau and Mr. Drake."

continuing to seek total control of paralytic polio," Sullivan declared.

"The people of Belleville, through their support of the March of Dimes for more than 20 years, have contributed substantially to a great health program that resulted in the Salk vaccine. Now, another advance in this field can be credited with the development of Dr. Sabin's oral live-virus vaccine.

"Local dollars are also going to support the work of Dr. John Calabro at Jersey City Medical Center where the Essex County Chapter sponsors the Juvenile Arthritis Clinic in collaboration with National Foundation chapters in Bergen, Hudson and Union Counties.

"We hope to move along similar lines in the birth defects field, perhaps with establishment of a clinic locally.

"As for our educational program, we have nine Essex residents training in the various health fields under scholarships totalling more than \$23,800.

"I am confident the people of our town will continue to fight for themselves and their children through the New March of Dimes, both as volunteer workers and through their contributions."

Masters Degree in Administration of Education and naturally it should be expected that my sympathies would be in favor of improved education, and indeed they are! However, I am a dedicated teacher who believes that good education is the result of a teacher's dedication to his job. It does not depend on elaborate buildings whose only contribution is higher taxes and increased costs of operation.

"Why then is a small group attempting to saddle our community with an unnecessary tax increase? Is it to satisfy the ego of an individual who would like to have a monument erected to his name, or has the ABC group been taken in by Mrs. Rochau and Mr. Drake? Let us look at the facts!

"The school population of Belleville has been dropping from year to year. Many of our elementary schools have empty classrooms; and there will be more empty classrooms if the new high school is built. Belleville's expansion is now complete since according to the census bureau, the annual population increase for the past ten years was only 300 persons per year. Assuming that 60 per cent of these are children of school age it would mean an annual increase of 180 children per year; or 18 children per school, since we have nine elementary schools and one high school in Belleville. Most of this

increase can be attributed to the highly respected residential area of the Rutan Estates. This area I must say has added dignity, prestige and culture to our town of Belleville.

## PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS

"However despite this increase, enrollments have dropped and they will continue to drop still further. This has been due to the influence of the parochial schools. St. Peter's expanded its school; and to other parochial schools were built namely; Holy Family and St. Anthony's. We have also witnessed the opening of the Essex Catholic High School which currently has an enrollment of 1200 students but which will have 3000 students by 1965. This high school will drain still more students from the Belleville High School. Therefore the future looks as if the high school population will be dwindling at an ever increasing rate.

"Since these are facts—what is the possible justification for the new proposed high school?

"The ABC the so-called 'aroused citizens committee' are a small group who have been brainwashed and would have the Belleville citizens believe that large segment of townspeople they are representatives of a large segment of townspeople who want the new high school. This is far from the truth. As a matter of fact members of this same ABC for the most part constitute the majority of the committees allegedly studying high school requirements. However, each of these committees are chaired by a member of the Board of Education who diplomatically guides and influences the decisions of those few members who do not belong to the ABC.
