### Formal Announcement Next Week

## Early Check Shows Petition For Government Change OK

The Citizens' Tax Council's petition for a change of government submitted January 9 to Town Clerk Eugene Barnett, appears to be legal and in good order, according to reports based on a preliminary check of the 4,473 signatures.

The petition calls for a referendum to decide whether or not Belleville's form of government should be changed to the Council-Manager Plan D type.

Barnett is expected to issue a statement next Monday telling the validity of the petition. Signatures are presently being checked against Essex County voting records.

The Council-Manager Plan D form calls for a municipal manager and seven councilmen. Three of the councilmen would be elected at large with all town voters participating. The remaining four councilmen would be elected by individual wards.

If Barnett announces the validity of the petitions, which is expected, next Monday, it would signify that Belleville must conduct a special election on the government change question. Such an election would, according to law, be held sometime between March 10 and May 9.

## Proposed HS Already Costing Money, Garson

Lee H. Garson today continues his strong and controversial bid for a seat on the Belleville Board of Education. Garson, who resides at 301 Jerusalem Street, and who has the blessings of the Citizens Tax Council, today states that the present school board members have "already committed themselves to the spending of thousands of dollars of the taxpayers' money" whether the proposed high school goes through or not.

Garson adds in his release today that the board is paying "unearned fees for a project that you and I know will never be built."

Although opposed to a new high school, Garson emphasizes that "I am 100 per cent in favor of better education." He said a thorough overhauling of Belleville's educational system is "long past due." Garson commented that "our entire system is in a disgraceful state." He asked that it be improved "in a businesslike, economical way."

## Arthur M. Pico Hits E. Arvidson

School board candidate Arthur M. Pico today criticized Ernest Arvidson, presently a member of the board, for his conduct as president of school five PTA. Arvidson endorsed the election of Mrs. Violet Rochau and Richard Drake in behalf of school five PTA at the group's recent candidates' night.

Pico's statement follows:

"A day of infamy came to the Board of Education due to the unethical performance of Mr. Arvidson a present member of the Board of Education.

"I, as a fully qualified candidate for the Board of Education, was invited to attend a candi-

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Belleville Board of Education this week changed its target date for a referendum question on a new high school building from April 15 to May 16. Belleville voters will be going to the polls next month for the school board election, again in April for the primary election and then again for the new high school election in May. Just when the election for a change of government would be squeezed in before May 9 is not yet known.

Sal Calabro, president of the Citizens' Tax Council, called the change of government drive "a people's movement and not a political one." Calabro presented the petitions bearing 4,473 signatures January 9 to Barnett. A total of 3,890 valid signatures, or 20 per cent of the registered vote in town, is all that's needed to force the referendum election.

Calabro said the extra 789 petitions, above the 20 per cent figure, are what he calls "insurance."

Belleville voters by a 2,254-2,771 margin turned down a referendum in 1954 for a change to the council-manager type of government. The move for a change at that time was launched by the board of commissioners.

## Mrs. Violet Rochau Says Performance Important

Mrs. Violet F. Rochau's week long campaign statement to this newspaper today calls attention to the advantage of experience on the school board. Mrs. Rochau, who is board president, is one of four candidates seeking election to two expiring seats on the school board next month.

Mrs. Rochau's press statement follows:

"On Feb. 14th of this year, two members will be elected to the Belleville Board of Education. The question should be 'Are these the two people who will best serve the schools for the next three years?' I should like to discuss my own qualifications to so serve. First this is definitely a community service being an

# Mayor's \$51,000 Salary Ordinance Is Approved by Unanimous Vote

## Hiring of School Architect Creates New Controversy

### School Board To Meet on Issue Tomorrow Night

Belleville Board of Education will convene in special session tomorrow night at 8 o'clock to reconsider its hiring of Alfonso Alvarez Jr. of Montclair as architect for the proposed new high school. The hiring of Alvarez, according to Dr. DiRuggiero, places the entire high school project in serious jeopardy.

Dr. Frank DiRuggiero requested the special meeting Tuesday in telegrams sent to all board members. Dr. DiRuggiero, who is a board member, telegraphed the following message: "Requesting Special Meeting within 72 hours to reconsider engagement of A. Alvarez."

Dr. DiRuggiero told The Times that "too many people are reaching negative conclusions since the board decided to hire Alvarez."

The Montclair architect is not a member of some architectural organizations including the American Institute of Architects. Dr. DiRuggiero said that some people don't like the idea that William Boyd, son of the chairman of the Alert Belleville Citizens (ABC) is employed by Alvarez. The ABC is supporting the selection of Mrs. Violet Rochau and Richard Drake to the school board in next month's election.

Mrs. Rochau admitted she was upset with Dr. DiRuggiero's request for a special meeting. "But it's a good thing to get this whole thing into the open," she added.

Bad reactions to the hiring of Alvarez were further stimulated this week when it became generally known that the school board added the name of the Montclair architect to a list approved by the citizens advisory committee on architects. The citizens committee did not recommend Alvarez.

Mrs. Rochau said Alvarez's name was added "because only a few of the architects on the list were from this area and it was thought that some of the members together to get a New York State or Connecticut to inspect school buildings designed by these other men."

Last week Mrs. Rochau also stated that Alvarez's suspension from the American Institute of Architects had caused the citizens committee to refrain from suggesting Alvarez as acceptable for the proposed Belleville project.

Other reactions to Dr. DiRuggiero's telegram, generally, were of surprise. Board member Ernest Arvidson said he believes "Dr. DiRuggiero is doing this for publicity" adding "this may not be the case however, if Dr. DiRuggiero has come across some earth-shaking information."

The vote to hire Alvarez was unanimous. Dr. DiRuggiero included. It was also announced before the vote was taken that William Boyd, son of the ABC chairman, was an assistant of the Montclair architect.

## Drake Discusses Town's Long Range School Goals

Richard H. Drake, an incumbent seeking election to the school board next month, today issued a statement discussing long-range goals for Belleville's educational system. Drake is presently vice-president of the local school board.

His statement follows:

"As I had indicated in a previous statement, the establishment of long-range goals for the educational effort is, and must be, one of the prime concerns of the Board of Education and its administrative staff. The very fact that these goals are long range in scope means that they must be continually reviewed and subjected to a periodic reevaluation in the light of changing conditions. They must be flexible enough and general enough to permit adaptation of the latest means for attaining our objectives without appreciably altering the ultimate goal. Among the chief long-range goals with which the school system must be concerned are:

## Kiernan, Sullivan, Gruhin Will Seek New Raises For Town Departments

Despite protests from taxpayers, lasting more than an hour Tuesday night, Belleville's five commissioners gave unanimous approval to Mayor Padula's controversial \$51,000 salary ordinance. The ordinance provides pay hikes to members of the town finance department, including a \$1,053 raise for the assistant town treasurer, Isadore J. Padula Jr., who is the mayor's son.

Tuesday night also signaled the introduction of a salary ordinance by Commissioner George F. Kiernan's parks and public property department and reports were that a \$500 raise will be introduced for all workers in Commissioner Robert Gruhin's public works department and \$600 raises for policemen and firemen and \$900 for superior officers in Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan's public safety department.

Gruhin Tuesday said the public employees "are getting salaries which are in the lowest echelon of all town workers."

Kiernan told reporters after Tuesday's meeting that "I am not going to give any of my employees raises." A check, however, revealed that most employees in Kiernan's department already received substantial raises in 1961.

Again, as two weeks ago, the commission chambers were packed with citizens, most of whom came to complain of Padula's salary hikes, high taxes and, in general, poor government. Gruhin's Finance Committee at one point late in the evening told the meeting that "actually it's not the raises we're objecting to. It's simply that the people of Belleville have lost faith in their government. The people feel they can't trust the governing officials of Belleville. That's why we're here."

Critic James Golden spent most of his time Tuesday criticizing this newspaper instead of town affairs. Golden's persistent attacks on The Belleville Times prompted several citizens to prefix their comments with the statement they wanted to keep out of the controversy "between the Times on one side and Mayor Padula and Golden on the other."

Mayor Padula refused to answer most questions raised by citizens Tuesday which concerned comparisons of Belleville to other municipalities. One man, for example asked why Nulley's salaries are so much lower than Belleville's. Padula said he didn't know anything about Nulley. He added in response to another question, that he didn't even

know if Nulley was under civil service.

When the mayor's son, Isadore Padula Jr., assistant town treasurer, was repeatedly referred to in citizens' questions, Mayor Padula noted that "Belleville has had an assistant town treasurer 30 years. I did not create the position for my son."

John Bass, president of the Rutan Estates Homeowners' Association, said he was speaking as a businessman and asked whether

## Civil Service Reports About Excessive Jobs

The salary scales proposed by Civil Service and adopted Tuesday night for Mayor Padula's finance department are based on a 40-hour work week according to A. R. Mangione Jr., director of classification and Civil Service. Belleville Town Hall employees work a 32-hour week.

Mangione attended Tuesday's commission meeting to join Mayor Padula and town clerk James Golden in emphasizing that Mayor Padula has absolutely nothing to do with the Civil Service survey of the finance department.

Under questioning by citizens at Tuesday's commission meeting, Mangione said Civil Service is not an efficiency expert. Mangione said that Civil Service definitely could not detect any inefficiencies or unnecessary jobs in Mayor Padula's finance department. He added "we don't determine how efficient a person works either."

The citizens' questions concerning unnecessary jobs and an inefficient department were prompted by an editorial in this newspaper last week. Mangione said if any unnecessary jobs were included on the salary scale adopted Tuesday, it's up to Mayor Padula as director of the department to detect them.

Critic James Golden, who has passed by every opportunity to criticize Padula's \$51,000 salary ordinance, repeated his personal observation that "town employees are supposed to work 32 hours a week, but I figure with some coming in late and with all the coffee breaks, that they actually work about 28 hours a week."

Mangione made it clear that "the salary ranges we recommend are based on full-time employees working a normal 40-hour work week."

Mayor Padula made no comment on this question Tuesday.

Mangione attended Tuesday's commission session at the invitation of Francis McCoy, town treasurer. Mayor Padula made it clear there had nothing to do with Mr. Mangione's coming here to night. When Padula was asked if he knew Mangione was coming to the meeting, the mayor replied, I knew this afternoon that he would be here tonight.

Mangione explained in detail

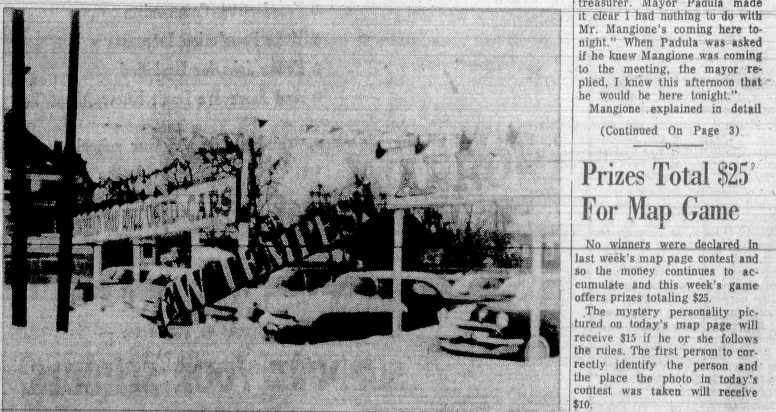

## Mayor Padula Wins Taxpayers Lose Again

Well, Tuesday night at the Belleville Town Commission meeting Mayor Isadore Padula had his way. His colleagues on the commission unanimously approved Padula's salary raises and higher salary limits for Finance Department employees.

We firmly believe the action was bad for Belleville — bad for the overburdened taxpayers too. While a few of Padula's employees merited raises and salary adjustments, we believe Padula should have eliminated unnecessary jobs before he saddled the taxpayers with additional burdens.

Padula's moment of glory is at hand. Undoubtedly he is the most popular figure with some employees in the Finance Department. Whether or not the taxpayers

feel the same way about a free-spending mayor remains to be seen. Judging by the hostility of the crowds attending the past two commission meetings which considered the mayor's pay raise proposals, we think Padula's unpopularity with taxpayers should produce for him — not a moment of elation — but a moment of concern over Belleville's future.

Padula's raises will trigger similar demands from other department and town employees. Are we to deny our police and firemen pay raises earned long ago but long delayed? And what about our public works employees who worked 'round the clock removing snow from our streets? And what about our genuinely hard-working employees of the public affairs department, the public property department — and what about our 250 teachers and principals — the school office employees — the custodians — how about the employees of our public library?

If Padula's policies persist, many Belleville homeowners will be unable to pay the high taxes resulting from excessive wages paid to employees whose jobs should be abolished in the first instance.

how Civil Service determines its salary recommendations for municipal departments. He also noted that Civil Service made the recent survey of Mayor Padula's department entirely on our own volition.

Frank McGill, representing the Citizens' Tax Council, said he was appointed to represent the taxpayers in advance that Mangione was going to attend the meeting. "I would have had 14,000 questions for him had I known he was coming," McGill added.

The Tax Council representative, noting that Golden had a long list of questions ready for Mangione, said "this whole arrangement looks like a set-up to me." McGill said he voted for Golden in past commission elections but it seems to me that his recent feud with the newspapers has turned him a complete 180 degrees," inferring that Golden has now come to the defense of the commission rather than the taxpayers.

Golden later regained the floor and denied that he's changed his position at all. After again making several derogatory remarks about this newspaper, he said, "I have not defended these raises" and in the next moment added "it's not up to me to criticize these raises as being excessive." Golden, however, it was his right to criticize The Belleville Times for the manner in which news is disseminated."

"(1) Achievement of an effective balance between the concepts of education for knowledge and of education for self-realization. The tremendous expansion of available knowledge in the last few years cannot be ignored, but we must not over-emphasize the acquisition of that knowledge at the expense of training our children how best to use it.

"(2) Development of diversified programs designed to challenge and develop to their fullest the potential abilities of all children, whatever their interests or abilities. These programs must include, but are not limited to, specialized education for children who are handicapped, either physically or mentally (and Belleville is now in the forefront of experimentation in these areas); specialized education for those children who are mentally advanced to the extent that the

normal program is restricting their abilities rather than developing them; and more effective programming of "terminal" education for those students who will go directly into jobs and for whom the last and best preparation for their future efforts must be the training they receive in High School.

"(3) The maintenance of a reasonable view towards the grading and promotion of students. We must neither deny an effective and continually broadening education to the student who has genuine difficulty in advancing nor can we deny the serious and able student the just reward of a meaningful diploma.

"(4) The development and implementation of an effective guidance program not only at the High School level but also at the Junior High level and even earlier. When the student is able to bring to his studies a directed effort and the feeling that he is making progress towards a known and desirable goal, at that point real progress begins.

"(5) A program of development and replacement of buildings and physical facilities which recognizes the importance of avoiding commitment to rigid details before the need arises unless such details can be readily adapted to changing times. First things must be given priority; as each step in the program is reached the entire program must be appraised anew."

dates' night at School No. 5 on the evening of January 16th. I attended with the intention of presenting my views on quality education for the students of Belleville. After all candidates spoke, Mr. Arvidson, on the pretext of making a thank you statement on behalf of School No. 5 for our attendance, proposed to read a lengthy statement which favored the election of Mrs. Rochau and Mr. Drake. This unethical practice by Mr. Arvidson, who seems to believe in victory at any price, has violated the ethical standards of the Board of Education. Performance of this caliber are dangerous to the very root and core of our educational system and should not be allowed to be repeated if quality education is to be expected in our schools.

"For you see—the effectiveness of the school board member is important to pupils, for upon it

depends whether they will have the maximum in educational opportunity. This effectiveness is important to teachers, for upon it depends their opportunities and incentives for professional growth and service to young people. It is important to parents, for it is their children whose lives and destinies are being shaped in our schools.

"Is Mr. Arvidson aware of the fact that a board member should have the time to devote himself unstintingly towards good public relations and should be able to appreciate the points of view of all segments of society. The effective school — board member should have the emotional maturity essential for the job. He should be able to listen to all sides of a question and make decisions free from emotion and prejudice.

"He is in school work because he is interested in seeing his community achieve the best education possible and not because he has an ax to grind, a pet theory which he intends to push at all cost, or resentment against a person or group which causes him to use his position as a weapon.

"I leave it to the parents of the children of School No. 5 and to all of the citizens of Belleville to decide whether his conduct has been in accord with the high standards that they ask of a member of the Board of Education."

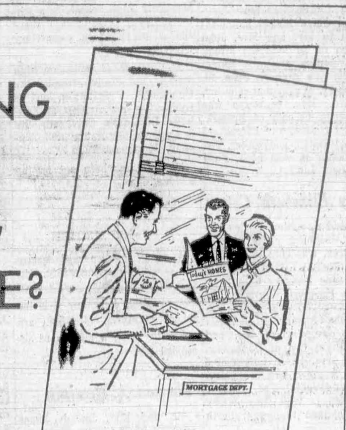

This year's Big Ten Basketball Conference is proving to be one of the tightest in history, and the championship may not be decided until the final game is played.

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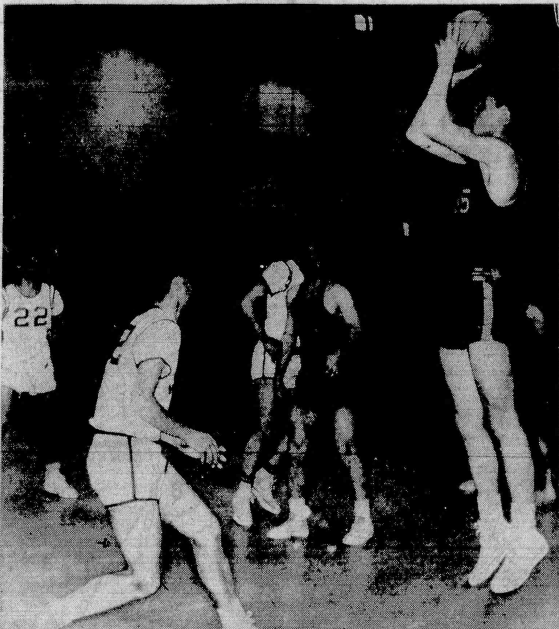

The Bellboys' most persistent drive came in the third period when they outscored Irvington by two points, 16-14. And with the support of a large Belleville crowd, The Blue and Gold held on to what can truly be described as a victorious defeat.

Belleville's first period according to the running score shows the team's evenly paced Irvington up to a 9-3 score with the Bellboys in the lead. Red Higgins' deadly eye swished through six of Belleville's nine tallies on long jump shots. Irvington then spurred to a 14-1 point rally.

High man for Belleville was senior Frank Annichiarico, Higgins collected 13 points. Most of Annichiarico's tallies came during the second half with eight points coming in Belleville's big third period.

"As a professional civic and  
business leaders of the community,  
the ABC Committee wishes to

only the same common sense  
and progressive leadership which
