## Polls Open Again Tuesday To Ask School Budget OK

It's back to the polls again for Belleville voters next Tuesday. The defeated \$2,151,575 budget for the board of education is being resubmitted, without change, to the electorate for approval. If rejected, the budget would go to the board of commissioners for editing before finally being submitted to the State Board of Education for validation.

Mrs. Mary B. Shader, Belleville Board of Education secretary told The Times yesterday that taxpayers are playing about \$1,000 for next Tuesday's second election on the budget.

The defeat of the school budget last week was by a narrow 103 votes. Rumbling behind the scenes during the past week appears to indicate the budget will receive a more favorable score at the polls next Tuesday.

The defeat of the budget last week was the third time in four

years that Belleville voters have turned down the board's financial requests. Mrs. Violet F. Rochau, who presided at a special meeting of the former school board last week, observed that a review of items in the 1961-62 school budget indicated that all categories had already been reduced as far as possible in the original proposal.

A statement released by the board said that "maintenance costs have been cut to a minimum and reduction in the salary schedules would place Belleville in an unfavorable position in its ability to attract and retain competent teachers."

The new school board, which organized Monday night with Arthur M. Pico occupying the seat formerly held by Mrs. Rochau, made no mention of the school budget.

## Government Vote Would Reduce Wards to Two

A change in Belleville's form of government would mean a change in Belleville's number of voting wards, from the present total of four to only two. The reduction in the number of wards was noted this past week by Mayor Isidoro Padula and Commissioner George F. Kiernan and their observations were concurred upon, at least tentatively, by Salvatore Calabro, president of the Citizens' Tax Council. The Tax Council submitted petitions calling for the government change question.

Town Clerk Eugene Barnett announced last Thursday that the referendum on the question to change the town's government from commission to Council-Manager Plan D has been scheduled for May 2.

Both Kiernan and Padula indicated they believe the Tax Council was unaware that the number of wards would be reduced to two if the government change issue goes through. But Calabro told The Belleville Times yesterday that he was aware "the possibility exists" but is waiting for a formal opinion from the Tax Council's attorney before commenting further on the topic.

# Fate of High School Referendum Up For Test Next Monday Night

## School Board Chooses D. Lally New President

The course leading to the May referendum on the proposed new high school may be delayed into rougher waters next Monday night when the new Belleville Board of Education conducts its first business meeting. Dominick A. Lally, who was elected 4-3 to the board presidency Monday night, issued a brief statement after the reorganization meeting renewing his personal support of the high school proposal. About 50 persons attended Monday's organizational meeting.

Although an identical 4-3 vote elected Michael Albertine the board's vice president, there was still uncertainty as to how the seven board members now will line up on the referendum question. Arthur M. Pico was elected last week on a platform calling for a halt to all plans to con-

duct a referendum in May. Superintendent of Schools Evan Thomas told newspapermen Monday night that a split board would "radically change" our feelings on the referendum. So far, Pico is the only board member to oppose continuing plans for the referendum.

Albertine told The Belleville Times this week that "I'm in favor of the referendum" but added that "my thinking is subject to revision." Dr. Frank DiRuggiero in recent days has also stated he is in favor of a referendum. "Let the people decide whether they want the new school or not," DiRuggiero told this newspaper following last week's election.

Three board members including Richard H. Drake, who was returned to office last week, and Ernest Arvidson and Nicholas Juliano, are all firmly in favor of continuing plans for the May referendum.

## D. Lally Renews His Own Support Of New School

Dominick Lally, who was elected president of the Belleville Board of Education Monday night, renewed his support for the high school referendum and thanked his colleagues for "placing your trust and confidence in me."

The first two paragraphs of Lally's statement, which appears below, were read during the board session Monday, but the remainder of the statement which gives support to the new high school program was not released until the meeting had adjourned. The statement follows:

"First, I wish to thank you board members for placing your trust and confidence in me. I believe that together we must meet the challenges of the ensuing year.

"I am sure that it is our collective aim to develop between educators and the general public such united efforts as will secure for every child the highest advantages in physical, mental, social and spiritual education.

"I also wish to inform you that in my opinion, the high school program undertaken by the past board should be followed through to its scheduled completion.

"We must give the people a chance to weigh the facts concerning the proposed expansion program.

"To deprive the public of the privilege of voicing its opinion at the polls would be undemocratic."

TO INFORM PICO  
Many board members told The Times they hoped Pico might change his attitude opposing the referendum once he is brought up to date on "all the facts." A special conference of the board has been called for tomorrow at 9 p.m. expressly to provide Pico with all the facts surrounding the issue.

The outcome of tomorrow night's conference will be brought into the open at next Monday night's regular meeting of the board. Attorney Max Schwartz at that time is expected to ask the board for approval of contracts hiring Montclair architect Alfonso Alvarez to begin work on plans and specifications for the proposed new high school. The plans and specifications are required by state statute before a referendum can be held.

Both Lally and Albertine were opposed in the school board's election of officers Monday night. After nominations for president were opened, Drake nominated Juliano and Albertine nominated Lally. Nominations were closed and a secret ballot elected Lally, 4-3.

Nominations were then opened for vice president; Juliano nomi-

## For Secret Project Firm Takes Monster Through Town Streets

Using the world's largest trailer, a Belleville firm last Tuesday night transported a mysterious giant 90-ton object through the streets of town en route to Port Newark; the object, about 23-feet tall, was a marine boiler which had been modified for a top-secret missile project in California.

The Hoffman Rigging and Crane Company of 560 Corlandt Street, Belleville used its huge 50-wheel trailer to transport the metal monster from the Curtis-Wright plant in Wood-Ridge through the streets of Carlstadt, Rutherford, Nutley and Belleville to Port Newark. The object was taken through Nutley along Passaic Avenue to Centre Street, to Washington Avenue to Mill Street, to Mount Prospect Avenue to Bloomfield Avenue and Newark.

At Port Newark, the 90-ton object was put aboard a ship that will sail through the Panama Canal to the west coast. Traffic was snarled by the procession that inched its way through local streets. Bulldozers equipped with plows moved ahead of the tractor to clear any snow. Another bulldozer was used in the rear, tending its strength should the

## Another Black Eye for Belleville

Some people might think there is humor in the regular rejection of school board budgets by our voters. To us the result comes as a tragedy. When news of this event goes forth into the world about us, the proud Town of Belleville is downgraded one more notch in the eyes of on-lookers. Some of these people might have been contemplating a Belleville residence. Others might have been thinking about applying for teacher opportunities in our school system.

It is an undisputed fact of life that a good school system is a magnet which draws higher-income families to a community. Higher-income families in a community help local business and provide us with families that will be able to afford the high tax rates emanating from Town Hall.

The budget provided a modest salary increase for our teachers. Even with the modest increase, our teachers will continue to be among the lowest paid in Essex County. In such a circumstance what inducement is there for bright teachers to remain in the Belleville school system?

If Belleville voters persist in rejecting sound school budgets, we inevitably will end up with second-rate teachers unable to make the grade with better school systems offering higher salaries.

Of this we can be sure: history has proven that twice-rejected school budgets are eventually approved by the Town Commission with only token changes in the over-all budget figures. Meanwhile, the harm done to our town and the school system remains with us.

Last week the budget was rejected by

only a 108-vote majority. Approximately 25% of Belleville's registered voters bothered to visit the polls. Of the 4,483 persons voting on Feb. 14, only 3,371 cast ballots on the budget question. There were 1,737 "no" votes and 1,634 "yes" votes, leaving 1,112 voters who failed to express an opinion on the budget.

It is safe to assume that voters who wanted to vote "no" on the budget did so. The assumption therefore follows that a potential 1,112 votes could have been registered in favor of the budget if the voters had remembered to vote on the figures as well as for the candidates of their choice.

Some of the luster can be restored to the proud name of Belleville next week if the voters go to the polls and vote "yes" on the school board budget — as they should have done last week.

We continued to believe the school board budget is reasonable and should be adopted. We urge a "yes" vote next Tuesday.

## Tuesday, March 14th, A Date to Remember

"We're in good shape." So observed Mayor Isadore J. Padula last week as he introduced the new town budget, which reflects a rise of approximately 43 points in the tax rate.

We don't agree with Revenue and Finance Director Padula. We think Belleville is in bad shape. Mayor Padula lacks the insight or political courage required to demand cutbacks in town expenditures and thus give the taxpayers a much-needed break. Mayor Padula, as chief fiscal officer of our town, fails our taxpayers when he refuses to eliminate unnecessary jobs in his department. This is payroll padding of the most flagrant type — reflecting an "I don't give a damn what taxpayers think" attitude.

When Mayor Padula last month introduced his controversial salary ordinance providing a \$1,053 pay rise for his son,

Isadore Padula, Jr., and a top salary of \$10,059, and other raises totaling \$51,079, we posed several questions which Padula to this day has refused to answer.

We believe the taxpayers are entitled to the answers and, perhaps, the budget hearing scheduled for Tuesday evening, March 14, might be as good a time and place, as any for His Honor to answer some of the following questions:

1. Why doesn't Padula replace the Assistant Town Treasurer's \$10,059 job with a bookkeeper at \$4,000 per year?

2. Why must Belleville taxpayers stand the expense of four water meter readers when the work should require only two meter readers?

3. Why must Belleville taxpayers be asked by Padula to pay a Town Treasurer \$14,500 for a job worth no more than \$8,000?

After the public hearing held Jan. 24 on Mayor Padula's salary ordinance, he caused to have printed a statement claiming the taxpayers fully endorsed his salary ordinance, which provides a total of \$51,079 in salary increases.

We think the mayor ought to have a reminder on just how our taxpayers feel about those juicy \$1,000 raises and \$14,000 salaries. In next week's Times-News we again shall review the salaries and increases which are included in the budget scheduled to be aired Tuesday night, March 14.

We urge Belleville taxpayers to reserve that night for a date at Town Hall. If you can't stop the obvious waste of your money, you can see at first hand how little regard the mayor has for the overburdened taxpayers — and the great desire he has to build up a political machine at your expense. Incidentally, no cost for admission.

## On Trial

The new school board majority which brought about the election of Dominick Lally as president and Michael Albertine as vice-president is on trial. Rumors are flying thick and fast that politics is to be the order of the day in the operation of our school system.

Well, it is only a short six years ago that an Essex County Grand Jury voted a presentment against former Belleville school board members and employees who permitted politics to govern our school system.

Belleville citizens will not tolerate a return to such an unsavory condition. Three of the four school board members comprising the present majority will be up for re-election next February. Their stewardship of our school system during the next 12 months will be the decisive factor when they seek public support next year.

Despite the misgivings of some of our citizens, we have confidence in the ruling four members of our school board. We believe they will join the other three members of the board in establishing the best educational policies for our children, leaving to our professional staff the job of administering the board's policies. Should events and time prove our confidence misplaced the news and editorial columns of The Times-News will expose any attempt to foist political control upon the professional staff of our school system.

The school system should not — and cannot — be used to hand out political favors or jobs. And our professional staff should reject political interference no matter how high the source.

The school board majority is on trial. Time will show the quality of its service.
