

Budget Wins Voters' OK On Tuesday

Expenses Are Same As Rejected Feb. 14

Belleville's \$2,151,375 school budget won approval by a 228-vote margin at the polls Tuesday. The same budget had been rejected two weeks ago by a 109-vote margin when it was voted on by the school board.

Ward Four showed the biggest turnout in the two elections. Ward Four defeated the budget February 14 by a 815-534 margin. The same ward Tuesday approved the same budget by a 599 to 355 count. This ward includes the Rutan, Soho and Silver Lake sections of Belleville which vote at schools two, four, seven and ten.

Only two polling places showed the negative votes the greatest on the budget question Tuesday. The days were barely in the majority at school two where the budget was turned down 45-44 this past Tuesday. At school four a slim 110-105 margin rejected the expense items there.

What influence do women have in politics? Well history may have learned the answer in Belleville Tuesday night when not a single representative of the female population decorated a seat at the town commission meeting. And perhaps a coincidence, but the records show that Tuesday's womanless session was not only the briefest meeting, but also the quietest one enjoyed by the commissioners this year.

None of the commissioners was

Actually, no issue of vital importance was before the commissioners this week and perhaps the women simply were demonstrating their supposed extraordinary foresight by choosing the one Tuesday evening of the decade when they could stay home and watch television without having to worry about the trouble the boys might get into at Town Hall that night.

The female population, however, did have some assurance that its suffrage wouldn't be removed in Belleville. Mrs. Gertrude Raymond, secretary to the board of commissioners, was at her post Tuesday noting every word said, perhaps with the intention of making a detailed report later to her absent sisters.

Mrs. Raymond was so surprised when told she was the only woman among the more than 50 men in the room that Town Treasurer Francis McCoey joshed, "Don't worry Gertrude, you're well protected."

WHAT HAPPENED? For the benefit of the ladies who weren't there, here's a rundown of the business transpired at Tuesday's session which was not only completely lacking in women, but also in controversy and significant news.

The most interesting item Tuesday was the passage of \$600 across-the-board raises for the town's 141 police and firemen. However adoption of the pay hikes was never in question as had been publicized in detail by the press before Tuesday's meeting.

Commissioner Robert Gruhn reported he is still working on the realignment of the Third River and that he will discuss possible new routes for the stream with officials of the Glendale Cemetery in Bloomfield. The river presently runs along the cemetery's borders.

Several official reports were included in the minutes as filed with the clerk. Gerard A. Ceraso of 327 Division Avenue was named a constable from the Third Ward for a period of one year and Gustave W. Jaglowick of 504 Washington Avenue was granted a mercantile license.

Commissioner Harry Sullivan's public safety department bought a new 1961 ambulance for \$14,000 and three new patrol cars for \$2,000 each. Old vehicles are being taken in trade by the only bidder, Bigelow Motors of Belleville.

Commissioners Nuncio Pico, George Kirman and Mayor Isadore Padula had no new resolutions before the board this week. Finally, and this happened unusually early in the evening, the meeting was adjourned.

Chamber Planning Exposition

Cavalcade of Progress Will Be Staged in May

A three-day "Cavalcade of Progress" featuring exhibits of Belleville industrial, business and mercantile establishments will be sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce May 18-20 in the Elks Club here.

Twenty-nine booths will display exhibits set up by the industrial and business firms. Chamber President Arthur Jackson said this morning when plans for the exhibition were released.

Harry T. French said that space was already at a premium and although he did not reveal any names of those taking booths, it was learned that the so-called "industrial giants" of Belleville will be participating.

Jackson explained "the purpose of the 'Cavalcade of Progress' is to show the people of Belleville the many interesting things being done by Belleville's industries and the many products and services offered by Belleville's business firms."

The Chamber of Commerce believes actually few people of Belleville are aware of the "world-wide scope, the research and the activity which Belleville industries are playing in the 1960's."

"The people who work in Belleville are having a direct influence on national defense and the progress being made in an ever-expanding economy to produce a better way of life for all of us," French commented today.

Speaking in behalf of the Chamber of Commerce, French said that the officers and board of directors believe the exhibit will be of "great benefit" to the town as well as to the firms which will participate.

At School Conventions

Arthur Pico Would Have Teachers Pay Expenses

Arthur M. Pico, newest member of the Belleville Board of Education, surprised Monday's meeting when he announced his policy to oppose the board's paying school employees' expenses incurred while attending workshops, teachers conventions and so forth.

Pico opposed two resolutions dealing with such topics Monday. In both instances he cast the only negative vote. He opposed the board's paying the expenses of Edward T. Berlinski's attendance at the National Football Clinic in Atlantic City, March 13-16. Board Secretary, Mrs. Mary Shader estimated the expenses will be about \$100.

Later, Pico opposed a resolution authorizing the attendance of elementary school principals at the Regional Conference of the Department of Elementary Principals of the National Education Association for two days this month. Expenses would be about \$35 for each principal attending.

Board Decides 6-1 To Continue Plans For HS Referendum

Sen. Walter Jones of Bergen County had received the endorsement of the Belleville Republican County Committee in his bid for the GOP candidacy for governor. Nicholas R. Rapuano, town Republican chairman, told The Times last night the Belleville committee voted 22-0 with two abstentions to endorse Jones.

Jones was nominated for the endorsement by Daniel Hyde of Rutgers Street. "No one else was suggested," Rapuano said. He stated during the discussion no vote was voiced by any committeeman for the other GOP hopefuls including former labor secretary James Mitchell and State Senators Charles Sandman of Cape May and Wayne Dumont of Warren County.

Belleville committeemen also offered unanimous endorsement to Rapuano as a candidate for

Superintendent of Schools. When Thomas reported the State Board of Education not only supported but recommended municipal school boards' assuming the expenses incurred by school personnel attending educational conferences.

Pico is a school teacher in Clifton Public Schools.

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Overpowers Pico's Move To End Project

For the first time since Arthur M. Pico's election to the school board February 14, supporters of the proposed new high school have been assured the project won't be dropped before voters are given the opportunity of deciding the question at a May referendum.

The assurance came at Monday night's three-hour school board meeting when, despite earlier predictions, it became evident that Pico's election last month hasn't changed even one member's opinion on the proposed project. Pico, who was elected on a platform opposed to construction of a new high school, introduced a resolution asking the board to "immediately suspend all planning relative to the proposed new senior high school."

Pico was the only member to support resolution which was defeated by a 6-1 vote. One significant change in board voting statistics, however, appeared to benefit Dr. Frank DiRuggiero who has been waging a one-man battle to get the board to hire an architect other than Alfonso Alvarez of Montclair, DiRuggiero brought up the issue again Monday asking that the board not hire Alvarez but select an architect from a list suggested by the citizens' subcommittee. He joined DiRuggiero in supporting this resolution. Everyone else agreed to stick with Alvarez.

FOURTH VOTE Monday's vote of confidence for Alvarez marked the fourth time the Montclair architect has won the confidence of the Belleville Board of Education. While this time the vote was 5-2, he had enjoyed a 6-1 margin before Pico took over the seat occupied by Mrs. Violet F. Rochau who was defeated in last month's election.

Signing of contracts between Alvarez and the board is presently being negotiated by attorney Max Schwartz. DiRuggiero said that selection of Alvarez "has become an issue before the public" and is jeopardizing the chances for winning approval of the high school project at the May referendum.

Richard Drake, one of Alvarez's supporters, knocked DiRuggiero for supporting the architect's selection has become an issue. "More correctly, it's been made up an issue," Drake said, "and is due to the efforts of Dr. DiRuggiero."

BHS Principal Nearly Lost His Right to Vote in Town

Belleville High School principal Hugh D. Kittle nearly lost his right to vote in future elections when school board members considered a resolution to ban schools to all employees on election days.

As introduced by Arthur M. Pico, the resolution read, "Resolved, that instructional personnel shall be required to leave the school premises on school election days no later than 2 p.m."

School election polls open at 2 o'clock and close at 9 p.m. Just as the board was about to vote on the resolution, Kittle popped out of his seat and startled the meeting with the announcement "You are denying me the right to vote." The principal explained if he had to be out of school by 2 p.m., he wouldn't be able to cast his ballot.

Attorney Max Schwartz agreed Kittle had a problem — although Schwartz was sure the United States Constitution's right to vote guarantee would take precedence over any resolution the Belleville Board of Education might adopt.

Then the board began an animated discussion noting all the ridiculous possibilities which might result if Pico's resolution were approved.

The "Summary of Current Fund Section of Budget", appearing above, develops the "Local Tax For Municipal Purposes" in the manner prescribed by State Rules. This results in showing the entire "Reserve for Uncollected Taxes", required to maintain the statutory cash basis, as a part of the tax levied to support Town appropriations. School and County taxes are carried into the total tax levy at the amounts required in cash only, without any reflection of this cash basis "overlay." The table below compares the estimated tax levy and rate for 1961 with the actuals of 1960 and sets out the relationship of the "Reserve for Uncollected Taxes" to the requirements for municipal, school and county purposes.

The three elements of the estimated 1961 tax levy, making proper allowance for related reserve portions, divide as follows: Municipal 31.50%, School 44.05% and County 24.45%. For 1960, the actual division in the same order was 31.38%, 45.15% and 23.47%. Indicated tax point increases on the same basis are: Municipal 15, School 10 and County 18. For 1960, corresponding changes, in the same order, were an increase of 25 points and decreases of 3 points and 1 point, for a net increase of 21 points, compared with 43 points estimated above. Without the increase in assessed valuations the 1961 tax rate increase would appear as about 51 points.

Taxes for County and School Purposes are determined by the Freeholders and the voters, respectively.

Revenue anticipations are set at levels believed fully realizable.

Many elements of the municipal levy, such as outlet sewer charges, garbage removal service contract, street lighting and other public utility charges and pension funds, are not directly controllable by the Commissioners.

The budget shows 1961 and 1960 in parallel, thereby facilitating comparison of each item. Departmental appropriations, are supported by detailed worksheets developing amounts appropriated. At the public hearing each Commissioner will be ready to explain and discuss any items in this budget subject to his control and discretion.

Miss C. Jacoby Succumbs at 71

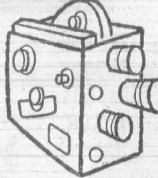

offer a substitute plan to correct Belleville's educational shortcomings, he offered a four-point suggestion.

(2) Do you want an addition to the recent high school building? (3) Do you want an all-purpose room at school one? (4) Do you want an all-purpose room at school four?

Presumably, if voters decided they wanted a new high school, then plans would be made along the lines of those presently being completed by the board. A referendum would be presented later for the bond issue and then the building erected. However if Pico's plans were adopted and voters said they wanted an addition to the present high school building, the referendum for funds which would come later would cover the costs for an addition rather than an entire new school.

schools one and four are included because they are part of suggestions of the Rutgers Department of Field Studies whose report included the recommendation that a new senior high school be built for Belleville.

REACTIONS

Pico's resolution calling for a stop to the entire high school project drew a variety of response from board members and the approximate 20 citizens who crowded the meeting room and adjacent hall and office space.

Ernest Arvidson said he believed "it's too bad Mr. Pico doesn't have all the background information to do. This is something which has been studied for 10 years and now it's about time we did something about it." Arvidson observed.

Richard Drake said that presenting the question of a new high school to voters is not an original thing to do. "This is what was recommended to the board by two renowned universities," Drake noted, "and this professional recommendation is the one which ought to be and is being presented to the citizens."

Nicholas Juliano thought Pico's suggestion to stop plans on the new school "has arrived here entirely too late." Juliano said Pico's resolution "is primarily an action to renege all the work that has been done on this project."

Michael Albertine thought a halt to plans at this point "would mean a loss of time and money to the taxpayers." He was critical of Pico's failing to offer an alternative to the high school plan.

Dominick Lally, newly elected school board president, believes the voters should decide the fate of the high school proposals at the scheduled referendum this May. Lally asked Pico "to have a little faith in the past decisions of the board." He invited Pico "to work with us and the citizens' lay committee in searching out the answers to all the questions." Lally noted many of the questions being posed by Pico are the same ones "a lot of people are asking all over town."

A Bad Start

By a 5-2 vote the Board of Education refused to reconsider the appointment of Alphonse Alvarez as the architect for the proposed new high school.

We believe the result was bad. We have no confidence in the manner in which the school board went about its selection of Alvarez as the architect for its controversial project. The suspicion surrounding the manner in which the architectural selection was made shakes our confidence in the entire project.

The architectural selection method gives us sufficient reason to pause in our hopes to modernize Belleville's school system. With all the explanations handed out in press releases our suspicions remain unsolved. While Mr. Alvarez may be the most competent architect around, and the nicest guy, we are opposed to the manner which led to his selection. And in this posture of things our confidence in the entire project is shaken.

Off To A Good Start

Monday night was the first meeting presided over by newly elected School Board President, Dominick Lally. It pleases us to report that his conduct of the meeting was exemplary.

Mr. Lally permitted board members to indulge themselves in a bit of political speech-making involving two very heated

subjects — the new school proposal and the engagement of an architect to prepare plans for the new school. Lally demonstrated great resourcefulness in his effective manner of terminating personality jousts and keeping the conduct of the meeting in reasonable bounds.

We hope this precedent will continue through the troublesome weeks and months ahead.

There's Joy In Belleville Tonight!

Our citizens have righted a wrong! The school board budget was approved Tuesday. Small though the vote was — (approximately 1,700 voters bothered to visit the polls) the result heralds a new day in our town.

Upon reflection the voters realized another turnaround of the school budget would only mean further downgrading of a community that should — and must go the other way.

The word has now gone forth among our neighboring towns and villages, that Belleville no longer will tolerate a second-class educational system: that Belleville has finally arrived at the age of maturity.

We are happy for our town — but most of all — we are happy for our children. They are entitled and deserve a first-class school system — and the best teachers available. Let us not shortchange them again.

Eugene G. Barnett, TOWN CLERK. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, 'AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND CONTROL THE ERECTION, CONSTRUCTION, ALTERATION, REPAIR, DEMOLITION OR REMOVING OF BUILDINGS AND OTHER STRUCTURES IN THE TOWN OF BELLEVILLE, ESSEX COUNTY, NEW JERSEY,' Adopted November 9, 1936.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, do ordain:

Section 1. That Part V-A Means of Egress No. 63A adopted December 11th, 1945, that Part V-A Means of Egress, paragraph No. 63A as adopted July 27th, 1948 and that Part V-A MEANS OF EGRESS NO. 63A adopted May 13th, 1952 be amended by striking out the above aforesaid and that the same is hereby amended and inserted in place thereof the following:

63-A (a) Required Number of Exits. There shall be provided, except as hereinafter specified, at least two means of egress in all buildings of all types, construction and occupancy, on each floor.

When more than one dwelling, office, or other occupancy unit occurs on any or each floor, such units shall be directly connected to the required exits by a hall or passageway, which shall be of sufficient width to accommodate all occupants.

When more than one dwelling, office or occupancy unit occurs on the first floor of any building and such units are separated by a fire - resistive wall and contain a floor area of not more than 800 square feet, one exit only may be provided for each unit.

A minimum of two means of egress on the first floor shall be required in one family dwellings not exceeding two stories in height.

(b) Types of Exits. All required exits, as specified in the foregoing section, shall be classified as primary and secondary.

A primary exit shall consist of an exterior doorway, with supplementary steps and platform, which will permit all occupants free access to a street or open exterior area.

A secondary exit shall consist of: a window, which exterior sill height is no more than six feet above the ground level below, and which interior sill level is not more than three feet above the finished floor level. Such windows shall be of a type and size to permit free passage of a greater-than-average-size person; a fire escape of steel construction, consisting of a balcony, and a jankie or balanced ladder securely fastened to the building. The balcony shall contain a minimum area of 12 square feet for each occupancy unit. The ladder shall have a minimum width of

20 inches; an exterior doorway, with supplementary steps and platform. All secondary exits shall permit all occupants of the building free access to a street or open exterior area.

(c) Location of Exits. All exit requirements, as required in the foregoing sections shall consist of a minimum of one primary exit. Primary exits shall be situated in the front half portion of the building toward the public street. Secondary exits shall be situated in the rear half portion of the building toward the rear yard of the premises. In no case shall primary and secondary exits be within a distance equal to one-half the long or overall dimension of the building.

Travel distance, measured in

more than 50 feet to a required exit. Additional secondary exits shall be provided if such distance is exceeded.

(d) Exemptions. Multi-family dwellings, for which approval and permit is granted by the New Jersey Bureau of Tenement House Supervision is exempted from compliance with the requirements of this article.

Section 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication in accordance with law. Fee: \$31.30.



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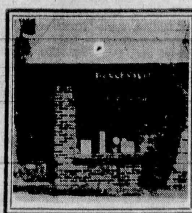
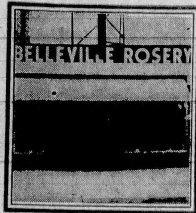

by published according to law.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZ-
ING VARIOUS PUBLIC IM-
PROVEMENTS IN THE TOWN
OF BELLEVILLE, IN THE
COUNTY OF ESSEX, MAK-
ING A DOWN PAYMENT AND
AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE
OF BONDS TO FINANCE THE
COST THEREOF AND TO AU-
THORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF
BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN
ANTICIPATION OF THE IS-
SUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

The Board of Commissioners
of the Town of Belleville, in the
County of Essex DO ORDAIN
as follows:

Section 1. The several improve-
ments described in Section 3 of
this ordinance are hereby re-
spectively authorized to be made
or acquired by the Town of
Belleville, in the County of Es-
sex. There is hereby appropriated
to the making of the several
improvements and the acqui-
sition of the properties described
in Section 3 hereinafter referred
to as "purposes", the re-
spective amounts of money
hereinafter stated as the appro-
priation for said purposes. Such
appropriation shall be met from
the proceeds of the bonds author-
ized, and the down payment hereinafter
appropriated, by this ordinance.

Section 2. The Board of Com-
missioners of the Town of Bel-
leville, in the County of Essex,
has ascertained and hereby de-

purposes referred to in the
schedule set forth in Section 3 of
this ordinance is a current ex-
penditure of the Town, and (2) it is
necessary to finance said purposes
by the issuance of obligations of
said Town pursuant to the Local
Bond Law of New Jersey.

Section 3. The improvements
hereby authorized and the sev-
eral purposes for the financing
of which said obligations are to
be issued are set forth in the
following "Schedule of Purposes
and Amounts", which schedule
also shows (1) the estimated
maximum amount of money nec-
essary to be raised from all
sources for each such purpose,
and (2) the amount of each such
sum which is to be provided by
the down payment hereinafter
appropriated to finance the re-
spective purposes, and (3) the
estimated maximum amount of
bonds and notes to be issued for
each such purpose, and (4) the
amount of the cost of each such
purpose included in the estimated
maximum amount to be raised
from all sources which is esti-
mated to be necessary to finance
(a) engineering and inspection
costs and legal expenses, and (b)
the cost of issuing the obliga-

than \$1,600 of the moneys ap-

"down payment" or "Capital Im-
