In Belleville Government

Commissioners, Except Kiernan, Urge 'No Change'

Four Belleville commissioners today "officially" endorsed the retention of the commission form of government. Mayor Isadore Padula and Commissioners Harry Sullivan, Robert Gruhin and Nuncio Pico released "an official message to the citizens of Belleville" stating they are going "on record as being definitely opposed to any change in Belleville's form of government."

Release of the statement by the four members of the five-man board had been predicted. Commissioner George F. Kiernan, however, is known to favor a government change for Belleville and although Kiernan pre-

fers a switch to the strong mayor-council form, he's expected to give his backing to the council manager plan to be voted upon at a referendum May 2.

Padula, Sullivan, Gruhin and Pico's "official message" stated that "no individual should seek office under one form of government and consent to govern it to the measurements of some other form." They obviously were referring to Kiernan who was elected under the commission form and who is now seeking a government change.

The four commissioners call the commission government "sound and realistic." Padula, Sullivan, Gruhin and Pico however term council manager government as "extremely expensive and unrealistic." When questioned by The Belleville Times, Mayor Padula said "elaboration of our statement will be made at future intervals."

STATEMENT
The text of the statement released today by the four commissioners reads as follows:

"On January 9, 1961, the Town Clerk, Mr. Eugene G. Barnett received petitions from the Belleville Citizens' Tax Council on which there appeared a total of 4,452 signatures. The petitions asked for a Referendum to be voted by the residents of Belleville to decide whether the Commission form of government we now have should be scrapped in favor of the Council Manager Form, Plan D.

"After careful processing, 689 signatures were considered as valid as follows: One was printed, which is illegal. Ten were non-residents; Three hundred and sixty-one were not to be found on the registration books; two hundred and twenty-four were duplications; Seven were illegal because they were not legible; Eighty-six were non-existent. However, there were enough valid signatures to command a Referendum vote.

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Chamber of Commerce Reports Exposition Space Already 60% Sold Out

Only 12 Booths Available for May Event; Cherry Blossom Contests Draw Inquiries

Only a dozen booths are still available for the Belleville Chamber of Commerce's "Cavalcade of Progress," a business and industrial exposition scheduled here for May 18-20. F. Douglas Wadsworth, chairman of the Cavalcade, reports "about 60 per cent of the space on the exposition floor has already been reserved."

Wadsworth said he is enthused with the immediate reception the chamber has received on the exposition. He indicated that interest shown by other firms "is so great that the chamber expects the remaining space for the Cavalcade to be completely reserved."

Propose Purchase Of Vacant Tract For Parking Lot

A municipal parking lot was proposed Tuesday by Commissioner Robert Gruhin in a public hearing March 28. The ordinance appropriates \$15,000 and authorizes the issuance of notes for the purchase of a tract between Rutgers and Academy Streets just north of Washington Avenue.

Gruhin distributed maps Tuesday night showing the exact location of the proposed new parking facility. A direct entrance to the parking lot would be provided from Washington Avenue at a point near the library building.

The area involves more than 47,000 square feet and the parking lot would border properties on Hornblower Avenue, Rutgers and Academy Streets. A portion of the area is adjacent to the synagogue in Academy Street.

Belleville will again have an "Easter Hunt." This year's hunt is scheduled for Saturday, April 1, at 10 o'clock on the grounds of the Municipal Stadium. The event will be sponsored by the Belleville Recreation Department and is open to all children under the age of 10 years.

Children will be divided into two age groups, one under five years and the second ages six to ten. Commissioner George F. Kiernan reports "it will be impossible for youngsters to participate unless they follow all instructions and gather in front of the stadium on the cinder track where the rules will be given."

Winners will receive Easter baskets. Kiernan said that 500 baskets will be awarded.

Committeemen for the hunt include Robert E. Cook, Alice Fitzpatrick, Phyllis Serritella, Rose Schriber, Catherine Popko and John Nelson.

Adopt Town Budget Including All Raises Despite Objections

Belleville commissioners adopted the 1961 municipal budget Tuesday night and simultaneously hiked the local tax rate to a record \$8.64 figure. More than 100 citizens attended the two and a half hour hearing during which strong sentiment for a change of government was voiced.

Seven citizens addressed the assembly Tuesday and nearly all made reference to the current movement to change Belleville's form of government. Most

questions sought answers to general questions such as why the tax rate is going up or why such "exuberant" salary increases are being given by commissioners.

The hearing was interrupted several times by applause whenever someone suggested throwing out the commission form of government because of high taxes and high salaries.

WHO'S GETTING RAISES?
Commissioner Robert Gruhin denied reports he's giving some

members of his public works department \$500 across-the-board raises as stated in last week's Belleville Times.

The \$500 figures reported by this newspaper last week were extracted from budget statements submitted by Gruhin's department to the town treasurer's office.

Instead of \$500 hikes for public works personnel, Gruhin said Tuesday night employees will receive 15-cent hourly increases. The 15-cent hourly hike totals \$343 over the period of one year.

\$164,000 PAY HIKES
A total of all department budgets indicates the new budget provides about \$164,000 in salary increases for Town Hall employees. A rundown of the increments for each department was printed in a front page article in last Thursday's Belleville Times.

About 90 minutes of the public hearing were occupied with a speech by James Gordon of Tappan Avenue. He told the commissioners they were "unwise" in providing salary increases "at this time."

The Tappan Avenue critique went into a detailed discussion of each department's budget before concluding "the time has come when you must realize the political honeymoon is over."

He said he wasn't objecting to pay hikes "for working men" but added he is "diametrically opposed" to pay raises for "hacksters" who he suggested were kept on Town Hall payrolls as political favors.

Dominick Touch of 606 Jorammon Street reminded the commissioners that "it's the trend across the country to cut costs whether you know it or not."

Touch wanted to know why municipal costs in Belleville couldn't be cut "even in one single area." His question prompted Mayor Padula to read the roll call of Essex County municipalities followed by new respective tax rates. He named the 119 rate hike for Cedar Grove as compared to Belleville's 43 point increase, and then commented, "you see Mr. Touch, we aren't too far out of line."

Not happy with the answer, Touch mentioned the May referendum on the government change issue. The Jorammon Street taxpayer told Padula, "your days are numbered."

NEW GOVERNMENT!
Paul Francisco, 124 Crestwood Avenue told Padula, "we're supposed to be in a recessionary period." He added that he examined municipal costs in the Belleville budget and "I don't see one where you've made a reduction."

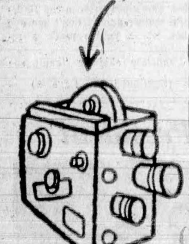

AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE ACQUISITION OF LAND FOR THE WIDENING, STRAIGHTENING, DEEPENING AND IMPROVING OF THIRD RIVER AND THE RELOCATION OF THE JORALEMON STREET BRIDGE, IN THE TOWN OF BELLEVILLE, IN THE COUNTY OF ESSEX, TO MAKE AN APPROPRIATION OF \$15,000 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT AND TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO FINANCE THE COST THEREOF AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, DO ORDAIN: Section 1. That the Town of Belleville, in the County of Essex, shall acquire for the purpose of widening, straightening, deepening and improving the stream known as the Third River, and for the relocation of the Joram Street Bridge over the Third River, the following lots, pieces or parcels of land in the Town described as follows:

A strip of land 100 feet in width along the westerly side of block 565 Lot 15 from the easterly side of Joram Street to Block 631 Lot 1, containing easterly through said Block 631 Lot 1 on a curve to the land of the Town of Belleville, known as Lot 20 in Block 635, and from the easterly boundary line of said land of the Town of Belleville through Block 645 Lot 1 (Glendale Cemetery) and a portion of Block 618 Lot 22 to the boundary line of the Town of Bloomfield.

Said land is more specifically shown on the map entitled "Proposed Relignment of the Third River, Belleville Sector, Belleville, N. J.," prepared by Aurnhammer, Jeske and Aurnhammer, designated Plate "K" Dwg. date 11-21-60, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Town Clerk and open to public inspection. The sum of \$15,000 is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of such purpose. Such appropriation shall be met from the proceeds of the bonds authorized, and the down payment hereinafter appropriated, by this ordinance. Said improvement shall be undertaken as a general improvement and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property especially benefited.

Section 2. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the making of such improvement (hereinafter referred to as "purpose"), (2) the estimated amount of money necessary to be raised from all sources for said purpose is \$15,000, and (3) \$750 of said sum is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance said purpose, and (4) the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$14,250 and (5) the cost of said purpose, as hereinbefore stated, includes the sum of \$5,000, which is estimated to be necessary to finance (a) engineering and inspection costs and legal expenses and (b) the cost of issuing the obligations authorized by this ordinance.

and (c) interest on such obligations, to the extent permitted by Section 401:53 of said Local Bond Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$750, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for said Town are now available to finance said purpose. The sum of \$750 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purpose.

Section 4. To finance said purpose, bonds of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$14,250 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6 per cent) per annum, applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 5. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of said Town of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$14,250 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to said Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate which shall not exceed six per centum (6 per cent) per annum, applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of said purpose, according to its reasonable life, is a period of 40 years computed from the date of said bonds.

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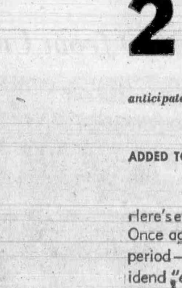
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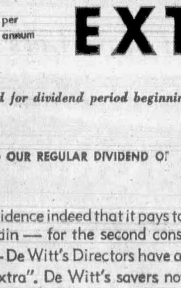

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The Meaning of May 2nd

Taxpayers interested in Belleville's continually rising tax rate may have an opportunity on May 2nd to do something about the expensive government we are getting at Town Hall.

May 2nd is the day when all Belleville voters have the right to visit the polls and vote to oust the Commission form of government and replace it with a system of government which is more representative, more economical, and more efficient. We refer to the Manager-Council form of government.

For some Belleville taxpayers this opportunity to do something about the back-breaking tax burden may be their last chance. As before them have done — they find themselves unable to pay the increasing tax burden — and thus they sell off their homes and move out of town. So for all of us, whose interest is in not trying to get on or remain on the Town Hall payroll, May 2nd takes on more than historical significance. It will be the day when Belleville's aroused citizens will rise and shout from the rooftops, "Thank God we have returned Belleville to its status as a first-class city." Shabby Town Hall politics, invasion of the public treasury by politicians who are determined to make unnecessary Town Hall jobs for the political lieutenants, have created for Belleville, the atmosphere of a second-class community.

Only our aroused citizens by their votes on May 2nd could change all this. Will you bother to vote?

The crowd at Town Hall is already organizing. It has at its disposal over 100 jobs to award election day. And you can be sure these jobs will only go to persons whose vote is pledged to keep the outmoded Commission form of government. The only group which remains unorganized is the homeowner — the person with the greatest stake in the May 2nd election results.

In 1955 a Charter Study Commission recommended to the citizens of Belleville that Commission form of government be discarded and replaced with a Council-Manager form of government. A disinterested population, with faith in the newly elected Town Commission voted to continue Commission form of government. One of the arguments advanced by the Charter Study Commission in urging Belleville voters to vote for the change in 1955 was, "Under Commission form of government, if continued, our tax rate will rise to \$7.50 in ten years."

Tuesday night, March 14th, less than

six years after this statement was made, our Town Commission adopted an overall town budget establishing a tax rate for 1961 of \$8.64! Amen.

Mayor Padula Economizes — Takes It Out On The Times-News

Eager to pay heed to our many cries for economy at Town Hall, Mayor Padula Tuesday night asked for adoption of an overall town budget of Six Million Dollars (\$6,000,000.00) and in this fantastic sum he found one place to economize.

He cut Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) from his budget for legal advertising insertions in The Belleville Times-News. This money for years was used to pay for regular size "Election Notices," publication of proclamations concerning Red Cross Month, United Fund Month, Sister Kenny Week, etc.

It could be the Mayor wants to apply this saving to the \$1,053 salary increase he has granted to his son, Assistant Town Treasurer Isadore Padula, Jr.

Whatever the motive for Padula's "economy wave," one fact remains, this newspaper will continue to publish the truth — and unequivocally express its opinion on this editorial page without regard to possible reprisals from any source.

A Wise Decision

Wisely, the Town Commission Tuesday night decided to postpone action on the proposed acquisition of New Jersey Bell Telephone Company's unoccupied building at 270 Washington Avenue to be used for a new police headquarters.

We agree with Commissioners Harry Sullivan and George Kiernan that the present basement quarters for our police department are entirely inadequate. In fact we think they stink. A change should be made. But we question the advisability of purchasing the present site for that purpose.

There is no doubt the property is worth many thousands more than the town proposes to pay for it. However, before the town commits itself to spend any more taxpayer money we should build a fire under the slumbering Town Planning Board and find out from them what their plans are for Washington Avenue. Almost a year ago we complained the Town Planning Board was moving too slowly to satisfy Belleville's best interests.

The selection of a new school site without prior consultation with the Planning Board by the school group is a case in point. The present proposal to purchase an important site on Washington Avenue for public purposes is another case in point. Will Belleville's public officials ever realize that time runs out — even for our fair Town of Belleville?

In deferring action on the acquisition of a new site for our police headquarters we believe the Commission acted wisely.

The necessity of having to increase every item in the budget. The Crestwood Avenue resident admitted he was talking "in generalities, but if we don't run this town like a business, we'll go bankrupt." He concluded his talk with the statement "on May 2 we will get a new form of government." He was applauded despite the sound of Padula's gavel.

John Bass, president of the Rutan Estates Homeowners' Association, noted that "taxes are going up, up, up." He asked, "can you tell me Mr. Mayor when they're going to stop?" Padula answered simply, "no, no, no."

Bass said "this is the third year I've come to budget hearings. I wasn't even going to get up tonight because it just doesn't do any good. You don't listen to the people; Mr. Mayor. We can't afford this budget, you've just got to cut it somewhere. Don't approve this budget tonight," Bass pleaded.

Others addressing the commissioners included Mrs. Mabel Walsh of 160 Malone Avenue, Thomas McCool of 194 Fairway Avenue and Albert Guglicelli of 75 Lake Street.

Mrs. Walsh wanted to know "if all these salary increases are really necessary." She never received an answer.

McCool said he supported Mayor Padula in three election campaigns but was now favoring a government change.

Horsfield explained briefly how the new system works. The nationwide dialing plan di-

vides the United States and Canada into 90 numbering areas, each with a three-digit code. For example, the three-digit code for the Chicago area is 312, the state of Colorado is 303 and the Los Angeles area is 213.

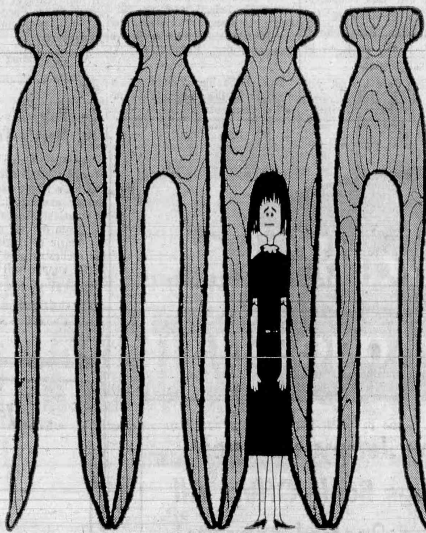
