Misrepresentation Linked to Group For Commission

Caracciola Says He Was Tricked,
Employees Say They Were Forced
Into Supporting Commission Form

Nuncio Caracciola, local businessman of 38 Roosevelt Avenue, said the Belleville Times Tuesday that the "Committee for the Retention of the Commission Government" tricked him into the chairmanship of a businessman's committee for supporting the town's present form of government.

Zoning Board Will Consider Apartment Plan

A proposed 40-unit garden apartment development off Washington Avenue will be considered by the Belleville Zoning Board at 8 p.m. next Tuesday.

The site for the proposed development is the same one Commissioner Robert Gruhin is seeking for a municipal parking lot. Paul Schwartz, owner of the property, will be at Tuesday's Zoning Board meeting to answer questions in his attempt to get a variance to permit construction of the two double-story buildings. Each building would house 20 three-room living units.

Accompanying Schwartz at Tuesday's meeting will be Leslie W. Finch, Belleville attorney, and Stephen J. Potter of Union, the architect. A variance is needed because the area is zoned "Residential B" which does not permit apartment buildings.

Belleville Commissioners four years ago rejected another plan to build apartments on the 283 by 165 foot tract off Academy

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Propose 3 New Traffic Control Laws for Streets

Traffic control, including parking, one-way streets and truck traffic, is the subject of amendments to ordinances introduced Tuesday by Commissioner Harry J. Sullivan. Public hearing on the three measures will be April 25 at 8 p.m. in Town Hall.

Proposed is the restriction to trucks driving on several streets. Sullivan said this ordinance is needed "because the streets were not built for truck traffic." The streets involved are Salter Place, Naples Avenue, Florence Avenue, Frederick Street, Magnolia St., Belmont Avenue from Franklin Street to Franklin Avenue, and Newark Avenue from Watchung Avenue to the Bloomfield Town line.

Most of the new streets which would be restricted to truck traffic.

CCC Says Funds Mounting

James LaMotta, president of the Citizens' Change Committee favoring a "yes" vote on the Council Manager referendum May 2 yesterday expressed satisfaction with taxpayers' response to his group's "Change for Dollars" drive. LaMotta also announced the appointment of George Mitchell of 149 Academy Street as the treasurer of the CCC.

LaMotta said "the initial response to our drive for funds to aid in our effort to give Belleville a modern form of government is very gratifying. I have always been confident in the good sense of our Belleville voters and taxpayers. As I talk to

better Belleville. I told him I didn't have much time. Then he talked me into it because I am a businessman and I am interested in a better Belleville. But he didn't tell me anything about working for commission government and I'm not going to let them push me around or tell me what to do. And when it comes time to vote (for the government change referendum), I'll vote as I damn please," Caracciola said in a telephone interview with this newspaper.

Continuing, Caracciola emphasized "I had absolutely no knowledge that this committee had anything to do with the commission government. I was trapped into it and I don't want my name used in any way with the commissioners' committee to keep the form of government as it is."

TOWN HALL EMPLOYEES
Other objections to tactics being used by the retention committee came after its head, Ralph Risoli, called a meeting of Town Hall employees at the committee's headquarters Monday night. A Times-News representative was at Risoli's headquarters but he was asked to leave before the actual meeting began.

Risoli on Tuesday told The Times that he "is not authorized" the Tax Council head ignored Risoli's intervention.

At Rally Next Wednesday

Franklin Township Mayor, City Manager to Speak Here

A Citizen's Rally for Council Manager Government has been set for next Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the Belleville Elks Hall. Featuring talks by officials of Franklin Township, which recently dumped its commission government for the city-manager plan.

A member of the staff of the Rutgers Bureau of Government Research Bureau will moderate Wednesday's rally. Speakers will include William Sommers, Franklin Township Manager, and George Consoway, Franklin Township Mayor.

Mayor Consoway has the unusual experience of serving as

Franklin's mayor under both the commission and council-manager government plans. Franklin adopted council manager government July 1, 1959.

Belleville voters will go to the polls to decide a referendum May 2 which would give this town a council manager government. The May 2 referendum was forced by petitions signed by residents throughout town and sponsored by the Citizens' Tax Council.

Thomas McCool of 194 Fairway Avenue, chairman of Wednesday's program, told The Times that "this rally is for the purpose of educating the citizens of Belleville with the merits of council manager form of municipal government and to allow all citizens to ask any questions pertinent to the issues."

McCool added he hopes the talks by the Franklin Township officials will refute recent statements made by "the politically motivated Citizens for Retention of Commission Government."

The "Retention" committee is headed by Ralph Risoli, aide to Commissioner Nuncio Pico.

The Tax Council notes that since the inception of Council Manager government in Franklin Township, personal property taxes have been abolished "and many improvements made without an increase in the municipal tax rate." The Franklin tax rate was stabilized and services

increased, the CTC reports. The group lists a number of increased services including recreation and parkland development, improved street lighting, expansion of police department and additions to town offices.

Construction of a new six-inch water main in Washington Street was proposed in an ordinance introduced by Commissioner Robert Gruhin Tuesday night. Public hearing on the proposal will be April 25 at 8 p.m.

Proposed is the construction of a six-inch main from the existing 12-inch main at the south side of William Street to the existing main in Belleville Avenue. Installation of a fire hydrant is also provided.

The ordinance would appropriate \$6,000 to finance the project.

Seeking for Apartments;

Total of 39 Lots Involved

Sixteen lots on Overhill Road were purchased on April 12, 1956 by Krugman and De Petro for the purchase of all land in the plot to be used for recreational purposes. Commissioner Kiernan wrote the following letter, "Misses Jeanne Krugman & Elsie De Petro, Mountain View Drive, Clifton, New Jersey

"Dear Mesdames: A resolution duly passed on January 10, 1961 by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Belleville, New Jersey, authorizes me to negotiate for the purchase of land, by the town, recorded in the names of Jeanne Krugman and Elsie De Petro of Mountain View Drive, Clifton, New Jersey, commonly known as per description on attached list.

"For the purpose of taxation this property is assessed at \$10,600 which is in keeping with our assessing formula, 40 per cent of its true value.

"True value then being determined at \$26,500 I will, with your permission, recommend to our governing body the purchase of your property at this price.

"I would appreciate your advising me by February 1st by February 10th, 1961.

The developers also own 26 lots on Lorraine Court and one adjoining this parcel on Joramelon Street. These lots were purchased by the developers on January 6, 1958 at a cost of \$24,000 and Mayor Isadore Padula's Revenue and Finance Department assessed this parcel of land at \$2,200.

Kiernan's letter indicates the town's assessing formula is 40 per cent of true value. Since true value in this case is \$48,000 the developers should have been paying taxes based upon an assessment of \$19,200 and not the sum of \$10,600 which was assessed by Padula's department.

Although Commissioner Kiernan's letter requested a reply by February 1st to Krugman and DePetro failed to acknowledge Kiernan's letter.

Washington Ave. Repair Job Bid Is \$196,751.75

A bid of \$196,751.75, submitted by the Gallo Asphalt Co., of Irvington, was the lowest of four received by the New Jersey State Highway Department on a contract for improving a two-mile section of Route 7 in Essex County, some of it being in Belleville and Nutley, where the route is known as Washington Avenue.

The work includes placing a new surface of bituminous concrete three inches thick on the highway from Second River in Newark through Belleville to the Erie Railroad crossing just north of Centre Street in Nutley.

The new surface is designed to improve riding qualities of the road, which now consists of worn asphalt and granite block. Broken sections of the curbing along the outer edges of the 60-foot wide roadway also will be repaired.

A total of 55 working days has been allowed for completing the Newark - Nutley project.

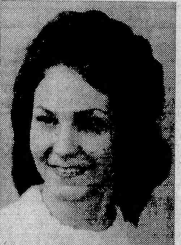

The land involved is part of the parcel the developers want to open for an apartment site.

According to Commissioner George Kiernan the Town of Belleville is assessing property at 40% of true value. Since the developers paid \$23,500 for the parcel of land it is logical to assume the purchase price represents true value. An ordinary homeowner with similar circumstances would be obliged to pay taxes on an assessment of \$9,400 — almost 200% more than the developer must pay on the foregoing parcel. We now wonder — did Padula's department err in the above assessment? Did Padula's department deliberately establish the low assessment? Is this the only instance of such a low assessment?

Ugly rumors persist that despite the January action of the Town Commission ordering Commissioner Kiernan to negotiate with the developers to purchase the land for a recreation area the developers have not abandoned their plans to erect an apartment house on the site. Lending credence to this rumor is the plan to realign the Third River at a cost to Belleville taxpayers of \$750,000. Curiously enough the proposed realignment of the Third River makes available a large tract of land adjacent to the proposed apartment site which is now under water. Moreover the apartment site becomes the most improved property of any in the area.

Town Employees and Council-Manager Government

Monday night city hall employees were invited to attend a "meeting" at the Risoli-Padula "Retain Commission Government" headquarters in a room on Washington Avenue.

About thirty employees were herded into the vacant store to hear fears expressed about the future of town employees under a Council-Manager form of government.

government.

The inferences and implications were all too clear. "Get out a 'NO' vote on Tuesday, May 2nd or else you will not have a job to come back to once Council-Manager takes over."

This impression is a complete fraud. There are certain basic jobs required in Town Hall regardless of the government form. Contrary to the misrepresentations emanating from the Vote "NO" crowd, city hall employees who turn in an honest day's work need fear nothing from a Council-Manager government. It is only the employees who are on the payroll because they are relatives of Commissioners, or whose only qualification is as a member of a political machine that need fear the handle of a new broom in the hands of a city manager.

Experience has proven that city employees enjoy more job security and higher wages after control of city hall jobs is shaken loose from the firm hands of power drunk political bosses.

If Belleville city employees entertain any fears over their future under a Council-Manager government they could do one of several things: obtain reassurance from the New Jersey Civil Service Commission; attend the April 19th public meeting in the Elks Club which will be addressed by the Manager and the Mayor of Franklin Township, a community that has enjoyed the benefits of Council-Manager government, and ask questions of these two officials; and a third course is open — sponsor a public meeting and invite Messrs. Risoli and Padula to state in public some of the remarks they make privately concerning the future of town employees under a Council-Manager form of government. At the same meeting spokesmen advocating a "YES" vote in favor of Council-Manager could be heard in rebuttal.

The last course would seem to be a "must" if the Risoli-Padula team expect town employees to place any credence in the arguments advanced in favor of retention of our antiquated, expensive, inefficient Commission form of government.

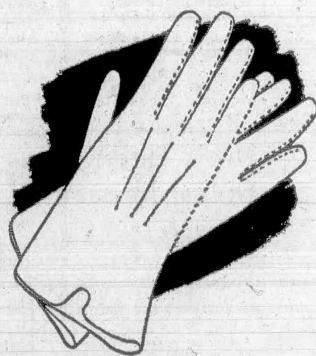

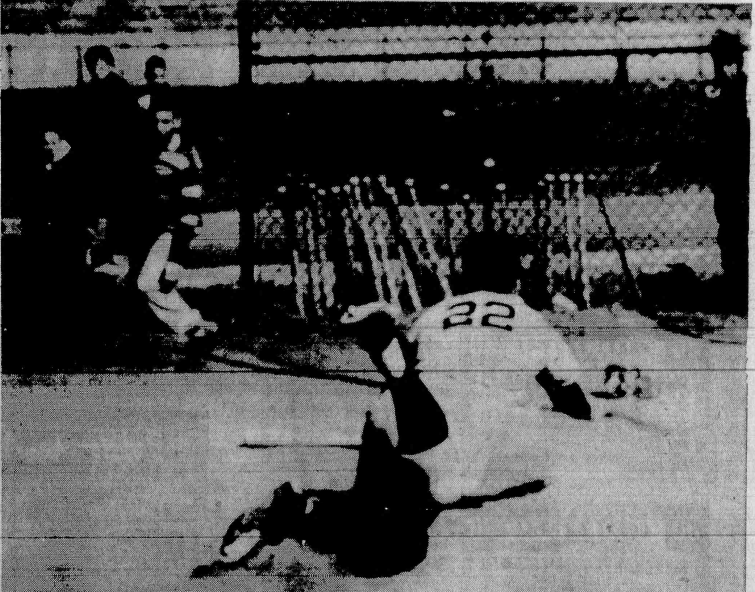

Mistakes In Tax Returns Decrease Deadline Nears

Each year brings a decrease in the number of errors discovered in federal income tax returns. Joseph F. J. Mayer, director of the Internal Revenue Service for the Newark District, said today, "I'm not advocating any particular method of checking or re-checking a return." Mr. Mayer declared.

"I would suggest, though, that the return be checked immediately on completion, put aside for two or three days and then rechecked. Quite often taxpayers find an error which didn't show up on the first check."

"By starting now to prepare their returns," Mr. Mayer added, "taxpayers will be able to give themselves a breathing spell in which to take a fresh and unhurried look at their work. For many, it may be a worthwhile saving; for us, it should make for better and more efficient processing."

Each Federal income taxpayer is responsible for the facts and figures entered in the return he signs, even if it is prepared with the assistance of an Internal Revenue Service agent, Mr. Mayer said.

"In advising taxpayers of this responsibility," Mr. Mayer stated, "we must remind them that

they are responsible under law for all entries and all supporting documents in their returns, no matter who prepares it."

The Internal Revenue Service, he pointed out, welcomes returns prepared by competent professional persons, but such assistants can only rely upon information provided by the taxpayer.

"The taxpayers themselves are the persons primarily and finally responsible," he concluded. Income tax returns must be filed no later than Monday, April 17.
