Gutter Campaign Continues Right Up to Election Day

The campaign of calumny and vilification against the change in government was pressed by Mayor Padula's Retention group right up to 8 p.m. Tuesday when the polls closed.

Typical was a talk given by Ralph Risoli in a radio broadcast Monday night. Risoli falsely accused Times owner-publisher Frank A. Orechio of "yellow journalism" in this newspaper's support of the change. In a desperate effort to discredit the publisher, Risoli also charged Orechio with being a "personal friend" of Cuban dictator Fidel Castro.

Risoli — who proclaimed his belief in God at the start of the 20-minute broadcast — tagged the Citizens Tax Council as a "handful of people who circulated petitions to change Belleville's democratic form of government." He dubbed the Belleville Times as the council's "partner" in the attempt.

Risoli said Orechio wasn't even a taxpayer in Belleville, and he blasted the council-manager form of government as "undemocratic." Risoli warned his

listeners they would have no control over a town manager.

Risoli said that taxes in Franklin Township, where a council-manager government was passed two years ago, had skyrocketed. He said no other town in New Jersey had the council-manager form.

Missing Tax Records From Padula's Dept.

Council-Manager Change Carries 19 of 24 Districts As 'Yes' Wins, 5,421-3,497

Local PBA 8,918 Voters Cast Ballots Anniversary Valley Area Only 'No' Ward Form Effective in July 1962

State PBA President James J. Vigilante of Maplewood will be the principal speaker when Belleville Local 28 of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association celebrates its golden anniversary at a dinner-dance this evening in Parrillo's Restaurant.

The affair marks the organization in 1911 of the local group. Director of Public Safety Harry J. Sullivan, whose father was first president of the local, will be a guest.

Belleville citizens at the polls Tuesday widened the definition of "Clean Up Week" to include Town Hall and adopted Council-Manager government by a 5,421 to 3,497 count.

Some 8,918 voters, 50.3 percent of the eligible vote, answered the referendum question which will give Belleville the Council-Manager government beginning in July 1962.

The vote for the change was town-wide failing to carry only Ward One, which encompasses the Valley section. The change lost in the Valley by 12 votes. Biggest gains for Council-Manager government came in the third and fourth wards where the "yes" votes won by margins of 917 and 947 respectively.

Strong report came from the Rutan Estates district, home district for Ralph A. Vara, Town Democratic Chairman, and John Bass, vice - chairman of the Citizens Change Committee. This area, Ward Four's third district, turned in 443 yes votes compared to only 80 noes.

COMMISSIONERS LOSE

The four commissioners who supported retention of commission government were unable to persuade even their home districts to carry a "no" vote. Mayor Isadore Padula's district (4-6) carried a yes vote by a slim 119 to 110 vote. Commissioner Nuncio Pica's eighth district in Ward Four voted "yes" by a 317 to 109 margin. Commissioner Robert Gruhn's home district, 3-1, voted 323 to 156 for the change. Finally Commissioner Harry Sullivan's Third Ward, third district carried a 216 to 113 vote favoring the change to Council Manager.

KIERNAN CONFIDENT

Commissioner George F. Kiernan and Vara, who actively supported the change to Council Manager, were at Town Hall when the returns came in from the polling districts. Both seemed unusually confident the change would be adopted.

"One thing's for sure," Kiernan said, "few minutes before the polls closed, 'the people did come out; the elections are out of control as far as the politicians are concerned.'"

Asked if he could be quoted about the "people's decision" if the "no" campaign won, Kiernan answered, "You can quote me."

Vara, who for the past week had been predicting a 2-1 vote for the change with 8,000 turning out, was smiling long before the returns started pouring in to Town Hall Tuesday night.

Meanwhile tabulations were being counted at the Washington Avenue headquarters of the Citizens Tax Council, the organization which more than two years ago began circulating the petitions which forced Tuesday's special election. Salvatore Calabrese, tax council president, said the election results "demonstrate that a determined citizenry without funds can beat entrenched political machines."

CCC LEADERS

James Mitchell, John Bass and Joseph DiKattaro, members of the Citizens Change Committee (CCC), were shaking hands continuously Tuesday night. The three together with all other persons involved in the election, are preparing statements to thank voters, the workers and other supporters for the change.

Vincent Strumolo, standard bearer of the Vincent Strumolo Association, was at Town Hall Tuesday evening. His association endorsed the change to Council-Manager. He extended his personal gratitude to members and officers of the Strumolo Association before he prepares a statement which The Times will carry next week.

MAYOR PADULA

Mayor Padula could not be reached after the election results.

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Propose More Laws for Town Traffic Control

The Belleville Town Commission adopted three ordinances and introduced two others, all dealing with trucking regulations, parking restrictions and street directions.

Henceforth trucking in Salter Place, Naples, Florence Avenues and Frederick and Magnolia Streets between Franklin and Newark Avenues will be limited. Another ordinance adopted will curb trucking in Belmont Avenue from Franklin Street to Franklin Avenue and in Newark Avenue from Washington to Bloomfield Avenues. All the roads are secondary streets that heavy trucks damage easily.

Another measure adopted will make Eugene Place one-way from Franklin Street one - way northbound. It will also extend one - way traffic northbound in Brighton Avenue to Wallace Street to Sanford Avenue.

One of the two ordinances introduced is designed to ease traffic congestion around Clara Maass Memorial Hospital by making Florence Avenue from Franklin Street one-way southbound.

turns were counted. He spoke to The Belleville Times at the headquarters for the Committee for Retention of Commission Government a few minutes before the polls closed at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

The mayor looked uneasy and asked The Times not to take his photograph, "whether we win or lose." His request was granted.

RALPH RISOLI

Ralph Risoli, chairman of the Citizens Retention Committee, was contacted by telephone late Tuesday night. Risoli extended his congratulations to the groups and men which led the movement to change Belleville's form of government.

"The people have spoken," Risoli said, "and we recognize their decision. We will continue to do the best job we can for the people in Town Hall. Our efforts have always been a duty to continue to be in the interest of all the people of Belleville."

When asked to interpret Tuesday's election results, Risoli commented, "It's a trend — people wanted a change." He said he was disappointed in the results, "I thought the vote would be much closer."

COMM. GRUBIN

Commissioner Grubin also was at Town Hall Tuesday night. Returns were given him in his office. Although he made no formal statement to The Belleville Times, Grubin expressed disappointment in the result. He was critical of this newspaper's stand during the campaign. The Belleville Times editorially supported the change to Council-Manager government. There was a vast difference of atmosphere in Grubin's Town Hall office Tuesday night and that of Kiernan's, just one door away.

TAX COUNCIL

The Citizens' Tax Council wrote a brief statement for the press Tuesday night which appears below. Other statements will be printed in The Times next week.

The council's statement reads as follows:


"The Citizens Tax Council wishes to thank all those who helped in our campaign to give Belleville a new lease on life. The change to Council-Manager government, as proposed by the Citizens Tax Council, has demonstrated that a determined citizenry without funds can beat well entrenched political machines.

"This victory is the culmination of years of effort by the CTC to enlighten the voters of Belleville to the inadequacies of Commission government and, without the necessity of political deals, the independent voter has shown that he is not to be deceived."

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secretary of the splinter association is reported to have died six months ago.

Joseph Zimmerman, secretary of the United Tavern Owners Association of N. J., said Tuesday that in order for Belleville to legally increase the number of taverns, state law would require a population of 88,000. (State law requires 2,000 people for each additional license. Belleville now has 35,005 people and 17 "B" licenses. Under the state formula, 43 licenses equals 86,000 people, so in order to get another license, the population would have to increase to 88,000.)

To increase the number of package store licenses, (one license is permitted for each 5,000 of population) the town's population would have to increase to 60,000, Zimmerman said. This breaks down to 11 licenses times 5,000 people equals 55,000 plus 5,000 for another license.

State Alcoholic Beverage Control officials were equally skeptical about the handout's "information." Deputy ABC Director Emerson Tschupp of the Newark Limitations Law prescribes the number of liquor licenses a town may have.


The breakdown of the fees received by the Belleville Times from legal advertisements in 1960 follows: Essex County Surrogate's office, \$350; Essex County Sheriff's office, \$164.32; Essex County Board of Elections, \$32.80; liquor legal advts., \$718.25; Town of Belleville, \$3,665.83 and Belleville Board of Education \$11.34.

FREE RABIES VACCINATION CLINIC

FOR ALL DOGS TO BEGIN MAY 8th AT TOWN HALL

Commissioner Nuncio R. Pico, Director of Public Affairs and Health Officer Edward G. Burdzy announced that the Belleville Health Department will hold its annual free rabies vaccination clinics at the following places and dates:

May 8—Town Hall, rear 6-8 P.M.

May 9—Washington Ave. Firehouse 6-8 P.M.


May 10—Silver Lake Franklin St. Firehouse 6-8 P.M.

According to information received by the local health authorities from the State Department of Health, New Jersey has not had a case of rabies in humans since 1955, and very few cases of verifiable rabies in dogs during this period.

Health Officials and specialists in animal diseases transmissible to a man, say this is the result of widespread immunization of dogs. They also say that uncared for dogs, which are not immunized constitute a potential reservoir of infection.

A case of rabies among dogs would spread quickly, and from them to cared for pets which have not been immunized against the disease.

The Health Department urged that all dog owners, in order to protect residents of the Town, bring their dogs to be vaccinated with anti rabies vaccine at the free clinic, at the time and places above designated.

Scrivanich contended he was drowsy from a hay fever condition. He said he was exhausted from work at home.

The commission ruled he was not fit for his job.

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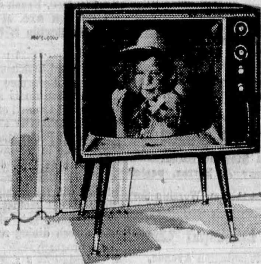

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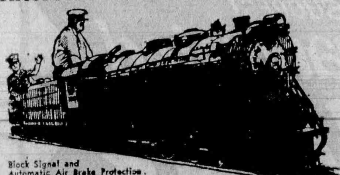

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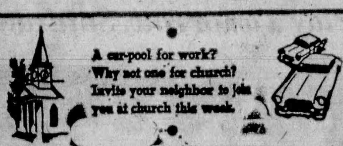

The Flag And You

The United States of America now faces the greatest peril of its history — a peril even greater than when we have been at war, because history proves that, while we are a peaceful people, we can and have gone all-out and have won every war that has been forced upon us. But war with all its horror and complexity is a simple game compared to the deadly contest we are now in.

We are a people governed by law, not by men. We play the game according to the rules of international and Divine law.

The Communists are not so handicapped. They have broken every international law, every treaty and, of course, since they have erected a Goddess society, they do not recognize or are they bound by the moral codes which stem from God's law.

The flag of the United States of America is the symbol of this great nation, which is dedicated to freedom, a government of, by, and for the people — one nation, under God, with liberty and justice for all."

Three great national holidays or events are in the offing: Memorial Day, May 30; Flag Day, June 14, and Independence Day, July 4.

Wouldn't it be a great demonstration of our loyalty and love of our country if from every loyal home in the land the Stars and Stripes were flown on these days?

Wouldn't it confound our enemies from within and from without to see and know thereby the strength and depth of our support of our government in this time of crises? Let us all display the flag that symbolizes what we stand for — the flag of the United States of America, the flag of freedom . . . the flag of hope for enslaved peoples of the world!

Youth's Hope

"We live in an adult community that has much wrong with it. These adults are our models. So one of the answers is for the adults to clean their own mess and produce better models," observed one high school student yesterday.

Are we doing what we have to do as individuals to make ourselves the kind of honest, law-abiding citizens we want our juveniles to be? A citizen's duty is to vote Tuesday. Will you?

Foundation Of Good Government

For some years there has been an increasing tendency of businessmen to take an interest in politics. The tendency has been speeded up by the settled policy of many companies to encourage all personnel to participate in political activities — local, state and national. Some have looked upon this resurgence of political activity on the part of business people as something new and possibly of questionable merit. Charles R. Barr, an official of Standard Oil Company (Indiana), has taken a post-election look at "Businessmen in Politics" programs and has come up with some interesting observations. He finds that there is nothing new about businessmen in politics and points out that "the founders of this country, for the most part, were business and professional men — Washington, Jefferson, Hamilton, Adams and Franklin, to name a few. These men risked not only their business, but their very life, for principles which they set out in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States."

Businessmen were active in politics throughout the history of this country until about 1930, when there was a lessening of interest. Mr. Barr believes this lessening of interest "was brought about primarily by the rise of a new type of

businessman, the professional salaried manager."

These salaried managers for a number of reasons hesitated to become involved in political matters. But this situation has undergone a drastic change. For example, perhaps as many as a quarter million business people have taken some type of study course in politics and government within the past two years. This indicates that in elections to come there will be an increasing number of businessmen with training and experience available to their political party or their favorite candidates.

Excessive Speed Big Killer

Compilations by The Travelers Insurance Companies show that persons killed last year in highway accidents which were blamed on excessive speed totaled 10,970 as compared with 12,980 in 1959. This report is included in the safety booklet published annually by The Travelers since 1931 and distributed to more than 3.3 million persons.

"Citizens organizations throughout the country should take heart in these figures," said J. Doyle DeWitt, president of The Travelers. "This decrease in deaths due to speed is even more significant when you realize that it came in a year when highway accidents actually killed 400 more people than a year ago."

The Travelers president pointed out that speed has long been blamed as "the number one killer on our highways."

"Even with the improved speed record last year," Mr. DeWitt said, "speed was listed as the primary cause of accidents which accounted to 36.1 per cent of the total deaths. As for injuries, the record was not as good. They increased nearly 100,000 with more than 1,000,000 blamed on speed during the year."

Operation Pathfinder

Suppose you worked for an oil company as a touring specialist, with the job of selecting the best routes for up to 100 motorists a day and then staying behind while they went gallivanting off on fun or business. This sounds frustrating enough to pave a path to a psychiatrist's couch.

But it doesn't work out that way, according to the people who man the touring centers of our oil companies. None is looking for a psychiatrist. In the words of one staffer, "The job requires endless contact with people, and people and their problems are fascinating."

These specialists are located in many cities here and abroad, and they provide free tour guidance by mail, phone and personal contact. One bureau, for instance, had to plot a coast-to-coast tour for a young man whose pregnant wife had always to be within 100 miles of a hospital. Other bureaus have to reassure people that those TV bandits are not actually bushwhacking travelers in the Western desert. And, believe it or not, when Hawaii was admitted to the union last year, there were requests for "directions on driving to our 50th state."

The oil company gets no direct benefits unless the motorist happens to buy its brand of gasoline, and sometimes the route passes through areas where gasoline isn't even sold. One young lady asked for guidance on a route from Palmyra, N. Y., to Tampa, Florida, adding that she planned to go by horseback! She got the information she wanted. It's a good will service, from the company standpoint, and a mighty useful one to the motorists venturing into far, strange places.

Every once in a while a customer comes to our store and asks a number of questions indicating that he read up on the purchase he intends to make. This of course is a good idea. Still the information thus gained is of limited use.

Except for matters of basic construction like power transformers versus series string heater hook up of the tubes, printed circuits against handwiring or the number of tubes which a set contains, there is not much anybody who is not an electronic technician can really learn by casual reading up on different sets. This much is obvious, every manufacturer will describe his product in a manner which makes it appear as if it is the best.

There are so many factors involved which only long experience reveals.

Unfortunately one can not

just buy by brand names alone any more. The experience with so-called "printed circuits" in recent years is a case in point. Almost all major manufacturers switched to this method of assembly. There is nothing basically wrong with printed circuits, on the contrary, if they are right, they will result in a better set. The first few years they gave a lot of trouble simply because they were not tried out properly before being put in production. This is only one example. There are many more matters to be considered, which only the experienced technician knows to properly evaluate. Most people unfortunately buy their sets from stores which do not have service facilities and do not know the shortcomings. Your best bet is to deal with a local store that employs its own technicians.

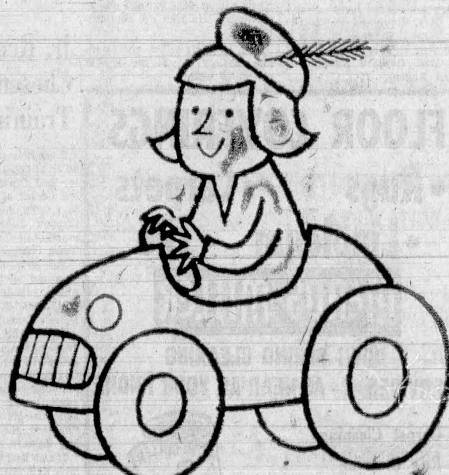

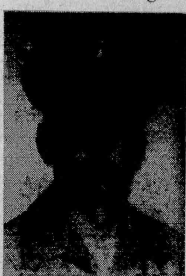
Peter Rossi Now In 49th State

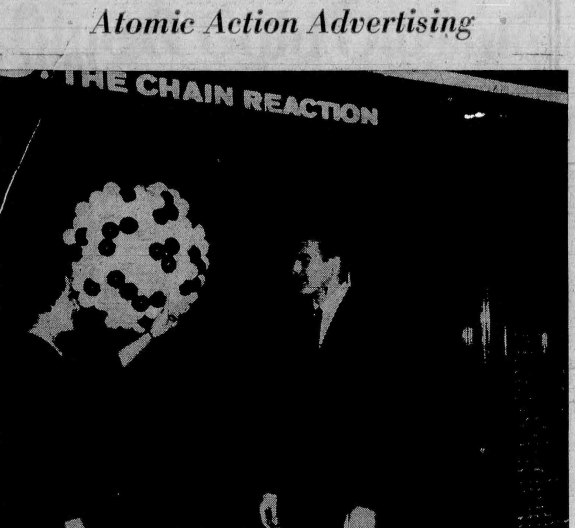

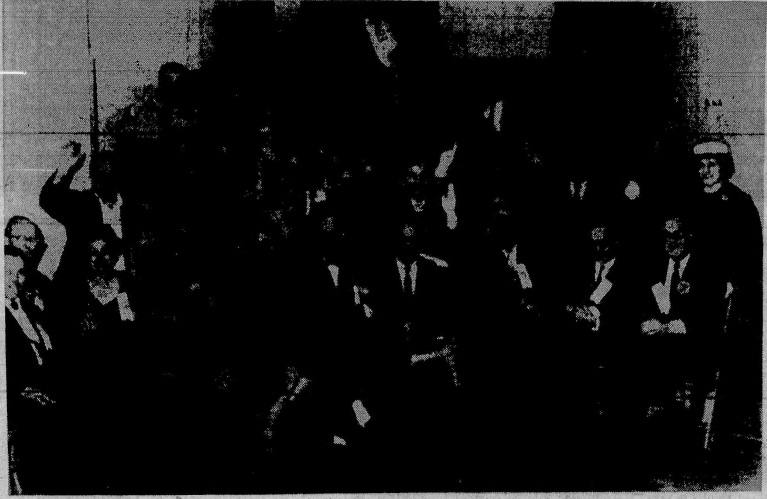
