

# Padula Adds Restrictions Interfering With News Coverage of Finance Dept.

## Reporters Must Write Questions, Wait for Answers

New procedures complicating news coverage of Mayor Padula's Revenue and Finance Department were introduced this week. Padula told The Belleville Times that telephone and in-person interviews are no longer permissible. He said that all information concerning his department must now be requested in writing.

Padula informed The Times-News of the new procedure Monday afternoon. This latest restriction upon the press tightens even further the steps taken by Padula against reporters during the recent government change campaign.

Up until this past Monday and for the past three weeks, all information obtained by reporters in the Finance Department had to be "cleared" or "arranged" by Padula.

"I want to make sure I understand your questions clearly," was Padula's reason for imposing the new restrictions on the press. "Write me a letter listing your questions," Padula said. Padula issued the new procedures to Phil Wolfe of the Times-News Monday.

Wolfe sent Padula a registered letter Monday afternoon requesting a variety of information. The letter concluded by asking the mayor to consider other arrangements with the press for releasing information kept in the public records of the Department of Revenue and Finance.

Restricted by Padula's latest order are the availability of all Revenue and Finance records including salary information, tax bills, tax assessments lists of all monies paid by the Town, water department records and all the business transacted and records kept in the offices of the Town Clerk, Tax Assessor and Purchasing Agent.

Padula's post-election restrictions upon newspaper reporters were viewed as a tangible indication of his bitterness which came when his efforts failed at the polls to retain the present Commission-type government in Belleville.

# Tax Records, Deeds Show Krugman-DePetro Aren't Paying at All for Property

(The case of "the missing tax records" from Mayor Padula's Finance Department is told below. The article consists of non-verbatim-type summaries telling of the activity of The Times editorial staff in recent weeks.)

## THE CASE OF THE MISSING RECORDS

On Tuesday morning, April 23, 1961, a representative of the Belleville Times-News phoned the Belleville tax assessor and asked for an appointment to examine some of his official records. He advised our representative that everything had to be cleared through Mayor Padula, Director of Revenue and Finance. Our representative called Mayor Padula who replied that the people in the town hall were too busy but that if we were still interested to come by the office after three o'clock on Wednesday afternoon. (The town hall closes at 4 p.m.)

On Wednesday afternoon shortly after three we went to the tax assessor's office in the town hall and asked Mr. De Noia to show us the records relating to tax assessments of the vacant land off Jerusalem Street on the east side adjacent to the Third River purchased by developers, Krugman and De Petro at a price of \$22,750 and assessed by Mayor Padula's office at \$3,400.

Mr. DeNoia was very gracious and very accommodating. He showed us the engineer's map of the area which indicated the acreage was sub-divided into building lots. When we asked him for the records which would reveal the reasons why he gave this property preferred assessment treatment he went to a couple of filing cabinets, searched through some files and said he was unable to find the cards

He acknowledged the impartial news coverage given by the Newark News and was particularly impressed by the factual and incisive reporting of The Belleville Times that served to alert the residents to the importance of the issue. He complimented The Times for its public service in publishing an impartial summary of the principals of both forms of government for study by and the education of the citizenry.

Brescia said "Seasoned politicians did not accord the change a chance to succeed. They pointed out that a group of amateurs, dedicated as they might be, could not successfully cope with the power of four entrenched city hall political machines. And when Ken Smith and his mach-

# Work Begins Tomorrow To Set Up Two Town Wards

## Times-News Is Sponsoring Drive To Repeal New Business Taxes

The Times-News this week launched a townwide campaign calling for repeal of Chapter 51, (Personal Property Tax revision) Laws of 1960 as another move to have the law declared unconstitutional got under way in Superior Court in Freehold.

Chapter 51 is the controversial measure passed by the legislature last year after the State Supreme Court ordered the lawmakers to change the law governing assessments "within three years."

Frank A. Orechio, publisher of The Times-News, said this newspaper was mailing a letter with a petition form to every businessman in Belleville. The letter urges signatures on the petition, which calls for prompt repeal of the universally-disliked law.

In a related move earlier this month, both houses of the legislature acted to postpone for a year the effective date of Chapter 51. A move by Senator Wayne Dumont (R-Warren) was reported in the Senate that would repeal the complex and unpopular tax measure.

A statewide rebellion by "little" businessmen forced the move to delay the effective date of the law, originally scheduled to take effect in 1962. Owners of small concerns have been vehement in their complaints about PPT-1. This is the form designed by State Tax Division experts under the controversial law as a "guide" to local tax assessors. Its purpose is to gather information on which to base local tangible personal property rates.

The two-page sheet of tricky questions on business inventory items has been criticized throughout the state as "too complicated." Another widespread criticism has been that PPT-1 could require every small

businessman to become literally his own tax assessor. Growing pressure on state legislators about the complexity of PPT-1 led to the adoption by the Senate of a bill postponing the effective date of Chapter 51 until 1963. An estimated 400,000 persons in New Jersey would be affected by the legislation.

Extra copies of petition forms are available at The Times-News office. Added emphasis to the local campaign was given when the Belleville Chamber of Commerce called upon both houses of the legislature "to repeal this statute as presently enacted." The Chamber also called for further public debate on the measure.

# First Step In Changing Government

Steps will begin tomorrow to divide Belleville into two wards as provided by the passage of the Council-Manager referendum adopted here last week. The four man Essex County Board of Elections and Belleville Town Clerk Eugene Barnett will meet tomorrow at 10 a.m. in the County Court House.

Law requires that the new ward boundaries be filed within 30 days of the election, which puts the deadline at June 2. Barnett said the four election board members will be sworn in tomorrow as "ward commissioners" and as such, they will be responsible for establishing the dividing line separating the two new wards.

In addition to Barnett, the ward commissioners will include Edward A. Reilly, Joseph A. Intile Jr., Mrs. Grace C. Herbst and Rita S. McDonald; the four are members of the county board of elections. None resides in Belleville.

Belleville now has four wards. Under the provisions of the Council-Manager plan, the town will be divided into two wards. State law states that the difference in population between the two wards be less than 10 per cent.

**TOWN MEETING**  
The first meeting of the Belleville Board of Commissioners since the change election was held Tuesday night. Although most of the citizens addressing the board spoke of the adoption of Council-Manager government, none of the commissioners commented on the subject.

Mayor Isadore J. Padula made brief mention, however, of Barnett's meeting with the County Board of Elections on the new ward divisions. However, Padula did not volunteer his remark, it came in response to a question by James Golden of Tappan Avenue.

**SMOOTH TRANSITION**  
In addition to Golden, citizens speaking Tuesday night included Thomas McGill of the Citizens Tax Council and John Bass, vice chairman of the Citizens Change Committee and president of the Rutan Estates Homeowners' Association. All three urged the Commissioners to "restrict your activity (in the year ahead) to the administration of routine, normal town affairs which will assure a smooth transition from the present administration to the

## Deterioration Rate Is High for Local Homes

Figures released in Washington this month show that the rate of deterioration of Belleville structures is almost four times the pace in neighboring Nutley.

The breakdown was contained in a structure — survey of the two towns released by Rep. Peter W. Rodino, Jr. (D-10th Dist.). Structure deterioration in Belleville is proceeding at a rate two-and-one-half times greater than in Nutley, where, however, the percentage of structures rated "sound" is better than the per cent less than in Belleville.

## Directors Say Civil Defense Alert 'Smooth'

An appraisal of the recent air raid drill held in Belleville was issued by local civil defense authorities this week.

The drill went smoothly right from the start. It was the first time for local units to be alerted on a "round-the-clock" basis at the new Control Center in the Recreation Building. When the "take cover" alarm sounded at 4 p.m., the response was instantaneous and complete, officials said.

The drill was under the supervision of Ludwig R. Pesa, CD Director. Deputy Director — Police Chief George Spatz and Thomas J. McMahon, as well as William G. Hunt, secretary of the CD Council were other interested spectators.

After the "all clear" sounded at 4:30 p.m., the CD staff remained at their posts throughout the night. Direct radio communication with Civil Defense headquarters in Livingston was maintained throughout the period of the test.

Approximately 36 messages were sent and received between Belleville and Livingston. The Belleville Center's new six-meter installation performed satisfactorily, according to operators taking part in the exercise.

Among local "hands" who took part were: Richard McKinley (WAZEDM), James Condon (WAZEDM), and Charles Mantone (WAZEDM). Theme of the local aspect of the drill was the problems caused by a simulated five-minute bomb falling on Jersey City, and thereby causing some 1,700 casualties in Belleville.

McGill read a two page statement of the Tax Council. "The Citizens' Tax Council is asking that this governing body, either formally or by gentlemen's agreement amongst yourselves, to agree on a resolution that you will not introduce, during the coming year, any new projects which will entail capital expenditures beyond those which have already been budgeted," McGill said.

The present Commissioners will not leave office to make way for the new Council-Manager form of government until a year from this summer.

Golden told the Commissioners that they were largely responsible for the failure of town government. "There were many reasons why this change of government was successful," Golden said, "but many of these reasons can be traced upon this board itself for its inefficient administration."

The Tappan Avenue critic told the Commissioners "yours is now a caretaker government and as such, you have the responsibility to see that a smooth transition (to Council-Manager government) is made."

covering these properties. He advised that Trenton has a copy of this particular record; he would phone Trenton the next morning and let me know what reasons he gave in support of the low assessment on this property. We received no such call the next morning.

The Times-News then learned through investigation that the Town of Belleville is sending a tax bill to Krugman and De Petro covering lot 622 in Lorraine Court for Lot 34, although the December, 1957 deed conveys title to Krugman and De Petro and recites the lot as No. 35.

The same December 1957 deed conveys to Krugman and De Petro a lot designated as 28, Block 624. The Town of Belleville is not sending a tax bill to Krugman and De Petro for this lot. Although the December, 1957 tax bill does not transfer title to the lot, block 566 on Jorammon Street, Padula's department is sending a tax bill to Krugman and De Petro covering this property (to which Krugman and De Petro do not have a title).

Tax Assessor De Nola said he "assumed" Lot 28, Block 624 on Lorraine Court was the same as Lot 1, block 566 on Jorammon Street.

dula had boasted that the records of his department were always open to the press. In the presence of reporters, he shouted to his department employees telling them to "cooperate with the Belleville Times. Show them whatever they want to see. The records of my department are always open to the press."

Then as the election campaign drew to a close, Padula began issuing orders restricting or hampering with the press coverage of his department activities. Up until Monday, he had instructed all department heads not to

Several times when such clearance was requested, Padula replied that his staff was "too busy" to see you today. "Come tomorrow instead."

This week's extension of him-

dering the press came in a demand that any information or questions pertaining to Padula's department be expressed in written form. The mayor said he wanted to be "absolutely sure" that he understands reporters' questions.

However Padula has never said he was ever unclear about any questions put to him by reporters — at least by representatives of The Belleville Times-News.

## SANE Group Stages Protest During CD Test

The Belleville-Nutley Committee for a SANE Nuclear Policy protested during the recent state-wide Civil Defense drill, "Operation Alert." Headed by Mrs. In-

grid Frank of 43 Rossmore Place, the local committee passed out literature all day April 28 stating "the truth is Civil Defense is no defense." The group made no attempt to resist taking shelter during the public participation segment of the drill.

The SANE Committee maintains that shelters would offer no protection in a nuclear war. The literature noted that this belief is supported by Gov. Robert B.

Meyner and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt.

Mrs. Frank said that "even one 20 megaton bomb would be sufficient to seal all underground shelters in mountains of radioactive rubble in an area upwards of 200 square miles."

Continuing, she said that "firestorms would spread in all directions, consuming everything flammable, including the oxygen we are supposed to breathe in our shelters."

"A canopy of radioactivity would kill and contaminate an area covering hundreds of square miles initially — and scorching winds would damage people seriously, even on the fringes of a 2,000 square mile area," she said.

Included in the literature distributed by the Committee was a full page article reprinted from the New York Post written by Gov. Meyner and headed, "A Governor Says No to Atomic Shelters—There is Only One Defense—Peace."

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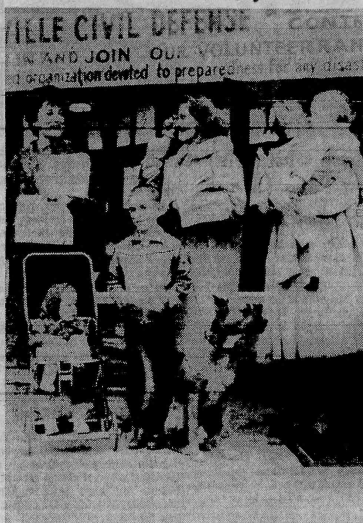

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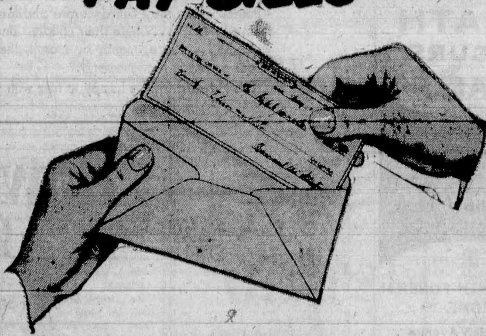

## The Commission Should Be Reasonable

Last week's election results should be closely scrutinized by our present members of the Board of Commission. While Mayor Isadore Padula suggests a "virus of change" was responsible for the overwhelming victory which saw the people reject commission form of government by a vote of 5,421 to 3,497, we believe the Mayor has not correctly read the election results. It is our opinion that when the people went to the polls to vote "yes" they were actually voting "no" to the following propositions:

1. The people don't want a public parking lot off Rutgers Street as Mayor Padula and Commissioner Robert Gruhin have proposed.
2. The people don't want the commission to spend \$100,000 or \$200,000 to buy the old Bell Telephone Company building as the site for a new police headquarters.
3. The people don't want the commission to spend \$750,000 to a million dollars to change the course of the Third River.
4. The people don't want any more thousand dollar raises, especially to relatives of public officials.
5. The people don't want the Board of Commission to grant a developer authority to build apartments off Joralemon Street.
6. The people don't want one taxpayer favored over another in the matter of proposed assessments.

In other words, what the people are trying to tell the commission is that they can't afford to pay high real estate taxes — and it is time to stop needless spending of taxpayers' money. This was the simple message of Tuesday, May 2nd.

## Mitchell versus Hughes

At a general election to be held Tuesday, November 7th, the people of Belleville will be asked to cast a ballot for a gubernatorial candidate to succeed the outgoing governor, Democrat Robert B. Meyner.

In a bitterly fought contest, Republicans nominated President Eisenhower's Secretary of Labor, James P. Mitchell. The Democrats selected former Superior Court Judge, Richard J. Hughes.

Belleville's Democrat Committee recently reelected to another one year term its chairman, Ralph Vara and vice chairman, Mrs. Mae Mead Mazza.

The Republicans reelected their youthful Nicholas Rapuano as chairman and Mrs. Ruth Fredericks as vice chairman.

On the basis of past experience, the Vara-Mazza combination begins the Fall campaign with a head start over the Rapuano-Fredericks team. For the last decade Democrats have won practically every general election in Belleville. There is greater party strength with the Democrats in Belleville than there is with the Republican party.

Even his enemies admit that Ralph Vara is an able political leader and a relentless detail man. It is going to take a lot of doing to switch Belleville to the Republican column this November. It is quite a challenge for the leadership of Nicholas Rapuano and Mrs. Fredericks. Mrs. Fredericks enjoys a State-wide reputation as a hard working Republican. She has earned the title of "Mrs. Republican" not only in Belleville but also in Essex County. She has dedicated most of her years to the Republican party. Whether it has been as a worker in the ranks or as a leader among women she has been right in there pitching for the G.O.P.

Young Rapuano, an attorney, is short on length of service in the Republican party but what he lacks in experience he more than makes up for in enthusiasm and personal integrity. Rapuano and Mrs. Fredericks will need all the help they can muster for the Republicans to make a

good showing in Belleville in November.

In Jim Mitchell the Republicans have a product who can be sold easily to the independent voters. This group incidentally represents more than a third of our voters.

It will be interesting to watch developments as the two opposing teams utilize the dull summer days for organizational purposes. Characteristically, Fall campaigns do not begin in earnest until Labor Day.

We would encourage every citizen interested in preserving and strengthening the two-party system to volunteer his services as a worker in the party of his choice.

Instead of a handful of workers — and some for pay at that — both parties should be receiving offers of help from citizens whose only interest is in good government.

## The PPT-1 Form

Apparently the voice of the small businessman was heard in the halls of the New Jersey Legislature for during the past two weeks legislation was enacted and Governor Robert B. Meyner signed a bill postponing for one year the effective date of the revisions in the local taxing laws which required every businessman to file Form PPT-1 containing 200 questions which upset the average businessman.

While we are pleased that a postponement was voted by the New Jersey Legislature, it is the belief of the Times-News that Chapter 51, Laws of 1960 is unfair and places in the hands of politically appointed tax assessors the power to send honest businessmen to jail. Under the terms of the law every businessman became his own tax assessor. Under the penalties of perjury a businessman whether or not he was a trained accountant or attorney was required to supply answers which at best in most instances would only be a guess. God help the little grocer — the delicatessen store owner — the gas station operator and a multitude of other little one-man shops whose guess was questioned by a politically motivated tax assessor. We submit the power granted to political appointees in Chapter 51 of Laws of 1960 can be used in the form of blackmail. This certainly could not have been the intent of honest legislators.

The Times-News is mailing a letter with a petition form to every Belleville businessman urging him to sign the petition which is calling for a repeal of Chapter 51, Laws of 1960 which gave birth to the obnoxious form PPT-1.

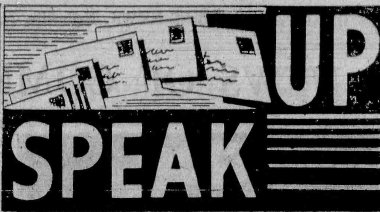

## The Serious Problem Ahead

On Tuesday, October 17, 1961, the citizens of Belleville will be asked by the school board to march to the polls to vote on two questions; one concerns the construction of a new school and the other involves the construction of multi-purpose school rooms.

The Times-News will strain every resource available to it in order to inform our readers on the questions involved at the special school election. The voters will in large measure be guided in their voting by their pocketbooks. That the Belleville school system requires a face-lifting no one doubts. Whether the surgery planned and recommended by the school board is the answer only a study and time will tell. Meanwhile it is the prime responsibility of school authorities elected and appointed to present their arguments in favor of the new construction plan so thoroughly as not to leave any doubt in the voter's mind on the question he is expected to vote upon.

For its part the Times-News has asked the school board for a copy of the contract which it entered into with the architect for the construction of the new school. We shall publish in a series of articles important excerpts from the contract and our analysis of Belleville's educational needs.



## A New Cornerstone Has Been Set for Town

Dear Sir: "All must be imaginative, all must look ahead, or this town will be trampled under foot in the forward march of progress if indeed it has not already lost the race."

This is a quotation from the April 24, 1961 issue of the "Chamber Bulletin" of the Belleville Chamber of Commerce.

The admonition was answered by the people of Belleville, on May 2, 1961 when they went to the polls and laid the cornerstone for a new Belleville by the annihilation of an antiquated governing system and the paving of the way for progress.

We, in this gesture join the rest of the nation on the road to a new frontier.

A just released Better Business Bureau's bulletin shows that the TV and radio sales and service classification still registers the largest number of complaints of all merchandise categories.

This surely is a sorry record. Deliveries of defective sets, failure to make promised adjustments, unsatisfactory service and failure to fulfill contract and guarantee terms are the usual complaints.

This, of course, is not news to us. We receive calls for service every day from people who did not buy from us. Due to our service policy we can not accept such calls. The majority of these purchases were made at so-called discount houses, which do not want to have anything to do with a piece of merchandise once you have it. Service is a bad word with these places. Amazingly enough we receive a great number of calls about sales by department stores. The remainder is from smaller stores who compete with the larger discount operations. As far as they are concerned, service is strictly for suckers, a losing proposition, a nuisance, a headache etc.

It is in the nature of a delicate piece of equipment like a TV or good quality phonograph to require careful attention to adjustments. Many times we receive sets which may have left the factory in good order. The bouncing over a long distance haul shakes them up badly and they are not working properly or they don't work at all when they are unpacked. We check every set and there is not one that does not need some work. For this reason we do not deliver new sets in the original carton to the customer's house. We need a number of instruments to check the sets out and these instruments are too expensive and too delicate to be taken out on trucks. Discount houses and department stores in many cases have deliveries handled through trucks. They unpack a set in front of the customer's home and you hope for the best.

## Health Officer Lists Precautions for Polio

Belleville Health Officer Edward G. Burdy this week recommended a list of precautionary measures against poliomyelitis.

Pointing out that the danger of a polio outbreak is greatest during the months of May to September, Burdy urged citizens to take the following steps:

Avoid extreme fatigue from over-strenuous exercise; avoid sudden chills from extreme changes in temperature during very hot weather; pay careful attention to personal cleanliness by cultivating such habits as hand-washing before meals; take all reasonable precautions to insure that milk and drinking water is not contaminated and, finally,

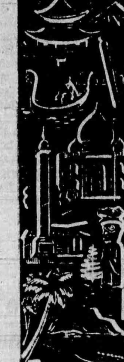
avoid unnecessary contact with persons with symptoms resembling those found in poliomyelitis cases.

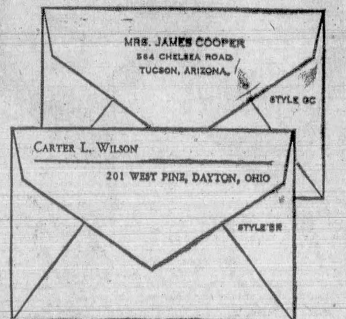

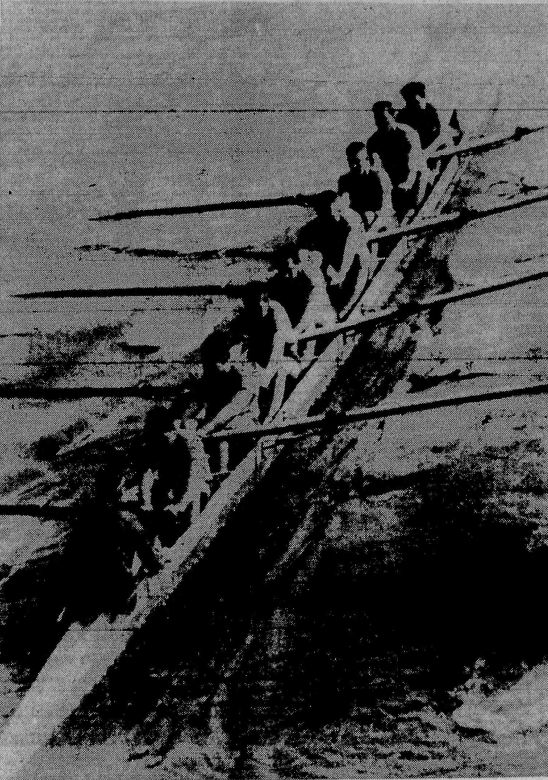

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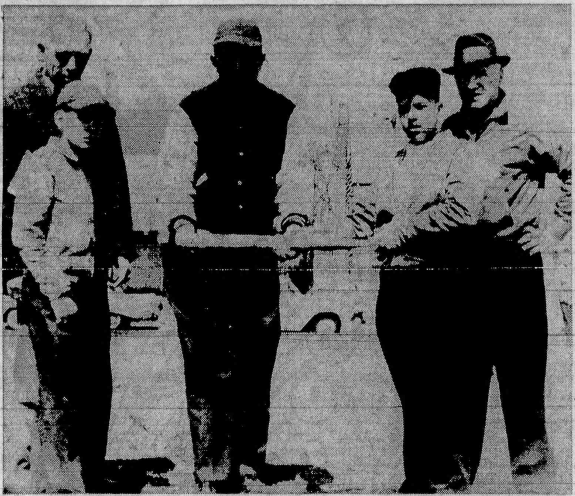

## Super Cinerama Now in Works, Full Scope Type

Cinerama has entered a new and important phase of its development, Company President Nicolas Reisini announced today, as he detailed some of the company's new exhibition developments, its theater building program, and plans for new motion pictures in the Cinerama process.

A new concept of motion picture exhibition, "Super Cinerama", was unveiled on Thursday evening, March 9, at the opening of the new Cooper Foundation Theater in Denver, Colorado. In Super Cinerama, the theater is comprised of three walls, with the fourth wall being the screen itself and reaching from floor to ceiling. The entire interior of the theater is done in one uniform color, to heighten the impact of the huge wrap-around screen.

"In 1952, Cinerama introduced the first wide-screen," Mr. Reisini noted. "Many other wide-screens followed. Now we have a new concept of exhibition, Super Cinerama, to give full scope to our process."

The Cooper Foundation, an organization operating a chain of theaters in the West and Midwest, has invested just under a million dollars in its Denver theater, the world's first designed especially for Super Cinerama presentations.

### FIVE CITIES

As a result of the success of Super Cinerama in Denver, the Cooper Foundation has decided to build similar theaters in five other cities. Cinerama is also actively discussing with two other construction and financing companies the building of Super Cinerama theaters in San Diego, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The first European Super Cinerama theater will be opened in November of this year. It is being constructed at a cost of \$1,200,000 in Paris. Super Cinerama theaters are planned for Glasgow, Scotland, Manchester, England, and Cinerama is negotiating for additional Super Cinerama theaters in Germany and elsewhere.

According to its co-production agreement with M-G-M, Cinerama will have 100 theaters in operation by the time the first new storyline Cinerama feature is ready. With a total of 27 foreign theaters now exhibiting Cinerama, and 23 locations in the United States, half of the total has already been reached. With additional Cinerama theaters sched-

uled to be opened every month this year, at least a hundred theaters will be operating both here and abroad by January or February of 1962.

### STORY PICTURE

The first story-line Cinerama feature to be produced jointly by M-G-M and Cinerama under their agreement will be "The Wonderful World of the Brothers Grimm," a George Pal production. This feature will begin in late Spring and be ready for exhibition by Christmas of this year.

Second Cinerama picture will be "How The West Was Won" (tentative title) with M-G-M Studio head, Sol C. Siegel as executive producer and Bernard Smith as producer. A total of nine major stars will be signed for this major epic, with Debbie Reynolds and Jimmy Stewart already paced. This picture is due for completion by July of next year.

The third M-G-M Cinerama feature, name to be announced, will start principal photography by October of next year; the fourth picture under the agreement will start by July of 1963.

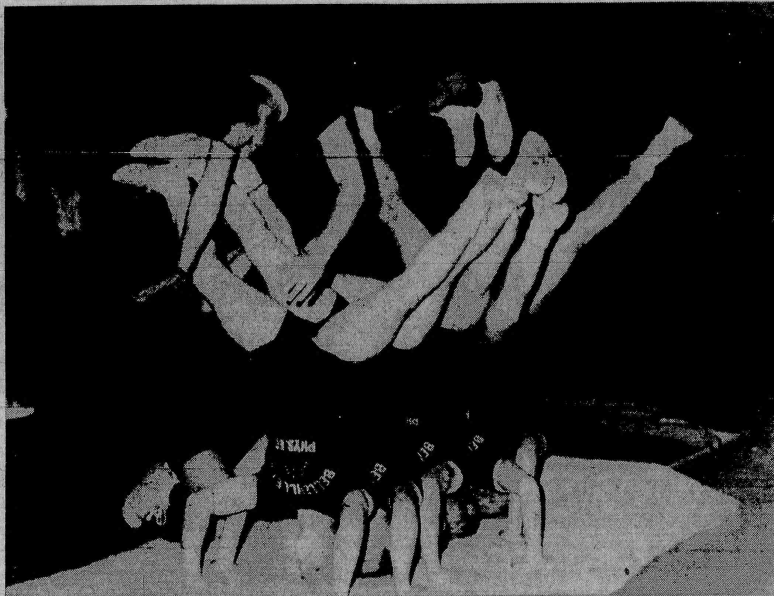

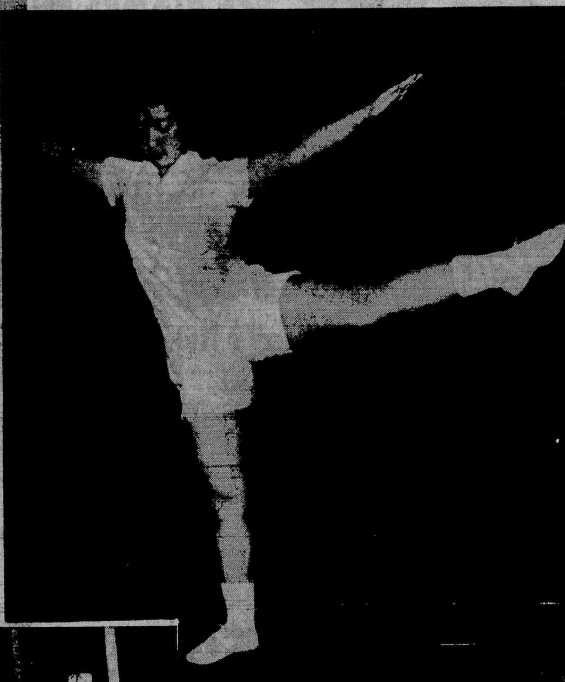

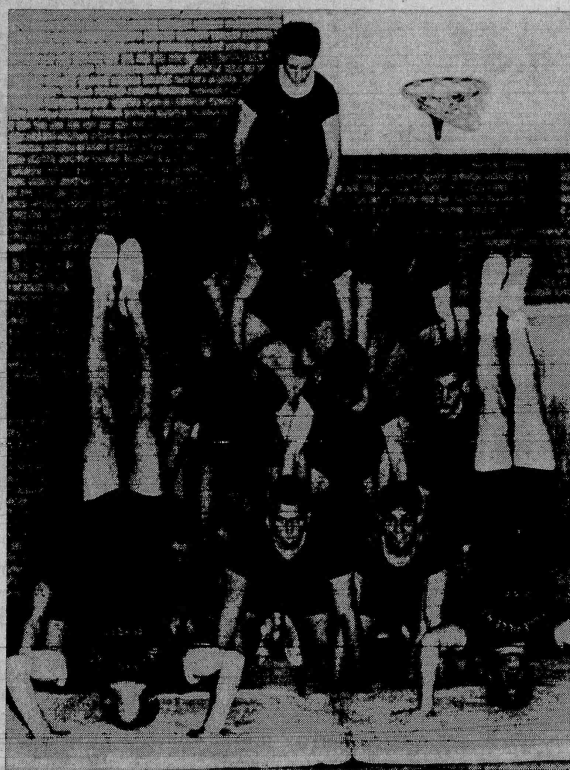

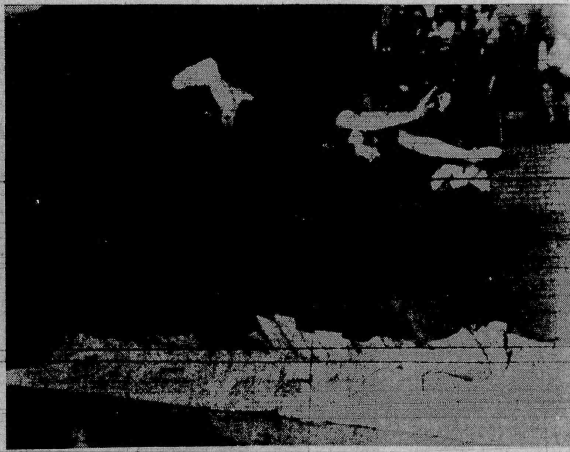
