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### Arthur Pico Will Insist Referendum On Schools be Split

#### Wants New HS Question Separate From Multi-Purpose Proposals

School board member Arthur Pico's campaign to divide the proposed high school referendum into two parts will reach a climax Monday night. Pico wants the construction of a high school a separate question from another asking for construction of multi-purpose rooms at Schools One and 4.

Pico is opposing the construction of the high school proposed for the stadium area. However, he favors much of the multi-purpose room construction. He has told his colleagues on the school board he considers it "unfair to lump the two questions into one

### See Objections Over Gas Station Plan Next Week

A move by the Shell Oil Company of New Brunswick for approval of a preliminary permit to erect a gas station at the corner of Union and Belleville Avenues faces rough going from residents within the prescribed 200 feet of the proposed station site.

A canvass among owners whose property would be affected if the station is built has been under way for some time. George Gebhardt, executor of the Gebhardt Estate, has reportedly approached property owners in the area with the idea of softening opposition to the plan. Gebhardt himself was unavailable for comment on the report.

A survey of the district discloses that opposition to the proposed new station has stiffened considerably during the past week. Complicating the issue is the fact that about 20 feet of the proposed site—now occupied by three rental homes—is zoned "B-1." Should the permit be approved at Tuesday's commission meeting, the Shell Company would be probably compelled to seek a zoning variance.

Much of the opposition to the proposal stems from fears of additional traffic hazards to pupils of School 8 on Union Avenue. Opponents of the station say pupils there are already exposed to more traffic hazards than is consonant with good planning.

The permit comes before the commission at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

### Social Security to Start in 91st Year

#### Herbert Jacobus Retired In 1935 from Post Office

A 90-year-old Belleville retired postal worker will get a \$49.50 monthly income check for life starting June 1 because somebody took the trouble to check his Social Security status.

Herbert C. Jacobus of 438 Union Avenue retired from his job with the Post Office in 1935 after a career that spanned 61 years. He did some work as a handyman and eventually became a groundskeeper for the Town. His job was taking care of the World War II monument in Union Avenue, not far from his home.

When Town Treasurer Francis J. McCoy noticed Jacobus' name in the March, 1959 Social Security report, he decided to check out the groundskeeper's status with the Newark office at 1016 Broad Street. A claim was filed for Jacobus as a result of McCoy's interest, and in due course the good word came back notifying all concerned that Jacobus was eligible to receive \$49.50 a month for life.

Jacobus married his wife, Jessie, 85, two years after he began working for the Post Office in 1897. They live alone and care for their house themselves. He

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### Pete Spera To Join HS Football Staff

A new assistant football coach for Belleville High School next fall is being recommended by the Athletic Council. The Council's recommendations, drafted Monday night, will be presented to the school board next Monday.

The new coach would be Pete Spera of 341 Greylock Parkway. A graduate of George Washington University in 1957, he has taught at Robert Taft Junior High and Newark East Side three years.

Spera has been associated for a number of seasons as coach of the Belleville-Nutley Iron Dukes, the local semi-pro football squad. He would replace Alan Estes who is resigning from the Belleville system this June.

Except for the addition of Spera, the Athletic Council's recommendations are a duplicate of names now coaching Belboy teams. Edward Berlinsky is recommended as head coach for both football and baseball. John Westlake for basketball. Thomas Testa for track. Mario DiMaggio for cross-country and Michael Rosamilia and Stan Seher for crew.

There is a possibility that Spera might be asked to assist Estes with the varsity track program. Estes is currently holding down this post.

No increases in coaches' salaries are being recommended. Members of the Athletic Council at Tuesday night's session were Chairman Ralph Casale, Hugh Kittle, Evan Thomas, Lou Long, William Chappard, Joe Bonavilla and William Kintzing.

### Belleville Seaman Assists In Rescue of Spaceman

sea rescue operation of Navy Commander Alan B. Shepard after his historic sub-orbital space flight down the Atlantic missile range.

He is Radar Seaman John W. Dalton, USN, a member of the crew of the destroyer USS Rooks, one of the navy recovery ships assigned to recover the now famous Mercury spacecraft from the sea.

The navy force, composed of surface and air units, was deployed down the flight path from Cape Canaveral, prepared to scoop up America's first space man minutes after his capsule landed in the sea off Grand Bahama Island.

Actual recovery was made by a Marine helicopter which plucked Commander Shepard out of the water less than five minutes.

### Nuncio Pico Will Assist in Change Of Government

Commissioner Nuncio R. Pico today pledged his support to cooperate in making the newly adopted Council-Manager government "a success" when it goes into effect in Belleville in July 1962.

"I will sincerely pledge my efforts to make this plan a success because all of us are part of government," Commissioner Pico told this newspaper. Pico is director of the Department of Public Affairs.

He said that he intends "to continue to operate the Department of Public Affairs economically and efficiently" for the balance of his term. Commissioner Pico made no mention whether he intends to seek election as a councilman under the new form of government.

"Now that the noise and clamor of the May 2 election have faded away," Pico said, "I extend my congratulations to the people of Belleville for changing to Council-Manager Plan D."

Pico had been a supporter of the retention of Commission government in Belleville.

Continuing, he stated that "an awakened electorate, keeping watch over the activities of their governing officials will certainly

## Board Finally Decides To Release Contracts

Contracts between the Belleville Board of Education and architect Alfonso Alvarez of Montclair were debated again Monday night. Board members argued the merits of providing a copy of the contracts to The Belleville Times-News as had been requested by the newspaper. After a lengthy discussion, the board agreed to provide the newspaper with the contracts. The document was supplied with some reservations however. Nicholas Juliano said he wants it clearly understood that the school board is not obligated to duplicate and mail a copy of the contracts to the newspaper. No one objected to the newspaper copying the contracts in the school board's office, however. REASONS? Dominic A. Lally, president of the board, favored giving the contracts to the Times-News. Lally said he was hopeful the newspaper would support the board in its campaign next fall to win approval of the new high school contract. But Juliano and Richard Drake weren't so sure that support would be coming. They questioned the "motives" of the newspaper in requesting the contracts. Superintendent of Schools Evan Thomas thought the con-

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"clerk" to make sure his own firm is doing the work desired by the school board.

Board President Dominic A. Lally said "right now we have no one in mind for the clerk's job." Attorney Max Schwartz noted, however, that while the board would name the "clerk," the selection must be approved by the architect. A \$175 weekly fee for the "clerk" would be paid by the architect.

Nicholas Juliano called Pico's remarks out of order. When he failed to persuade Lally to halt the discussion because it hadn't been included on Monday's agenda, Juliano ended the meeting by introducing a motion to adjourn. Only Pico and Dr. Frank DiRuggiero voted against the adjournment motion.

DISCUSSION CONTINUES Although the meeting was officially ended, the board remained seated for more than an hour. Both Pico and Dr. DiRuggiero made it clear that if the high school referendum passes, the clerk must not be a member of the architect's firm.

The architect is Alfonso Alvarez of Montclair. Pico said that the name of the "clerk" that "has popped up" was that of an employee of Alvarez.

Pico said he is still opposed to the high school project. Lally said the clerk would be hired only if the referendum on the high school proposal is approved.

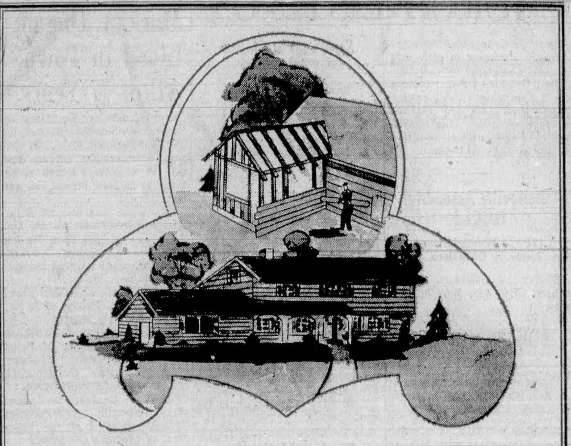
The annual Spring registration and health survey of children for

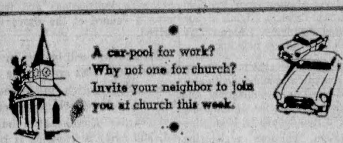

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## Commissioner Nuncio Pico

Since Hurricane Donna came to visit us last October, Commissioner Nuncio Pico has unsuccessfully attempted to obtain commission approval of a \$1,200 charge for removing debris and felled trees left in the wake of the hurricane's visit to Belleville.

During the campaign for change of government, many statements were made suggesting that Commissioner Pico made a deal to support the retention of the commission form in exchange for commission votes to approve the \$1,200 invoice. During the campaign we refrained from publishing this statement because to do otherwise would have violated our sense of fair play. However, now that the battle is over and won it is important that we pay close attention to the rumors circulated during the campaign. This one is especially important to the taxpayers of Belleville because it involves their money.

If the majority of the commissioners refused to approve this \$1,200 invoice prior to May 2nd what new evidence is available now that would permit them to change their positions today? Refusal of the commission to approve payment of the invoice would mean that Commissioner Pico would be obliged to pay this charge from personal funds.

In passing it should be noted that Commissioner Pico for months had joined forces with people to oppose retention of the commission form of government. Through some strange hocus-pocus the people of Belleville woke up one day and found him in bed with the very people of whom he was most critical. To change his mind is the right of any citizen and in this instance Commissioner Pico acted pretty much like politicians normally behave.

He can do the taxpayers a great favor by abolishing the job now held by his top political lieutenant, Ralph Risoli. From all reports it appears that Mr. Risoli spent most of his time during the last month spearheading Mayor Padula's forces in organizing and conducting the disastrous vote "no" campaign. Such being the case it appears to us his job is certainly one that could be abolished now by a town commission interested in economy. There is no point in waiting for the new council to take over and abolish this job which very well can be eliminated today with a \$4,500 saving to our taxpayers.

## Not In The Public Interest

Tuesday night the Town Commission will be asked to take official action on an application for permission to erect a gas station on one of Belleville's most valuable corners — the northwest corner of Union Avenue and Belleville Avenue.

Three buildings now occupy the site. These would be demolished and in their place and stand Belleville would obtain a gas station — the 22nd within a one mile radius.

We do not believe a gas station in this area is necessary. We further believe this proposed use is not in the public interest. Yes — the owner would stand to make a chunk of money with a long term gas station lease — but what effect will another gas station at this intersection have upon the future development of Belleville? Has the Belleville Planning Board been consulted regarding its own projection of zoning for this area? Or are we to assume the Town Commission cares not about the Planning Board's opinion?

The people of Belleville are excited over the new possibilities open to our town with the adoption of the business-like Council Manager form of govern-

ment. Even so innocuous an enterprise as a gas station will have its impact upon the future development of "Belleville the Beautiful."

The vote on this resolution Tuesday night will let the people know whether or not the politicians who control the Commission have learned anything from the election of May 2nd.

Clearly a favorable vote upon the gas station application is not in the public interest.

## School Board Politics

For the umpteenth time our hard-working Board of Education will consider the dual questions of a new high school project and multi-purpose rooms for three of our grades schools.

Three board members want the questions to appear separately on the October special school board election ballot.

Three board members want the questions presented as one on the ballot in October.

Politics is behind the posture of both threesomes. We think this posture is bad for Belleville. Provincial interests should not becloud the basic question — what is best for Belleville.

We believe the multi-purpose project should not be joined with the new school project. We believe the multi-purpose room project should be held over until the regular February school board election. To do otherwise would be to confuse the issue of the proposed new school project — which is already encumbered with built-in problems of its own.

No harm will be done by delaying the vote on the multi-purpose room proposal until the February election. To insist upon an October plebiscite is an invitation to disaster for all the programs. Members who are sincere in their desire to improve our school system will think twice before submitting themselves to the political pressures which are being applied to both sides in the controversy — and also on the undecided member — School Board President Dominick Lally.

## Long Arm

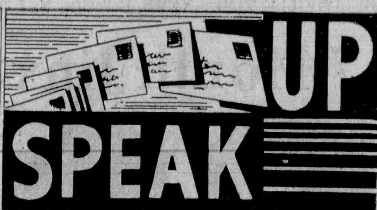
Another income tax time has come and gone. And millions of us feel a sad flatness in the pocketbook.

Once the income tax was a rich man's tax—people of small and moderate earnings paid little or nothing. But now, as Citizens Public Expenditure Survey observes, "the long arm of the Internal Revenue Service reaches out to nearly everybody."

Here's the cold statistical story: Of the total federal tax, people who earn under \$5,000 a year pay 21 per cent. The \$5,000-\$10,000 group pays 39 per cent. The \$10,000-\$15,000 earners pay 11 per cent. The \$15,000-\$50,000 people pay 17 per cent. And the real big income group—\$50,000 and over—pays only 12 per cent.

This isn't because the rich are favored. Income tax rates reach a top bracket of 91 per cent. It simply reflects the fact that there are not enough wealthy people to foot the bill for government—but there are millions of individuals in the modest income brackets. So, inevitably, the latter must pay the great bulk of government costs. And they, collectively, would gain the most from reductions in non-essential governmental spending.

Hartland, Wisc., Reporter: "There has been a great deal of talk that the new administration may well be advised to make some temporary tax cuts as one means of getting the economy 'moving' again... The dissident thought occurs: Is this what taxes are for? Are they meant to provide the necessary costs of government, or are they intended to be a magic wand that will change or cure, speed or retard our economic and social enterprises? A tax cut, even though temporary, would of course be welcome. But it would be far sounder and more beneficial if it reflected a reduction in government expenditures."

May I add to the points which you made that it is vitally important for Belleville's 18,000 registered voters to familiarize themselves with our educational problems and the proposed solutions.

Unfortunately, the loudest critics of educational improvement plans are among those who have had the least exposure to the problems.

## Beck's Column



After extensive tests the Federal Communications Commission has approved a new FM transmitting system called "MULTIPLY." This means that FM radio transmitted by stations which are going to install the necessary equipment, can be heard "stereophonically." There were a number of different multiplexing systems submitted to the FCC. All of them were demonstrated and tried. Amazingly enough, the whole industry agrees that the FCC made a wise choice.

The new feature will go in operation sometime this summer, as soon as the stations have the equipment for the transmissions, one needs first of all an FM receiver. Present FM sets need an adapter, which will cost some where between \$50- and \$100-.. You also need a stereo amplifier and stereo sound system. If you now have a stereo phonograph, you will make use of it for stereo FM radio, of course.

Without an adapter you will continue to hear FM the same as you hear it now. The new feature will enhance greatly the tone quality of FM music, provided of course that you have the equipment to receive it "stereophonically." FM is far better in many respects than AM radio. The tone quality on FM is far superior. There is no static and no interference from neighboring stations. Best of all there are a few stations on FM that do not have any "commercials" and this alone is a relief.

In the half mile Bob Cornish and Jim Debois took first and second and in the low hurdles Bob McGeeown, Fred Valese and Chris LaPara swept, as the Blue and Gold began to make a rout of the meet.

Jim Harvey came from behind to win by inches in what proved to be a very exciting mile run; Ernest Stefanelli took third for Belleville.

In the 220 yard dash Stan Tomaszewski came through with his second first of the day as he won in 24.5 seconds. Frank DeMeo took third in this event in 26.0.

The high hurdles, which was won by Jack Herman was the only running event which was not taken by Belleville. Bob McGeeown came in third in the 80 yard highs with the winning time 11.6 seconds.

The field events began with Barringer's Frank Calabria taking first in the shotput with a heave of 42' 5". Lou Mazza came



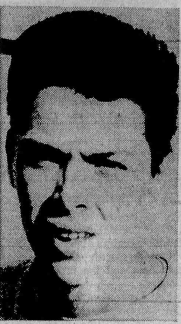
FRANK DeMeo Finished 3rd in 220-Yard Dash
