More than 10,000 Visit Cavalcade; A Great Success

More than 10,000 persons visited the three-day Cavalcade of Progress, the business exposition sponsored by the Belleville Chamber of Commerce in the Elks Auditorium last Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

All the exhibitors agreed the show far exceeded their predictions. While no official count was made of the number visiting the Cavalcade, F. Douglas Wadsworth, chairman, says that "it's safe to say that more than 10,000 attended although estimates run to twice this number."

The auditorium was usually crowded throughout the three-day period. Quiet periods came during the opening hour of the show (2:30 to 3:30 p.m. Thursday and Friday) and during the supper hour.

The Belleville Chamber of Commerce is "highly pleased" with the reception given the show by town citizens. Wadsworth said "the exhibitors themselves are entitled to high praise for their outstanding displays which have seldom been equaled in any show, anywhere."

VISITORS COMMENT

Several persons who visited the Cavalcade filled out forms which asked them to comment on the exposition. All of the comments were favorable and included such remarks as "Excellent show, must be repeated . . . Inspiring to Belleville residents . . . the best thing that ever happened in Belleville."

WANTS SECOND SHOW

Harry T. French, executive director of the chamber, stated that the show has stimulated a number of businessmen into joining the Chamber of Commerce.

Arthur Jackson, chamber president reported that "many merchants and businessmen who have not the Cavalcade have already expressed a desire to be included in the next show the chamber might hold." Jackson said, "I'm very pleased with the success of this venture."

Many of the exhibitors, who make the rounds at expositions in other parts of the state, including the Trenton fair, said they never saw such a steady flow of people as appeared at the Belleville Cavalcade of Progress.

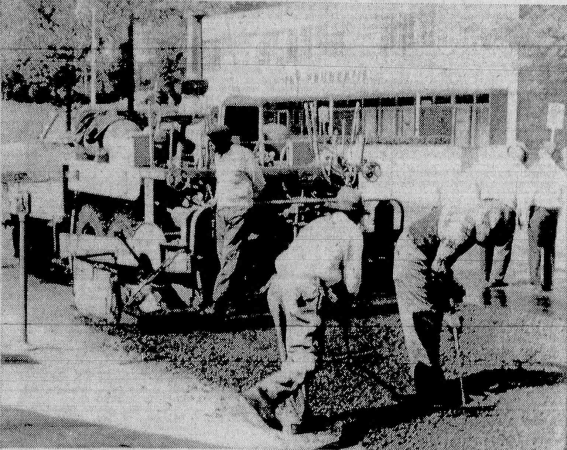

Paving Should be Completed June 8



WELL, FINALLY . . . State Highway workers this week moved into Belleville for the Washington Avenue (N.J. Route 7) repaving job. Tentative schedule will complete the work on June 8. Today and tomorrow, workmen are scheduled to repave the intersections of Greylock Parkway to Rossmore Place; June 1-2 from Rossmore Place to Belleville Avenue, and June 7-8 from Belleville Avenue to the Newark line. These sections of Washington Avenue will be closed to traffic on the days the work is in progress there. Buses are being detoured around roadblocks on the nearest street paralleling Washington Avenue beginning and ending at the points of the roadblocks.

Belleville Business People Support Times' Campaign To Repeal New Tax Law

Immediate and enthusiastic was the response to the campaign launched last month by The Belleville Times to have the "PPT-1" business tax law repealed.

No sooner had the issue of the paper with the story about the project and the letters to business and professional people been delivered than phone calls and visits to The Belleville Times office indicated that the drive had touched a sensitive nerve and was assured of practically unanimous support.

A longer - than - average comment on the law which is being found so distasteful has been received from Philip J. Silvestri, of 264 Rutgers Place, Nutley, an attorney and longtime and widely-known resident of the community.

Saying that he had "followed through on the petition to Senator Fox" as requested in the letter, Mr. Silvestri wrote:

"The law that created the issue and use of the form PPT-1 did not contain the form and same was devised by a learned employee of the department who did not have the intelligence to take into account that the said form may be the right one for the big firms who have a monthly inventory record and keep all types of records to keep track of the business and make their federal returns and pay their insurance premiums on the monthly record plan.

At that point, two more blasts struck Payton in the forehead. The youths then raced to police headquarters, about a block away. Another friend, Richard Wells, 21, of 20 Greylock Avenue, joined them en route. Swain was held for investigation.

Candidates for the U. S. Service Academies should be at least 17 years of age and must not have reached their 22nd birthday by July 1 of the calendar year in which they will enter one of

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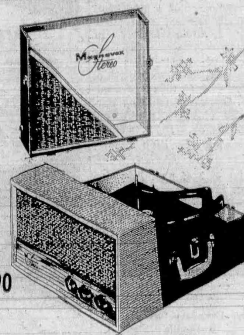

By its work it has earned the respect and support of our citizens and its business community. What Mayor Padula Doesn't Say

Mayor Isadore Padula last week wasted another \$575,000 of taxpayers' money taking a trip to Seattle, Washington to attend a convention of Municipal Finance Directors.

Padula claims his attendance at the conference will benefit Belleville. If the past is any judge of the future we must respectfully enter a dissent from the opinion of our well-travelled Mayor.

Of his trip Padula's advance release said, "I shall do my best to bring back the high points of the conference from which our Commission Board and the forthcoming Council may obtain many useful leads for the efficient operation of town affairs, involving finances."

In his seven years-plus as Revenue and Finance Director Padula has failed to demonstrate any ability in efficiently operating his department. In fact history will record that he has been Belleville's most expensive Mayor.

We do not believe the people or next year's new Council will want any more of Padula's advice — even for free.

We are sorry to see another \$575,000 of taxpayers' money wasted. At the very least we hope the expenditure may have some therapeutic value for the hard-working Mayor.

Can Municipal Expenditures Be Cut?

If one were to listen to the siren cry of Mayor Isadore J. Padula, the taxpayer would assume that at no time in the history of municipal government in the United States was a community able to reduce taxes.

President Kennedy recently told American citizens and the world that today we are in a state of war. Kennedy

also stated that war-time emergencies and sacrifices were necessary if we are to survive as a people and if we are to progress as a country.

The same kind of emergency grips the taxpayers of our country. With the high cost of living making it difficult for the average taxpayer to meet his bills it behooves all of our public officials to cut back on public expenditures today.

Wives find it necessary to seek gainful employment to supplement the income of hardworking husbands. Today we find husbands seeking second jobs to supplement the income from the first job and the income of the working wife and mother. All the rosy statistics notwithstanding the hard facts of living today involve the difficult task of a husband and wife working hard trying to meet the daily bills of a growing family.

Of course we do not have a depression but conditions akin to a depression are with us today and what are our Town fathers doing to aid the beleaguered taxpayers? The sordid history of the past five months is there for all citizens to see. Thousand dollar raises are the order of the day. Unnecessary jobs are continued and held by political hacks whose services could be dispensed with in a moment if our public officials were disposed to render the taxpayers a real service.

Let's take a look at a page in the history book of the United States. In 1932 this is what history tells us:

"In Wisconsin, 101 cities reduced taxes this last year by an average of 12 per cent.

Detroit cut its budget from \$76,000,000 to \$60,000,000; and Detroit is the first large city to decide that it will not spend any more than its income.

Chicago, where for years they had lots of trouble over assessments and taxes, employed an expert to cut the force of employees in the assessor's department from 491 to 90.

In Baltimore, the total city expenses were reduced \$2,000,000 in one year. In Pittsburgh, where taxes used to be \$30,000,000, they were cut down to \$20,000,000.

In Buffalo, a new budget was \$2,500,000 less than it was the year before. In Rochester, New York, the budget was cut from \$18,000,000 to \$15,000,000.

In Akron, Ohio, three cuts were made. A budget of \$11,000,000 was cut to \$8,700,000. This was accomplished as the result of the Mayor's action, backed up by the Bureau of Municipal Research and the Chamber of Commerce.

Oshkosh, Wisconsin, cut its budget from \$1,600,000 to \$1,200,000.

In Pontiac, Michigan, taxes were reduced 30 per cent under those of its high tax year in 1930.

In Cleveland, there was a tax cut of \$10,000,000. This was effected by many mass meetings of the taxpayers, and the joint action of twenty-three different business and civic organizations.

Mamaroneck, New York, cut its budget from \$526,000 to \$415,000 — a cut of 21 per cent.

Appleton, Wisconsin, cut its taxes to one-half of what they were just 12 months previously.

And Woonsocket, Rhode Island, which was faced with bankruptcy one year — cut its taxation \$583,000 the following year and ended the year with a SURPLUS of \$53,000!"

The year was 1932 and the place — all over America.

The reading of history proves one thing — where there is the will surely there will be found the way.

Official inaction on the adoption of obvious economies at the Town Hall fools no one but the fellow in the mirror. The taxpayers are aware of what is going on under the Town Hall dome. They expressed their resentment on May 2nd — and come next May they will take a very hard look at what has transpired during the interim.

Beck's Column



The only items which we carry other than electronics are air conditioners. There are many misconceptions about the functioning of these units. Most people expect too much from a room air conditioning unit.

There are central air conditioners available, to take care of a house. However, they are fairly expensive and require ducts and extensive installation. We do not want to talk about these, we just want to talk about room air conditioners which are commonly installed in clerks' transoms and occasionally in walls.

If you want to get an idea whether you can cool several rooms with one unit, just ask yourself whether these rooms could be heated with only one radiator. Heating as well as cooling depends on the circulation of air. It is impossible to push cool air through a door opening and at the same time pull warm air out. If you consider this, you will readily see that you would need an air conditioner in every room which you want to cool efficiently, just the same as you need a radiator in every room if you would want to heat it efficiently. Of course you would feel a slight effect in adjoining rooms, if you leave the doors open. However, if one unit is adequate for one room, it would be considered if it is expected to take care of more than it is designed for. The result is that it runs continuously and still can not take care of the overload.

The manufacturers state in their literature that an air conditioner can handle a room of certain measurements. In most cases this is exaggerated. It is presumed that the location is ideal, meaning no exposure to the hot afternoon sun, insulated walls, ceilings etc. There is even a great difference between the same room size on the first and second floor. If you want to be sure to get the right unit for the job, it is best to call a qualified technician to make a survey of your requirements. We offer this service free of charge.

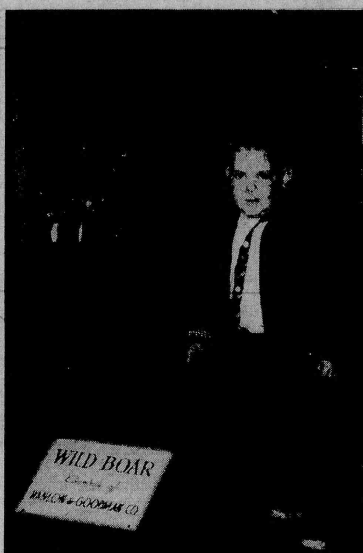

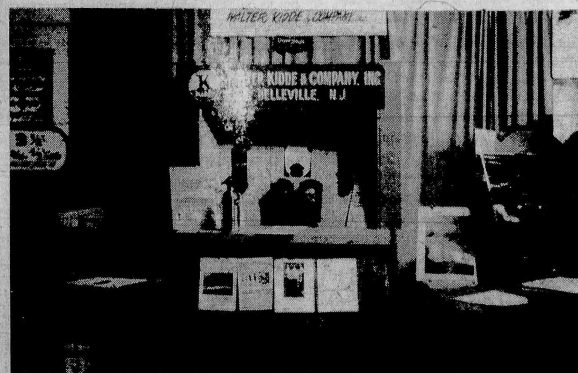

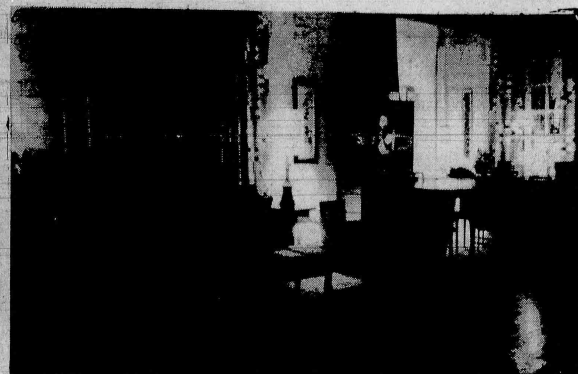

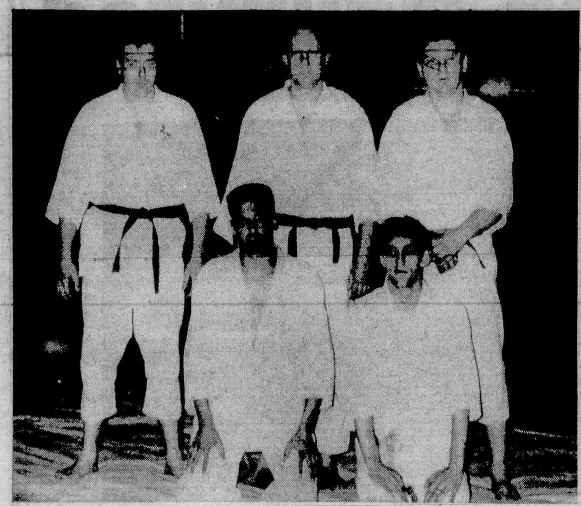

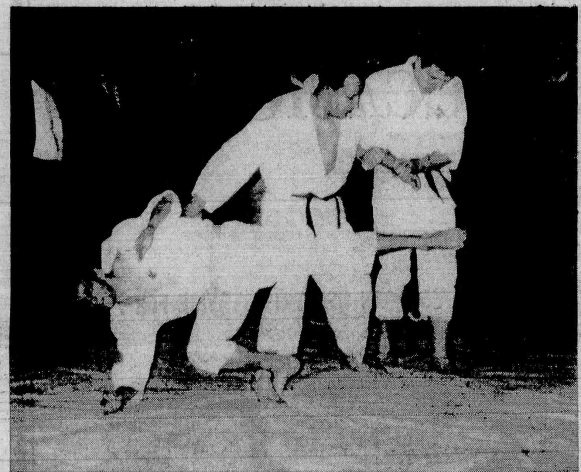

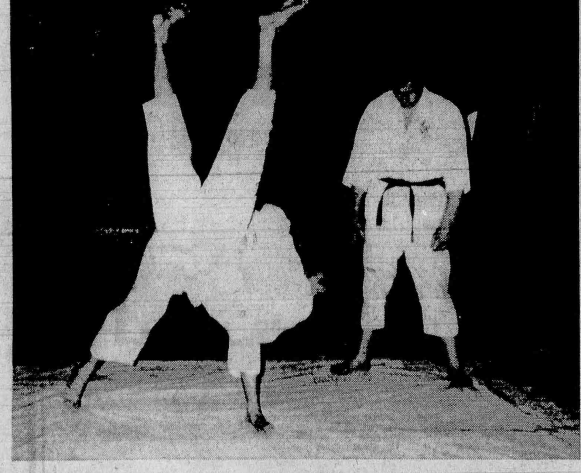
