### While the People Slept

Apparently the cynicism of our local politicians knows no bounds. As a result of the Council-Manager change voted by the people on May 2nd, the members of the Essex County Board of Elections in consort with the Town Clerk were under obligation to redistrict the Town of Belleville into two wards. At present we have four.

This redistricting of the town wards must be done without any interference from politicians at any level. Unfortunately Mayor Isadore Padula insisted upon chopping up our ward boundaries for his personal convenience. Padula wanted the ward lines so arranged as to place Commissioner Pico and him in separate wards. The North Ward boundary was stretched just enough to include Pico's backyard thus placing Pico in the North Ward and Isadore Padula in the South Ward.

Padula apparently is intent upon making another run for local office. Frankly we hope he does. We thought when the people overwhelmingly approved the Council-Manager form of government on May 2nd it was a repudiation of the policies of the present Padula government. Mayor Padula apparently doesn't think so. We invite him to put his record on the line again next May and let the people pass judgment directly upon his tenure as Revenue & Finance Director and Mayor of our community.

The realignment of our wards in accordance with the demands of Padula will not soon be forgotten by our voters.

While the people slept, the politicians planned. Obviously the politicians have not learned a lesson from the May 2nd vote. The redistricting shenanigans give ample evidence that if taxpayers do not remain vigilant for the remainder of the commission's present term, other matters may be pushed through by a lame duck Town Commission which may have disastrous effects upon taxpayers and our tax rate.

A number of matters are tabled, i. e. the Cardiac Hill parking lot, acquisition of a new police headquarters, realignment of Third River, etc. It is important that citizens visit the Town Hall every Commission meeting in order to oppose any effort of the present Commission to thwart the will of the people.

### Rutan Homeowners Slap

#### Pico's Dept. for 'Laxity'

The president of the Rutan Estates Homeowners Association charged Commissioner Nunzio Pico and his Department of Public Affairs with failing to carry out obligations toward correcting unsanitary conditions in the Rutan area.

Several weeks ago the Rutan group presented Pico with a petition signed by 214 residents demanding that the conditions be corrected. Rutan President John Bass said that Pico failed to carry through a law suit against the owners of the Lobnitz property where debris and reported stagnant water are creating unsanitary conditions by providing a breeding place for rats and mosquitoes.

"DOING BEST WE CAN" Pico told the commission meeting that the suit against the owners was stopped about a year ago "because Lobnitz agreed to clear up the conditions." When Bass asked "why the Lobnitz promise wasn't followed up," Pico replied, "we're doing the best we can under the circumstances."

Bass inferred that Lobnitz, a large land holder, was receiving special treatment by Town Hall. The petition was presented by William Riedel of 38 Plong Drive. He complained that contrary to law, top soil has been removed from the Lobnitz property and the resulting land contour of the land is ideal for creating stagnant pools of water.

Pico said the water on the property was tested and because of the rains, "it was found not to be stagnant." Bass then displayed a jar of water

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## Bellboys Upset Nutley Team, 8-3, In Spectacular Holiday Contest

Whatever the ingredients of a good ball game are, Tuesday's holiday tilt between archrivals Belleville and Nutley had them all. Belleville took full advantage of extra base hits, sacrifices, errors, walks and stolen bases to snap Nutley's 14 game winning streak by an 8-3 score.

Eric Hatch outlasted three Maroon pitchers and went the full nine innings for the win. Nutley's Doug Bursch, who relieved Tom Parachini in the second frame, was the losing moundsman.

Hatch did all right at the plate too; he blasted two triples which scored a pair of runs in the first inning and put him in position to score himself in the fifth frame.

Nutley wasn't able to get one extra-base hit off Hatch. The Belleville pitcher faced 39 batters, gave up six hits, four walks and fanned six men.

Belleville's other long drives were belted by George Sheridan and Bob Pucciarello who hit doubles off Bursch and Al Hallam respectively. Hallam came in for Bursch in the seventh inning.

**BIG CROWD** Nutley was riding high on the glory of a 14-game winning streak, was (and still is) leading the Big Ten Conference and was rated at the top of New Jersey's best teams. Needless to say, this reputation drew several out of town spectators who joined huge crowds from Belleville and Nutley at the Maroon's home oval.

Belleville got the afternoon off to a fast start and scored twice in the opening frame. Lead off man Joe Petrillo drew a walk and managed to steal second while Parachini was busy fanning the Bellboys' second and third batters, Frank Annichiarico and Bob Pucciarello. Then Sheridan walked, and with two men on base, Hatch blasted his first triple and the two scores came in. Jerry Caruso struck out, leaving two men on an infield.

**NUTLEY'S FIRST RUN** Before the crowd could quiet down, Nutley got things going again in the second and closed the scoring gap to 2-1. With two men out, Al Pettit singled. He stole a base and took advantage of two errors by Pucciarello and Sal LoCoco to score.

Belleville scored two more runs in the third inning. Annichiarico puffed with a triple and after Pucciarello popped out, Sheridan doubled, scoring Annichiarico. The second inning ended with Castellano fubbed twice enabling Sheridan to come home.

In the fourth inning, Belleville took advantage of but one hit, a walk, stolen base, error and sacrifice to score twice. Jack Petrich walked and stole second. Then Jim Silco reached first on Bursch's error which also enabled Betchick to score and Sileo went to second. Petrillo singled and finally Annichiarico sacrificed, scoring Sileo from third. Pucciarello popped out again to end the rally.

**BIG NINTH INNING** Tension was high as the game approached the ninth inning. Belleville was leading, 7-1. Belleville scored once in the ninth, and Nutley had its biggest inning and brought in two runs before the final out was made.

In the top of the ninth, Annichiarico scored on a sacrifice fly. (Continued On Page 9)

### Tax Council Hits Education Board On HS Issue

The Citizens Tax Council has come out with its hardest hitting attack on the school board since the board elections last winter. Lee Garson, spokesman for the Tax Council at Board of Education meetings, told the board "you have evidently decided that the only way to get what you want is to keep the voters in the dark in the hope they will follow you blindly."

Garson discussed several issues emphasizing the plans for the construction of a new high school building. He talked about the architect's contracts and the necessity of the architect's having to approve the clerk of the works who is supposed to represent the board's interest at the project site.

The Tax Council spokesman again asked for an educational plan to include the grammar school improvements. "Every time a plan is mentioned," Mr. President (Dominic Lally) made your now well known reply, "we have a plan."

Garson said that if the board does have a plan for the grammar schools, "you (Mr. Lally) have certainly kept it strictly to yourself because no other member of the board has ever admitted knowing about it, and it has certainly been kept very secret as far as the public is concerned."

### Will Use 6 Substandard Classrooms

Six classrooms in Belleville schools, all classified as "substandard" will again be used for the grammar school program next year.

School board members have asked for renewal of permission to use the six rooms for the 1961-62 school year. Some of the rooms have been on the "substandard" list more than nine years.

The rooms are located as follows: School 3, third floor, one room for the fifth and one for the sixth grades; School 5, basement, two kindergarten, one fourth and one fifth grade room; School 8, basement, one room for a kindergarten class.

The two rooms at School 3 have been classified as "substandard" for more than nine years, according to Superintendent of Schools Evan Thomas. He said that the third floor has been called a fire hazard, but noted that exit facilities are adequate to accommodate two of the classrooms on the top floor.

School Board member Arthur M. Pico asked his colleagues to discuss the topic of substandard classrooms in a closed conference so that "we can get rid of these conditions once and for all."

Requests for use of substandard classrooms, according to law, must be made annually to the County Superintendent of Schools.

**Jaycees Name Officers for Year** The newly organized Belleville Jaycees has elected a full slate of officers, G. Fred Burlazzi, president; G. Fred Burlazzi, secretary; Larry Hoffmann, treasurer; and Norman Gross, director.

Burlazzi said at a meeting last night the group anxious to welcome new members. The Jaycees is open to men between the ages of 21 and 35 years. The next meeting is set for June 21 at 8 p.m. in the Aerie Lounge, Mill and Bridge Streets.

**Reappoint S. Grossman Adult Education Director** Seymour Grossman, school principal, has been reappointed director of Adult Education in Belleville. The school board made the reappointment at its May 22 meeting.

Grossman will receive a salary of \$800 on a non-contractual basis. The salary represents a \$100 increase over last year.

### Planning Board Report Predicts Peak for 1980

Three reports which will eventually be incorporated into Belleville's Master Plan were released this week by the Planning Board. The three studies deal with an analysis of existing land use, an analysis of housing in town, and a study of population trends.

None of the reports makes any recommendations. They are merely stating facts compiled by Urban Planning Associates of New York City, consultant to the Belleville Planning Board.

William H. Cullen, secretary and public relations chairman for the Planning Board, said yesterday that additional fact reports studies will be released before the Master Plan is completed. Cullen said the Master Plan should be ready about next February.

**FEW OPINIONS** The reports issued this week present few conclusions by the New York consultants. The "Existing Land Use Analysis" states that there remains no large tracts of land for development. "Any substantial new growth which may occur will take form of private or public redevelopment and displace existing buildings."

In noting that Belleville's commercial area occupies 2.8 percent of the total land area, the report states that the land utilized for commercial activities is "scattered and poorly arranged. Most of the commercial activity is strung along Washington Avenue in an uneconomical manner."

Another opinion presented in the land analysis report concerns "the chaotic mixture of land uses within the eastern and southwestern sectors of town. A clear statement concerning the future of these areas has obviously never been made and they continue to develop in a haphazard fashion."

**STREET PATTERN** "Belleville's street pattern is highly irregular and is not laid out for the most efficient flow of traffic. The railroad crossings at grade cause further confusion to the overall circulation system."

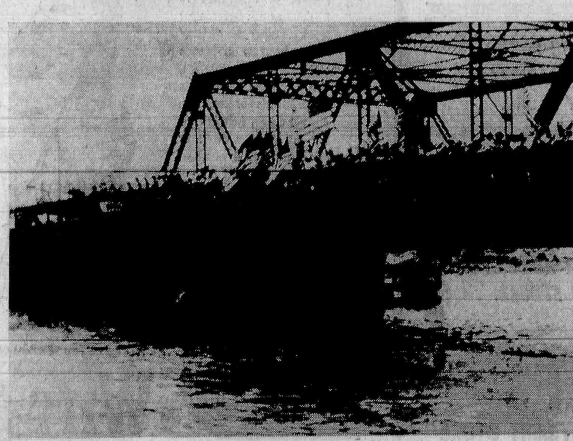

circumstances. What the circumstances are, Pico didn't say.

STREETS AND CURBS

Garson said that unlike Belleville, "the great majority of towns pay no expenses to at-

tend any (teachers') workshop except for board members. And they (other towns) tell us that teachers and principals stand in line for permission to attend these various workshops at their own expense."

Superintendent of Schools Evans' remarks that the State Board of Education recommends that boards of education pay expenses of teachers and school officials for attendance at special workshops, conventions and other similar meetings.

The transcript of Garson's remarks follows:

#### TEXT OF TALK

"We of the Tax Council have been very quiet the last two months as far as educational affairs were concerned because we felt that this board was entitled to the opportunity to be fair with the people of Belleville and put the true facts on the table. Instead, Mr. President (Mr. Lally), you have evidently decided that the only way to get what you want is to keep the voters in the dark in the hope they will follow you blindly."

"It is very interesting to note that most of the statements made by the Tax Council during the February (school board) campaign and so vigorously denied by Mr. (Richard) Drake have come true. We want it definitely understood that we do not believe that Mr. Drake deliberately attempted to fool the people but he was misleading by some of his hard colleagues and he did not have the time to personally investigate the true facts."

"Our statement we made was that a minimum sized high school able to accommodate the minimum needs of Belleville could not be built on the three and a half acres on Passaic Avenue. We now note that the architect (Alfonso Alvarez) has now agreed with us and the site is being pushed further and further around on Division Avenue ever closer to the site so badly defeated five years ago."

"We also note that this board is taking a deed to part of the (Municipal) Stadium, on the suggestion of our lame duck mayor (Isadore J. Padula) until December 31, 1964 which will mean that another referendum

can be held in 1963 if the referendum this year is defeated."

"Evidently, the board has sensed the feeling of the people and knows that this attempt to saddle the taxpayer with this high, needless tax burden is doomed to defeat."

"We of the Citizens Tax Council, having visited thousands of homes in the last two years to get signatures to our petitions, know that the board members who have advocated this wasteful spending of the taxpayers' money will not be around in 1962 to put a new referendum on the ballot."

"And if part of the stadium site is deeded to the board, there will be the little matter of keeping to consider. It would take very little time for this board to inspect the records at Town Hall and find that they are now spending in excess of \$50,000 a year plus the cost of manpower and machinery to keep the stadium in usable condition."

"This board, as a matter of course, would be called upon to pay their proportionate share. And this must be done because a stadium that cannot be used is surely a waste of the taxpayers' money and a decrease in recreational facilities which we so badly need."

#### TOOL OF COMMISSION

"We wonder if this board realizes that it is being used as a tool by the lame duck commission. They unload part of the stadium upkeep on you which will enable them to reduce taxes in the next budget

and then run for councilmen next May on the grounds that they have reduced municipal costs."

"And why, we wonder, has this board made such an issue of releasing a copy of the architect's contract to the public. Is it because you feel the taxpayer is not interested, or is it because all those oral agreements for extra services made by the architect before the contract was signed are now being denied by him?"

"Although denied by this board at the last special meeting, the rumor persists and it has been partially verified, that Mr. Alvarez insists that his right hand man, Mr. Boyd, be appointed clerk of the works to represent this board."

#### CLERK OF WORKS

"Can anyone imagine Mr. Boyd telling his boss that construction is not up to specification and he must reject it on behalf of this board. Is this the way to win the confidence and backing of the heavily overburdened taxpayer?"

"We realize that there is little that can be done now to stop this travesty except defeat the referendum."

"But we sincerely hope that once it is a thing of the past, this board will settle down and attempt to give the children of Belleville the high type of education they deserve, both structural and academic, instead of attempting to erect a costly, unneeded monument to one individual."

"Our position regarding a new high school has been misinterpreted so often that let me once again put it in simple language: we firmly believe in better education in every definition of the word. But we just as firmly believe that an unneeded, costly edifice in the almost inaccessible bog area is not the answer to better education."

"There has been so much publicity recently about the costliness and ineffectiveness of junior high schools that I won't go into that. There is, however, one point that has been brought to our attention by dozens of parents who have children in the fifth, sixth and seventh grades. There is no way of getting to the present high school from many sections of town except to walk."

"At the present time, many children stand in the street in an attempt to hump a ride. It might be very educational for you gentlemen to stand at Washington and Belleville Avenues or Washington and Joralemon some afternoon and see for yourselves. This is bad enough when 15 or 16 year olds do it, but when we think of 12 and 13 year olds doing it, it becomes a matter of grave concern."

#### GRAMMAR SCHOOLS

"The discussion that developed at the last special meeting regarding repairs at School 4 is, to our mind, uncontrovertible proof that we must have a plan and work strictly according to that plan if we are to have better education at a cost the taxpayer can afford."

"Every time a plan is mentioned, you Mr. President, make your now well known reply: 'we have a plan.' We, of course, have no way of denying this, but if you do have a plan, you have certainly kept it strictly to yourself because no other member of the board has ever admitted knowing about it. And it has certainly been kept very secret as far as the public is concerned."

#### TEACHERS EXPENSES

"Another matter I would like to mention is the subject of paying expenses of principals to a workshop such as the one in Irvington which came before the board a few meetings back. A statement was made by the superintendent of schools inferring that the State Board of Education had requested this be done."

"Inquiries to various towns in the county have elicited the information that they had received no such communication. The

great majority of towns pay no expenses to any workshop except for board members, and they tell us that teachers and principals stand in line for permission to attend these various workshops at their own expense."

"It would be interesting to know why Belleville must always be different when it comes to spending the taxpayers' money."

#### CLOSED CONFERENCES

"One more thing. There is a

resolution on the books making all conferences open to the public with certain exceptions (when matters involving specific personalities are involved). We would suggest that a resolution be passed to remove this resolution from the books. It has become purely a resolution to mislead the public. Not one conference has been open since you, Mr. President, have been in the chair."

Msgr. Weisbrod Observes 40th Year In Priesthood

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. John A. Weisbrod, pastor of Our Lady of Good Counsel Church, Newark, the first parishioner of St. Mary's Church, Nutley to be ordained to the priesthood, celebrated the 40th anniversary of his ordination on Sunday, May 21.

Msgr. Weisbrod marked the occasion with the celebration of a Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving on Monday, May 22 at 9 a.m. in the Newark church. He was presented with a spiritual bouquet of prayers in which all members of his parish participated.

Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., Msgr. Weisbrod came to Nutley in 1903 and lived for many years at 128 Walnut Street where his sister, Mrs. Joseph A. Judge still resides. He attended Nutley public grammar schools and his Freshman year at Nutley High School and then commuted daily to Seion Hall Preparatory School, South Orange.

He was graduated magna cum laude from Seion Hall College in 1917, completed his theological studies at Immaculate Conception Seminary, South Orange and was ordained on May 21, 1921 in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Newark. Msgr. Weisbrod celebrated his first Solemn Mass the following day in St. Mary's Church, here.

Pastor of Our Lady of Good Counsel Church since 1956, Msgr. Weisbrod recently broke ground for a \$1 million expansion program which will include a new Catholic Social Action Center, six additional classrooms bringing the total to 24, five new convent rooms, six garages, a concert auditorium seating 800, cafeteria lunchroom seating 600 and a modern physical education gymnasium.

Since being assigned to Good Counsel parish, the Monsignor built a new 18 classroom grammar school for his 1,050 pupils; rehabilitated two High School buildings which house 700 students, constructed a lower church and built a new rectory to accommodate five resident priests, two visiting priests and three domestic help.

He hopes to complete his program of expansion by September, 1962. Monsignor Weisbrod's first assignment shortly after ordination was to Holy Trinity Church, Passaic, and in August of 1921 he went to St. Peter and Paul Church, Hoboken, after which he was assigned to St. Patrick's Cathedral, Newark, where he served as curate until 1931.

After a year at St. Michael's Church, Jersey City, he was curate at St. Leo's Church, Irvington, from 1932 until 1935 after which he went to St. Augustine's, Union City until 1941.

He returned to St. Peter and Paul Church, Hoboken in 1941 for his first pastorate and served there until being assigned to Our Lady of Good Counsel. While in Hoboken, he was a member of the Chamber of Commerce there and chaplain of the Hoboken Department of Public Safety, detailed to the Police Department.

He conducted a lone campaign for six weeks to have the City Ordinance changed opening taverns on Sundays at one p.m. instead of 6 a.m., and campaigned successfully to keep burlesque out of Hoboken, earning for him the nickname, "Watchdog of Hoboken."

In 1947, the former Nutleyite was appointed Archdiocesan director of the Apostleship of the Sea, and Port Chaplain, serving the 89 piers on the 200 miles of waterfront from Edgewater to Sayreville. He was elected national president of the National

Catholic Conference of Apostleship of the Sea in 1951.

Monsignor Weisbrod was instrumental in establishing Apostleship of the Sea Sunday in the United States in 1952 and two years later wrote the constitution for the National Conference adopted at the Pittsburgh convention.

He was elevated to Domestic Prelate with the title of St. Rev. Monsignor by Pope Pius XII at the request of the Most Rev. Thomas A. Boland, Archbishop of Newark, in 1954 and three years later was appointed a member of the Archdiocesan Board of Education. In 1957 he was elected also a member of the board of trustees of Leo House, Catholic Hospital, in New York City.

His brother, William L. Weisbrod, resides at 27 Friedland Road, Nutley; another brother, Joseph, is a resident of Clifton, and Valentine lives in San Pedro, Calif.

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## James Mitchell And The GOP

James Mitchell is the Republican candidate for Governor. As Secretary of Labor under former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, Mitchell compiled a remarkable public record.

He successfully survived an extremely tough Primary Election. His adversaries were formidable opponents. With the help of U.S. Senator Clifford Case, Mitchell took their measure. To what extent Mitchell has been able to close Primary Election wounds is difficult to say.

Of one thing we are certain: many Republicans are gravely concerned over the prominence given on Mitchell's campaign committee to certain personalities who formerly were top men in the discredited Driscoll administration.

It was under former Republican Governor Alfred Driscoll that law enforcement reached a new low in New Jersey. Gangsters were being murdered in daylight on well-traveled main streets. Organized crime was entrenched.

Nelson Stamler, Deputy Attorney General, sent into Bergen to ferret out crime and criminals, was suddenly relieved of his duties under peculiar circumstances by a Driscoll-appointed, politically-motivated Attorney General.

If Jim Mitchell loses the gubernatorial election this November it will be for one reason only: the Democrats will have made stick the accusation that a return of the Governor's chair to the Republican Party will mean a return of organized crime as existed during the Driscoll tenure. By surrounding himself with Republicans prominent in the Driscoll administration during the days of crime investigation, Mitchell is exposing himself to the only weak spot in an otherwise impenetrable facade.

Crime-buster Nelson Stamler, former Bergen County Judge Carmine Savino, Jr. and other GOP personalities long associated with clean and decent government should be recruited and projected more prominently into the Mitchell gubernatorial campaign.

There is no valid reason why such an outstanding American and Republican like Warren's State Senator Wayne Dumont should not be called upon by Mitchell to assist in the Republican drive to win in November.

While Mitchell is the front-runner today, he is still a long way from winning.

## Another Problem For Some Businessmen

All of a sudden an eager-beaver in the New Jersey State Corporation Tax Bureau discovered many corporations in New Jersey were not conforming to a statutory requirement which makes necessary the filing annually with the Bureau of a list of directors and officers. The statutory requirement is functional and informational. There is no tax involved. There is very little in the way of disclosure.

One wonders why the information requested in Form C-112 could not be incorporated in the Corporation Business Tax Return Form CBT-100 (formerly the Franchise Tax Return). But let's be practical. It isn't the objective of government employees to make things easier for taxpayers. To request the information concerning new directors and officers on Form CBT-100 would be too much of a simplification for our government red tape. As a matter of fact, Form CBT-100 does request a list of all officers. All that need be added to this form is a questionnaire concerning new directors, and this addition should satisfy the basic needs of Form C-112.

Additionally, Corporation Tax Bureau employees are asking corporations to file Form C-112 for years going back to the 30s. This appears to us to be a ridiculous request. If this request cannot be waived for past years by a departmental regulation, then one of our brighter legislators should introduce legislation making it unnecessary to file Form C-112 for years prior to 1958 for those corporations which inadvertently failed to file. Even the toughest governmental bureau — the Income Tax Bureau — is satisfied with three-year-old records.
