

## State Gives 41 Grants To Seniors

### Evan Thomas Praises Students, HS Faculty

Forty-one Belleville High School seniors have been awarded scholarships by the New Jersey State Scholarship Commission. The 41 seniors are among the third group of state students to be granted scholarships under the program which went into effect July 27, 1959.

Superintendent of Schools Evan Thomas told The Times that "these scholarships illustrates the fact that our high school is doing a very good job in preparing students for college." Thomas extended his personal congratulations to the high school faculty and to the scholarship winners "for this very fine record."

Each scholarship is for \$400 or the amount of tuition, whichever amount is less. The Belleville students will receive the award for a four-year period provided they remain in full-time college attendance and maintain a satisfactory academic record.

Awards are based upon demonstrated financial need and scholastic ability as determined by a qualifying examination. In addition, the law provides that a successful applicant must have demonstrated high moral character, good citizenship and dedication to American ideals.

## Easter Seal Sale Up 19 Per Cent Over Last Year

Commissioner Robert C. Gruhin, municipal chairman for the 1961 Easter Seal drive in Belleville, reported today that contributions to the campaign totaled \$489, an increase of 19 per cent. The total compares with a figure of \$410 raised in 1960. Gruhin said the money will be used to support the Easter Seal Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center at the N.J. Orthopaedic Hospital in Orange.

The center is sponsored by the Essex County Society for Crippled Children and Adults. Gruhin announced the total at a final report dinner held at Grunlich's, Orange.

The municipal chairman thanked all residents who gave and noted that the fund will enable more than 200 children at the center to continue receiving treatment. He noted that the increase in funds will enable more intensive treatment for the children at the center. Gruhin reported that no child suffering from cerebral palsy is ever turned away.

He said that although the intensive phase of the 1961 drive has been completed, the society would still welcome contributions. The final report dinner also honored Dr. Sidney Keats of South Orange who has headed the center for 13 years as a volunteer director.

A total of \$31,034 was raised in Essex County, an increase of 75 per cent. The 1960 drive, at the same date had netted \$17,794.

## Sam Levenson at School 9 Had His Serious Moments But Kept the Laughter Going

Sam Levenson is really a serious fellow. After about an hour of humorous tales which kept the School 9 PTA members in gales of laughter, the television personality got down to some serious thoughts about American education. Levenson is a former school teacher; he taught high school classes until 1945.

Levenson said he believes too much emphasis is being placed upon students who excel in mathematics and science. "If someone's good in big numbers, then he's a gifted student," Levenson said. "But if he only excels in music or art, then there is something wrong with him."

While he said he is "for the conquering of the billions of miles of space, I am for it only if this accomplishment helps us live better here in our world."

To me the real space which has to be conquered is the space between people, the space between a child's present ability and his potential."

Levenson ended his humorous talk with "serious comments" and the audience listened quietly, occasionally nodding their heads in agreement. For the final 10 minutes, the comedian told of "my dreams for American education."

"Did you teachers ever stop to think about the future of your students?" Levenson asked. "If you do, you will find that the future of your students is in your hands."

## Will Double Event's Size, Group Says

A second "Cavalcade of Progress" is being planned for next year, the Belleville Chamber of Commerce announced today. Arthur Jackson, president, told The Belleville Times today that the Chamber's Board of Directors has been reviewing the past year's Cavalcade's progress and after several meetings, has agreed to sponsor the event again next year.

The recent Cavalcade, which featured exhibits of Belleville businesses and industries, was very successful. Exhibitors and visitors expressed high praise and satisfaction with the event.

Jackson said the second Cavalcade will be staged May 3, 4 and 5, 1962 adding that "it's anticipated that twice as many firms will have booths than were in the Cavalcade this year."

The two Belleville men are among 104 graduates of the school who will receive degrees at the 10 a.m. ceremony. Sixty-nine will receive the degree of doctor of medicine.

Mamunes is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Mamunes of 19 Mount Pleasant Avenue. A graduate of Belleville High School, Mamunes earned his bachelor of arts degree at Cornell University. His internship was at the University of California Hospital in San Francisco.

Narushinsky is a graduate of the Rabbi Jacob Joseph High School in New York and Yeshiva College. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Narushinsky of Jersey City, he resides at 450 Washington Avenue, Belleville.

Narushinsky performed his internship at Mount Sinai Hospital, Miami, Florida. At Seton Hall he is a member of Phi Rho Sigma.

The Seton Hall College of Medicine and Dentistry is the first such institution established in New Jersey. Previously, New Jersey was one of the few states that had no college for training future physicians and dentists.

Affiliated with the Jersey City Medical Center, the Seton Hall College of Medicine and Dentistry received its charter from the state in November 1954 and the first class was enrolled in the fall of 1956. The charter class of 71 doctors and 33 dentists was graduated last year.

This year's graduating class has representatives from eight states in the Medical College and five in the Dental College. The current total enrollment is 442. Of these, 296 are students in the College of Medicine and 146 are in the College of Dentistry.

Dr. Taylor is widely known for his vigorous views on education and his leadership in American political activities, education practices, and the field of controversial ideas.

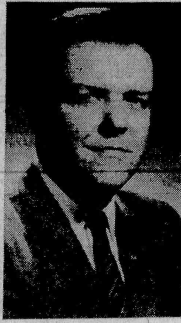

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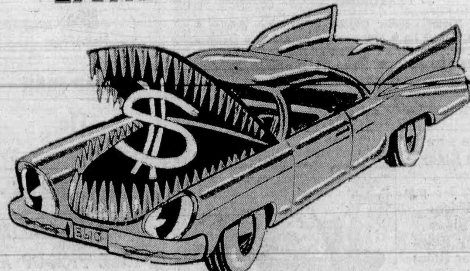

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## City Slams and the Suburbs

The all-out attack on slums and blight in America's cities over the past decade is one of the most heartening developments in recent history.

Projected plans for rebuilding Newark through the clearance of some of its worst slums surrounding the central business district are dramatic. They envision new high-rise housing, new office buildings, expansion of educational and cultural facilities, creation of industrial parks and enlarged hospital facilities.

The key to Newark's massive program to revitalize the city lies in urban renewal.

The two sites on which a housing project are located brought Newark only \$182,000 prior to clearance. It is estimated that the total tax take when completed will be about \$450,000. Even allowing for the increased tax rate in Newark since the area was cleared, the net gain to Newark will be \$270,000 by 1962. This is on top of savings in costs which are conservatively estimated at \$250,000 a year due to elimination of a fire house and police precinct station and reduced operating costs.

Essex County also gains, for its share of taxes increases from \$17,000 in 1955 to \$58,000, because of the higher valuations created by the project.

It is one thing to clear slum areas. This involves the city in problems of relocating slum residents, either in public housing or in decent available housing. It also means a substantial investment in new public facilities and cash to meet the city's share of the costs.

It is another to get the essential private capital to purchase the cleared site and re-develop it. The private developer assumes the risk that his project will attract new tenants to reverse a trend which for years has led people to leave the city.

The test of economic feasibility — the ability to construct large projects which will meet the rental market — is a fundamental requirement for urban renewal projects. In our large cities in New Jersey the big problem in meeting this test is the property tax. The combination of high real estate tax rates and the uncertainty of how a new structure will be assessed create a barrier to new construction.

The Fox-Lance Urban Renewal Corporations Bill (Senate Bill 8) was introduced this year in recognition of the need to provide a method whereby developers can be assured that property taxes will not destroy the economic feasibility of re-development projects. The bill provides for a limitation on taxes on industrial, commercial and residential projects built in slum and blighted areas for a period of 20 years.

For five years the developer would pay 12½ per cent of his gross income as a service charge in lieu of taxes; this would increase to 15 per cent for ten years and 17½ per cent for five years.

Before a developer may secure the tax limitation, he must first execute a contract with the city which provides for control over his rental levels, financial operations and building management. His payment in lieu of taxes cannot be less than the amount paid by the area prior to clearance, and any earnings in excess of the profit limitation must be paid over to the municipality.

The Fox-Lance Bill is written to implement the New Jersey Constitution, which provides that tax exemption may be granted to private corporations on projects built in blighted areas, provided

that such corporations are limited as to profits and dividends and controlled by law.

It is rather surprising that the bill has created so much adverse comment in Newark's suburbs.

The first question that needs answering is whether we ought to be concerned with re-developing Newark. How important is rebuilding Newark to the suburbs?

Newark does provide jobs for a large number of us. Industrial and commercial expansion will mean greater job opportunities for our children; business decline will mean they have to look elsewhere for earning a living.

Building up the educational institutions in Newark — Seton Hall, Rutgers and Newark College of Engineering — brings higher education closer to the suburbs.

Tax-wise, the suburbs benefit in two ways from re-development. Even with the limitation on taxes, Newark will pay more to the county from such projects than the county presently receives from the slum areas.

There can't very well be a suburb unless there is an "urb." The prosperity of the central city is mirrored in the suburbs; a declining central city will soon cast its shadow on the surrounding communities. For our own selfish benefit we ought to do everything possible to promote Newark's urban renewal programs.

The second question is whether there is a need to grant some form of tax relief to promote urban renewal. In the ordinary course of events we would expect that worn-out buildings would be torn down to make way for new structures as a matter of sound business. That this isn't so is pretty clear to anyone who tours Newark's slum areas today. Investors just won't put money into rebuilding in these areas, because the rental levels won't justify the investment, particularly when high property taxes are taken into consideration. Dilapidated, obsolete structures can produce more income after taxes than new modern buildings. While Newark has made some progress in forcing slum landlords to improve the condition of their properties, this is merely a holding operation.

Finally, there is the question as to whether the provisions of the Fox-Lance Bill are reasonable. Some have questioned the need for giving commercial development any tax relief; others have raised the question as to the need for 20 years of limitation.

The statute books throughout the nation are filled with unused legislation which seeks to promote renewal through the device of tax limitation and profit controls. New Jersey has three statutes today; only one has ever been used, and that only to a limited degree. The fact that past enactments have failed is pretty good proof that they were not tied to the economics of re-development.

It seems to us that this is not one of those proposals which should be opposed by the suburbs on the mistaken premise that we get little advantage from it. The long-range benefits of a prosperous, growing Newark will flow to us too. We shouldn't fear Newark's re-development; far more frightful is the threat of continued decline and slum growth, of declining business activity and the departure of industry. These will have a real impact on the suburbs.

Many other electronic organs have just one octave of tone generators, and their expression facilities are limited. There are other tone generating systems like reeds and tone wheels for instance, which do not even come close to the versatility of electronic tone generation.

It is interesting that more and more serious musicians and organists turn to CONN Organs because of their superior tonal qualities and Mr. Bollington is no exception. He has studied the instrument exhaustively and he can do all but make it "talk."

## Father, Sons Provide Liquid Spray for Lawns

One of the busiest firms in town since the coming of Spring has been Vaseo Sampaio and his sons, Tony and Vasco, of 79 Carner Avenue, Belleville, who last year took over the liquid fertilizer service for lawns previously supplied by John Hawkins & Son, Nutley fuel oil dealer.

According to Tony, the liquid fertilizer service got its start on American farms about five or six years ago, when liquid nitrogen tests demonstrated the effectiveness of leaf feeding. As soon as ways were found to formulate a concentrate incorporating all the essential plant foods, the farmers quickly discovered excellent results were to be obtained by spraying their pastures, corn, wheat, etc.

The liquid fertilizer, containing the lawn-feeding ingredients of

nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potassium, is pumped from a tank truck and results in beautiful, golf green, well-fed lawns throughout the entire season, eliminating weeds, crab grass and re-seeding.

Tony said the system has been used with much success, out-moding dry-fertilizer because the spray can be used in even the warmest weather.

A native of Portugal, Sampaio, Sr., came to this country as a young man of 18. Engaged in outdoor work all his life, he bought a landscaping and contracting business in 1947, earning a wide reputation in the Nutley-Belleville area.
