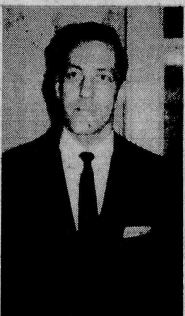
Eugene Barnett and committee are recruiting donors from the Knights of Columbus while Leslie Finch and committee are recruiting from the membership of the Craftsmen.

You Can Cool Off in Pool, But Not for Another Month

Town to Open Friendly House Pool to Residents

Plans for the opening of the Friendly House swimming pool are being rushed to completion by Commissioner George Kiernan's Recreation Department, and from the looks of the thermometer, the Florence Avenue center should be one of the most popular spots in town.

Commissioner Kiernan reported yesterday that the Town of Belleville has entered into a two-year agreement with the Friendly House, owned by the Silver Lake Baptist Church. Under the agreement, Belleville will pay no more than \$1,800 to repair the heating and filtering system of the large 16 by 50 foot swimming pool. Then for two years, the town will be paid the \$1,800 by collecting admission receipts from swimmers.

Admission tickets, which will be available to all Belleville residents, will probably run about 50 cents for an adult while a lower charge will be set for children.

BY JULY 4

Both Commissioner Kiernan and the Rev. B. Pascale, pastor of the Silver Lake Baptist Church, hope the pool will be ready for the July 4th holiday.

Mr. Pascale told the Times that "volunteers have been painting the swimming area and scrubbing down the tiles." The pool is all-time and ample locker-room facilities are available at the Friendly House.

There has been some criticism of the town's taking an active part in repairing the pool but Commissioner Kiernan notes that Town Attorney Thomas D'Avella has thoroughly checked all legal aspects and has found Belleville to be acting in accord with all laws.

Such matters as insurance and lifeguards have already been completed according to Edward Lister, recreation department coordinator. Lister said the Belleville Recreation Department plans to sponsor aquatic activities which include swimming lessons, life saving instructions and swimming teams.

Mr. Pascale reports the pool's opening size is 16 by 50 feet with a shallow area about 12 by 15 feet. "The pool's not being used now," the pastor said, "but we are looking forward to its reopening."

The pastor, who has been at the Silver Lake Baptist Church since 1914, long has been associated with community service projects. In 1914, he sponsored the building of Belleville's first public playground. The church for four years sponsored a free dental clinic and the opening of the Friendly House has attracted thousands of young people since it was first opened for recreational purposes.

Mr. Pascale said the pool is able to accommodate about 75 persons at one time.

Town Purchasing Agent Thomas McLaughlin is presently obtaining bids for the heating and filtering work at the Friendly House pool. Once work has begun, it's expected to be completed quickly and both Commissioner Kiernan and the Rev. Pascale hope the Friendly House will be ready for Belleville residents on the July 4th holiday.

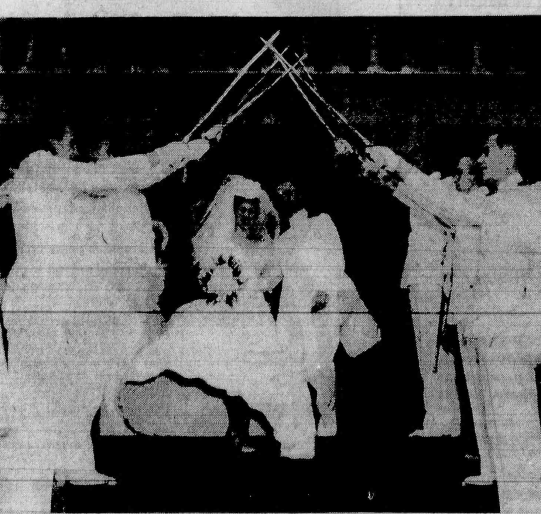
"I have to talk them out of the bathroom most days," she says. Her brothers, on the other hand, say they like having a "kid" sister around so much, they enjoy teasing her.

We pay our Federal taxes. We support financially the Post Office Department to the same extent as other communities do and perhaps more. In the family of communities we should no longer accept second class status. We are entitled to the same consideration as any other community.

The new Democratic administration in Washington controlling the Post Office Department should be requested to examine our problem and help us obtain Federal services that are now granted to other communities. Our Democratic Congressman, Peter W. Rodino, should take the lead in this effort.

Progress Must Be Served

The politicians are at it again. Mayor Leo Carlin, starting early and running hard for reelection as Newark's Mayor in next year's municipal election, is criticizing the Port of New York Authority for its favorable consideration of plans by the American Airlines and the United Airlines to fly medium range jets into Newark Airport.

Whether Newark's Mayor Carlin realizes it or not it is the simple fact of life today that jets are here to stay. Suburban Newark houses many executives who require fast plane transportation in the discharge of their corporate duties.

Executives of many metropolitan Newark corporations cannot effectively operate a business today without the use of jet transportation and the telephone. To deny them the use of jet transportation in Newark in this day and age is like taking the telephone away from a businessman. Plane transportation for businessmen is not a luxury — it is a necessity.

If Newark Airport is not open to jet traffic it will signal the beginning of the end for this public facility. Such a result inevitably will bring with it economic disaster to the whole area served by Newark Airport.

Members of the Airlines Pilots Association wouldn't be flying a jet today if they didn't consider it a safe airplane.

We believe the American Airlines and the United Airlines should be commended for their vision and determination to "inflict" progress upon a community which is saddled by a politically-minded Mayor. Carlin has a right to remain a politician but when it comes to community progress and the best interests of all the people, he should try to become a statesman.

15th Anniversary Salute

"Multiple sclerosis is the greatest cause of chronic disability among young adults" — Dr. H. Houston Merritt, professor of neurology and Dean of the faculty of medicine, Columbia University.

In this 15th anniversary of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, whose Hope Chest campaign this year runs from Mother's Day to Father's Day, we are reminded of the bitter heartbreak of young parents stricken by this disease.

Fifteen years ago, the future of multiple sclerosis victims seemed hopeless. Their families, deprived of breadwinner or homemaker, were pressed to the wall by the grinding expense of a chronic disease with no known cause or cure. But the human spirit does not surrender. Loved ones do not turn their backs. They sought each other out and they formed the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. The Society began a relentless pursuit of the cause and cure of the disease, sending scores of research men after it.

For 15 years, the track-down has continued: \$2,400,000 has been spent on research, 145 research projects have been initiated, 345 fellowships have been granted. Today, though the cause and cure of multiple sclerosis are still unknown, there is hope, based on knowledge gained from research.

Beck's Column



We received a call from a customer who had an air conditioner which blew fuses. A check up revealed that the unit was 5 years old and had never been touched since it was installed. The air filter was completely clogged up. There was a bird's nest in the box which protrudes outside and all the bolts and nuts were badly rusted. It was a wonder that the unit ran at all, but it did.

Due to the obstruction of the air flow the compressor overheated after a while and blew the fuse. Present air conditioners have an over load cut out protecting device built in, while this unit did not have it.

Amazingly enough, after a thorough cleaning, lubrication and filter replacement the air conditioner functioned properly again. Nothing could be done about the advanced stage of corrosion, which could have been prevented to a great extent if the water which accumulates in the pan, would have been removed after the unit was not used any more. Probably in another year or two the pan will have rusted out completely and the air-conditioner will have to be discarded. The replacement of all the corroded parts would be far too expensive.

With a little care, this air-conditioner could have been used for 10 years or more. Now it will have to be discarded after only half its life expectancy.

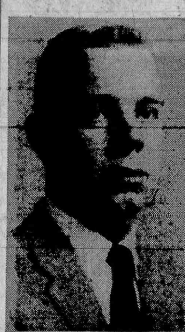
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David Denzler Is Graduated

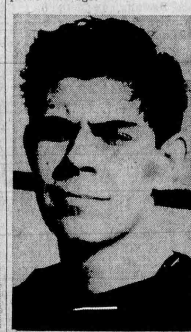

Louis M. Plansoen, Founder of Federal Leather, to Retire

Today Company Occupies 22 Acres in Main Street

The day Louis M. Plansoen and his brother John started the Federal Leather Company in two shacks on the banks of the Passaic River in Belleville, the Main Street area was principally inhabited by pheasant and wild duck.

The year was 1919 and today the dirt road that was Main Street, and the two shacks that were the Federal Leather Company have both come a long way. From old scrap lumber the shacks were built, and from \$8,000 capital a business was built which recently sold to Textron Inc. for over \$8,800,000.

Louis M. Plansoen, now 68, will retire this month and one of his early associates who helped build the company, John W. F. Young, age 62 will succeed him as president. Mr. Plansoen has been chief executive of Federal since 1932 when his brother John died.

Today, the company occupies the same location along the Passaic River where the original building stood, but has expanded its plant to cover an area of over 22 acres along Main Street in two towns. Its products—vinyl coated fabrics and vinyl foam—are sold under the trade name of "Federal" and are used extensively throughout the country in the manufacture of automobile seat covers, luggage, clothing, shoes, and upholstery. At capacity operation, the company employs almost 1,000 persons.

FIRST IT WAS LEATHER

Originally, Federal's sole business was to finish leather hides and sell them to nearby manufacturers of dining and living room furniture. When he started, being in business for himself was the achievement of a life-long desire for the 26 year old Louis. In his native Yerske, Holland he had successfully operated a fleet of oyster boats, and in the United States he was a machinist for the Hamden-Whealey Paper Company in Gardfield, there he moved to the position of plant superintendent.

Mr. Plansoen developed and secured patents on many inventions relative to paper manufacturing, and it was here that he learned the early processes of coating materials. Scrapping his high position and pooling his meager resources with his brother John, Mr. Plansoen finally gave in to his great urge—to begin the business of his own.

With Louis' knowledge of the coating fabric processes and John's capabilities as a salesman, the business grew slowly.

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IN KITTATINY MOUNTAINS

Boy Scouts' Camp Mohican Is Ready for 900 Visitors

OUTDOOR CODE
The Boy Scouts of America is anxious to instill in all oncoming generations of Scout campers the desire to be good campers. It has developed an "Outdoor Code" which is increasingly being adopted by Scouts as their way of life in the open.

It follows:
"As an American I will do my best to: 'Be clean in my outdoor manners. I will treat the outdoors as a heritage to be improved for our greater enjoyment. I will keep the outdoors free of trash and garbage out of America's waters, fields, woods and roadways."

"Be careful with fire. I will prevent wild fire. I will build my fire in a safe place and be sure it is out before I leave."

"Be considerate in the outdoors. I will treat public and private property with respect. I will remember that use of the outdoors is a privilege I can lose by abuse."

"Be conservation-minded. I will learn how to practice good conservation of soil, water, forests, minerals, grasslands, and wildlife; and I will urge others to do the same. I will use sportsmanlike methods in all my outdoor activities."

In addition to Camp Mohican the Council also owns Scott Acres, the Conklin Scout reservation near Bonton, N. J. Both camps have resident superintendents and are used by Newark, Irvington and Belleville troops the year around.

Mrs. Leola G. Hayes of Leonia, teacher and coordinator of special education for the Fair Lawn Board of Education, was guest speaker at the May 4 meeting of the Parents Association for Handicapped Children, Inc., at the Nutley Elks Clubhouse, 242 Chestnut Street.

Mrs. Hayes' subject was "America's Promise for the Handicapped." She discussed fulfilling these promises by reaching a full measure of growth in a child, pointing out that there are three types of children, the bright, normal and retarded. She said schools are not geared for the very bright or retarded and that they require special education.

Mrs. Hayes claimed that "the world is geared for the so-called normal child, but no one knows just what normal is, or no two people have the same limitations and we all excel in different fields. It is therefore up to educators and parents to help children reach their individual capacities."

"Much patience and perseverance is needed to handle different children," she went on. "All children, regardless of their capacities, should be given equal opportunities to reach these capacities and be wholly accepted by parents, educators and the community itself."

Mrs. Hayes has a Bachelor's degree from Hunter College, two Master's degrees from New York University in elementary education, guidance and supervision, and a third Master's degree from City College of New York in special education. She is presently a candidate for a Doctorate at Yushiva.

Mrs. Hayes taught the blind in New York and is a consultant for the blind in Chicago. Teacher and coordinator of special services in Fair Lawn.

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'South Seas Adventure'

"Cinéma-South Seas Adventure", produced by Carl Dudley, is the next new attraction at the Clairidge Theatre, Montclair.

Tracing the voyages of great South Seas explorers like Captain James Cook and Captain William Bligh of the ill-fated "Bounty", the fifth Cinéma production is the story of an expedition by the sailing schooner "Te Vega", luxury liner "Lurline" and airplane.

Landfalls on the journey of adventure are Hawaii, Tahiti, Tonga, Fiji, New Hebrides, Australia and New Zealand.

Arriving in Hawaii on the "Lurline", the Cinéma adventure in the South Seas traces the romantic holiday of Kay Johnson in the surf at Waikiki and the tropical beauty of Oahu.

"Te Vega" takes French painter Jean - Louis Martin from Hawaii to Tahiti. As the schooner crosses the Equator, the ship's cook, in the guise of Father Neptune, initiates Jean - Louis to the brotherhood of Atlantis.

The young painter searches out the memory of Paul Gauguin, famed French painter, after landing in Papete Harbor. All around him preparations are in progress for Bastille Day ceremonies. Jean - Louis finds himself at home in Tahiti. His imagination is captured by the

Polynesian loveliness of the dancer Turia. As "Te Vega" sails off, he remains to paint her against a South Seas sunset.

The tribal meke and the kava ceremony are tendered Captain Durr in the Falls, his next landing on the route under the skies of the Southern Cross. Just 100 years ago, the fuzzy-headed Fijians were head-hunters. Now they parade in blue tunics and white saris on the grounds of British Government House.

"Te Vega" sets sail for the most primitive islands of all, the New Hebrides. One of the last outposts of the head-hunters and a wartime battleground, these islands are covered by dense tropical jungle. On Pentecost Island, inhabited by 2,000 Melanesians and a Catholic missionary, a strange rite is per-

formed. The Matli tribe, in a proof of masculine superiority, oulids a hundred-foot tower once a year and plunge to the ground, landing on their heads. Their legs bound only by vines.

In New Zealand, home of fire-eating Maoris, "Cinéma-South Seas Adventure" discovers a land of floods and snowfields. The Maoris perform the canoe poi song and the haka. Startling beauty and astounding fertility characterize New Zealand, where American visitor Jim Perry plucks fat rainbow trout from the streams and marvels at electric-generating plants using volcanic power.

The giant continent of Australia, a flat and brown land by contrast, tells the story of a family of "New Australians".

Through the eyes of the Koschek, the great metropolis of the South Seas — Sydney — may be seen. Into the rugged "outback" fly Stefan and Anna to join Stefan's brother David and his family at Broken Hill. They discover the great Australian institutions spanning the lonely continent, the Royal Flying Doctor Service and the Schoolroom of the Air, bringing civilization into the home by means of a radio-transceiver.
