Plan Full Day Of July 4 Events At Town Stadium

Plans are ready for what is expected to be Belleville's biggest July 4th celebration next Tuesday. Events will begin at 9 a.m. Tues. with a flag raising ceremony and will conclude with a fireworks display at 9:20 p.m. — all at the Municipal Stadium. George Mitchell of 149 Academy Street is chairman of the program.

The day will be highlighted by the appearance of a circus featuring the Paramount Orchestra and Ladd Lyon as master of ceremonies. The circus acts, produced by the Oliver Entertainment management company, will include G. Oliver, will start at 7:10 at the Municipal Stadium.

Born in Montreal, Canada, he was brought to the United States as a lot of shoes. Shortly after he moved to Belleville, he changed the name to "Tannen's Shoe Shop" to emphasize that the store also carried a full line of men's and women's national brand footwear of all kinds.

A former Belleville High School baseball and basketball star had a front row center seat at the most fantastic sea drama of modern times recently because his job literally made him "the man on the spot."


Henry Petrin, currently visiting his mother, Mrs. Mary Petrin of 27 Vine Street, is airport manager for Pan American World Airways at Recife, Brazil. The steamy, sub-tropical city of almost one million souls burst into the headlines of the world's newspapers last January when Captain Enrique Galvao seized the Portuguese cruise liner the "Santa Maria" carrying some (Continued On Page 2)

900 unsuspecting tourists in the South Atlantic.

In the hectic days that followed, Petrin's office became the sensitive operations center for the task force of navy planes that was dispatched to track down the errant steamship. Albert Schomburg of 1 Essex Street, Belleville died June 12 in his home of a heart attack. He was 65 years old.

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Belleville Going To Seed?

Is Belleville going to seed? Some of the statistics which come to our attention lead us to believe that all is not well in Belleville. According to the latest report of the U.S. Census Bureau, 124 Belleville dwellings are in a dilapidated condition. 925 more are badly deteriorated. The 124 dilapidated dwellings are more than eyesores. They present a threat to the safety of the dwellers and the security of adjacent homes.

There are a sufficient number of ordinances on the books already — which if enforced would compel the owners of dilapidated dwellings to do something to correct the conditions which have led the U.S. Census Bureau to classify 124 Belleville homes as unfit for human habitation.

The Wrong Hearing

Today the Essex County Board of Elections sitting as the Ward Commissioners of the Town of Belleville have invited complaining citizens to appear before it stating their complaints in opposition to the ward boundary lines which have been established by the Essex County Board of Elections and Eugene G. Barnett, Belleville's Town Clerk.

In establishing a new ward alignment the Ward Commissioners conveniently placed Commissioner Nuncio Pico in the North Ward by the simple expedient of curving the north boundary of the South Ward around Pico's backyard. The effect of this shenanigan was to place Mayor Isadore Padula in a separate ward from Pico.

Under the new ward alignment, Padula is in the ward which includes Silver Lake and Pico now finds himself divorced from the Silver Lake section which was his strongest voting area in the 1957 Commission election.

The Ward Commissioners in a peculiar procedure have invited the protesting citizens to appear at different hours of the day instead of following the normal procedure of calling a public hearing at a given hour for all concerned. This unusual procedure for a public hearing is most baffling.

We believe the people of Belleville are being made witnesses to the wrong hearing. What should be taking place today is a hearing before the Grand Jury with Ward Commissioners testifying under penalty of perjury. The Ward Commissioners should be compelled to testify under oath concerning the political pressures brought upon the individuals which led to the present irregular realignment of Belleville's two wards.

Instead of subjecting our citizens to interrogatories, the Ward Commissioners should take the Bible in hand and tell us the truth about the politicians who exerted pressure to insure for themselves a politically expedient division of our community.

Census in Town Getting Figures On Employment

Several Belleville families were contacted by the U. S. Census Bureau during the week of June 19 as part of the bureau's compiling national figures on employment and unemployment. Information collected from Belleville families will be combined with that collected in 332 other areas of the country to provide the national estimates. Approximately 35,000 households are included each month in the Current Population Survey.

These households are selected at random under the Census Bureau's scientific sampling program to provide a representative cross-section of all classes of the population, and all types of areas in the country — large cities, small towns, rural areas and so forth. Facts on employment and unemployment collected in Belleville are forwarded to the Census Bureau headquarters in Washington to be processed by the Bureau's electronic computer. The

nation report covering the information collected during the week of June 19 will be issued in Washington early in July. Current Population Survey information also was collected from a number of Belleville families. Under the guidance of the American Foundation for the Blind, a two-year international survey has been initiated first to collect, then to distribute, information on technological aids and devices presently available to blind persons.



Local Woman Remembers Friendly Town Vacation

One local resident with an unusual interest in the Friendly Town children who will be visiting in Nutley for the Summer is Mrs. Jerome Frank, of 43 Rossmore Place, Belleville. When she was a small girl, Mrs. Frank recalls glowingly that she had an opportunity to go on a never-to-be-forgotten Friendly Town vacation in Plainfield. Mrs. Frank's story is unusual, although her enthusiasm for her Friendly Town vacation is not. Born in Germany, Mrs. Frank was lucky enough to get out before the outbreak of hostilities. On the day her father was released from concentration camp, she was taken out of the country with a large group of children under a plan known as "Children's Transport". There she lived, with many other refugees' children, for many months, until someone she didn't know at all took her to England, to the home of some distant relatives she never had seen. There, a week before the war started in 1939, her parents were able to join her.

In 1941 the little family was able to reach the United States, where they settled in one room in New York City. Her father, formerly a lawyer, secured work as a counterman in a luncheonette. It was necessary for her mother to work, too, in order to make ends meet, so she secured employment as a seamstress on Grand Street in New York.

It was during this period, when there would have been no vacation, no relief from the heat of the city streets, that Mrs. Frank was invited to be a Friendly Town visitor. Her two weeks in the New Jersey

turned over to the town recreation department and he suggested that the school board obtain the Krugman DePetro tract along the Third River and swap this parcel with the town for the stadium.

THIRD RIVER APARTMENTS

The Krugman - DePetro property is the same which brought down the Fairway Civic Association to Tuesday's meeting. President Charles Barbone of 233

Fairway Avenue noted a news article in the Newark Sunday Star Ledger which reported that the Krugman and DePetro are to meet with the Belleville Planning Board "within two weeks" to gain approval of the apartment site. Barbone said that a check into the source of the news clipping revealed "work would begin on the apartment within three weeks."

Mayor Padula said he also saw the Newark newspaper clipping. "Commissioner Kiernan and I are both members of the Planning Board," Padula said, "and take it from us, we have not heard anything about the Krugman - DePetro property as a recreational area."

Padula noted that the Planning Board could not approve the apartment project. He suggested Barbone attend the next Planning Board meeting to obtain answers to any other questions the Fairway Civic Association might have.

Critic James Golden of Tappan Avenue, said the Planning Board could change the zone to permit apartments along the Third River; however Padula noted that any such move would have to be approved by the Board of Commissioners. Golden later suggested the Planning Board be abolished.

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Third Graders Make Exciting Discovery The Trolley

Had Doubts Until They Took A 15-Cent Ride

The third graders of Miss Barbara Rosenberg's class in School 9 take a pretty dim view of a new-fangled means of travel they discovered the other day . . . the trolley car.

More than a decade has slipped by since the once-ubiquitous "ding-dings" rattled along Washington Avenue laden with shoppers and hurried commuters. None of the children in Miss Rosenberg's class were even born when buses replaced the trolleys. So perhaps it's not too surprising that one of her charges—blonde, eight-year-old Robin Zeiss—reacted to the proposed trip by stating flatly:

"There's no such thing as a trolley—my mother says so."

But she was talked into going on a trip on the trolley anyway. In due course she joined her classmates in dropping 15 cents into the "little money box beside the engineer."

The idea for the trip started during a class discussion of a mural the children had drawn to illustrate transportation through the years. Each child spoke to the rest of the class about the era his or her drawing depicted. Everything from covered wagons to the first plane was covered.

It was then that Miss Rosenberg decided on the trip from Franklin Avenue station of the subway to Penn Station, Newark. School Principal Mrs. Viola Spray agreed, and in less time than it takes to tell, it was a case of "all aboard for Bloomfield Avenue, Park Avenue, Norfolk Street and points east."

When they first saw the trolley turning around at Franklin Avenue for the trip to Newark, most of her charges were something less than ecstatic about boarding the strange-looking "bus," Miss Rosenberg recalls. "They were sure it was going to crash into the wall," she said this week.

Dark-eyed Karen De Rose noted the "sparks coming out" of the pole on top of the trolley. She was afraid they were going to come in the window. As the ride progressed, the lurching motion of the strange new conveyance served only to increase her apprehension.

"It was a pretty bumpy ride," she said solemnly. But she conceded it "was interesting."

John Longo, age nine, opined it was like riding a jet in the clouds. "However, given the choice of riding to school on a pony or a trolley every day, John told Miss Rosenberg firmly:

"Gimme a pony every time."

Nine-year-old Donna Jeanotte reported she was very shaken around like Mexican jolly bunnies (they're probably related to the well known jumping variety), while Jo-Ann Lopez thought it rather like riding in the "twilight zone, on dark steel tracks . . . very dark." The influence of television on the tots was plainly discernible in their reaction to the outsized white light in the center of the trolley ceiling.

"It looked like a great white eye," she said. The children, Arnold, Striano, age nine, thought the trip was "fun," especially when it looked like trolleys approaching on the other track were "going to hit us." Another boy said there weren't too many passengers when "we got to North Fork (Norfolk Street)."

Two girls who appeared glad to dismiss the trip as "a pretty scary ride" were Shirley Shires and Sally Kay.

"That trolley rocked from side to side," Sally recalled. Shirley thought it was going to "tip over." She figures she'll stick to the old-fashioned bus on future trips to Newark.

Old-timers such as parents and readers above the age of ten will be interested to learn one young lady's reaction to the trip.

"Oh, I guess it was okay, but I don't figure trolleys will ever amount to anything like buses."

Shades of San Francisco!

Miss Barbara Decker Plans To Attend Mathematics Institute This Summer

The director of the 1961 Summer Institute in Mathematics at Bowdoin College has announced that Miss Barbara Decker of the Belleville High School faculty has been awarded a stipend to attend the institute. Supported by the National Science Foundation, the institute at Bowdoin is part of a Master's degree program conducted for secondary school teachers who were mathematics majors at accredited colleges. The program is especially planned for gifted teachers likely to exert leadership in the teaching of mathematics by developing modern courses and writing new texts.

Miss Decker joined the Belleville High School faculty in the fall of 1959. She is a graduate of Douglass College, and has

done graduate work in mathematics at the New York University.

Miss Decker will begin studies at the distinguished seaboard college on June 28. Some of the country's outstanding mathematicians are giving courses in the Bowdoin program. On hand during this coming summer session will be University of Wisconsin Logician Steven C. Kleene and also Bowdoin's own Professor Cecil T. Holmes, author of texts in mathematics much used in American colleges and universities. Available to the high school teachers in the institute are courses presented in an associated Bowdoin institute conducted primarily for college teachers. Professor Ernst Snapper of the University of Indiana, Professor Robert Sloan of Oswego State Teachers' College and Professor Howard Alexander, Head of the Department of Mathematics at Earlham College, give these courses.

Bowdoin is the college of Longfellow and Hawthorne, and Longfellow began his teaching career at his alma mater. Known for a literary tradition that has lingered on from the time of the great poet, Bowdoin has been preeminent in the teaching of mathematics and science, and has placed an unusually high percentage of its graduates into research and in college teaching.

Citizenship: Must be a citizen or National of the United States.

Education: Although the Navy prefers High School Graduates, there are no specific educational requirements. All applicants take a test to show their ability to read, write and think clearly.

Character: The Navy wants men of good character with average or above learning ability.

Marriage: Married men or those with dependents are acceptable, under certain conditions for enlistment in the regular Navy.

Term of Enlistment: Applicants enlist for four or six years at their own option.

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
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
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












